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


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
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The Konica Minolta Cup is a showcase for the semi-pro game in Wales. Howard Evans anticipates two cracking games this weekend

here is a saying in cup folklore that "West is best", and in the semi-final between Llandovery and Llanelli the latter have been the main reason for that adage, having won 13 of the 35 finals. But for Llandovery, even the last four, let alone the final showdown, is uncharted territory.

In previous cup meetings, Llanelli lead 2-1, but Llandovery caused an upset last season by dismissing Llanelli 29-21 at Church Bank. And their 21-6 victory in the league last September will have done the club's confidence no harm at all.

New Zealander John Elrick has returned home, but Simon Daniel's boot has proved equally effective for the Drovers and lock Arwel Davies should be leading a side that has back-rower Jonathan Mills home from a short spell at London Welsh.

Llanelli have young talent galore. They could include Morgan Stoddart at fullback, but in truth they have pace aplenty and several of their players will be knocking on the Scarlets' door next season. Chris Rowe is the skipper at lock, but both Dan Godfrey and loan Cunningham have led the side during the campaign.

Cardiff and Bridgend both represent East Wales and have met six times in the cup, with Cardiff leading 5-1, including two finals: 14-6 in 1981, and 12-12 win on try-count the following season. Bridgend's sole success came in 1975 by 6-4 at the Arms Park.

Fly-half Craig Evans is running into top form for Cardiff and Darren Allinson is a fine prospect at scrum-half, while Jamie Roberts at fullback looks a star in the making. The pack grows stronger each week with Rhys Gill, Ross Johnston and Gareth Gravell all powerful figures.

Bridgend have signed former Wales fly-half Matthew Jones and have another good kicker in Gareth David at fullback. The squad will include Andrew "Wizz" Williams, who was in the top division when League rugby began back in September 1990.

All told, the semi-pro game in both West and East Wales has plenty to shout about, not least two great semi-finals this weekend.



Drovers return

With a win over Llanelli earlier this season under their belts, lestyn Thomas is hoping for more of the same from his Llandovery squad this time around

aving ploughed his furrow with Llandovery since 1987, director of rugby lestyn Thomas has seen his team through good times and bad. This season is no exception; on the one hand they're involved in a relegation dogfight, and on the other they're gunning for a place in the Konica Minolta Cup Final.

Thomas believes that the club's cup form has helped their fight on both fronts. "We've been able to use the cup to gain a bit of momentum." he explains. "We're enjoying the competition and it has helped with our confidence in the league."

Aside from boosting league form, Thomas knows exactly how much getting one over on Llanelli and playing at the Millennium Stadium would mean to the Drovers faithful. "It's a great honour to be here," he says. "Llandovery have never been this far before but we're certainly not just making up the numbers, nor would we be on April 28."

Llandovery's success over the past few years has helped cement this never-say-die attitude, explains Thomas, having built his team

around a team ethos rather than star power. "We like to get maximum performances out of our lads, who aren't here for individual glory but because they want to play rugby and want to be part of the Premiership and that's fine by us," comments the Drovers' boss.

Within this cohesive unit. Thomas has particular praise for such talented youngsters as

hooker Emyr Phillips and utility back Howard Thomas: "They're outstanding prospects who've been playing consistently well for us all season."

Llandovery will certainly have to be at their most united to overcome Llanelli and Thomas is well aware of the task at hand. "They're a highly competent side with a lot of form and a lot of history of doing well in this cup," he says. "They've got some good younger players who train and play full-time, but we haven't done badly against them in the past. We knocked them out of the cup last year so

this should be an enjoyable game, both a derby and a semi-final."

The team certainly had a nailbiting route to this weekend's game with comfortable wins over Nantyffyllon and Caerphilly being offset by a gripping, last-minute victory at Bedwas in the quarterfinal. "It was a tight game and Bedwas are obviously a proud club and a difficult team to beat," admits Thomas. "We did well to stay at it and get the points in injury time. It was enjoyable for us but equally disappointing for Bedwas."

Their injury-time away victory encapsulates both the agony and ecstasy the cup competitions can provide. A win over the 13-times winners this weekend would spark ecstatic scenes among the Llandovery faithful and, according to their coach, the anticipation has been building since the game was announced. "People have been looking forward to the Llanelli game because we've fared well in the past, so we'll be heading into the match full of confidence."

And what better way for lestyn Thomas to mark 20 years at the club than with his team's first final at the Millennium Stadium?

Rock steady

A builder and the bedrock of the Drovers' front row. Andrew Jones is relishing the chance to reach his first cup final

he term "stalwart" is often overused, but it's fair to say that Andrew Jones fits the bill perfectly. Since making his debut at the age of 18, the prop has been a constant presence in the Llandovery engine room. At 33 years of age he's seen a lot in his time but the amiable veteran believes that reaching the Konica Minolta Cup Final would represent the finest moment in his career to date.

"We've never been this far before," he comments. "Personally, having been at the club so long, it's a huge incentive to get there. At my age there's not too many games like this left so I can't wait for the kick-off."

For a few moments in the

previous round it didn't look like Llandovery, or Jones, would make it this far but, according to the Carmarthenshire builder, it was the Drovers' team spirit that pulled them through against Bedwas. "We never gave up," he says. "They started well and I think at half time they must have thought they'd win the game, especially as they were the home team, but we stuck at it and scored the winner in the last minute."

That 21-14 win set up this weekend's mouth-watering

showdown and, in the opinion of Jones, has helped kick start the Drovers' struggling league season. "We've been up for the cup and it has given us a bit of momentum." he enthuses. "Since then, we've beaten Bridgend, Maesteg and Newport in the league, so it's given us a lot of confidence."

- a fact illustrated by the way he relishes the prospect of this weekend's clash. "Everyone in the Llandovery area is pleased we've drawn Llanelli because they're the team to beat due to their cup heritage," he says. "We've got a lot of respect for them and we've had some cracking games against them in the past but we've beaten them earlier in the season

and we know we can beat anyone on our day."

The familiarity between the two sides, believes Jones, should make for a close and intriguing contest. "A lot of the players know each other," he says. "They've got some guys who've played for Llandovery and we've got some lads who've had experience with them."

And if the Drovers can claim another local scalp, the tantalising prospect of appearing at the hallowed Millennium Stadium awaits. "We didn't really talk about it until the later rounds but we started thinking before the Bedwas game that we're only two victories away from the national stadium. This match is probably the best opportunity we'll ever get to reach the final."

Llanelli may be the "Cup Kings", but the man who has been the bedrock of the Llandovery pack for over a decade is more than willing to steal their crown.



With a squad as young as Llanelli's, Appleyard concedes

that, while they've strung together a good cup run, a stable league form has been harder to achieve. "Inconsistency comes from naivety and the boys not preparing properly mentally for games in terms of motivation and build-up," he explains. "Some days we haven't turned up in the league but we've been working hard to make sure that hasn't happened in this knock-out competition."

The Llanelli man sees this weekend's encounter as a clash between two sides with plenty of mutual respect and a local bond. "As a region we really want Llandovery to stay up," he admits. "But this is the cup and we have to be ruthless. Unfortunately for Llandovery they're the ones in the way at the moment."

In Appleyard's opinion, a triumph at the Millennium Stadium on the 28th would be a fitting reward for their season's efforts. "As a group they've learned so much," he says. "It would be wonderful to have something to show for it come the end of the season, to prove that the side of 2006/07 is a great team."



Final focus

The prospect of this weekend's semi-final showdown has provided Llanelli's lan Jones with a welcome sting to the tail end of the season

or Llanelli prop lan Jones, this year's Konica Minolta Cup has proved a real boost, helping him and his teammates maintain their late-season concentration. "The cup gives us something to look forward to," he explains. "We know we won't be winning the league but the cup has allowed us to go into training and really focus. It's tough for other clubs in our position who aren't in the competition as they've got nothing to aim for."

The young loosehead sees that

chance to run out at the Millennium Stadium on April 28 as the pinnacle of a year of hard work. "It would be against either Bridgend or Cardiff and both would be a tough game," he admits. "Luckily both teams want to play rugby so it would be a great way to end the season."

But the 21-year-old is certainly not underestimating the threat Llandovery pose to his final dreams this weekend. "It will be a hard match but if we can get the ball to our backs we can finish Llandovery off," he believes. "They've got a

strong pack but we're definitely up for the challenge."


In Jones's opinion, Llanelli's watershed moment was their 17-3 win at Newport in February. "That was the turning point," he says. "We all thought that if we could go to Newport and beat them we could beat anyone. The preparation for the game was brilliant and everything just clicked for us, it really helped our confidence."

On a personal level, Jones has been pleased with his form in both the league and cup this season. At 6ft 3in and almost 19 stone, the hard-working loosehead has been turning a few heads. "It's a great stage to put your hand up and show people you're still trying, wanting to play rugby and working hard to make yourself a better player," he comments.

Despite being one of Llanelli's most consistent performers in the competition, it was an injury sustained in the cup that nearly cut short his season. "I got a bang against Ponty and had to come off," he recalls. "I had a haematoma in my left thigh, so I've been out for a while, but I should be ready to face Llandovery."

Llanelli fans will be buoyed to hear that Jones should be fit for this weekend's match. Born in Carmarthen, he's been capped by Wales from Under 16 to Under 21 levels and represented his country at the 2004 Under 19s World Cup. He's indicative of the young talent the Principality Premiership boasts, with Llanelli in particular nurturing several hot prospects.

lan Jones may be relishing the Cup Final as a great end-of-season prize, but many feel this could be just the beginning of a bountiful medal haul over the coming years for the promising youngster.



Stephens is sure that the club's biggest obstacle this season has



hen Bridgend take on Cardiff this weekend, you will be hard pressed to find a safer pair of hands than Tom Evans, Bridgend's athletic second-rower. It's hardly surprising, given that Tom's other job is delivering babies to overjoyed parents as part of his medical studies in Cardiff. "It can make getting to training a challenge – newborn babies don't always keep to timetables," he chuckles.

The 6ft 7in former Christ College, Brecon pupil will be out to make a point this weekend after playing with the Cardiff Under 19 and Blues Under 20 set-ups, only to be let go. That's not to say Evans bears any ill will to his former club, far from it. "I learnt a lot in my years at Cardiff and coaches like Bob Newman were integral to my development," he says. "I also cut my teeth at Glamorgan Wanderers. The experience I gained there has stood me in good stead."

After Cardiff released him, he spent his first year at Caerphilly in the inaugural season of the Principality Premiership. "It was my first season of senior rugby and I thoroughly enjoyed it," he recalls, "but unfortunately the Cheesemen were relegated. Luckily, Bridgend heard I was available and I'm in my second season now and thoroughly enjoying it."

Despite battling with Ospreys tyro Mike Powell this season, Evans has kept his head down and has begun to find form. "We've started putting in some decent

performances in the Premiership," he comments. "We've always been a decent side but we're just getting back to winning ways. It's a habit more than anything."

Pack mentality

Hooker Ross Johnston offers a front-row view on Cardiff's cup clash

f there's one player who has embodied Cardiff's never-say-die attitude during this year's Konica Minolta Cup run it's Ross Johnston." That's the message from his head coach, Justin Burnell. Johnston - recently turned 21 and the brother-in-law of Wales's Grand Slam winning captain, Michael Owen - has added an allaction, combative attitude to the Cardiff pack that has led them to this year's semis, with a

series of outstanding displays.

Talking to Ross, it's clear he has found his niche at the Arms Park. "We had a nail biter at the Gnoll that we did well to come through, and we were clear winners against Swansea in the 39-8 win." he says. "You have to play the best teams to win the cup and that's what we've been doing. Bridgend will be no different. This side has been playing good rugby of late, and it's just reward for our hard work."

This weekend's game at Sardis Road can't come quickly enough for Johnston. "We are desperate to win the game but you never know in a cup match, anything can happen," admits the Cardiff hooker. "The whole game can turn on one moment of inspiration. Bridgend are a tough side to beat, we're expecting a very stern test.

"Along with Scott Roberts and Rhys Gill, we form the youngest front-row in the Premiership so we will have our work cut out," he continues. "Upfront will be a huge challenge, but in captain Gareth

Gravell we have an inspirational leader from the back of the scrum." Hailing from Beddau, Johnston

says that Sardis will be a fitting place to battle out the semis: "It's a historic ground but I'll have to put sentiment aside and go out and perform. Hopefully I'll have

a few local boys coming down

to cheer me on."

Johnston has thrived this season under Justin Burnell. "We set ourselves a target of a top-six finish and a decent cup run, so we're on our way," he observes. "Personally. it's been satisfying to play weekin, week-out. Last year was more frustrating - I played a few games



with Glamorgan Wanderers, and got a rare run-out with the Blues between a few niggling injuries, but there was no consistency."

Having recently being offered a development contract with the Blues for next season, Johnston is determined to make his mark. "Next year will be a big one for me, Rhys Thomas will probably be at the World Cup, I'm hoping to get some Blues experience alongside my cousin Duane Goodfield. I just want to keep my head down and keep performing. I've never played on the Millennium Stadium and it has a mythical status in Welsh rugby, so it's a huge incentive to turn over Bridgend."



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





























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
