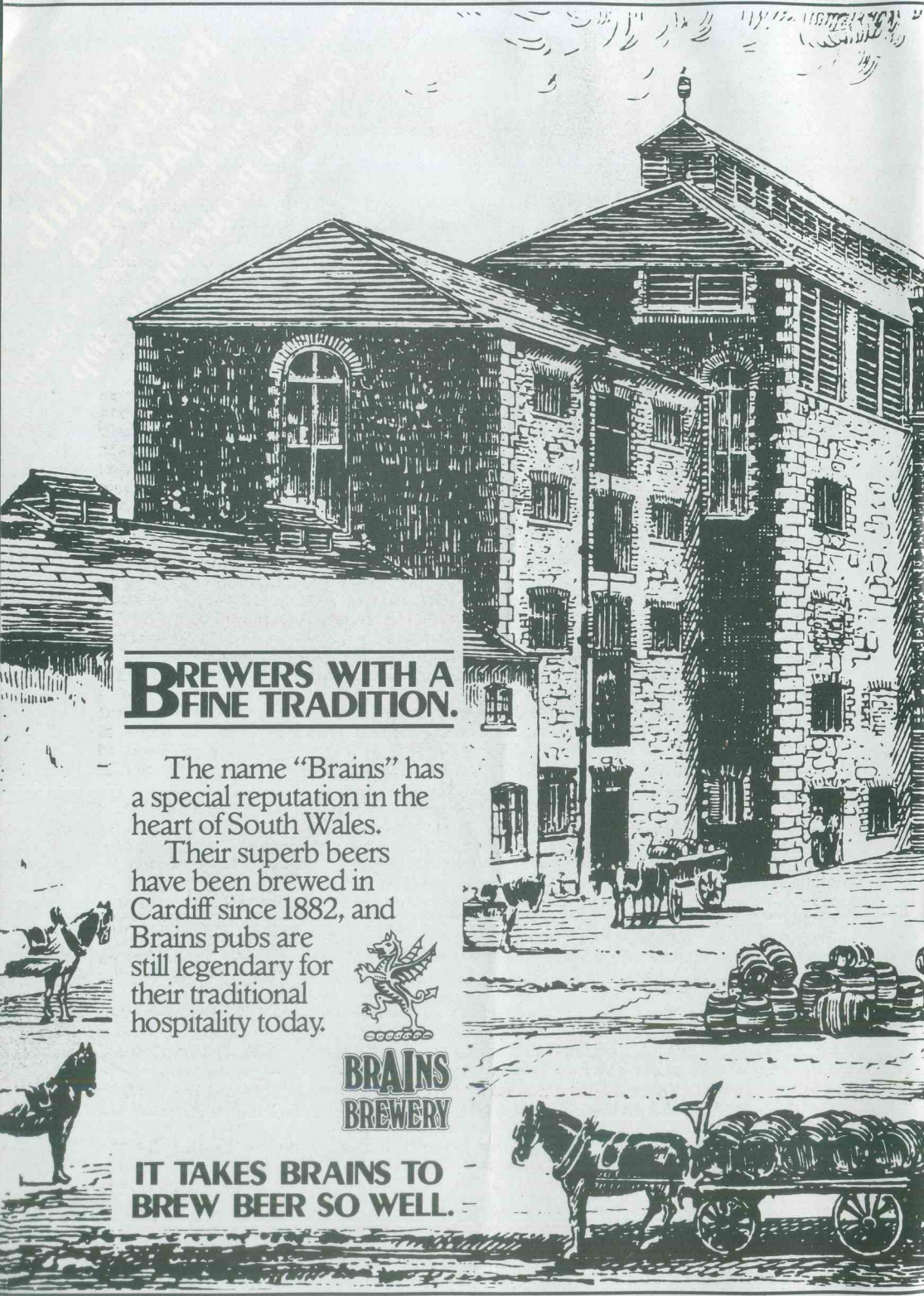

Cardiff v. Maesteg

WEDNESDAY, 27th NOVEMBER, 1985
KICK OFF 7.15 p.m.

Tonight we can really say good riddance to the Wednesday evening outings for 1985. After tonight's encounter we go through to the end of February before we play another evening game and indeed only one more after that before the end of the season. This should come as a bit of an early Christmas present for Alan Phillips and his team because our Wednesday evening results have been far from good. In fact Wednesdays in October were rather disastrous occasions as we registered three of the four blots on our current record whilst playing under the lights. So good-bye to Wednesday and hello to a nice string of home fixtures. In fact this evening's game begins a sequence of seven home games in the next eight culminating on New Year's Day with the visit of Bath.

On to tonight then and it's welcome to Maesteg for the 25th game in the series which began in 1920. Games have been pretty spasmodic to say the least but the up to date record reads 14 wins to us, 8 to Maesteg with 2 games drawn. We have managed a total of exactly 400 points to their 272. Like many other clubs victory in Cardiff is in extremely short supply for Maesteg and in fact they have only managed it once and that was in 1926 when they won to the tune of 14 points to 0. They came very near to it again however on their visit to the Arms Park in October 1983. On that occasion we seemed to be coasting to another win by half time but the Llynfi Valley boys came back very strongly in the second half and the game ended up 26 all. In fact that was the last occasion we met as last season's scheduled game didn't take place due to our cup semi-final commitment. They do figure prominently in our all time record too as they have the dubious distinction of being on the receiving end of our highest ever score when on December 23rd, 1973 we unfeistively beat them by 77 points to 9.

Currently The Old Parish are having a pretty traumatic time. After a reasonable season last year when they won 29 of their 48 games things aren't going at all well at the moment. Prior to last Saturday they were on a nine game losing streak against first class opposition. The only lifeline in that pool of defeat was their cup win away at Tumble by 11 points to 6. Lady Luck has also not seen fit to smile on them in the next round in the shape of a home game, but instead have to travel for the difficult task of overcoming an extremely efficient Cilfynnydd side in order to advance to the third round. They kept up the good work last Saturday as well however when they won at home against Tredegar by a healthy 27 points to 4.

So those two wins will help lift the gloom of the previous string of defeats and a second win in Cardiff would really put them on cloud nine. Perhaps the recent pruning that they have done to their squad to reduce it to 23 players will serve a useful purpose. Their avowed policy is to promote youth, utilise local talent and strive to achieve a standard of rugby that is entertaining for the fans. They had an extremely good youth side last year and are now busy nurturing several of those into the senior rugby scene. Hopefully they will replace such experienced players as David Authur who defected to Bridgend, Peter Jones to Aberavon and Colin Donovan who decided to step down a level and now plays with Llanharan. The latter of that trio became the club's highest ever try scorer last year when he amassed a career total of 171. Another to establish a record was forward Robbie Llewellyn who touched down on 22 occasions to surpass the previous best by a forward of 19 by Alan Fall some eight years earlier. Another they have high hopes for is No. 8 Ralph Turner who although not a giant in stature certainly makes up for it in the shape of commitment and all round playing ability. So who knows, with such a good player as Gwyn Evans to marshall these youngsters, perhaps a return to the palmy days of the 1949-50 season, when they were the champions, may be only round the corner. To Maesteg then, we extend a warm welcome to Cardiff Arms Park this evening.

Finally, it only remains to offer our sincere thanks to Welsh Brewers for the generous sponsorship of tonight's game.

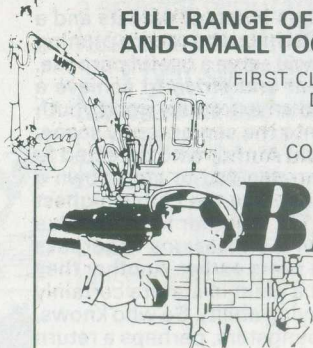
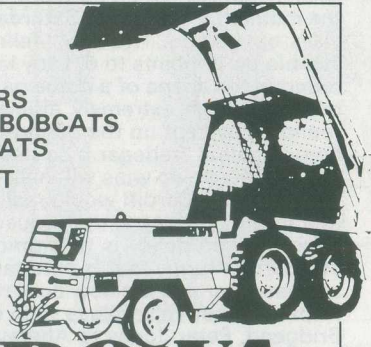

KNOW THE LAWS

SOME OBSERVATIONS

With the onset of wet, inclement weather and the consequent muddy grounds, referees will have to deal with more players going to ground. Referees will have to be vigilant and ensure that the new and experimental laws are applied consistently, so that players do not fall back to the bad habits of last season.

I am aware of the situation of a scrum which collapses after the ball has been heeled through the second row to the No. 8.

How should the referee deal with such a situation?

Play should **always** be stopped and either a scrum or a penalty be awarded regardless of the ball becoming available. The safety of the players is paramount and no advantage should be played in this situation.

Referees should also be vigilant with regard to scrums which collapse **after the ball has left the scrum**, and should award a penalty if foul play has taken place. A good referee will always turn his head and glance over his shoulder. Control and good positioning are essential qualities in refereeing.

PAST PLAYERS CORNER

R. F. TROTT

Frank Trott, a Cardiff boy was educated at Canton High School. He began his rugby career firstly with Penarth before graduating to Cardiff. He played at the time when full backs were the last line of defence and were expected to be good kickers and strong tacklers. Frank certainly was a good tackler and although his line kicking was never considered to be lengthy, it always made the safety of the touch line. He won his first team cap in season 1946-47 and the following year considered by many as Cardiff's greatest he played in 38 of the 41 games. He gained eight Welsh caps by playing in all the five nations championships games in 1948 and 1949.

Frank was vice-captain to Bleddyn Williams in season 1949-50 and retired in 1951-52 after playing in 205 first XV games. He went straight on to committee the following season and in 1955-56 he took over the secretary's post from Bruce Jenkins and did a marvellous job of it until poor health caused him to retire in 1970. Indeed he was about to take over as General Secretary of The Athletic Club at the time and I'm sure he would have been as excellent in that job had his health held up.

Frank now lives a quiet life at a retired people's home in Penarth.

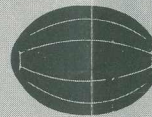

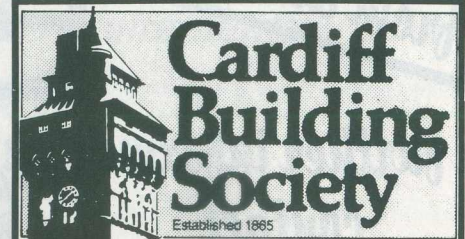

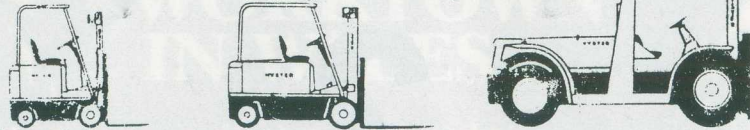
