#### INTRODUCTION

It is natural in the Introduction to the Report for the year ended May 4th, 1936, that one should refer to the death of his late Majesty King George V. In the previous Report reference was made to the Silver Jubilee of King George V and specially to the visit of our present King, Edward VIII, to the Cardiff Arms Park, on Saturday, May 11th. 1935, when as Prince of Wales, he visited Cardiff to represent H.M. King George V at the National Jubilee celebrations

for Wales which were held in this city.

The death of his Majesty King George V came as a great blow to the nation, particularly after a period of such great national rejoicing. It is not for one in this report to refer at length to the very great feeling of loss which came over the nation on the death of its Sovereign. In common with all others, the members of the Cardiff Athletic Club mourn the loss of a great King who had shown his interest in the every day life of his subjects in so many ways. The late King never visited the Cardiff Arms Park but we know that he was interested in Rugby Football because on several occasions he visited the Headquarters of the Rugby Union at Twickenham and received both teams prior to the match. Our present King, to whom the members of the Club wish a long life and a successful reign, has also shown an interest in Athletics and Rugby Football. Not only did he visit the Cardiff Arms Park on May 11th last year, but he was also present and received the teams on the occasion of the Ireland v. Wales match on the 12th March, 1932, when Ireland won by 12 points to 10. We have every reason to believe that His Majesty on that occasion and on all occasions when he has been present at a Rugby Football match has thoroughly enjoyed the game and we hope that circumstances will permit of his continuing to take an interest in and give his support to Rugby Football in a manner similar to that in which it was supported by the late King, his father.

Death has also deprived the Club of the services of two of its Vice-Presidents since the publication of the last Report, in the persons of Sir William Reardon Smith, Bart., and Mr. Ridgeway

Sir William Reardon Smith, who was a Vice-President for a number of years, was one of those who gave the Club practical support, at the time when the ground was purchased from the Marquis of Bute, by taking up a considerable block of debentures. Further, he materially assisted the Club by refraining from taking the steps to which he was legally entitled during the difficult days when the Club was unable to meet the interest on these debentures.

Mr. Ridgeway Fitzgerald was well known to a large number of the members of the Club because he was actively engaged in so many of its interests. He was a member of the Management and Football Committees for many years and a member of the General Committee, and Captain of the Cardiff Athletic Golf Club at the time of his death. In the appropriate sections of the Report references are made to his activities and services in connection with the Rugby Club and the Golf Club. As a member of the Management Committee, his services from the point of view of general administration had been invaluable, and it was with a very real sense of loss

and regret that the Management Committee accepted his resignation from that body some few years before his death, owing to his continued ill-health. He continued, however, as a member of the General Committee until the time of his death, as it was always hoped by his colleagues on the Management Committee, and by those who knew of his very great interest in the Club that his health would improve sufficiently to permit him to become an active member of the

Management Committee once again.

During the year another blow of a different kind has fallen on the Club. When the ground was purchased by the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., the Marquis of Bute retained the frontage along Westgate Street, letting to the Company the ground which comprised the three Lawn Tennis Courts along the Westgate Street wall on a nominal monthly tenancy. Since the issue of the last Report, the Company has received notice from its landlord to quit this strip of land, which at the time of writing, as most members know, is being utilized for the erection of a large block of flats which will overlook the cricket ground. Not only will the erection of this block of flats be detrimental to the ground in that it will be more shut in and completely overlooked by this large building, but, in addition, the general amenities of the members have been curtailed. We have lost the three lawn tennis courts which were along the Westgate Street wall without being able to replace them as yet, and, in addition, the cricket ground itself has been reduced in width by some ten feet. The Management Committee, however, has very carefully considered the problem with which it has been presented, and is hoping that circumstances will permit it to take steps which will permit of an enlargement of the cricket ground, and the restoration in some other part of the ground of the amenities which the Lawn Tennis Section has lost. With this end in view the Management Committee has considered certain plans and schemes, but it is probable that some time will elapse before it will be able to take any definite steps in the matter, because there are various parties to be consulted and with whom agreement has to be reached before any definite action can be taken. In the meantime, members may rest assured that the Management Committee is taking every step possible to safeguard their interests in the difficult situation in which the Club finds itself.

During the Football season the New Zealand Rugby Team, which was touring Great Britain and Ireland, paid two visits to the Cardiff Arms Park. In the first match they played and defeated Cardiff in a delightful game, to which reference is made in the Rugby Club's Report. In the second match they played and were defeated by Wales by 13 points to 12 points, in what was probably the most exciting football match that has ever been played. New Zealand led by 3 points at half-time and in the second half, the lead actually changed hands four times before the final whistle left Wales the victors. The match was watched by a very large crowd, all of whom felt no doubt that they were having the privilege of seeing a really great and exciting game of Rugby Football. In addition, in March, Wales played Ireland on the Park and won by three points to nil, thereby becoming

the champion country for the year.

Following usual practice, the serious attention of members is once again drawn to the Statement of Accounts which accompanies

this Report. An examination of this will show that we made a profit on the year's working of £317 8s. 5d. as compared with a loss in the previous year of £264 188. 5d. An examination of the Asset side of the Balance Sheet will also disclose that not only are the Assets written down to a nominal figure, but also that the liquid Assets of the Club amount to about £2,800. These figures are liable to mislead members very considerably as from them they will probably conclude that the Club is in a very strong financial position. Actually, the position is one which should receive most careful attention from every one concerned. Leaving aside the beneficial effect of such an attraction as the New Zealand Rugby Football side on our financial results last year, the attention of members is once again directed to the true financial position of the Club. The Arms Park (Cardiff) Greyhound Racing Co., Ltd., pay the Club a subscription of £1,000 per annum. If the Club had not received this subscription instead of making a profit of over £300 it would have incurred a loss of nearly f.700. The Club is not liable for any rates on the ground, nor for practical purposes does it have to meet any bills as regards repairs and upkeep of the Stands, at any rate at present, while, in addition, there are certain other small items of extraneous income of a somewhat similar nature which certainly help the finances in the course of the year. If one makes allowance for all these helpful factors, the truth is that instead of making a profit each year on its own working the Club actually makes a substantial loss. Though it is difficult to realise. the fact remains that during the last three or four years no single Section would have made a profit on the year's working if it had been charged with that share of the general expenses which it would have incurred had it been conducted as a unit entirely apart from the others. This is the position after expenditure has been curtailed in every possible direction. What is really required is increased revenue. With expenditure at its minimum a comparatively small increase in revenue would assure the finances of the Club. It is hoped that all members will do what they can to assist the Club by endeavouring to secure additional members amongst their friends, and that the public will show their appreciation of the wonderful ground situated in the centre of the city by supporting the Club more handsomely than they have in the past at the Football and Cricket

In conclusion, it is fitting that reference should be made to the work of the General Secretary, the Head Groundsman, and of the staff under them. The curtailment of the ground, owing to the construction of the Westgate Street flats has created a lot of extra work because as far as possible turf had to be moved and preserved and other matters of a similar nature had to be attended to. Often, in this connection, decisions had to be made at very short notice, as naturally the needs of the builders could not wait on the decisions of the various Committees, who would otherwise have to be consulted. In these circumstances the members of the Club should be grateful to the Secretary and the other members of the permanent staff, not only for the excellent general condition of ground, which is up to its usual standard, but also for the way in which all the Staff have faced these emergency problems and have handled them to the best of their ability in the general interests of the Club.

Compation in

The Season 1935-36 must be written down as a sort of "Mixed Bag," containing as it did its measure of hope, optimism, success, and perhaps, too, disappointment. Nevertheless, it was notable in two respects.

Firstly, we had the visit of the most famous of all Colonial Touring sides, the New Zealanders, more popularly known as the "All Blacks." We had watched them, prepared and trained hard for them, but were beaten in a game which was stated by these famous opponents to have been their most enjoyable one up to that time. True, we were not beaten pointless and Cardiff certainly had a glorious spell in which the team carried all before it—a phase of sparkling football. However, we suffered defeat at the hands of a combination which played the better all round football and which was never slow to profit by error; no Cardiffian cavilled at the result of this really fine game.

Secondly, and happier to relate, we achieved the distinction of inflicting on the famous Barbarians their first defeat in Wales after a sequence of twenty-two winning matches in six seasons. At the end of this thrilling struggle, Tommy Stone, our Captain, was carried off "Shoulder high" and he must have been mighty proud to have led the Cardiff team that day. Praise and congratulation first came from the sporting "Baa-baas" themselves and the merit of the victory is reflected by the strength of their team, which was as follows:—

V. G. J. Jenkins (Wales); K. C. Fyffe (Scotland), W. Wooller (Wales), P. Cranmer (England), G. V. Boyle (Ireland); W. R. Logan (Scotland) R. W. Shaw (Scotland); S. J. Deering, J. Russell, C. E. St. J. Beamish, A. Alexander (Ireland), R. J. Longland (England), D. L. K. Milman, and R. J. L. Hammond.

The season's results in terms of wins and losses do not perhaps, reflect too favourably from the point of view of the record—which, on comparison at some future date, might be regarded as only a moderately successful one. The glory of this incomparable game of Rugby football is

only achieved, however, by the spirit in which it is played, and as far as Cardiff are concerned the necessary spirit always prevailed, as doubtless it always will.

We are everywhere welcomed, pressed to come again, and —almost to the point of embarrassment—begged to enlarge or amend our already very strenuous fixture list.

For charity and similar causes, nine "Extra" engagements were fulfilled in addition to the official fixtures

The most notable features were: The successful Cornish tour when all three matches were won, followed by a victory over Llanelly at Stradey on the ensuing Saturday; at Bridgend, the home team included D. Solomon, F. Vorrath and W. R. Collins of the "All Blacks," but victory was won by Cardiff; London Welsh and Plymouth Albion were also twice beaten; whilst we had the better of our four fixture argument with our Swansea rivals.

E. Watkins was the Club's representative in the victorious Welsh team against New Zealand on the Cardiff Arms Park, and, while on the subject of these tourists, we would like to state that the Club's congratulations were extended to the Swansea Club in its hour of deserved victory over the Colonials at Swansea.

To our popular Skipper, Tommy Stone, we tender our sincere appreciation in the accomplishment of the onerous duties of Captain.

The lack of the inspiration of a strong personality among the mid-field players was, no doubt, the chief cause of most of the defeats, but the Club's prestige remains unsullied and Tommy can look back on his year of Captaincy as one of success.

Incidentally, the presence of Cliff Jones in the ranks of the Blue and Blacks for 1936-37 is, we understand, assured, as well as the services of W. Wooller, who will be taking up an appointment in Cardiff on the 1st September, 1936.

In conclusion, we regret to record the death of Mr. Ridgeway Fitzgerald after a long illness. He was an ardent worker in the cause of Rugby football and had served as Vice-President and member of the Management and

Football Committees of our Club for a number of years. He had also rendered nearly twenty years service to the Cardiff & District Rugby Union and was its President until his resignation from that body owing to the illness which preceded his untimely death. Always outspoken, the late Mr. Fitzgerald was a capable administrator, and had greatly helped the cause of charity through his assistance in organising Rugby matches during and immediately after the War of 1914-18.

#### CARDIFF ATHLETIC XV.

For the third successive season, Hubert Johnson filled the role of Captain. This in itself is a very high honour and one which takes its place in the features of the Club's history.

The ideal Captain is one who obtains the maximum effort from his team, and is able to maintain that *esprit de corps* before, during, and after the game.

Hubert again showed his capacity for the task, by no means an enviable one, of leading the Athletic XV, indeed he proved himself an almost ideal Captain.

Praise in this respect has been meted out to him not only officially, but by the expression of his players also, and, but for an injury sustained whilst training, which caused him to stand down one match, he would have played in all the Athletic games. He assisted the first XV on several occasions and was always available to play in the Club's "Extra or Charity" games. Opinion has been expressed that had it not been for his worth as Captain of the Athletic, he would have merited and retained his place in the first XV.

The results obtained for 1935-36 compare most favourably with those of any Cardiff Reserve or subsidiary fifteen in post-war seasons. What, however, is more important is the fact that the real Cardiff type of football was produced, and several promising youngsters brought to the front.

We congratulate Hubert Johnson, not only for splendid results obtained during 1935-36, but also on his election as a member of the Football Committee for 1936-37. He should be an ideal acquisition to that body.

#### INTRODUCTION

During the year which ended May 10th, 1937, the Club was deprived of the services of Mr. H. M. Ingledew, who died on February 1st last. Of those who have been interested in the welfare of the Club since the War it may be said that no one has worked harder on behalf of the Club than the late Mr. Hugh Ingeldew, whose interest in it dates from the time when he was a prominent member of the football side. He played at half-back from the season 1887-88 to 1891-92, and played for Wales against Ireland in 1890 and against England and Scotland in 1891. After his active playing days were over he served as a member of the Ground Committee and continued to take a great interest in the Club on all occasions. When, in the early years after the war, the Marquis of Bute offered the ground for sale, he was one of the prime movers in forming the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., and in raising the capital necessary to purchase the ground. Since that time as honorary solicitor to the Club he has worked indefatigably in its interests. being very largely responsible for the successful negotiations between the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., and the Arms Park (Cardiff) Greyhound Company Ltd., and also for the negotiations between the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd. and the Welsh Rugby Union, which culminated in the reorganisation of the Company. He was a Director and Vice-Chairman of the Company from the outset to the time of his death and when, as a result of the reconstruction of the Company, the Club itself was reconstituted, he became the Vice-Chairman of the General Committee. It is probable that the ordinary member of the Club has no idea of the debt that the Club owes to the late Hugh Ingledew, because

his activities on the Club's behalf were rarely of a nature that the average member could see them or appreciate them. They were nearly always carried out either in his own office or in Committee, but it can be truthfully said that had he not taken the very great interest that he did in the Club it is doubtful whether members would be enjoying the amenities that they do to-day.

It is fitting to note that he has been succeeded as Vice-Chairman of the General Committee by his friend, Mr. Iohn Elliot, who, incidentally, came into the football side in the season 1892-93, the season after Hugh M. Ingledew retired, and who also served on the Ground Committee in succession to him. The new Vice-Chairman has also given much of his time to the interests of the Club during the post-war period, having also been a Director of the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., ever since the Company was formed. The members may be assured that the General Committee. in appointing Mr. John Elliot as Vice-Chairman, has made a very wise appointment, and that all are very fortunate in having a person of such wide experience as Vice-Chairman of the General Committee. As yet no one has been appointed Vice-Chairman of the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., in succession to Mr. H. M. Ingledew.

As will be seen from the sectional reports, the Club has had a very successful year. Reference should particularly be made to the Football Team, which has had its most successful season since the war, and to the Men's Lawn Tennis Team who won the South Wales Lawn Tennis Championship Bowl for the first time in the Club's history.

This year has seen the abdication of King Edward VIII and the succession of King George VI and his gracious consort, Queen Elizabeth, to whom the members of the Club wish a long life and a successful reign.

In last year's report, reference was made to the loss of the three Lawn Tennis Courts along the Westgate Street wall as the result of the erection of the flats on this site. In making this reference members were informed that the Management Committee had certain plans and schemes in view to compensate the members for the loss of amenities caused in this way. It was also indicated that a considerable time would elapse before definite steps could be taken. As yet, no definite official announcement can be made, but members may rest assured that the Management Committee has in every way considered the interests of the Club and that there is a distinct possibility that in the near future the Management Committee's negotiations will produce definite results of advantage to the members.

In conclusion reference should be made to those who help to make the Cardiff Arms Park what it is. Not only should members be grateful to the General Secretary and the members of the permanent staff who are responsible for the excellent condition of the ground on all occasions, but it is also fitting that some tribute should be paid in this Report to the work of the Ladies' Committee who are responsible for carrying out the catering arrangements during the summer months. The Club is indeed very fortunate that it should have amongst its members ladies who are prepared to devote a considerable amount of their time on Saturday afternoons to preparing and serving Teas in rather difficult circumstances. It is hoped that the members, particularly those who use the grounds in the summer either for the purpose of playing or watching Club matches or watching County Cricket games, will realise the debt of gratitude they owe to this Ladies' Committee.

#### CARDIFF RUGBY CLUB

The year 1936-37 proved to be the most outstanding of Post-War Seasons. Play was consistently good, at times brilliant and sparkling, and always in keeping with the very high traditional Cardiff Rugby standard.

For independent testimony to this successful year let us cite an extract from the report of "Old Stager" on the Cardiff v. Barbarians game last Easter, which reads "Cardiff dictated the trend of events for lengthy periods, and made their famous opponents feel the full weight of the best club side of the season."

Incidentally, an Irish International who took part in that game expressed the view that "No Club should be allowed to have such a good Club side as Cardiff!"

At the season's outset, prospects looked promising and the assistance of Cliff Jones and Wilfred Wooller was to be forthcoming. It was, perhaps, a little time before the pack settled into an efficiently blended "eight" which, when the team was at full strength, was subjected to fiery opposition thoroughly determined on defeating it with the object of lessening the effectiveness of our clever backs. The fine team spirit, however, which prevailed throughout, overcame a few early shocks and proved the dominating factor in a really wonderful year.

Doubtless, the season would have been even better had it not been for the unfortunate injury to Cliff Jones at Swansea on the 28th November, 1936, which prevented him from playing during the remainder of the season.

Some compensation was available in the person of Wilfred Wooller who, in spite of trial and International Matches and injuries was able to assist the Club in half of its matches, and his assistance proved invaluable.

Our thanks is due to both of these players who lost no time in joining in the traditional team spirit and everprevailing good fellowship of the Cardiff Club.

Unstinted praise must be given to the loyal Captain, Leslie Spence, for his tireless and energetic example. To successfully lead a first-class side is creditable, but to maintain the necessary team spirit and, when occasion demands, lead your team to victory with half-a-dozen of your best players absent, is a greater test, and one which "Les." successfully accomplished on several occasions.

If we say that Spence proved an extremely valuable and genuine "back row" forward, we mean that he proved entirely the opposite to the destructive, spoiling, non-shoving and ornamental "type" who is, unfortunately, still regarded in other quarters as "worth his place." Always in the thick of the fray, standing up to a lot of hard knocks, he set a sterling example to his team, and, particularly to his pack, which developed into one of the finest "eights" we have had for many years.

It is a great honour to Captain the Cardiff Rugby Club, and it is one which was worthily upheld by Leslie Spence, whom we sincerely congratulate on the valuable service rendered to those inseparable partners—Our Club and the Rugby Game—in this most excellent season.

Outstanding accomplishments were: the great win over the Barbarians by 16 points to 3; the maximum wins against Swansea—four times, Pontypool—three times, Neath, Coventry, and Plymouth Albion—twice each, the successful Midlands and Cornish tours—five games played all of which were won.

Against our Newport rivals, we were successful in three out of the four annual matches; incidentally, we consider that a more "healthy" rivalry continues to be shown in these games, which are doubtless keen but without the elements of rough Rugby.

Club players capped for Wales were W. Wooller (who captained the team against Ireland), E. Watkins, and H. Rees.

Unfortunately for Tommy Stone and H. O. Edwards, the postponement of the original match against Ireland at Belfast owing to snow, deprived them of their caps. These two players, however, played for the Barbarians during the year against the East Midlands XV in the Annual Edgar Mobbs' Memorial Match at Northampton, on the 4th March, 1937.

We were genuinely sorry to lose the services of Tommy Stone, who, late in the season, decided to turn professional, but it would be ungenerous to let this occasion pass without offering our thanks to this great player and product of our Elementary Schools, for his valuable service to the Club in the seasons, 1928-29 to 1936-37.

During the season a broadcast talk on the interesting features of the Club's history was given from the West Regional programme in which W. J. Hoare ("Old Stager"), R. T. Gabe, R. A. Cornish, and Louis Bush, the son of the illustrious Percy Bush, took part.

The First XV visited Port Talbot to play Aberavon on the 28th September, 1936, to commemorate that Club's Jubilee.

We were honoured too by an invitation from the Middlesex Rugby Union to take part in its popular Annual Seven-a-Side Tournament in the cause of charity. In deference to our status we were to be exempted from the preliminary rounds, but owing to the terms of the Welsh Rugby Union bye-laws, the invitation had to be declined.

OBITUARY.—Mr. R. W. Barry passed away at the Llandough Hospital on the 4th November, 1936, after rather a long illness. The late Mr. Barry was for three years a member of the Football Committee, which body he conscientiously served. He was, perhaps, better known as a Welsh Rugby Union Referee, and in his lengthy career as such had controlled many important first class matches in Wales and England.

RETIREMENT.—We are sorry to record that Mr. B. R. Turnbull, owing to increasing pressure of business, was unable to allow himself to be nominated for re-election to the Football Committee for the season 1937-38.

Mr. Turnbull was a member of this Committee since his football retirement, but we are glad to learn that his services on the General and Management Committees of the Cardiff Athletic Club will still continue to be available.

CHARITY.—In response to the Cardiff Royal Infirmary Centenary Appeal, the Club staged a Cardiff Past versus Present match on the 28th April, 1937, and it is hoped that a sum in the region of £200 will be forthcoming.

As a matter of interest we give below the team of those old players who so willingly emerged from retirement—some after a great number of years—to respond to the Club's invitation to do their bit for such a worthy cause:—

Playing prospects for Season 1937-38 are very bright and with almost all of the current season's players available, we feel sure that with good fortune in the matter of players escaping injury, the new Captain, backed up by an energetic Committee, will achieve as successful a season in terms of Club spirit and record as that of 1936-37.

#### CARDIFF ATHLETIC XV.

On the departure of G. V. Jones, the mantle of Captaincy fell on the shoulders of V. R. Osmond, who right nobly led the side well and successfully until the end of the season.

"Viv." Osmond has been a grand and faithful servant and his loyalty to the Club (mainly with the First XV) for a great many years is deserving of the highest praise. We feel sure that future players will benefit from his loyal example.

A word of praise is also due to Hubert Johnson who emerged from his retirement to assist in several matches; he is now a number of the Committee and a Selector.

Perhaps the most successful achievement of the season was the distinction of defeating those rivals Newport United in all four matches.






#### INTRODUCTION

During the year which ended on May 7th, 1938, the Club has lost the services of Mr. J. Gowan Clark, who died on November 28th, 1937, and of Mr. John Elliot, who died on March 30th, 1938.

In the Introduction to the Report for the year ended May 10th, 1937, reference was made to the close association which always existed between the late Mr. Hugh Murray Ingledew and the late Mr. John Elliot in activities connected with the Cardiff Rugby Football Club and the Cardiff Athletic Club. Like his friend, Mr. Hugh Ingledew, Mr. John Elliot was always one who took the very greatest interest in the Club. He never sought the limelight but did his hardest work for the Club behind the scenes, and was always ready to do anything he could to further the interests of the Club whenever he was called upon to do so.

He originally became associated with the Club as an active member of the Football side, playing as a three-quarter and half-back in the seasons 1892/93 to 1898/99. He was Captain of the Club in the season 1896/97 and secured three International Caps, playing for Wales against Ireland in 1894, and against both England and Ireland in 1898.

After his playing days were over, for some time he continued to take an interest in the Club, an interest which lapsed for a period but which was revived when the ground was purchased from the Marquis of Bute shortly after the War. He was one of the original Directors of the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., and in this capacity was jointly responsible with his friend, Mr. Hugh Ingledew, for the successful negotiations between the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., and the Arms Park (Cardiff) Greyhound Racing Co., Ltd., and also for the negotiations with the Welsh Rugby Union which led up to the re-organisation of the Company.

As was stated in the last Report, he succeeded Mr. Hugh Ingledew as Vice-Chairman of the General Committee of the Club and, subsequent to the publication of the last Report, he was appointed Vice-Chairman of the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., in succession to Mr. Hugh Ingledew. During the years when he was actively connected with the Club, in addition to his natural charm and geniality, he gave the Club the benefit of his great business experience, coupled with very marked ability in all negotiations. By his death the Club has in every way suffered a very great loss.

By the death of Mr. J. Gowan Clark, the Club has lost the services of one who was also associated with it for a number of years. During his younger days, as members will learn from the Cricket Club's report, he was a prominent cricketer, captaining the side in the seasons 1897, 1898, 1899, and again in 1902, during which period he also played for Glamorgan for a number of seasons. After his playing days he continued to take an interest in the Cricket Section, being for many years a member of the Cricket Committee and latterly the Chairman of the Cricket Club. He was, as members well know, for many years a member both of the General Committee and the Management Committee of the Club. During this period he proved himself to be a capable administrator. He took a great interest in the well-being of the Club and devoted a considerable amount of time to its interests. By his death the General Committee and the Management Committee have lost the valued assistance of a very old and genial friend.

As yet, no appointment has been made to fill the vacant positions on the General Committee caused by the deaths of Mr. John Elliot and Mr. J. Gowan Clark, nor has anyone been appointed to succeed Mr. John Elliot as Vice-Chairman of the General Committee of the Club, or as Vice-Chairman of the Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd. During the year Mr. Kenneth Ingledew was co-opted as a member of the General Committee and consented to act as Honorary Solicitor to the Club in succession to his father, while Captain H. J. M. Edwards, a member of the

General Committee, was appointed a member of the Management Committee in the place of Mr. J. Gowan Clark.

In the last two reports, reference has been made in a somewhat cryptic and enigmatical manner to plans and schemes which have been brought forward to compensate members for the loss of amenities caused through the erection of the flats along the Westgate Street wall. This work entailed considerable negotiations between the Club and its landlords, The Cardiff Arms Park Co., Ltd., and its co-tenants, The Arms Park (Cardiff) Greyhound Racing Co., Ltd., work in which both Mr. Ingledew and Mr. Elliot participated during their lifetime. This work has now reached a successful conclusion with results known to all the members. The Mezzanine floor of the North Stand has, as far as the structure of the Stand permits, been successfully adapted to accommodate a members' lounge and new and up-to-date changing rooms with baths attached to each. In addition, separate rooms have been provided for the use of the Referee in the Football season and the Umpires in the Cricket season, and for the Medical Officer in case of serious injury, two small points of considerable inportance to a ground of the standing of the Cardiff Arms Park.

The old wooden Pavilion had for many years been giving the General Committee considerable worry. It was generally in a dilapidated condition, had come to the end of its days and required replacing in some way or another. The adaption of the Mezzanine floor in the manner indicated permitted the dismantling of the old Pavilion which in turn resulted in the moving of the County Cricket Score Board to the Angel entrance and the erection of a Cricket Pavilion and Tea Room in the south-east corner of the Cricket Ground. This Pavilion, which is connected to the members' lounge by a communicating passage, also contains a Skittle Alley which promises to be very popular in the winter.

In addition, as those members who attend the Football matches are aware, the stands around the Football Ground have been altered and improved out of all recognition

by the Welsh Rugby Union. The result is that today we have not only the finest Athletic Ground in Wales, but also a Football Ground more in keeping with the traditions of the Club and the importance of the matches played on it.

Naturally, the very considerable alterations and improvements effected during the past year have entailed an enormous expenditure on the part of the Club, as is shown in the Annual Statement of Accounts, to which the attention of all members is particularly directed, involving a liability extending over the next twelve years. The Committee embarked on this expenditure and liability with considerable misgiving. It felt on the one hand that the Club had accumulated certain funds which could be used to the general advantage and benefit of the members. On the other hand, it found that when the scheme was completed, owing to a variety of circumstances, it involved a liability extending over a considerable period as has already been stated. It feels, however, that the actions it has taken have in every way been in the best interests of the Club. It hopes that the existing members and all others who use the Club premises will appreciate the improvements that have been effected and that as a result there will be a considerable increase, not only in the number of members of the various sections, but also in the number of consolidated members who, together with life members, control the destiny of the Club.

One cannot conclude this Introduction to the Annual Report without once again paying tribute to all those who make life on the Park so pleasant. Particularly one would mention the General Secretary and the members of the permanent staff who are responsible for the excellent appearance and condition of the ground and also the Ladies' Committee who carry out the catering arrangements during the summer months. It is to be hoped that the ladies who devote so much time preparing and serving teas for the benefit of their fellow members will find the new Tea Pavilion more pleasant in every way than their old quarters.

#### CARDIFF RUGBY CLUB

The Season 1937/38 was another very successful one and provided the best record since 1910-11, and to the Captains of both the First and Athletic Fifteens we offer our sincere congratulations.

It is a wonderful performance to win 38 out of a total of 46 matches, all against first-class opposition, a feat which the Cardiff Team accomplished in 1937/38; it also indicates the continued existence of a band of capable players imbued with a healthy team spirit.

The record is more remarkable when the frequent selection of the Club's players for Internationals, Trials and other representative Matches is borne in mind, which testifies to the strength of the reserve side. Twelve Cardiff Athletic Players were fielded against Blackheath at home; nine against Llanelly at home, and nine against Bath away, yet the wearers of the Blue and Black jerseys were victorious in each encounter.

Throughout the season, the football provided was typical of Cardiff, open, attractive and often brilliant, and it cannot be said that the team at any time resorted to a close style of play in order to preserve a slender lead, whatever the class of the opposition, or even when a temporary lapse of form was apparent. Yet it is a remarkable fact that, compared with the Season 1936/37, gate receipts were down. Cannot our Members help by introducing new members to a Club which provides so many pleasing facilities and so much brilliant Rugby Football?

Our reputation has been built up and continues to be maintained by playing Rugby Football in its true spirit. Ample testimony to this fact is borne by the popular welcome given to the Cardiff Team when playing away from home.

Read what the Newport programme for the Match versus Cardiff on the 13th November, 1937, has to say:

"Cardiff are a bigger attraction than any other Club in the Kingdom at Newport," and that even before the return of W. Wooller and Cliff Jones . . . . "Cardiff had a brilliant side."

Here, we would like to pay tribute to our Newport rivals, who, whilst not perhaps possessing many players comparable to those who have served the Club in some of its former brilliant seasons, continue to join in mutual and successful endeavour to provide a clean, hard and open type of football in our four annual games. The continued good feeling between the two Clubs is much to be admired, and must be maintained.

In the series of Internationals we were represented by Arthur Bassett, Cliff Jones, Harry Rees, E. Watkins, and Wilfred Wooller.

The Reserves were W. E. N. Davis, H. O. Edwards, W. G. Morgan, and Jim Regan, and we all sincerely wish that next season National honours will be the lot of these deserving and sterling players.

In Club Matches, Wilfred Wooller set up a record of nine dropped goals, thus comfortably surpassing the previous best of seven by Percy F. Bush and D. E. (Danny) Davies in the Seasons 1908/09 and 1922/23 respectively. Most of Wooller's goals were worth four points and on occasions proved match winners.

Arthur Bassett scored the highest number of tries.

All praise is due to the Captain, Arthur H. Jones, who proved a very capable and unselfish skipper. He was ever ready to encourage the selection of a younger or promising player, even if it meant "standing down" himself. In spite of several nasty injuries, he played in over thirty matches, and can look back with pride on the Captaincy of the Cardiff Team in such a successful season.

Aberavon were again given a fixture—at Aberavon on the 25th April, 1938—and the match, which proved a keen one, was played before what was almost a record crowd and lost in a sensational manner in the last five minutes.

All supporters of the Cardiff Club will be pleased to note the election of the Club's nominee, R. A. Cornish, to a seat on the Match Committee (East District) of the Welsh Football Union, and all concerned will, no doubt, endeavour to maintain uninterrupted representation of the Club's nominee in the future.

Christmas 1937 saw the demolition of the old Football and Cricket Pavilion, and the provision of new changing rooms on the mezzanine floor of the North Stand. Many will be sorry at the disappearance of the fine old Pavilion and sporting landmark which had accommodated players whose names are famous wherever Rugby Football is played.

A welcome visitor to the Club during the Season was the Reverend John Roberts, home on leave from missionary work in China.

Wilfred Wooller has been elected Captain for next Season and all will join in wishing him the greatest of success in his leadership.

Prospects appear bright, and who knows but what the writer may next year be required to write of an even better season than the last?

OBITUARY. Finally, we regret to record the sudden death of Mr. John E. Elliot, J.P., on the 30th March, 1938. In respectful tribute to him a one minute's silence was observed on the occasion of the Cardiff v. Plymouth Albion game on the 2nd April, 1938. As one of the Club's valued Vice-Presidents, a Club Captain in the year 1896-7, and one who played for Wales in the years 1894 and 1898, his passing is a great loss. Reference at greater length is made in the Introduction to the Annual Report.

Before turning the record of the Season's results, we give a comparison with the Season 1910/11:

#### CARDIFF ATHLETIC XV.

It is a singular fact, although logical enough, that the record of the Athletic side for 1937/38, in common with that of the First Fifteen, is the best since 1910/11, and this, achieved under modern playing conditions, must rank as a really excellent performance.

Under the Captaincy of V. R. Osmond, the players united in an admirable team spirit, and, as the details reveal put up a splendid "show" of open, spectacular, and successful Rugby on most occasions.

For a very long period it appeared as if the Athletic were destined to carry a mantle of invincibility as it was not until the 17th February, 1938, that the season's unbroken record was lost at Newport to the United XV, by 6 points to 5, as a result of a lucky try scored in the last minute. Lucky it certainly was, seeing that it arose from a poor attempt at a drop goal which resulted in the ball veering almost to touch in goal. A crocked Athletic centre who had been transferred to the wing limped vainly in an effort to prevent the final, desperate and successful dive of a Newport player for the touch-down which he obtained only a yard from the dead ball line!

Such, however, is the grand game of Rugby Football and in no way was the victory of the Newport United XV belittled, slender though the margin was.

A worse fate befell the Old Illtydians who, in their very last game of the season, surrendered an unbroken certificate on their own ground to the Athletic by 12 points to 5. This was a splendid performance on the part of the Athletic as the St. Illtyd's Old Boys are a very capable side, bounding with Club enthusiasm, and they play a very keen game.

As the report on the First XV suggests, the Athletic can perhaps claim to have defeated such first-class Clubs as Blackheath, Llanelly, and Bath against whom twelve, nine and nine players respectively were fielded. Six and seven players were fielded with the First XV on several other occasions.

It certainly proves the availability of capable players as substitutes for the premiers, yet there is no need for wonder, for all the players seem to delight in "playing for the Club," irrespective of their selection for either the First or Athletic Fifteens.

An instance of Club spirit was that, when a former Cardiff player, Cambridge Blue and Welsh International—none other than the famous (now the Reverend) John Roberts—was home on leave from Missionary Work in China, he not only offered his services to the Athletic "if in real need," but actually played for them in three matches and, incidentally, scored twice. In the last of the three games, on a very hard ground, John finished the game in his stockinged feet.

The Club's appreciation of a very fine sportsman goes to him and wherever his future Missionary work may take him, we all feel an assured conviction that the Reverend John Roberts will always be found "playing the game—of life!"

V. R. Osmond was proud and appreciative of the players he led, showing always the stamp and quality of experienced leadership, with tactful and pleasing disposition to them all, founded, no doubt, on his playing experience with the First XV, dated back to the Season 1928/29.

The Club admires his sportsmanship in accepting the onerous task of leadership of the Athletic XV.

Before passing to the detailed results for the Season, we give a comparison with the Season 1910/11, cited in the first paragraph of this Report:

## CARDIFF BASEBALL CLUB.

Season 1937.

When the Season 1936 came to an end, there were distinct signs that 1937 would produce even a more successful team, but accidents and other causes prevented many players turning out regularly so that at the end of 1937, Cardiff finished fifth in the League Table. A very creditable performance in so far as at no other time have so many veterans had to disturb the moths in their kit and play.

It was unfortunate, too, that the Captain, Mr. C. Weston, was unable to play, but his deputy, Mr. F. Fish, who again played for Wales, carried out the duties in a very able way.

The Season opened with a series of surprise defeats by the Cardiff Harlequins and John Williams B.C., in spite of the fact that J. Desmond performed one of the best feats in Welsh League Baseball by bowling out the whole of the Harlequins for 6 runs and 4 extras. Three excellent victories, however, against Grange Albions (away), Pill (home), and Newport (home) restored much of the confidence until the "bogey" team, Penylan, was encountered, and, although Penylan were met four times in all, they still remain the only side in Welsh Baseball whose scalp has not been collected.

From thereon a series of accidents and poor weather led to only varied successes until Pill were met, away. The fact that Pill were defeated, thanks to an excellent bowling performance by R. Jenkins, and the excellent tea, made this a memorable fixture. Later, however, Pill, were amply rewarded when they defeated Cardiff in the Final of the 1936 W.B.U. Cup. From thereon, the team met with but little success until both Canton and Newport were beaten away, to end the Season on a keynote of promise.

This year the batting averages saw a change. F. H. Fish, who has held the first position since the Club started, scored the highest total of 217 runs for an average of 7.00, but was beaten by A. Presdee, a new member of the Club, with an average of 8.19. Closely behind was D. W. George, a brother of the more famous E. L. George, whose average of 5.21 was an excellent performance for the youngest player.

In the bowling section, J. Desmond and A. Presdee headed the averages with an average of 6.17, followed by J. Rees with an average of 6.38 and R. Jenkins, the only player to score a hundred runs and bowl out a hundred men, a performance he has repeated each year and once only done by another Club man, T. Maile.

In the field, F. H. Fish took 19 catches, while the holder of the record, E. Jenkins, whose 26 catches still stands, held only 14.

The aggregates and averages, while being lower than those of other years, show that the team was a sound one all round and this is exemplified by the number of men who figured in the International Trials.

Although the Season 1937 did not end so well from the point of view of the League position, the good comradeship shown was excellent, and the run to Chepstow, together with the frequent teas provided by the generosity of Mr. H. D. Evans, and the work of the Chairman, Mr. R. A. Cornish, the Secretary, Mr. L. C. Watters, and the Committee, did much to make the season an enjoyable one.

While the season ended pleasantly, the close season was marred by the death of one of our most popular players, Mr. A. G. Wheeler. Though it was but his first season in the Cardiff Colours, he showed qualities which endeared him to his fellow players, and when 1938 opens, although his position on the field will be filled by another, there will remain a corner for him in the memories of the Club.

To Mr. W. H. Crocker, my successor as Match Secretary, and his Committee for 1938, go my best wishes for the most successful season ever.
