Cardiff v. Bristol

SATURDAY, 3rd SEPTEMBER, 1988 KICK-OFF 3.00 p.m.

Welcome to season 1988-89 and all that it may hold for us. The summer break has by no means broken any sunshine records but as far as rugby in general is concerned it's certainly been a long, hot and steamy close season. From the traumas of The Welsh Tour in New Zealand, the thorny question of league structuring, the to-ing and fro-ing of players between clubs and the supposed administration changes that many are advocating in order to take Welsh Rugby into the 21st century have certainly kept tongues wagging.

From our own point of view we can take great satisfaction from our tour to New Zealand. This turned out to be a resounding success. Two excellent wins and a narrow but honourable defeat against invitation sides heavily laced with ex-All Black players brought much praise from both the New Zealand press and public. So to acting captain Alan Donovan, tour manager Mervyn John, coach Roger Beard and indeed every single player, we say well done lads, you did the Cardiff Club proud.

Alan Donovan decided to call it a day on the field of play after that tour so we hoped he would become part of our coaching set up. He mulled the situation over but finally made up his mind to throw his lot in with Swansea as it cut down his travelling considerably. Alan has been a great ambassador of both the Swansea and Cardiff clubs during his career and has always been very popular with his fellow players. I'm sure his classic style of play would have earned him more than the six caps that he won had it not been for the bad knee injury he suffered. So it's good luck to Alan in his coaching career and thanks for the scores of happy memories he has left in Cardiff for us to reflect on and enjoy.

Roger Beard is another also experiencing a change of job. His last task as coach was the New Zealand tour. The success of that tour was in no small measure due to the very hard and dedicated work that he has put in since becoming coach in season 1981–82. In his seven seasons in charge he has taken us to five cup finals with four of them bringing us the most coveted trophy in Welsh Rugby. What better testimony could there be of Rogers' track record. It's one that any coach would be justifiably proud of and I'm sure he deserves the very generous of praise from us all. Roger has now handed the coaching reins over to Gwilym Treharne whilst he himself takes on the important position of First Team chief selector. We hope both enjoy themselves in these roles.

To finalize to administrative set-up Gary Davies has taken over the Chairmanship. Gary has now become a very seasoned administrator after a very long and successful playing career as a hooker. He captained the club in 1973-74, a season he thoroughly enjoyed and is now looking forward to his stint as chairman. Others new to committee this year are recently retired Chris Webber and coaching assistant Bob Newman. Leaving office however are Haydn Williams and Lloyd Williams two men of vast knowledge and experience. Their presence in the committee room will be very much missed but we certainly hope that will not be the case around the club.

Next to the to-ings and fro-ings. Well what can we express on that score except sheer delight. The return of Mark Ring gives us much elation as his departure gave depression. Mark's flair, ingenuity and unpredictability put him in the top bracket as a rugby entertainer and it will be a very acceptable sight to see him in the Blue and Black again. Roger Bidgood's decision to join The Arms Park set up contributes enormously to the strength and the very powerful back line we can nowfield. We welcome Roger and hope his change of club finally brings that first cap which was so tantalisingly snatched from his grasp a few seasons ago. The third of the outstanding trio of recruits is David Young. And what better can be said of David than even the mighty All Blacks wished he was of New Zealand nationality — what a recommendation. So it's welcome to David and we hope he enjoys his rugby with Cardiff.

So much for the import side of things but the export news is not very good at all. Sadly we seem to have seen the last of John Scott and also the appointed vice captain Adrian Hadley. There will be more about these great players in next Wednesday's programme.

It's on with the season then and the brand new start means that all clubs will be starting with a clean sheet with the most fervent of aspirations to keep it that way. A glance at your fixture list will reveal that the number of mid week games in September and October is being steadily reduced

and soon such games could become the exception rather than the rule. This appears to be in keeping with players wishes who far prefer to play rugby on Saturday afternoons.

What better way then, for the first Saturday afternoon of the season, could there be than entertaining the great West Country club, Bristol. This season sees them enter their second century as they celebrated their 100 years of existence during 1987-88. Oddly enough we were also their first game of that campaign and we were very ingracious visitors on the day as we won the game by 20-15. That was quite a disappointment for their centenary launch but they were as pleased as punch when their turn came to make a visit to Cardiff. The game was played on the evening of St. David's Day and Bristol won by 12-10 to record only their fifth win on the Arms Park since the very first game in 1888. Mind we nearly snatched the game in the dying seconds when a brilliant break by Geraint John was finally halted very close to the the Bristol line. This all added to the excitement of the game which is inevitably par for the course of a Cardiff/Bristol game. We really have seen some corkers over the years so let's hope this will continue throughout Bristol's second century.

Last season their centenary year was celebrated in grand fashion. It culminated in a visit to Twickenham for the John Player Cup. They failed to put the icing on the cake that day however and were beaten by Harlequins by 28-22. It was a good game and as usual Bristol gave the ball plenty of air. On the day however the Quins put up a great show and were delighted to become the first London club to win the Cup. Bristol had an opportunity to put things right in the Middlesex Sevens when they again met the Quins in the final of that competition. Alas, however, some silverware to grace the centenary was not forthcoming as the Quins came out on top once again. In the Division 1 Championship table Bristol were placed in 9th position. Uncharacteristically they lost five and drew one of the ten games they played in the league so no doubt they will be looking to improve that this season.

Today's game will be the 165th game in the series which stands at 125 wins to ourselves, 31 to Bristol and 8 drawn games. Before last season their last win in Cardiff came in 1972 and the three prior to that in 1931, 1928 and their first ever in 1922. They will be very keen today to chalk up another win to make it two in a row, a feat they have done on only four occasions. To Bristol then we extend sincere greetings and say you are most welcomed visitors.



KNOW THE LAWS

EXPERIMENTAL LAW

The **TEMPORARY SUSPENSION** ('SIN BIN') commences on the 1st September 1988 and ends the 6th May 1989. It will apply to first XV teams in domestic club matches between WRU clubs only. Such matches will be controlled by referees appointed by the WRU.

The basic principle is in **LAW 26 (3) PENALTY.** "A player guilty of misconduct or dangerous play shall either be ordered off, **sent off the field for a stated period (temporary suspension)**, or else cautioned that he will be ordered off if he repeats the offence. For a similar offence after a caution or temporary suspension the player must be ordered off."

If a player is temporarily suspended he shall be sent to such place as the referee deems most appropriate and shall not re-enter the playing area until permitted to do so by the referee

In addition to a caution or temporary suspension or ordering off a penalty try or penalty kick shall be awarded.

Temporary suspension is a degree of punishment which the referee has to determine in relation to the seriousness of the offence and may be regarded as intermediary between a caution and an ordering off.


There are no specific offences that it should be applied to. **The Sin Bin must not be a substitute for the ordering off of a player.** If the offence warrants the player being ordered off then he must be ordered off.

QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

THERE MAY be just a few ancients among you out there will will remember a comedian called Rob Wilton who began his still-funny monologues with the words "the day war broke out"

The late Mr. Wilton might well therefore appreciate the rugby season proper starting on September 3rd — the day that war did indeed break out 49 years ago. In short, here we go again: whatever happened to the summer? Well, Quidnunc, as ever in pursuit of the behind-the-scenes details of our intrepid heroes, has been scouring the land to discover what the lads have been up to and it seemed appropriate to let you know some of the things that really happened during that highly-successful (both on and off the field) tour to New Zealand. While the Welsh team were suffering all types of untold difficulties, Cardiff were frankly enjoying themselves and, in turn, being such fine ambassadors for Wales and the game that a hotel at which they stayed in Rotorua, having demanded a 500-dollar bond to offset the types of extravagant behaviour previously associated with visiting (All Black) teams, said they would be welcomed back any time — and without up-front cash for potential damage.
