





In the forwards Rumbelow, Jennings, E. Lewis, Pike, McIntyre, Strond, Moon, and Rhys. Davies are all young and fill of promise.

The valuable assistance given so readily and often by the Penylan Club cannot be overlooked. Never has assistance been given more readily and at more inconvenience, and it is fitting recognition that a fixture has been arranged with this club for next season. D. Stephens, their captain, has played eight matches during the season, and the Cardiff Reserves owe their success in no small measure to the unselfish support of Penylan.

The Premiers this season have drawn E. Harding, Ham, W. H. Gunstone, and R. David from the Reserves, and early in the season, when the half-back difficulty was most keenly fill, the value of the Reserves was demonstrated by the introduction of the last-named player, whose services to the team are now acknowledged.
