# The Maoris' Welcome Return Visit.

It was a matter of extreme satisfaction to those connected with Cardiff Rugby, when it became known that the Maoris were anxious to return to Wales and play another match with Cardiff before they bid farewell to the Mother Country. This can indeed be accepted as a compliment to Cardiff, its players and officials. On the last occasion the Maoris made the Grand Hotel their headquarters for ten days, and during that period they formed such friendships, and were so delighted with the cordiality and sincerity of the welcome they received that it was an open secret that they were anxious to visit the Welsh Metropolis once more—thus to-day's return match.

Arguments may be advanced for and against football and other types of games, but there is no questioning the fact that the bond of individual

friendship and brotherhood, not to mention the claims of Empire, are as thoroughly cemented by contact on and off the field of play as much, if not more than by conferences, meetings of Parliament and other administrative media. We thus feel sure that the present Maori team will look back upon their tour in the light of these remarks, cherishing kind sentiments and undying memories—all the outcome of a fight for supremacy over an innocent-looking oval leather ball.

Since playing Cardiff, the Maoris have not been too fortunate as far as wins go, among their subsequent defeats being that sustained at Llanelly, in a game which created much jubilation down West Wales. The Maoris in various phases of play may not have been the "team of talents" or the "draw" which the famous All Blacks were two years ago, but there is consolation in another far more important direction, as, according to the unanimous verdict of all critics that we have read, it is declared that the present Maoris team, whatever its defects, has been the most sporty combination of players ever seen on our playing fields, and after all, this is a greater trophy to carry home than an unbeaten record.
