



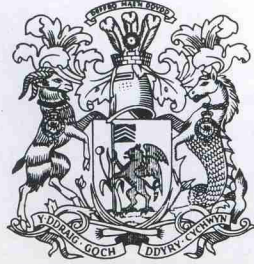

Cardiff v. Bath

THURSDAY, 1st JANUARY, 1987

KICK-OFF 3.00p.m.

Well I don't have to tell you what day it is today so let's begin this brand new year with a quote from the most famous Caledonian bard Robert Burns. "The best laid schemes o' mice an' men Gang aft a-gley—" Can there be any words more apt to manifestly describe the situation in which we find ourselves today. The mighty Bath side with three successive John Player Cup wins under their belt, rightly described as the best club side in England and currently playing at an all time zenith in their history were coming to Cardiff looking for a first ever win on the Arms Park.

Our visit to Bath earlier this season saw the home side comprehensive winners 28 points to 9. They had also won the corresponding away game last season and fully expected to achieve that first ever Arms Park victory last New Year's Day. That ambition was again thwarted when we won a magnificent game by 30 points to 12 however. Bath captain Richard Hill admitted that that defeat had really hurt them. So after their very good win early this season he made some very unequivocal statements concerning today's game. He stated that Bath would win, not maybe, but would definitely win. Now such statements can act as a two edge sword and there could have been no better motivation for the Cardiff players to defend that proud record.

Things were all go then for a really prestigious occasion. An extremely generous sponsorship by British Gas/Wales and British Gas/South West meant the Help The Aged in the Cardiff and Bath districts would receive a mini bus each from the sponsorship of this wonderful club occasion. But as Robert Burns said things have "Gang aft a-gley". The England selectors after a somewhat disappointing Divisional Championship have decided to hold an extra trial match at Twickenham on January 3rd and in so doing have

selected no more than ten Bath players for the trial. Now because of the World Cup next May, great importance is being placed on the forthcoming Home Championship and of course players do not want to jeopardise their positions in their national team so they can't antagonise the selectors by going against their wishes. Hence the absence of Bath's ten trialists today has taken the gilt off the ginger bread somewhat. Still the Bath club and players are very unhappy about the situation but there is nothing they can do about it. British Gas also will be very disappointed but the continuance of the sponsorship speaks highly of their generosity.

So on with the game and what a scalp for the Bath side if they can pull off a first ever win on The Arms Park. Today's game will be the 36th in the series between us. Of the 35 previous games we have won 26 to Bath's 8 with the remaining game drawn. This will be their fifteenth visit to The Arms Park and the nearest they have come to that elusive win came on two occasions in January 1937 and January 1948 when we scraped home by a try to nil in each game. No victories in Cardiff have also meant that they have failed to score two consecutive wins over us. Sadly too, today will also be the last opportunity, for the time being anyway, of recording the double over us. They have not been too happy about coming to Cardiff every New Year's Day, and who can blame them for that. With the policy of pruning the fixture list from next year on, we will play each other on the first Saturday in January home one year and away the next. So there are some real bonuses for the Bath side today and even though they are very depleted I'm sure they will be going flat out to get that very coveted victory. To Bath then we bid you a festive welcome but we hope you don't get the impression that we are going to underestimate you even though you have been shorn of your most talented players.

1986 is now a thing of the past and perhaps it's a year that will not exactly hold too high in our esteem. The regaining of the Schweppes Cup was the most memorative occasion. We seemed to be managing quite well at home and during 1986 we only lost at home to The BaaBaas in March and then to Pontypridd on Boxing Day. Our away record however is cause for concern as we lost five away fixtures at the back end of 1985-86 and the first half of this current season has been as bad as any season for quite some time. In all we have lost eight of our fourteen away games. Our present record stands at: played 27, won 16, lost 9, and drawn 2 with 557 points for to 461 against. 1986 also saw the defection of Terry Holmes and the retirement of Gareth Davies and this created a very rare situation in the Cardiff Club. I would venture to say that it's many a long day since we have been unable to field an international at either inside or outside half. That certainly breaks quite a long tradition in this club so let's hope the situation will be put to rights sooner than later. 1987 may hold better prospects for us we hope. That goes most sincerely to you all however and on behalf of the players and committee we wish you all the very best for 1987.

Finally in conjunction with the Bath Club we would like to earnestly thank British Gas/Wales and British Gas/South West for their magnificent contribution and sponsorship of today's game.

New Year Mudlarks

January 1, 1986: **CARDIFF 30pts BATH 12pts**

TODAY'S VISITORS from Bath have never won on The Arms Park, and according to their captain and scrum half Richard Hill, they will do so today. Riding high as probably the leading club side in England, they mean business and Cardiff are well prepared for the challenge.

The same situation occurred last New Year's Day when Bath arrived at The Arms Park determined to win a match played in extremely difficult conditions but in the end they failed through a remarkable second-half Cardiff recovery.

The clubs first met in 1924 and have played 34 matches with 27 won by Cardiff and 6 by Bath with 1 drawn. All six Cardiff defeats have been away at Bath. The drawn match was in the second meeting in 1926. Four matches have been cancelled owing to bad weather.

The New Year's Day fixture is a comparatively recent affair but last season's outstanding match was watched by a large holiday crowd who braved the weather, many travelling from Bath to cheer for their side.

Bath set off with a bang and were in the lead after three minutes when outside-half Stuart Barnes cut through and Travaskis skated over for a try that Barnes converted. This was the start they wanted and soon they were 12 points in the lead. Back row forward Roger Spurrell dashed over from a wheeled set scrum. Again Barnes converted and it looked as if they would kill off The Arms Park bogey.

Cardiff steadied and got used to the slippery, wet, muddy turf. They found their paddling legs and Adrian Hadley scored a try after holding a long pass from Gareth Davies. It was not converted but then Alan Glasson on the right wing scored the first of his three tries through following up smartly a kick to the goal line, and Gareth Davies converted. At the interval it was 12-10 to Bath and Cardiff supporters breathed more easily.

The second half was a revelation — even better than the first which had been hard and exciting. Bath were not to score again but Cardiff collected another 20 points and Gareth Davies proved the supreme controller as Alan Phillips got his pack to produce a mighty effort against a very strong and experienced Bath eight. It was hard, very hard but still sporting and a credit to both sides.


In the second half, Gareth Davies kicked a penalty goal for Cardiff to take the lead and then another penalty for 16-12. Now Cardiff were racing to victory. Glasson got a second try followed by one from scrum half Terry Lee and it was 24-12.

Try as they did Bath had little chance as Cardiff held a firm grip on the proceedings through the pack and Gareth Davies. Finally, Glasson ran 50 yards for his third and Davies converted superbly from the touch line.

The match ended with warm applause for both sides and for referee Clive Norling. It had been a special victory. Cardiff had fielded ten internationals and there were eight in the Bath side; little wonder there was an atmosphere similar to that when Wales play England on the National Ground.

Bath have played superb match winning rugby since then and although they lost recently to Gloucester and Neath they cannot be underestimated, even on their bogey ground today. If the match is even half as enjoyable as last New Year's Day, it will be worth watching.

Did you see that?

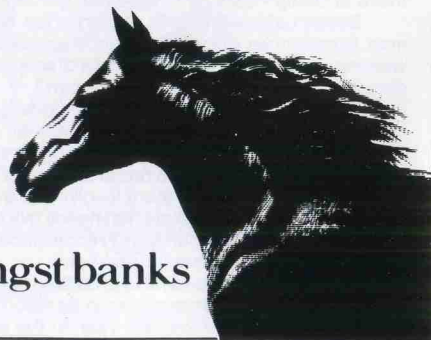

KNOW THE LAWS

A TIME FOR CHANGE

BLWYDDYN NEWYDD DDA — A Happy New Year to players supporters and especially Referees.

During the Christmas holiday, I have had the pleasure to read two books on rugby. Most readers know **Bill Samuel** as the discoverer, coach and mentor of Gareth Edwards and I recommend you to read "**Rugby — Body and Soul**" It's perceptive and very funny.

Barry John and Clem Thomas have edited "**Rugby Wales '87**". Among the shrewd observations is a chapter written by a highly respected colleague, international referee **Clive Norling**, who incidentally is in charge of this afternoon's match. I recommend you to read this well illustrated book.

In his article, Clive argues that it is now time to evolve the process of law changes for the style and pace of the game has changed drastically over the last 15 years. Clive suggests several changes to current laws but one which Welsh referees certainly support is the change in **the offside law governing general and open play**.

At present, in general or open play, a player can stand wherever he desires when the opponents have possession of the ball. If an opponent passes the ball **back** to this player then he can catch the ball and do whatever he wishes without incurring a penalty.

Now most players and all spectators will immediately cry 'offside' against the player, but under our current existing laws he is in fact still on-side. As everyone believes that he is offside why not change the law to accommodate and acknowledge that very fact, so that players who do not retire to their own side of the ball will in effect be out of the game and cannot interfere with play.

In other words the ball would be the actual off-side line when it is in a player's possession. Clive sensibly suggests that the change to the offside law should read as follows — "a player is offside in general play when he is behind an opponent who last played the ball."

This is certainly 'food for thought' for our Lawmakers.

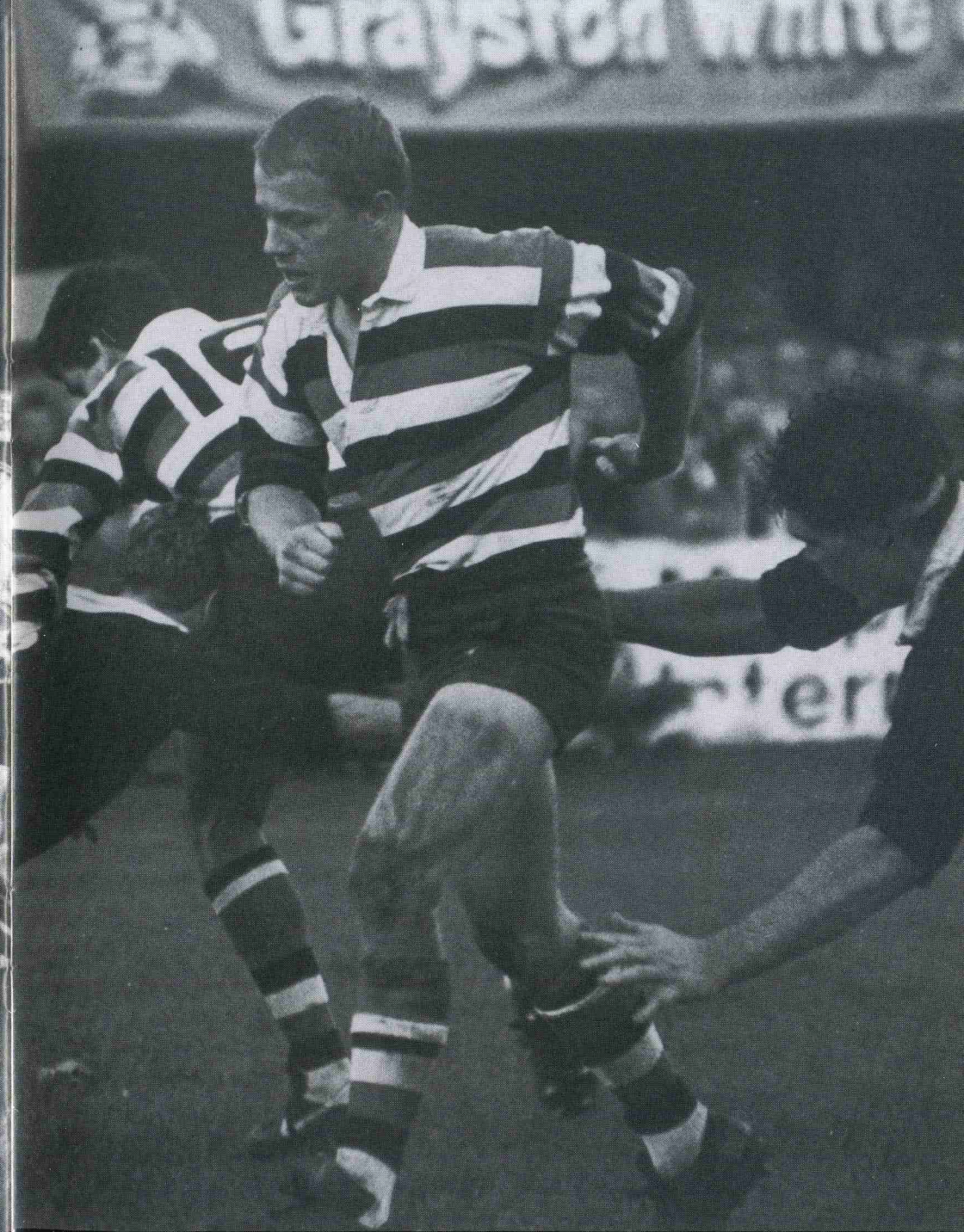

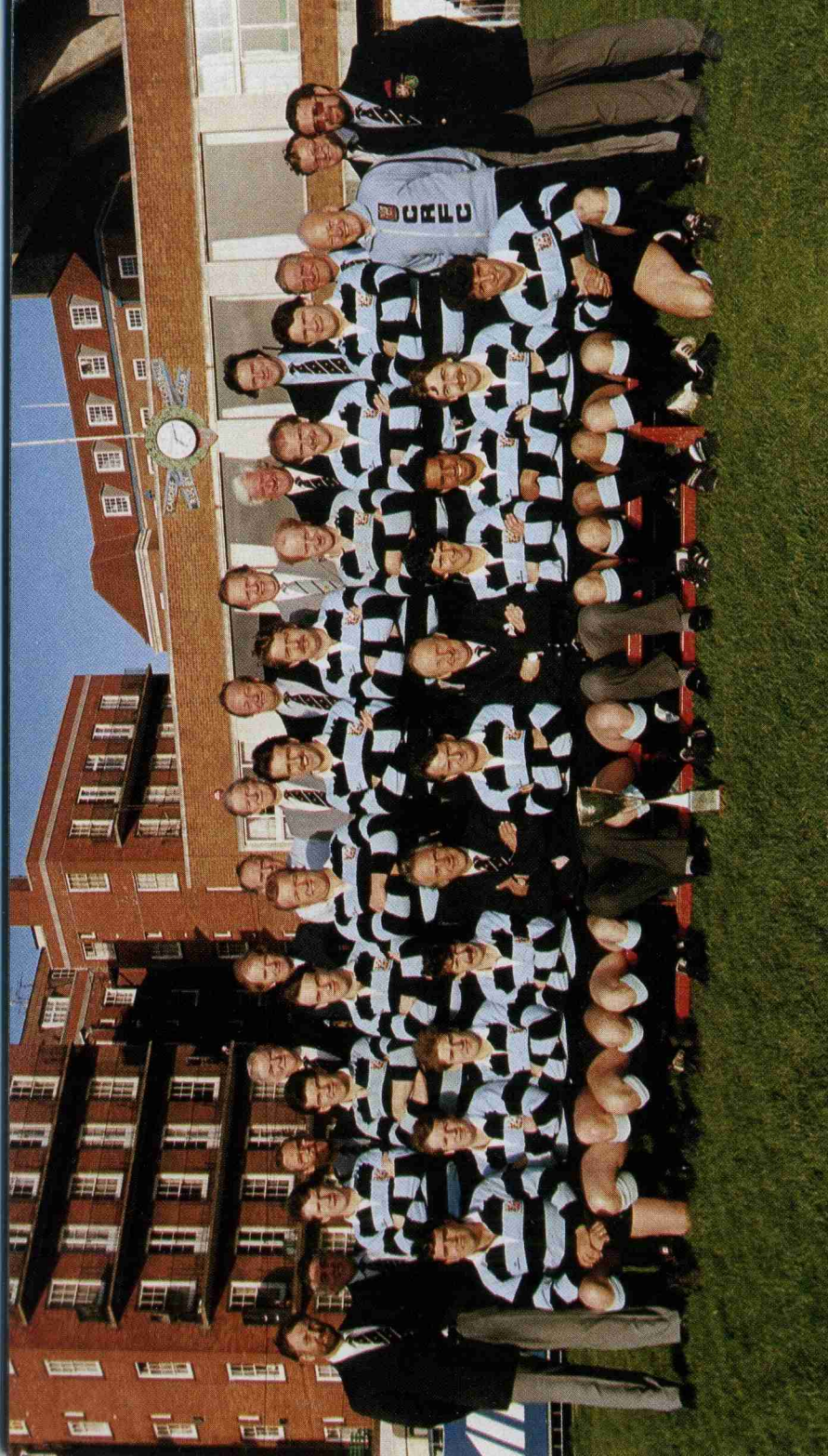
