May they carry the traditions of our great Game to the great Commonwealth Country and show that the Barbarians represent everything that is best in the Game. If they are as popular as the "Lions" of 1950 and 1955, then the side will achieve greatness.

The Cardiff Club is honoured by having three of its leading players—Cliff Morgan, Gordon Wells and Gareth Griffiths—in the side to tour in Canada, Lloyd Williams is standing by as a reserve ready to travel, and during this Easter Holidays will play for the Barbarians to emulate his illustrious brother, Bleddyn.

Park at the end of their tour. This will be the fourth special match played by the Barbarians on the Ground which they now regard as their Spiritual Home. The idea of such a match was helped into being by the late Arthur Cornish, of the Cardiff Club during the 1947-48 season, to produce extra revenue to meet the increased costs of the Wallabies Tour of that season and to enable them to return to Australia via Canada. It is fitting therefore that the Barbarians themselves should now go to Canada.

Yesterday the Barbarians paid their annual visit to the Penarth Ground. This match has become the social outing of the Welsh Rugby season.

During the post-war years, more and more ladies attend the match at Penarth and of course, the sun shines down! Today the Barbarians enter the International atmosphere of the Cardiff Arms Park. The meeting of the two sides has produced keen football in recent years. Last season 25,000 spectators watched a draw of six points apiece, and in fact the Barbarians could do no better than win one match, against Penarth, during that tour.

This year they hope to do better for they have one of the strongest sides ever to Tour Wales and contains 35 players. Over 30 of them are internationals and Cardiff will do well to win today against such strong opposition. Peter Goodfellow will be all out to prove his team is one of the best of the year in Wales.

The Cardiff Club expresses its regret at the sad passing of Mr. J. P. Jordan during the season. He will not be with the Barbarians this season, as a friend of the party and a representative of the Daily Telegraph. A great student and servant of the Game, he was a popular visitor to South Wales and especially to Cardiff.
