



Cardiff v. London Welsh

SATURDAY, 14th DECEMBER, 1985 KICK OFF 3 p.m.

Today it gives the Cardiff Rugby Club particular pleasure to welcome London Welsh to The Arms Park during this their centenary season and also congratulate them on joining the 'Ten Up Club' of Welsh Rugby. One hundred years of fluctuating fortunes, adventure and enterprise coupled with their early wanderings in search of a permanent home, find the Exiles from Wales holding their heads proudly to fully justify the esteem in which they are held all over the country.

From their foundation they have always figured prominently in the Welsh way of life in London. The players who have raised the club to its present place of fame are legion. Right from the formative years when the legendary A. J. 'Monkey' Gould sported the Scarlet jersey of the Exiles it has always had a magnetic attraction for the many Welsh teachers and students who had been drawn to the great Metropolis. Following Gould came names like Teddy Morgan and Willie Llewellyn then Wick Powell and Claude Davey. Their carefree style and enjoyable way of spending

their Saturday afternoons made them much sought after opponents.

Without doubt however, the golden era of the Exiles came during John Davies' career. He arrived in the early 1960's as an ex-Aberystwyth student who had also played for Newbridge. Capped for Wales in 1964 he was appointed vice captain of The Welsh in season 1964-65. The following year he became captain and remained in the position for the next five seasons. During that time he nurtured what was arguably one of the best club sides of all time. He introduced J.P.R. Williams as a young medical student to the club and then an ex-Swansea Training College teacher joined their ranks and became one of the best players the game has ever seen in his position — Mervyn Davies. By 1968-69 the astute coaching and tough training schedule John Davies had introduced had come to very satisfying fruitition. Many said this was due to the one game a week routine and the absence of the remorseless grind of two games a week by most players in Wales until the end of November.

This obviously was a contributing factor by the talent of John Davies side in its heyday could not be denied. The proof of this situation was well demonstrated when John captained The Lions tour to New Zealand in 1971 and with a further six of his team mates, a record Lions contingent from any one club, became the only Lions side ever to win a series in All Black country. Further testimony of the talent of that side was demonstrated again this very week when Tony Gray was nominated to succeed John Bevan as Welsh team coach, an appointment which must give The

Welsh extreme pleasure in their centenary year.

Time and tide wait for no man however, and the superstars of that era are now all part of The Exiles illustrious history. Following on after such a team became a bit of 'The after the Lord Mayor's show' situation. Things were going along very nicely during last season however, and it proved to be one of their most successful seasons since those palmy days of the early 1970's. They played their typical attractive try scoring rugby and were unbeaten at home until as late in the season as March 16th. All was well on course and a place in the John Player Cup final was a wonderful

launching pad for their centenary celebrations.

Alas, whilst there has been no shortage of enthusiasm and assistance in their celebrations they have fallen short of success on the playing side of the business. Hopes were high after an opening narrow defeat by a very strong BaaBaas side 27-24 that they were still on the right path. This was not to be however, and of their 13 games to date they have won 2, drawn 2 and lost the remaining 9. All is not lost however, because both their wins have been against strong Welsh opposition in the form of Llanelli and then last Saturday Aberavon. The Aberavon match in particular gave them reason for optimism because Mark Douglas returned from injury and certainly gave their attacking potential a far better cutting edge. A sad feature of that success however, means we shall not see their current captain and longest serving player, Clive Rees, in action today as their selectors have given a vote of confidence to the side who did so well against Aberavon. They have also adopted a tough no training, no selection policy. This is where it all started in the John Davies era so is there another purple patch on the way for them. After today, we hope they win every game until the end of the season. Anyway once again, we offer them a most warm welcome to Cardiff and we hope they enjoy their day. For the record we have played 94 games of which we have won 80 to their 12 with 2 drawn, points for 1663, against 589.

KNOW THE LAWS

THE LINE-OUT

1. QUESTION: At a formed line-out the ball is in the hands of the thrower-in and players rapidly exchange positions just as the ball is to be thrown in. Is this permissible?

ANSWER: NO, the referee should award a free-kick 15 metres from the touch line along the line-of-touch, because the players have left the line of touch. Referees should also be aware of some delay if the thrower-in holds the ball until the interchange takes place, for the law states clearly that "the ball must be thrown in without delay and without feint."

2. QUESTION: Who, or what, determines the maximum number of players in the line-out?

ANSWER: A line-out is formed by at least two players from each team lining up in single lines parallel to the line-of-touch in readiness for the ball to be thrown in between them.

The team throwing in the ball shall determine the maximum number of players from either team who so line up.

Therefore the opposition, i.e., the team not throwing in the ball, may not have more players participating in the line-out than the team throwing in the ball.

The referee must be alert to this situation for sides, who are coached this play, expect referees to penalise the opposition by awarding a free kick 15 metres from the touch line along the line-of-touch.

PAST PLAYERS CORNER

Lyn, a Cardiff man, did his schooling at Cardiff High where he showed great prowess at both rugby and cricket. He won a Welsh Secondary School cap in 1934 and this on examination showed the talent he possessed. He played outside half to Haydn Tanner when the selectors of the time favoured Lyn to the Swansea man's more well known partner, Willie Davies. The Tanner-Davies partnership had caused a real sensation in school circles (and later in senior rugby with Swansea) so it was quite a distinguished feat for Lyn to be chosen.

He played his first senior rugby with Penarth but in December 1936 when Cardiff were without Cliff Jones due to injury Lyn was invited to play for Cardiff in the outside half role. This opportunity he hastily accepted and had played in enough games to win his First XV cap by the end of that season. From then on until the war, Lyn's service to both the First XV and the Rags was always of the highest order.

Being in the T.A. at the outbreak of war he was called up with the Royal Engineers but in 1942 he took a commission in the R.A.S.C. and was posted to Barry. This enabled him to play in Cardiff's unofficial games and he was captain in season 1943-44 when of 23 games played only 1 was lost and 1 drawn. He also played for Western Command and for the British Army against the French in Paris in January 1945.

He soon took up his Blue and Black playing career again on demob in January 1946 and captained the Rags in season 1946-47 and 1947-48. The former of those years was very curtailed playing wise because of frost and only 22 games were played of which only 1 was lost. In his second year of office only 3 of 31 games were lost and Lyn proved himself to be a very popular captain.

He hung up his boots at the end of 1947-48 but immediately took up the administration cudgels by being appointed to committee the following season 1948-49. He then did magnificent service for some 34 years during which he was Chairman of Rugby on two occasions until calling it a day in 1982.

He was suitably rewarded for his service when, in 1982 he was made a vice president of The Athletic Club. Lyn's activities these days are confined to bowls a game he really likes but unfortunately one he cannot pursue as much as he wishes due to a hip disorder. He is still a regular attender at matches with his wife Muriel and twin sister Beryl and it is always a joy to see his happy face around the place.


