





THE TWO FIFTEENS.

Season 1926-7 is certainly going to be the most momentous in the history of the Club, in view of the decision to run two first-class teams, and relegating the Reserves to oblivion. It is a tremendous responsibility that the Committee has committed itself to, and there is to be no shirking by a single member if the venture is to prove successful, as it should in a centre like Cardiff. The novelty will mean a

much more important fixture list, and should also attract a far superior type of player. The trials have already revealed some splendid new talent, and there will doubtless be a spirited fight for places. The Committee's policy regarding the selection of teams will be closely watched—but whatever the ultimate constitution of the sides, the players will always remember that they are playing for Cardiff, and that the honour of the club will be in their keeping, whichever side they are chosen for.
