

INTRODUCTION

By the Chairman of the Management Committee.

The Editor has invited me, as Chairman of the Management Committee, to introduce the first Annual Report of the Athletic Club, with a brief reference to the outstanding events of last year.

This report is a departure from previous practice. Last June or July it was decided that in addition to the Annual Statement of Accounts, a report of the activities of the various sections of the Club should be printed and circulated to members. Time was too short to prepare a report then, so the matter was left until this year. Circumstances permitting, it is the intention of the Management Committee to publish such a report annually, in the hope of bringing home to the members the complete nature of the Club and the high position it occupies in the athletic world.

The Accounts contain some points of considerable interest. They are the most favourable since the formation of the Athletic Club. The accumulated loss on the Balance Sheet of the Limited Company has vanished and is replaced by a small profit. Instead of an overdraft there is money on deposit. The assets, steadily depreciated, now stand at a particularly low figure. The reduction of the consolidated ticket to f.3 3s. od. has increased the membership. (It is hoped that members will further this increase by pointing out the advantages of full membership, because the Club would be materially strengthened by turning sectional into full members). Lest they be too optimistic, members are reminded that the Club was considerably helped by its share of the South African gate; that without the annual subscription from the Greyhound Company, it is barely paying its way; that as yet it has entirely failed to meet its liability in respect of the debenture holders.

The activities of the Club are described in the Sectional Reports. I would refer only to three outstanding

events. The South African match was played in the spirit in which football should be played, but which is so often lacking in a big game. We lost the match, but no prestige in so doing. In the words of Howard Marshall of the "Daily Telegraph," "A good game, vigorous and hard, but cleanly fought and worthy, I think, of the great Cardiff tradition." The Irish International reflected great credit on everyone responsible for the arrangements. The day was perfect, the ground a picture, the gate the second largest in the history of Welsh football, and the reception given by the crowd to the victorious Irishmen memorable.

The selection of the "Park" for one of this season's Test Trials is a fitting recognition of the excellence of our ground and wicket.

Reference should be made to the negotiations conducted last Winter between the Directors of the Limited Company and the Welsh Football Union. This, a matter mainly for the Shareholders, affects the Club in this way. Hitherto, the Club, operating under license from the Company, undertook to meet the liability to the debenture holders. This the Club has failed to do, and the accumulated liability now amounts to over £12,000. The new scheme will secure the Club its independence without the millstone of debt about its neck.

I would conclude by referring to the staff, to whom our best thanks are due. Owing to financial difficulties we are always understaffed; in spite of this the work is carried out willingly and cheerfully. The excellence of the ground is proof of their hard work, and it is hoped that the active members of the various sections appreciate their efforts.

CARDIFF RUGBY CLUB

SEASON 1931-32.

The season ended with not so impressive a record for the First XV as was anticipated. The loss of that brilliant young forward, Norman Fender, in addition to other forward defections, had its effect on the results. Traditional Cardiff Rugby was however maintained.

Notable events were the visits of South Africa, and Oxford University, and the departure of John Roberts. The team rose magnificently to the occasion against the South Africans, and although losing by 13 points to 5, clearly displayed the better type of football. Our opponents won by superior kicking tactics. The match with Oxford was due in the main to the good offices of its Captain, "Bill" Roberts, who successfully led his side to victory against Cambridge. It is hoped that his efforts will lead to a permanent resumption of fixtures. The Reverend John Roberts sailed for China in the rôle of a Missionary in January, 1932, and we are sure that he will prove a worthy representative of the Principality. John has proved himself a thorough sportsman and gentleman, and was beloved by all with whom he came in contact. We are indeed proud of him.

The games with our Newport rivals are achieving the standard required of these famous clubs, and the overkeenness shown in the matches of the early post-war years is almost entirely absent.

Three players were capped for Wales in each of her International matches. They were R. W. Boon, A. Skym, and F. Williams.

The statistics show that 9 matches were lost by 5 points or less; that Tommy Stone, our big-hearted little full-back, played in all matches except one (on account of injury) and that he scored the highest number of points.

THE ATHLETIC XV. The improvement in the record of this team is due in no small measure to the hard work of its loyal Captain, Roy Gabe-Jones, who proved himself an able and popular leader.

CARDIFF CRICKET CLUB

The season of 1931 will be remembered as one of the wettest in the history of the Club. On six Saturdays, no play (or very little) was possible on Cardiff Arms Park, and in all 26 matches were abandoned. The "gates" consequently shewed a decided decrease.

The cricket also suffered, but it is pleasing to place on record the comparatively few drawn games, each eleven going out, whenever possible, for a definite result.

His regretted inability to turn out more often was a distinct loss to the side. Centuries were scored for the Club by N. V. H. Riches, H. G. Symonds and H. W. Tayler. In bowling, E. R. K. Glover, "B" XI, had the distinction of taking most wickets during the season, namely, 41.

Mr. J. W. Hughes, Captain of the "B" XI, gave a lot of time to his team and was as keen and enthusiastic as ever; and Mr. G. W. Harrison led the Second XI in his usual optimistic manner. Mr. A. R. Thilson (Captain of the Extras), had a responsible task with the younger players, and he carried out his duties to the satisfaction of the members and Committee.

CARDIFF ATHLETIC LAWN TENNIS CLUB.

Unfortunately, in common with other out-door pastimes, we suffered on account of bad weather last season. There is no doubt that the membership was affected through this circumstance, but it is pleasing to say that, taking things through and through, our standard was well maintained.

It is true the Tennis Section came into existence ten years ago and when it is said that the standard of tennis is better now than at any previous period, it certainly does suggest movement in the right direction. The hope is, therefore, that this progress will be maintained, and if such is the case then the Section can look forward with confidence to the future, both financially and socially.

So far as competitions are concerned, the men's team in the first league of the W.L.T.A., achieved results that made very pleasant reading. They occupied second place, which was quite a good performance and it is quite within our powers, with the material available, allied with the prevailing spirit, to improve on this. Although the record of the men's second team was not quite as good, and they were relegated to the Third Division, there is no reason at all to be pessimistic. Given their fair share of the luck, which is certainly a factor in any game of lawn tennis, there is no reason why the first place in the Third League should not be re-captured, and a return made to the higher section.

The women's team in the newly formed competition of the W.L.T.A. for women, whilst not leading their section, finished just behind the leaders. This was quite satisfactory in view of the difficulty often experienced in placing a truly representative side in the field.

There is no doubt that these competitions for both sexes serve as a medium for general improvement in the play, and this should be sufficient incentive for the teams to keep the Club on the map of Lawn Tennis.

The Club Tournament was held as usual in June, and although somewhat interfered with by the weather, it was completed in good time, the allotted period only just being exceeded. This speaks volumes for the Tournament Referee, Mr. Wyndham Richards and his worthy assistant, Miss Oxenham, who, as always, showed unceasing energy all through. We are very fortunate in having their services for this event, which, as everyone knows, requires unlimited patience and tact. Happily, they are well gifted.

As Captain of the Bowls Section for 1931, it is gratifying to me to confidently proclaim that "Ye old game of Bowls" has been thoroughly enjoyed by our club members and opposing teams.

Our Green was in excellent condition thanks to the energies and foresight of our groundsmen, T. Preece and L. Nash. A series of games in the eliminating rounds of the Glamorgan County Two Wood Competition, the Masonic Bowls Competition, and several other Associations Competitions, including the final of the W.B.A. Rink Competition, were decided on our Green, and all were delighted with and spoke in the highest praise of the Green.

Socially, this year was one of the happiest in the Section's existence, despite the adverse weather conditions which prevailed. In this respect, we have I think, a decided advantage over the majority of Greens as our Green is playable within one or two hours following heavy rain, whereas most Greens are so affected as to be unplayable for days.

With regard to matches on the Fixture List, we played 27 games, won II and lost 16. Two matches were abandoned through weather conditions, and three cancelled through the inability of opponents to raise a team. 1,949 shots have been scored against 2,044, being 95 shots in arrears on the season. For the Easter tour of the Welsh Team in Ireland, E. Winfield and D. O'Brien were invited to play.



INTRODUCTION

In the introduction to the Annual Report last year reference was made to the negotiations then in progress between the Directors of the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., as then constituted, and the Welsh Football Union. These negotiations have been somewhat protracted but have at last been concluded with the result that the position of the Club is probably better than it has ever been in its history, or in the history of its parents, the Cardiff Football Club and the Cardiff Cricket Club.

Previously the Club was operated under license from the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., revocable by either side at six months notice. Under this license it undertook to find the money necessary to enable the Company to redeem the Debenture Issue at the rate of £700 per annum and to pay the Debenture Interest at the rate of 5% per annum. The sums to meet these charges would have been decreasing amounts as the Debentures were redeemed. Actually, the Company's requirements were only met in the first year, when the sum of £1,950 was found, but since then the Club has entirely failed to find the necessary funds, with the result that up to 30th April, 1932, the arrears under these two heads amounted to £12,080, a figure which put the Company entirely at the mercy of the Debenture Holders, and which was a terrible mill-stone around the necks of all concerned with the future of the Club.

The position now is, that in place of this license revocable at short notice, the Club has secured a 99 years' lease from the reconstituted Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., at a rental of £200 per annum, entirely free of any obligations arising out of the Debenture Issue. In addition, during the last few years the financial position of the Club has improved materially. Four years ago the Club was in a very serious financial state, for not only was it entirely unable to meet its liabilities to the Company in respect of the Debenture Issue, but it had an overdraft at the Bank of approximately £2,000, and debts owing to sundry creditors amounting to a further £,850. It should be remembered that at this critical period, the Club was only able to secure this large overdraft through the kindness of its Bank Manager, and the personal guarantees of the Directors of the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd. The position to-day is very different, for not only does the Club meet its liabilities promptly, but it has at its disposal just under £3,000 in its Bank Account.

This change is due to three salient factors:-

I. During the financial crisis the then Management Committee resigned en bloc, and the Directors of the Company, by virtue of the fact that the Club had entirely failed to discharge its financial liabilities to the Company, appointed a new Management Committee—which in point of fact contained several members of the old Committee—in its place. In this way the Directors considerably strengthened the hands of the Management Committee, and also were in close co-operation with it; a policy which resulted in a more economical administration of the Club.

2. The Directors of the Company were able to sub-let the Football Ground to the Arms Park Greyhound Racing Co., Ltd., which pays the Club a subscription of £1,000 per annum and also bears a very considerable proportion of the rates and repair bills for the Stands.

3. As a result of the negotiations with the Welsh Football Union the Directors of the old Company were able to make certain financial provisions for the Club out of the funds then held by the Company. The net result can be summed up as follows. Four years ago the Club had an overdraft of £2,000 and in addition sundry debts amounting to £850, together with a steadily increasing liability for Debenture Interest and the Sinking Fund. To-day, by contrast, the Club owes no money, is free of the Debenture liability, has a fund amounting to just under £3,000, and a 99 years' lease on the ground at a rental of £200 per annum. As is well known, the negotiations have resulted in the re-construction of the Company with the result that only three of the old Directors are still on the Board. The members of the Club, therefore, should be very grateful to those Directors who are responsible for this marked improvement in the Club's financial position, and who have now retired from the Board.

The improvement is obvious, but the position even now is not

so strong as it appears to be.

For some years past the Club has made a profit, but this is really due to the subscription from the Greyhound Racing Co. Had it not received this subscription, it would have made a loss in each year. For instance, last year, after writing off £345 by way of depreciation, the profit amounted to £,317 2s. 7d., or a total, excluding depreciation, of £662 28. 7d., which would have meant that it would have sustained a loss of £337 17s. 5d. if there had been no Greyhound subscription; a loss to which should be added the amounts paid by the Greyhound Racing Co. by way of rates, and for repairs to the stands. When it is realised by the reader that the Club is so dependent on this outside income, it must be clear that there is just as great a need for economical administration as formerly. In addition the final financial adjustments as between the new Company and the Club have not yet been completed, but it is probable that certain fairly considerable sums will have to be paid over to the Company from the £3,000 at present held by the Club. Again, the rental of £200 per annum will have to be paid each year in place of the old Debenture liability, which was, in effect, an accumulating book entry and never actually met. This note is added in order that the reader may not become too optimistic in view of the apparently secure financial position of the Club.

A new Stand is being built by the Company on the north side of the Ground, and should be completed early in December. It will occupy the whole length of the north side, and will be a double-decker stand; the lower deck will be completely under cover and will afford standing accommodation, while the upper deck will also be under cover and will provide seating accommodation for 5,200. This stand is mainly intended to deal with International crowds and should materially improve the Football Ground. It is being constructed under the most modern methods and will be at the Club's disposal on completion.

In closing, reference must again be made to the Secretary and the Staff. Visitors comment favourably on all occasions, no matter what game they come to play, on the excellent condition of the Ground; this is due to the hard work so willingly and cheerfully put in by the Staff. It is only to be hoped that members who make use of the ground appreciate their efforts to the full.

CARDIFF RUGBY CLUB
Season 1932-33.

Sound play marked the early part of the season, with the promise of improvement as the team settled down.

Not until the Rectory Field was visited on October 22nd did the team suffer defeat from a powerful Blackheath XV, by the narrow margin of a penalty goal.

Excellent form was now shown, and later, in November, the standard of play was so high that it caused almost universal admiration. Our XV was described as "The Wonder Team," "Cardiff's Scoring Machine." Similar superlatives were frequent, whilst many of our older members compared the team very favourably with the great Cardiff sides of the past. That there was ample justification for the many glowing tributes will be realised after an examination of the records of the matches played in that month.

Later in the season the calls of Trial and International Matches proved heavy, and from February we lost the services of B. R. Turnbull (owing to injury), and his absence no doubt caused some unsteadiness in the back division. These circumstances, coupled with the burden of "extra" and "charity" matches, mostly played on hard grounds, caused us to lose 17 matches in a season of some remarkable achievements. The word "burden" is used unreservedly, as although our players are pure amateurs they have a duty to their Club, which has probably the hardest fixture list in the country. Players find it hard to ignore the calls of charity, which often involves refusing help to rugger friends of distinction. The remedy is not apparent, unless it lies in the direction of curtailment of fixture lists and the leaving of all "additional" matches to be played at the end of the Club's season.

However, progress or maintenance of tradition is not measured in terms of wins and losses, but rather on the play and conduct of a team, and we confidently assert that our prestige was worthily upheld by the 1932-33 team. In this connection our Captain is deserving of special tribute as he succeeded in maintaining that essential, "esprit de corps," throughout. The writer can personally vouch for Tom's unstinted praise of "his boys," to whom he gave all the credit in victory, whilst in defeat he never sank to harsh criticism, but rather bestowed words of encouragement on them. Well led, Tom! and well done! We thank you.

Outstanding feats were the shattering of Llanelly's unbeaten record on November 26th; the smashing of "Sospan's" ground record on Christmas Eve by 17 points to 5; the crushing defeat inflicted on Newport on November 12th, of 24 points to nil; and the defeat of London Welsh in London by 41 points to 13.

Many were disappointed at the omission of Tommy Stone, for his inclusion was an honour to which many competent critics considered he was worthily entitled. We hope that the honour will not long be delayed for this modest and great player.

THE ATHLETIC XV. This team, under the leadership of P. J. Fletcher, had a successful season, and produced some promising backs and forwards who assisted the First XV in several important games. We are confident that the Athletic XV will prove a good nursery, which, of course, is its primary function.

A BRIEF HISTORICAL SURVEY OF THE CARDIFF CRICKET CLUB.

As far as can be ascertained, the Cardiff Cricket Club was formed in 1867, for it is recorded that at a meeting held at the Angel Hotel on the 8th of February of that year, it was unanimously resolved, "That the Marquis of Bute be the President of the Club." At the same meeting it was carried, "That the Secretary be empowered to treat with a first-class professional bowler for an engagement of six weeks, or longer if the funds of the Club admit of doing so." The professional engaged, Thos. Butler, served the Club for some seasons, being paid 35/- weekly; a groundsman was also engaged at 12/- per week.

E. S. Barber was the first Hon. Secretary, being followed in 1868 by B. Pratt and in 1872 by E. W. Jones.

The General Rules of the Club were revised in 1871 but no record of any election of a Captain appears until 1877. It is extremely probable that the duties of Hon. Secretary and Captain were combined until that year, when E. W. Jones was appointed Captain.

Players of the early days of the Club who will be remembered were: S. Medhurst, C. M. Berkeley, E. U. David, C. David, A. Thackeray, G. Worthington, J. J. David, W. Yorath, J. A. Corbett, Carlton Riches, G. F. Insole, F. L. Perry, Cuthbert Riches, C. E. Waring, A. W. Morris, C. F. Vachell, F. David, C. N. Alexander, W. Bennett, H. B. Marquand, and D. M. Watson. Other members who gave much time and work for the Club as Hon. Secretaries were the late T. Farrance and W. G. Bowden, the latter acting for Club and County for something like 25 years.

The minutes of the various meetings, spread over a lengthy period are full of interest. For instance, on the 18th June, 1870, it was resolved, "Should any member (at practice nets) be bowled by the Professional three times or four times by two bowlers in his innings, that, although the allotted time (\frac{1}{4}\text{ hour}) be not expired, he shall retire and the next man go in." Again, half-way through the business of a meeting held on the 7th April, 1870, we read, "The meeting was adjourned and the members proceeded to dine."

In the records of Season 1883, in the averages for "All other games excepting 1st XI," appears the name of J. Gowan Clark (the present Chairman of the Cricket Club), who scored 89 runs for seven completed innings.

It is interesting to note that H. M. Ingledew was elected Captain in 1892, but owing to an injury received during the previous football season he resigned.

The late J. H. Brain, one of the best and most popular Captains the Club has ever had, was appointed in his stead, and together with N. V. H. Riches, holds the distinction of having been elected skipper of the 1st XI seven times.

W. H. Brain, who played for the Club some thirty or forty years ago, accomplished a unique performance in a County Match—Gloucester v. Somerset, played at Cheltenham in 1893, when he succeeded in stumping three men in three successive balls (C. L. Townsend was the bowler), and this feat has never been equalled in First Class Cricket.

In 1920, the 1st XI, under the Captaincy of H. G. Symonds were undefeated, playing 15 matches, of which 12 were won and 3 were drawn.

Here is an extract from the local paper of fifty years ago, which should prove of interest:—

CARDIFF CRICKET CLUB

The opening of the Season was not very promising, for wet weather prevailed, and of the first 22 matches arranged for the four elevens, 15 were cancelled owing to the unfit state of the grounds. Afterwards, however, play was interrupted but very little, and a big programme of matches was carried through. A record for the Club was established by the four elevens winning their games on one day.

The batting averages of the First XI "A" were again headed by N. V. H. Riches, with an average of 58.8 runs per innings, but the batting taken altogether was not sufficiently consistent to lay the foundations for many victories. With the exception of C. W. Knowles, F. W. Mathias, and F. Thomas, no other player averaged 20 runs per innings. The brunt of the bowling was borne by J. Chandless, who came out with an analysis of 11.5 for 39 wickets, a very good performance.

The "B" side had an excellent season under the Captaincy of G. L. Rattenbury, the batting and bowling being fairly consistent all through.

Until August, the Second XI did exceptionally well but their record was rather spoilt by the losing of three matches in that month.

The Extras are to be complimented on their good showing, considering that of necessity nearly all their games are played on away grounds.

Centuries were scored for the Club by N. V. H. Riches, 106 not out, and H. W. Taylor, 103.

C. Spiller was the only bowler of the Club to take 50 wickets, his figures reading 51 wickets at an average cost of 8.5 runs.

A very pleasing feature of the Season was the success of the Schools Competition promoted by the Club. Twelve Schools entered teams, all the games were played on the Cardiff Arms Park (usually in the evenings), and in the Final, Adamsdown beat Moorland Road in what was undoubtedly the best boys' game seen on the Park since the Competition commenced in 1927.

CARDIFF ATHLETIC LAWN TENNIS CLUB.

A review of the activities of a Tennis Club confined to grass courts must involve a consideration of the weather. From this point of view no Season has ever opened more disastrously than that of 1932. During the first five weeks the Grass Courts were only available on four days, and the Season closed as it opened, for September proved decidedly wet and only the most rabid enthusiasts played at all. In spite of the exceptionally severe handicap the elements imposed, the Club had a better financial season than in 1931. The membership was well maintained and "Economy" was the watchword.

MATCH RESULTS.

In the Competitions promoted by the Welsh Lawn Tennis Association, the Club achieved phenomenal success.

THE MEN'S FIRST TEAM headed the Eastern Section of Division I, and thus qualified to meet the Swansea Cricket and Football Club in the Final Tie to decide the Championship of South Wales and Monmouthshire. The match was played on the Cardiff Arms Park, and after a strenuous struggle, which was prolonged until late in the evening, Swansea proved victors by 6 Events to 3 and became holders of the Challenge Cup which was played for first in 1889. However, the match was played in such an excellent spirit that this Club was invited West, and a few weeks later, on St. Helen's Field, on Courts laid near the famous Mumbles End, we again suffered defeat—this time by 5 Events to 4.

THE MEN'S SECOND TEAM carried all before them in Division III, and, with an undefeated record, won the Championship of that Division, thereby gaining promotion to Division II and the Silver Candlesticks presented as Trophies.

THE LADIES TEAM were also undefeated in Division II of the Ladies' League, and won promotion to Division I and a Set of Silver "Tennis" Spoons.



INTRODUCTION

The year which ended on May 5th, 1934, was not as interesting as the two or three years immediately preceding it, because these were the years which saw the carrying out and the ultimate completion of the somewhat protracted negotiations with the Welsh Football Union.

Members will observe that the Annual Statement of Accounts takes a different form this year; the Income and Expenditure Accounts being divided into two sections, headed the General Public Section and the Members' Section respectively. This step has been taken on the advice of our Auditors. In fact, at the request of the Management Committee the Auditors set out the accounts in draft form so that the Management Committee could realise what was required and its general effect. The reasons for this change are as follow. The Athletic Club, like other bodies of a similar nature, has certain peculiar characteristics. In the first place it is a Club in the strict sense of the term, providing amenities for its members; it is also an organization for the conduct of amateur games, to which the public, who are not members of the Club, are admitted on payment. These two functions of the Club, while they may be expressed simply as above, occasion considerable difficulty from the point of view of the Income Tax authorities, because on the one hand a Club cannot make a profit out of its own members, with the result that an ordinary Club is not liable to Income Tax on profits; while on the other hand it is clear that the Athletic Club endeavours to make a profit out of its gate receipts from the public. Therefore, these two main divisions on the Income and Expenditure Account represent first of all the General Public Section which would be liable to Income Tax, and secondly the Members' Section which would not be liable to Income Tax. This is a general statement explaining the reasons for the two separate sections in the account, but members are advised not to consider the figures as final; they represent our point of view as to how and where the division should be made. The matter is a very difficult one for decision and will occupy a good deal of time and attention from both the Income Tax authorities and our own Auditors before a decision is reached as to the precise allocation of the figures.

Members will observe that the General Public Section shows a loss of £1,550 7s. 3d. which is counter-balanced by the profits in the Members' Section of £1,608 12s. 4d. These two are brought together in the balance sheet on the back of the account and show a surplus for the year of £58 5s. Id. Further it will be noticed that in the Members' Section and also on the Balance Sheet, £50 has been written off by way of depreciation, with the result that the total assets belonging to the Club by way of equipment and fixtures stands at £45 only. Looking at it as one may, the year must be regarded

disappointing as compared with the year preceding it because the surplus this year only amounted to £58 5s. Id., whereas in 1933 it amounted to £342 2s. 7d. This difference is for practical purposes entirely due to the fall in revenue derived from the Football Section in the General Public Section of the Account. The total income for the General Public Section was £1,271 9s. 8d. less than in the previous year. This loss of income is made up of the loss from the Football Section of £1,376 5s. 10d., which is set off by a slight gain in the two remaining sections of this account of £104 16s. 2d.

It will be seen that in the Members' Section of the account the income does not materially differ for the two years. There is actually a loss of income of £117 19s. 4d. which is made up of a loss of membership subscriptions amounting to £18 19s. od. and a loss of general income in this section of £99 os. 4d. As compared with the previous year there has been a reduction in expenditure, but unfortunately this reduction has not been sufficient to correspond with the loss of revenue, hence the decline in the surplus. Looking at the Football expenditure of the General Public Section we find that the decrease amounted to £501 5s. $4\frac{1}{2}$ d., of which a considerable amount falls under the heading of Entertainment Tax, which, of course, fluctuates with the gates. The general expenditure shows a decrease of £321 8s. 7½d., while the expenditure in the Cricket Section exceeded that in 1933. by £8 11s. 4d. Further, in the Members' Section of the account the expenditure is less than that in 1933 by £291 8s. 10d. It will thus be seen that practically everywhere very considerable economies were effected, but the fact remains that unfortunately we did not enjoy as successful a Football season as we anticipated, with the result that the income from the Football Section suffered severely, a result which brings us back to the old story that the public support a winning team.

This year saw the completion of the new North Stand. This was opened on the occasion of the England v. Wales match in January, when the upper deck of the Stand was full and a record crowd for Welsh International Football was present on the Park. The Stand was very much appreciated by all, the only criticism being the difficulty of entry and egress. It is hoped that the authorities will deal with these two important points before the Stand is again used.

During the year various minor alterations have been carried out with the object of improving the ground and the amenities. These in the main have been carried out by the permanent staff or by casual labour under the supervision of the staff. As has been pointed out on each occasion previously in this report, the number of staff employed is very small compared with the size of the ground, yet in spite of this the ground is kept in excellent condition, a fact which is entirely due to the supervision given by the Secretary and the excellence of Trevor Preece, and the groundsmen and staff under him. It is hoped that in the future the Club will continue to secure the support of the public to an extent which will enable the Management Committee to continue the policy of general improvement which is so needed.

CARDIFF RUGBY CLUB

Season 1933-34

The season 1933-34 opened full of promise. Almost all of the previous season's players were available and under the captaincy of Graham Jones, a good playing record was anticipated.

The form in the earlier matches, however, proved disappointing, and towards the end of the first half of the season the skipper was finding it difficult to apply himself fully to the all important role of leadership, whilst his own form could not be described as comparable with his brilliance of former years.

The main weakness was in the back play, as the forwards were generally acquitting themselves well, although lacking that little bit of extra concerted energy.

The Selection Committee found it necessary to make drastic changes, mainly in the selection of the back division, and with the resignation of the Captain owing to pressure of business, and the loss of the services of A. H. Jones through illness, their task was not to be envied.

Roy Gabe-Jones was appointed acting captain, but his services could not be fully utilised owing to his ill luck in the matter of injuries. In his absence the role of captain fell on the shoulders of Tommy Stone, and the leadership of the pack was vested in Archie Skym. The reorganisation policy continued, and with the introduction of new "blood"—mainly youthful and local players—began to bear fruit, so that by February a keener team spirit prevailed, better play resulted, and we had passed through the lane of poor form and its rather heavy trail of defeat.

In the later stages, a high degree of efficiency was attained, with teamwork the keynote, and it may justifiably be stated that the Cardiff standard of play was regained, and that future prospects are encouraging.

The most notable achievements of the season were the double victories over Gloucester (the most successful first-class English club side of 1933-34), Pontypool, and Richmond—which club we are pleased to welcome on the fixture list after a lapse of many seasons.

The Cornish tour in April also proved highly successful. All three matches—against Plymouth Albion, Falmouth and Redruth—were won.

During the season a presentation was made to Mr. W. M. Douglas as a token of appreciation of his having served the Club in a playing and administrative capacity for fifty years. Much has elsewhere been reported in detail of the service "W.M." has rendered to the cause of Rugby football. It would, however, be very remiss, if, in this report, we did not give expression to the feeling of the members that he will long be spared to continue his valuable connection with the Club as a member of the Football, General, and Management Committees.

In conclusion, we regret to record the passing away of Mr. W. H. Jenkins on the 2nd April, 1934. Mr. Jenkins had been associated with the Club for many years, particularly in the early post-war seasons, when he was an active member of the Football Committee during that difficult period of reconstruction. He was formerly a well-known Docksman and a popular figure in South Wales Rugby circles.

CARDIFF ATHLETIC.—It is pleasing to record a very successful season for this XV. Hubert Johnson proved to be a very keen, capable, and efficient leader, a Captain who was indeed proud of his "job."

To create and develop amongst the younger players a spirit of pride and ambition to play in the First XV, and to maintain at all times that essential esprit de corps is a difficult task, and necessitates both playing ability and capable administration by the Captain.

That Mr. Johnson possessed these essential qualifications was proved by his energetic example, his encouragement to his team, his modesty and tact, and above all his praise for "his boys" on whom full credit was always bestowed.

Were it not for a lapse at Easter, when certain dependable players were obliged to "cry off" at a late hour, the record of his side might have proved the best of any Cardiff Club subsidiary team since the war.

Of a total of 31 matches only eight were lost.

Well done, Hubert!

Cricketers had little cause for complaint of the conditions under which their big programme was carried through. With glorious sunshine, hard and fast wickets were the rule and with the batsmen making the most of their opportunities, the task of the bowlers was rendered trying and difficult. For a long period it appeared that the First XI "A," as in Season 1920, would go through without defeat, for it was not until the 19th August that they lost their only game. The batting averages were very satisfactory, the best in fact for many years. It is scarcely necessary to record that N. V. H. Riches, as usual, headed the list, his average being 103 runs for six innings (three times not out). Noel Morgan followed with an average of 63 for six innings (twice not out). Other players who scored consistently were J. T. Morgan, average 53 for eight innings, and H. G. Symonds, who, in addition to averaging 40, had the highest aggregate number of runs, 488, and scored the only century—109 not out— for the First XI "A."

Bowling honours go to J. Chandless, whose consistent length was most serviceable during the long innings. It was very unfortunate for the Club that Reed, who looked like proving a success as a bowler, was prevented by illness from playing any cricket after 1st July

The "B" XI had a fair season, their batting averages being headed by L. G. Jones, aggregate 579 runs, average 52. He also had the distinction of scoring two centuries, 154 and 105.

The Second XI were a keen and enthusiastic side, losing only one game. Batting averages were good, eight

players having an average of 20 or over. C. Spiller, the Captain, was again the only bowler in the Club to take over 50 wickets, his figures being 270 overs, 607 runs, 63 wickets, average 9.3.

The Extras, who played nearly all their matches on away grounds, had a very satisfactory season, and this team is doing the Club excellent service in training the younger players for promotion.

Another very pleasing feature of the year was that several members of the Rugby Section took part in games in the various elevens.

The Schools Competition was a great success. Fifteen schools entered and in the Final Radnor Road defeated Moorland Road before an excellent attendance of pupils and parents. At the conclusion of the game, Mr. J. Gowan Clark, Chairman of the Cricket Section, presented the Club to the Captain of the winning side. Subsequently, the City Director of Education, Mr. W. J. Williams, M.A., in a very happy speech, congratulated the winners, and losers, and thanked the Cardiff Club for the efforts they were making to foster the game of cricket in the schools of the City.

The prospects for 1934 are bright; the usual big programme of matches has been arranged and under the leadership of J. T. Morgan, the Club should have an enjoyable and successful year.

It is with deep regret the Committee record the death of one of the oldest playing members of the Club, Charlie Spiller, who died, as the result of an accident, on May 8th, 1934.

A keen and enthusiastic player, he was ready to play for any of the teams, and always placed the welfare of his Club first.

CARDIFF ATHLETIC LAWN TENNIS CLUB. 1933.

While possibly from the actual result of matches played the season of 1933 may not compare with that of 1932, in many ways it was possibly the most successful in the history of the Club.

Looking at the actual results first of all, the Men's first team retained its position in the First Division of the League, although they lost two matches this year as compared with only one the previous year; but the second team which had secured promotion in 1932 from the third to the second division, quite easily retained their position in that division.

The ladies, we are glad to say, had an equally successful season. For the first time in the history of the Club they played in the first division of the league, having secured promotion to that division at the end of 1932. It was, therefore, a great pleasure to all members of the Club that they were able to retain their position in that division last season.

It will also be seen that the general standard of tennis played in the Club compares favourably with the standard in South Wales, and with that obtained by the various other sections of the Club in their own particular activities.

Beyond the actual results, to which reference is made above and of which particulars are given below, the season was in every way a most enjoyable one. The summer was the finest since 1921 and while the water shortage gave Government and Local officials a considerable amount of worry, it did not perturb tennis enthusiasts who availed themselves of the fine weather and played more tennis in this season than they had for years.

The Club held its usual tournament, with a full quota of level and handicap events which took some time to play off. Not only was the play as keen as ever but, as an examination of the results will show, the competitions brought some of the newer and younger players to the front and suggested that at any rate at no distant date there will be ample material to make up for those who are getting past their best playing days.

The thanks of the members of the Club should be particularly paid to Wyndham Richards and Miss Oxenham. For many years past these two have acted together as Referee and Assistant Referee for the Club Tournament. The writer is of the opinion that very few members of the Club realise what such a task involves, but as he himself has had no little experience of this particular side of Lawn Tennis administration he would like to assure his fellow members that the duties involved are considerable, and that their best thanks are due to these two who have carried out these duties and made the Tournament so enjoyable for so many years.

Secondly, our thanks are due to the Ground Staff. Unfortunately, the Athletic Club owing to various difficulties has not a very big staff, with the result that members are apt to think they are neglected. The Courts as regards playing surface compare favourably with any in the district and this result is solely due to the efficiency of the ground staff, whose efforts should be appreciated.

CARDIFF ATHLETIC BOWLING CLUB.

1933.

"Progress" is the keynote of the report of the activities of the Cardiff Athletic Bowling Club for the year 1933.

We commenced the season with a game against Cadoxton on May 6th, in a W.B.A. Competition on our home green, and it was pleasing to win our first game by 22 shots, thus giving us a good start.

Of the 32 matches in our fixture list, five were in the W.B.A. Club Tournament, section 3, district C. We won four of these games and therefore qualified, as winners of the section, to meet Cardiff (Sophia Gardens) the winners of section 2. We were only defeated by the small margin of five shots, an excellent performance on our part.

In the Private Greens Competition we played four, won three and lost one, a great improvement on previous years. In friendly games we won II and lost II; so weighing up the records for all matches played, we won I8 and lost I4, 2,662 shots having been scored against 2,326, being 336 shots up for the season—this record is very satisfactory, and is the best in the history of the Club.

A series of games in the eliminating rounds of the Glamorgan County Two-Wood Competition, the Masonic Bowls Competition for the Dovey Cup, and several other Associations' competitions were decided on our green, and all participating were delighted with and spoke in glowing terms of the condition of the green. In fact the green was in excellent condition throughout the season, thanks to the energies of our Head Groundsman, Trevor Preece, and his assistant.

Socially, this was one of the happiest seasons in the Club's existence, and after all it is not the winning of matches which matters so much as the amount of social enjoyment obtained.

We increased our membership substantially this season, it being the highest ever recorded. This increase enabled us to continue the "A" side, commonly called the "Rags," which was ably skippered by E. Ridd, and thanks should be given to our Hon. Secretary, W. Tucker, for his energies in obtaining regular fixtures for this side.

They played 20 matches, seven of which were won, 11 lost and two drawn, a fairly satisfactory result considering that frequently the side was depleted at the last moment to meet the calls of the first team.

Our Club Competitions revealed a rising star in the person of Tom Allen, who won the Club Handicap, and the Umbrella Competition; W. Tucker again prevailed in the Club Championship, winning the cup for the fourth time.

The South Wales Trials were held at Penarth on the 27th December, 1933, and Miss E. Winfield was again selected to represent the South.

The Athletic Hockey Club was represented at both the West of England and the South of England Tournaments. South Wales were invited to take a team to the West Tournament held at Westonsuper-Mare and the Misses E. Winfield, G. Arthur, Q. Poole and M. Lewis were included in this team, whilst Miss F. French went to Clacton with the Sussex team.





INTRODUCTION

The year which ended on 4th May, 1935, may to a large extent be described as a purely domestic year, with the result that there is little that requires mention in the general introduction, because the items of interest will be found in the various sectional reports. There are, however, one or two matters to which reference should be made.

The 6th May saw the Silver Jubilee of the accession of His Majesty King George V to the throne of Great Britain. This happy event was celebrated with unparalleled enthusiasm throughout the country. In Cardiff the celebrations took various forms, some of which closely affected the Athletic Club. His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales sponsored a fund known as the King George's Jubilee Trust, the proceeds of which are to be devoted to the Youth Movements throughout the country. In support of this fund, two football matches were played on the Cardiff Arms Park. The first on Saturday, 4th May, was a match under the control of the Welsh Rugby Union between two sides, one representing Wales and the other The Rest. The second match was played under the auspices of the Welsh Schools Rugby Union, on Monday, 6th May, between two elementary school sides, one representing England and the other Wales. It is to be regretted that neither of these matches produced the financial result that those responsible hoped to obtain from them. This, no doubt, was largely due to the fact that they came at the end of the Football Season—in point of fact the season was extended by the governing body to enable these matches to be played—when the average spectator was tired of football.

It should be noted that as our own ground was engaged for the two matches mentioned above, the First XV played a match at Pontypool, to which reference is made in the Football Sectional Report.

On Saturday, 11th May, the National Jubilee celebrations for the whole of Wales were held in Cardiff, when His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales visited the city as the representative of His Majesty The King. In these celebrations, too, the Athletic Club participated in an indirect manner. The Football Ground was loaned to the Director of Education for the purposes of staging a large display of the various athletic pursuits of the schools under his control. This display was an enormous success and proved of very great interest to His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales. In point of fact, His Royal Highness expressed great regret that his time-table did not permit of his spending a still longer period at this display, a very great compliment when it is realised that he had already doubled the time originally allowed. In passing, it should be mentioned that two members of the Management Committee had a very great deal to do with the arrangements so far as they affected the general organisation of the ground.

It is to be regretted that the Annual Statement of Accounts, which accompanies this report, does not show as healthy a position as could be wished by the body of members as a whole. They show a loss on the year's working of £264 18s. 5d. On looking at the accounts, members will notice that both the Income and Expenditure is up for the year, but that while the expenditure is up by about £650, the income is not up by a corresponding amount, with the resulting loss referred to above. It is felt that some explanation should be given with regard to the increased expenditure, as some portion of it at any rate may be said to be beyond the control of the Management Committee. Our away expenses were up by £279 and our donations by £39. With regard to the latter item, this increase was due to donations to the funds in aid of the Gresford Colliery Disaster and also to the King George's Jubilee Trust. The balance of the £650 is accounted for as follows:—

Insurance (increase) £8
Income Tax £15
Share of Renovations to East and
West Stands £91

Of these three items, in the case of the first we are largely in the hands of the Insurance Companies who, in spite of our efforts to the contrary, have increased the rate of premium chargeable in respect of the fire risks on the Stands. The item for Income Tax is, of course, one which fluctuates with the fortunes of the Club and which is fully investigated by our Auditors before it is sanctioned for payment. The third item represents our share in the cost of renovating and repainting the steel work, etc., of the East and West Stands. By a special arrangement, we shared with the Welsh Football Union the cost of doing up the East and West Stands, while the Arms Park (Cardiff) Greyhound Racing Company, Limited, footed the whole bill for the North and South Stands. Briefly, with regard to this item of expenditure it may be said that it is not of a recurrent nature, but that the time for effecting this renovation was long overdue and as a result of the work that has been undertaken, the Stands are in a far better condition than they were previously. This increase in expenditure is already the subject of considerable concern on the part of the Management Committee, and members may rest assured that during the year every effort will be made to produce a better result for the year 1935-36.

The attention of all members is directed to the revival of the Baseball Section. This has come about through the discontinuance of Greyhound Racing on Saturday afternoons, which permitted the Management Committee to consider the position with the result that it decided to revive the Section. The Section has been successful in obtaining admission to the First Division of the Welsh Baseball League, in which it is hoped that it will enjoy a successful first season.

Reference must be made to the presentation of a pair of gold cuff links, with the coat of arms of the Club inset in platinum, to our President, Mr. W. T. Morgan. Although this event took

place after the close of the year to which this report refers, it actually belongs to the year 1934-35, for the following reasons.

In the autumn the members of the Management Committee and many other members of the Club expressed the view that the time had now come when the members would like to express their appreciation of Mr. W. T. Morgan's services as President of the Club for the past twenty-seven years, in some small but tangible form. The original scheme was that our President should be entertained at a Dinner early in February, at which the presentation should be made. Very unfortunately, before very much progress had been made in the matter it became obvious that his then state of health would not permit of such a function being held in February, therefore, the original scheme was abandoned. The Management Committee then decided to proceed with the presentation only. Subscriptions were limited to the sum of 2/6, because it was felt that in a matter of this nature both the President and the members would wish that this gift should be representative of a large number of the members rather than that certain individual members should give large donations. The appeal, as was only to be expected, met with a ready response from the members, and the subscription list was closed towards the end of April. The actual presentation was made to our President at the Annual General Meeting of the Football Club by Mr. John Elliot. When Mr. W. T. Morgan rose to thank the members of the Club for their kindness and appreciation he was received with very great enthusiasm.

In conclusion, the attention of members is once again drawn to the excellent condition of the ground. It is generally realised not only by the members but also by the citizens of Cardiff and South Wales as a whole, that the Cardiff Arms Park is an athletic ground suitable for the conduct of the highest class of sport. The Football Ground is, of course, used for International Matches, and the Cricket Ground is regularly used for County Matches and has on one occasion been used for a Test Trial; while the Bowling Green is used for a variety of fixtures of similar standing. This, in itself, is adequate evidence of the excellent condition of the ground, in spite of the fact that those responsible for maintaining it are always handicapped by the small numbers of the permanent staff, all due to the ever urgent need for economy. It is to be hoped that when members make use of the ground that they realise that its excellence is due to the supervision of the Secretary, Trevor Preece (the head groundsman), and the staff under them. There are obviously minor improvements necessary and these matters are receiving the attention of the Management Committee as circumstances permit.

CARDIFF RUGBY CLUB

Season 1934-35.

Another season has ended, its memories alone remain.

Perhaps not a wonderful "year," but as results go down in the Club's records, it shows a slight improvement as compared with the Season, 1933-34.

In common with all statistics, those of 1934-35 will make dry reading, but there are certain matches which will always remain a source of joyful remembrance. The 1935 Barbarian game is a match in point, and who amongst those privileged to see it will easily forget the destructive attacks of the "Baa-Baas," whose back division included: K. W. Marshall (Scotland) full-back; J. E. Forrest (Scotland), W. Wooller (Wales), P. Cranmer (England) and R. Leyland (England) three-quarters; with R. W. Shaw (Scotland) at outside-half?

Who will forget the gallant (and superior) display of the Cardiff forwards whose efforts must have borne fruit had our backs shown similar merit? Who will fail to share the crumb of comforting fact that a decisive factor in the visitors' victory was the all-round display of a Welshman, W. Wooller, the outstanding "centre-three" of the season?

Some fine results were however, achieved, notably on the New Year tour, when Bristol, Glasgow High School (F.P.), and Watsonians were beaten in successive matches; our near rivals, Newport, were beaten three times, and no defeat was sustained in any of the three games on the Cornish tour.

The first visit of a Cardiff Rugby team to Scotland proved a highly successful tour, and our officials and players alike are lavish in their praise of the hospitality showered on them by the Glasgow High School (F.P.) and Watsonians Football Clubs. The Glasgow High School (F.P.) will pay their first visit to Cardiff on Boxing Day, 1936, with, we all hope, R. W. Shaw in their ranks, and, given a fine day, we do not doubt that our followers will accord them a real Cardiff welcome.

In a match in aid of H.M. King George's Jubilee Trust, at Pontypool, Cardiff were victorious by 9 points to 6.

In spite of the capable leadership of Archie Skym, the Club's only Welsh International of the season, and more pleasing experiences than otherwise, the sum total of results must, from the Cardiff standpoint, be judged a trifle disappointing.

The Skipper spared no effort, but inability to fill the outside-half and centre positions in a satisfactory manner despite changes and experiments, prevented the Club from enjoying a season of outstanding success; we lacked, too, an outstanding personality in the three-quarter line to inspire and guide the material it contained.

M. J. Turnbull was unable to render full assistance owing to injury, but late in the season his place was creditably filled by D. Jenkins, the ex-Welsh Schoolboy International.

The present backs are, however, young and may develop on the essential lines, but we require to be better served in the key positions if we are to approach in 1935-36 the standard of play expected of Cardiff players.

There is no room for despondency, so let us repose confidence in the Committee in their unenviable tasks, and in the leadership of Tommy Stone, that great hearted and capable player. We have no doubt that no effort will be spared by all concerned for the welfare and success of the team for 1935-36, in which season added keenness and competition will doubtless be shown in view of the visit of the famous New Zealanders.

In conclusion, we are satisfied that the good name and prestige of the Club has been maintained, and it is a

pleasure to reprint the following extract from the Bristol Rugby programme of the 29th December, 1934:

"The Bristol Club had much to thank Cardiff for, and nothing was too much for them to do to put the Bristol Club on its feet. The Cardiff Club has always endeavoured to display the finest features of Welsh Rugger . . . and their name stands high all over the world, not because of the matches they have won, but because of the manner in which their games have been played."

Let us all join in mutual endeavour to maintain and justify the high standing of the Cardiff Rugby Club in the Football World.

Morgan, the Chairman of the Management Committee and Captain of the Cardiff side. The cup was presented to Mr. H. T. Joseph as the representative of the winning team, by Mr. Walter Morgan, captain of the team entered by the Bridgend Rugby Club, who were the previous holders.

Little else remains to be said, excepting that, as is fitting on such occasions, the speeches were brief and to the point. It should be recorded, however, that the health of Mr. John Duncan was drunk with great enthusiasm in his absence, as was also that of Mr. Ridgeway Fitzgerald who, as is well known, was probably the originator of this delightful annual competition.


