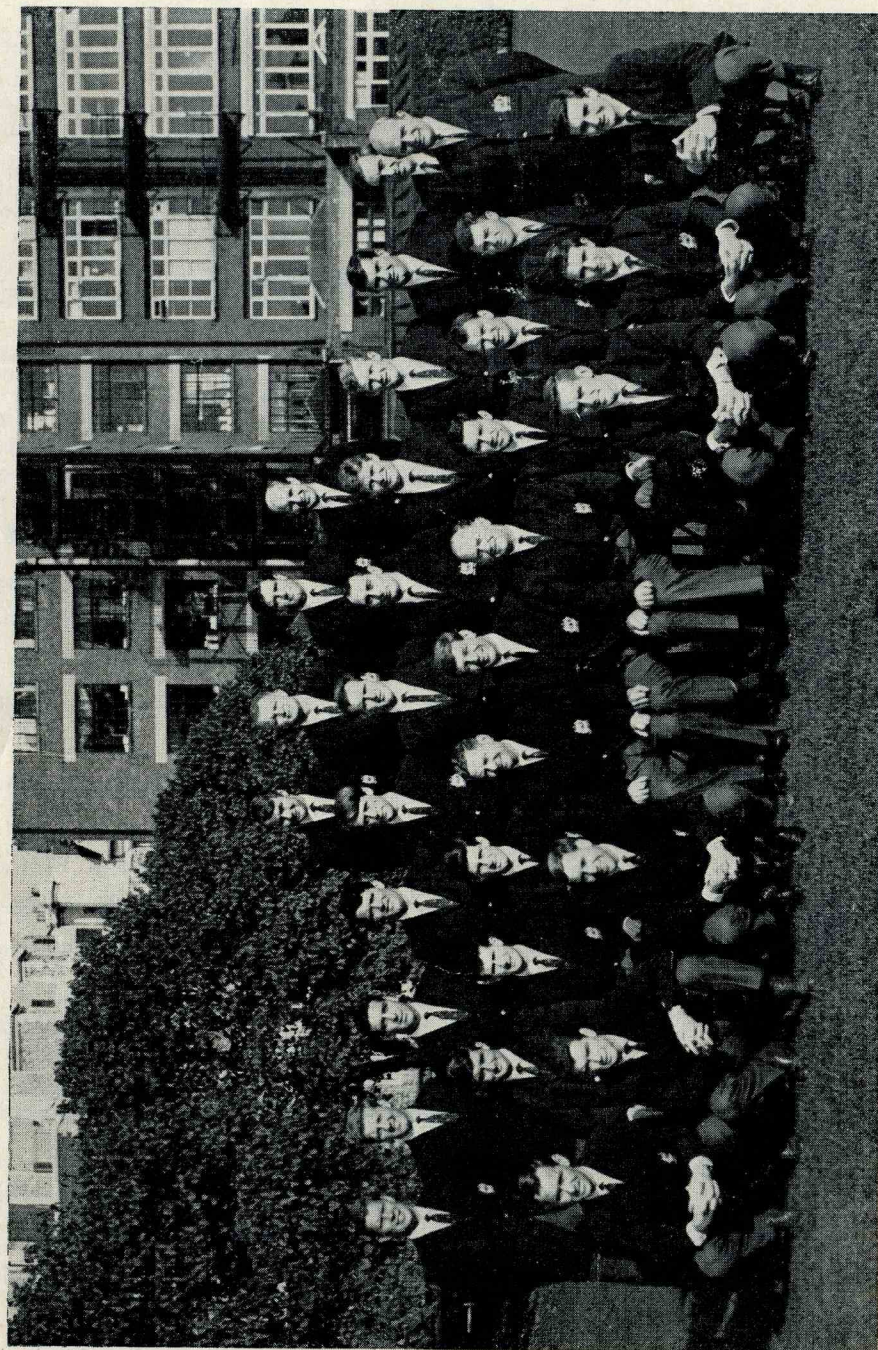

EDITOR'S NOTES

Today we are privileged to welcome the Australian Rugby Union Touring side to the Arms Park, the scene of so many memorable matches.

Firstly, then, on behalf of the Committee, players and supporters, we say to R. E. M. McLaughlin Manager, A. S. Cooper, his Assistant, John Thornett Captain and the remainder of the touring side, "We give you a most sincere welcome to Cardiff and we hope that today's game will be long-remembered, irrespective of who wins, as one of the outstanding matches of your tour."

The present tourists are the fifth Wallabies to visit the British Isles, though in 1927-28, a team representing New South Wales and known as 'The Waratahs' toured this country.

THE FIRST WALLABIES

The first Wallabies side came to this country in 1908 but played no matches in Scotland and Ireland. They won 25 of their 31 matches, drawing one and losing five. In the International encounters, Wales succeeded where England had failed and won by a penalty goal and two tries to two tries. Cardiff inflicted upon them their heaviest defeat, winning by 24 points to 8 and they were also defeated by Llanelli and Swansea.

THE WARATAHS

The Waratahs won 24 of their 31 games, defeating Wales, Ireland and France in the International clashes and Cardiff, Llanelli, Newport and Swansea in Wales. With such victories to their credit, it is difficult to understand why they did not win all their matches, though perhaps their lack of first-class reserves accounted for this.

THE SECOND WALLABIES

This side, who arrived here in 1939, were owing to the outbreak of war, unable to play a single match.

THE THIRD WALLABIES

This will be the Australian touring side best remembered by the majority of our spectators as they played in the British Isles in 1947-48.

Many knowledgeable critics still maintain that C. C. Eastes was the finest wing seen in this country and it was a tragic loss to the tourists when he broke a wrist against Newport. At that time in eight games he had scored ten tries.

In the forwards, Keller and Windon were outstanding and the former, as many will remember, stayed on in this country to represent and captain Scotland. Nick Shehadie was one of the "babes" of the side and it was a pleasure to see him return to this country as the only member of the fourth touring party who toured with the third Wallabies.

The 1947-48 side were beaten by Cardiff, Wales and the Barbarians and the Wallabies must have returned home with a high regard for the standard of Welsh Rugger and of the opinion that Cardiff Arms Park was their "bete noir".

Their other defeats were sustained at the hands of London Counties and a combined Lancashire and Cheshire side.

Cardiff won their match on 27th September, 1947, by 11 points to 3.

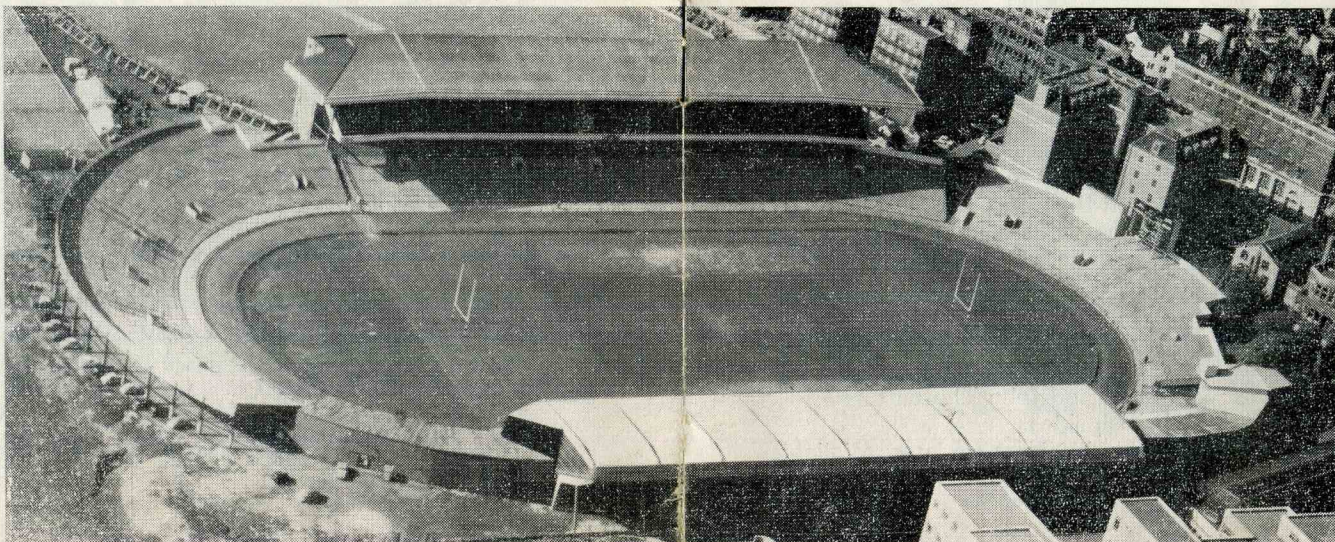

THE FOURTH AND FIFTH WALLABIES

The 1957-58 Wallabies were unlucky and nothing really went right for them. They had inexperienced managers and many young players, and they found British Rugby fairly strong at the time. They played 34 matches, won 16, drew three and lost 15 under the captaincy of R. A. L. Davidson.

In Wales they lost to Cardiff, Newport, Wales, Combined Abertillery and Ebbw Vale, and the Barbarians, and so the Principality was not a happy hunting ground for them. Yet they possessed several good players and one was the 19 year old Jim Lenehan at fullback who scored 64 points, and who is back again, still scoring points, as he revealed at Neath last Saturday!

We recall Terry Curley at fullback, Bob Davidson as prop, Rod Phelps on the wing, and Des Connor at scrum half, who later moved to New Zealand and became an outstanding All-Black. He may well have toured here again in 1963 had he not been a Wallaby in 1957-58. Others were Nick Shehadie, making his second tour as prop, for he was here in 1947-48, and who played for Barbarians when they beat Wallabies in 1958; N. M. "Muncher" Hughes at Number Eight, hooker J. V. Brown, second-row men Tony Miller and Alan Cameron, and fast wings Morton and Donald.

Miller is back again at the age of 37, for he was 28 in 1957, and it is said that "old forwards never finish", but now he is a strong prop, having moved up from the second-row. Finally there was John Thornett as a flanker, aged 22 years, who returns as a prop and captain, one of the most popular players in the game.

He is the second Whineray and the most capped Australian player. It is hoped that he will be fit enough to lead his side today, after illness, since he missed many matches in the last tour through illness. He led the 1963 Wallabies with success in South Africa.

I watched most of the 1966-67 Wallabies in action in Australia when I was there this year, and I feel they will be a stronger side, in the end, than their predecessors. They are called the Fifth Wallabies, although the Second Wallabies who arrived here in 1939, did not play a match owing to the outbreak of World War II.

The management of Bill McLaughlin and Alan Roper should prove both popular and successful, and as we have seen so far, both are determined to maintain good order off the field and a keen sense of discipline and clean play on it. This is much to their credit, while John Thornett should be an ideal captain.

In beating a strong combined Aberavon and Neath side last Saturday they have indicated their strength and determination to do well in Wales. They enjoy running with the ball and this is important, for it will make them attractive.

The side contains a dozen senior players and sixteen young Australians and two "exiles". They are a happy party and appear to be enjoying the tour. Lenehan is in good form at fullback; Cardy and Boyce are try-scoring wings; Brass, Marks and Smith are speedy centres; Gibbs and Webb the two "exiles"; Catchpole and Hawthorne as good as any halves in the world at the moment, plus young forwards who are doing well in company with their more experienced colleagues.

Gregg Davis as a flanker; Tony Miller as a prop; Peter Johnson as a hooker; Heming and Crittle as lineout men; Jim Miller as an allrounder; O'Gorman and Guerassimoff as loose forwards, and John Thornett as leader, all promise stern opposition at forward for British sides.

I am sure the followers at the Arms Park will like these latest Wallabies and maybe it will be "Fifth for Favourites"!

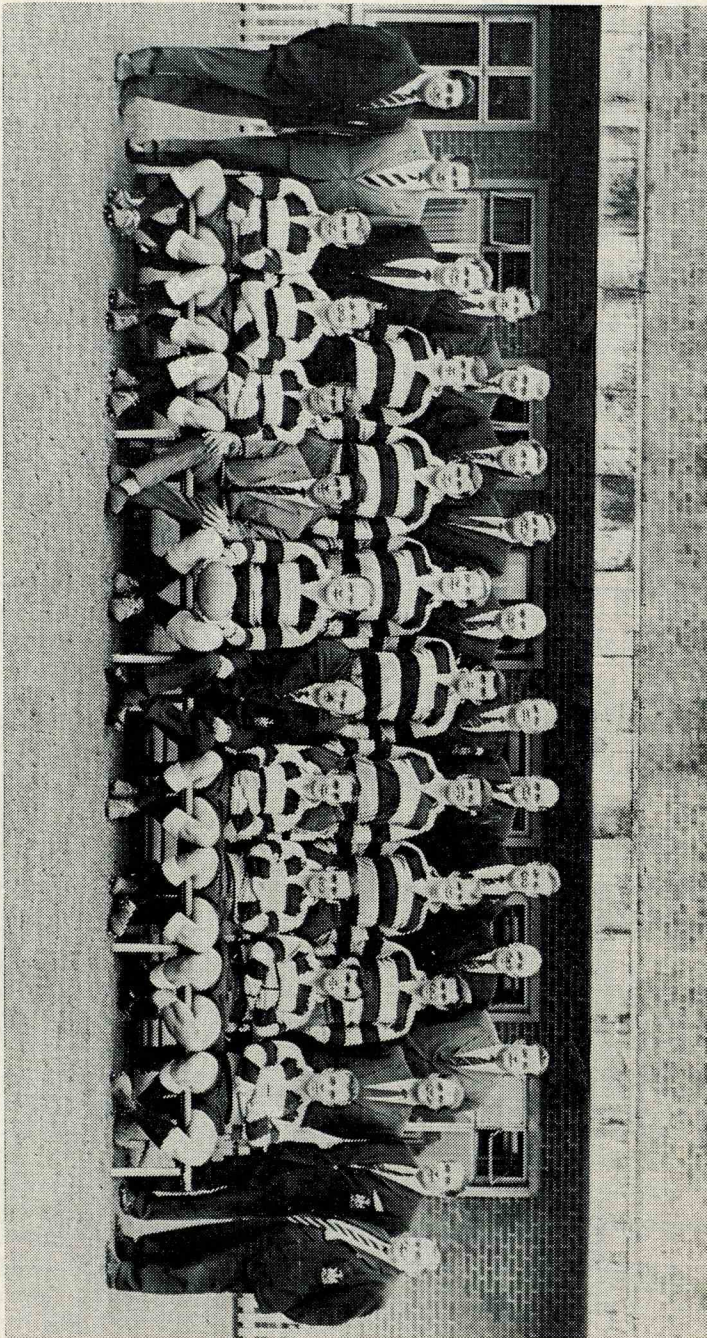
