CARDIFF POSE VARSITIES A TOUGH TASK

AFTER a busy Welsh rugby season the Cardiff rugby touring side, with seven internationals in it, has now struck form and should provide formidable opposition to Southern Universities at Newlands to-day.

A mid-week crowd of close on 20,000 is expected and there is promise of bright rugby.

Having played more than 30 games during the recent British winter, and having displayed ample evidence of it in their big win over Eastern Province, the win over Eastern Province, the Cardiff players should not be lacking in team-work and understanding in their fourth game on South African soil. Southern Universities have not

the opportunity of playing a combination this season, had as a combination this season, although several of the team did play together in the recent Western Province Colts game.

Thus the task of the home team seems difficult at first

ne home glance, but closer examination of its strength indicates plenty of individual talent, which, expertly led at forward most particularly by the Springbok Hannes Marais, could be harnessed effectively at short notice to exercise allshort notice to exercise all-important control of the ball.

For possession is the factor likely to influence the result.

STRONG BACKS

With players of the reputation of Ken Jones and Gerald Davies in the centre and with backs who ran Easterns off their feet the Cardiff pack with its formidable international front row will strive to play to that strength. strength.

The task of the Varsities pack is to deny them as much possession as possible, and at the same time give their own backs the chance to probe and penetrate.

Although the home inside backs seems less illustrious than their opposites' sight should not be lost of the fact that Eben Olivier, the Springbok centre, has shown peak form lately, and that the half-backs, Cilliers Holm and Mike Nicolai, although coupled for the first time, have the important asset of provincial experience.

Last night the manager, Mr. Lyn Williams, said that Cardiff looked forward to playing against the Varsities and at Newlands.

DELIGHTED

He added that Cardiff, playing at Windhoek and Upington in their first games, had taken time to acclimatize. "We are obviously a different team at coast level and our team enjoyed the cooler conditions at Port Elizabeth on Saturday and the yielding going."

The touring party were delighted on arriving in Cape Town yesterday that cool and drizzling conditions prevailed.

The seven international players in the team are: Gareth Edwards, full-back, who has won a cap for Wales as scrum-half. Ken Jones, well-known as a Wales and Lions centre; Gerald Davies, said to be the fastest centre in Britain; Billy Hullin, the scrum-half and captain; the entire front row consisting of the props H. Norris and J. O'Shea; and the hooker W. J. Thomas.

The wings are fast, Keri Jones being a national sprint champion, while Maurice Richards is right on form, having scored a hattrick of tries against Easterns on Saturday and also five conversions

CHIDDY DOUBTFUL

Last night the UCT centre, Hanlon Chiddy, reported that he was still troubled by a collarbone injury sustained against Van der Stel at Newlands on Saturday.

The ligaments of the right collar-bone are torn and Chiddy is obviously a doubtful starter. He will see a doctor to-day for final confirmation.

Should he not play his place would probably be taken by the Stellenbosch player, Taylor Botha.

Mr. Charles Turvey, secretary of the Western Province Rugby Union, said there was a tremendous interest in the game, the more so after the "bad shaking Cardiff gave Easterns". He expected a crowd of 20,000 provided weather conditions were favourable.

The curtain-raiser would be a schools senior game between Bishops and Hottentots Holland timed for 2.45 p.m. The main game will begin at 4 p.m.
