Cardiff v. South Glam. Institute

It's always a pleasure to receive a visit from South Glamorgan Institute. From its humbled prefabricated beginning in Heath Park to the high status in which it is held today it has always been a rugby centre par excellence. The regular high quality production of players that are churned out year after year speaks volumes for this seat of higher education. There can not be many first class sides in Wales that don't contain a player or two who was passed through its portals of knowledge. Indeed the Cardiff Club has had huge benefits from the likes of Gareth Edwards and John Bevan just to mention a couple of its most famous sons.

The national side has also had its fair quota from the very first cap from the Institute, Haydn Morris to its latest, John Devereux. In all the total adds up to over 30 with 12 of them capped whilst still at college.

They have also been well represented in the ranks of the British Lions and their latest honoured old boy in the manager of the forthcoming Lions tour Clive Rowlands. We wish him well on his mission.

Coaching has always been a very strong point at the college with Ray Bish in initial command over the last 20 odd years. Leighton Davies has been their mentor however and his product has been quite exceptional year after year. His sides thrill the crowds with the type of rugby served up and in doing so hand out many a shock to some of the established first class sides. Long may it continue to do so.

In all we have played the college on 7 occasions. We have won all 7 and scored 188 points for, to 77 against. Those 7 games include 3 Cup matches and in the first of them in March 1972 they came within a whisker of glory losing by only 1 point 7-6. In the last of them in November 1985 John Devereux had an outstanding game which earned him the first of his string of caps when he played against England in the following January.

The College XV has had a disappointing year with regard to results, but are through to the semi-final of the British Colleges Cup competition. This lack of winning, despite having played their usual brand of attacking football, has mainly been the inability to field their strongest side. The reasons for this have been the injury and representative calls on players.

Today's team includes Richard Boladz, Mark Jeffreys and Richard Williams, who are in the Wales U-21 squad with Gareth Potter in the Wales U-20 squad. Andrew Roda and John Green both played for the English in the winning side against a very strong French Students' team. Stewart Jardine has played for, and captained, the Scottish Students and is a strong contender for a Scotland 'B' place.

John Green, Stewart Jardine and Richard Williams all played in the inaugural world Student Rugby tournament in France in August.

A notable absentee today, of course, is David Bryant who is unavailable because of his involvement with the Welsh Sevens Squad in Australia.

To the Institute then, we again say welcome, we hope you enjoy the occasion. On the home front the Rags are still ploughing a steady furrow. Last weekend they had a mini tour to Exeter and Jersey where they recorded 2 good wins in a very enjoyable weekend.

QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

A LOOK at the neighbouring page this Easter Monday might suggest quite correctly that Quidnunc is today trying to discover whether justice is being dispensed to that very happy band of warriors known as the Cardiff Rags. Generally, their activities are reported only sparsely and, in view of the fact that they travelled far afield last weekend to play in foreign parts, it seemed an idea to discover how they fared under Mr Justice Collins.

If you need an interpreter to unravel all that, let me explain: Cardiff Athletic last weekend played two matches in Exeter — at the University — and Jersey (both of which they won with a little comfort incidentally) and, at the end of the trip and before returning home, there was held the traditional team court into alleged misbehaviour. Mr Justice Chris Collins, as captain, was presiding over the tribunal with Mr Justin Burnell initially acting for the prosecution but quickly to be relieved of his responsibilities and Mr Jose Souto acting for the defence.

What sort of thing was being judged, I hear you ask? Well, for example, Cardiff were leading Jersey by a sufficient number of points at half-time for the skipper to decide that there would be no kicking at all during the second half: the fine would be a pint a kick. No one erred — though Mr Mr Jose Souto (hence his appearance in the dock) was accused of behaving like a lunatic. His crime was two-fold; he blamed the shape of the ball for 10 consecutive crooked throws at line-outs and then kicked the ball far across the road into a neigbhouring farmer's field (some claim in Guernsey) to get rid of it. Josie also scored a superb try, side-stepping and sprinting like the very best, admitting to the referee that he had dropped the ball on crossing the line only after the conversion had been taken.

Because of his irrational behaviour on the field, Mr Souto is now known to his team mates as S. Phrenic (after Schizophrenic).

Who else was brought up in front of the beak for sentencing? Martin Daly, asked to be official vice-captain for the weekend, was found guilty of incompetence: "too much vice and not enough captaincy," was what I was told. Richard Mynott was done for his impersonation of pop singer Prince while Matthew de Maid, who may well take his father's second opinion on this one, was found guilty of head-butting an opponent's boot, which led to the loss of half a tooth.

Further questions I would like to ask include: Why was Chris Collins himself left behind in a taxi? How was Matthew Hadley locked in his room — from the outside? Why is Graham Pritchard no longer impersonating David Bishop and has switched allegiance to Dewi Morris? And why was Justin Burnell allowed merely to go on holiday and not play (he was found guilty of impersonating a rugby player and made to wear shorts and carry a stick of rock as a result)?

Finally, I come to committee men. I have, as he knows, the greatest respect for Mr Bob Newman but his notorious bias when running the line has now gone to extremes. You may have noticed that he is to be seen currently with a plaster cast on his arm and, with justification, might think that would keep him out of trouble. Not so: on one occasion in Jersey he raised his flag correctly with one arm, lifted the other and nearly laid out a Jersey prop with his plaster cast.

More serious are the allegations about Mr Terry Charles, now known as Tommy Tours, who was found guilty of impersonating a travel agent. Among the many complaints being laid at his door are why one of the restaurants he recommended for gourmet delights was the Granada Service Station outside Exeter; another was to his choice of aeroplane which led to 80 per cent of the party groping for their sick-bags on the return flight? Satisfactory answers to these, and many other queries, will never, I fear, be received...

KNOW THE LAWS

LAW 20 - THE SCRUMMAGE

Question

The restriction on a scrum half in stepping into the gap behind a flanker does not appear in Law.

Should the decision for this offence now be a free kick in line with other recent changes this season?

Answer

No, there has been no directive regarding this International Board ruling. Therefore, the penalty remains in line with offside offences at the scrummage.

LAW 6 - REFEREE AND TOUCH JUDGES

Question

A **substitute player who is acting as a Touch Judge** is seen to be cheating by the referee. The referee asks for him to be replaced. Is this player allowed to take part in the game later when one of his team mates is injured?

Answer

No. The referee should also take the Touch Judge's name and send in a report to the Welsh Rugby Union. Clubs should think carefully whether it is wise to nominate a substitute player to act as touch judge.

Please note that a W.R.U. circular forbids Club Coaches from acting as Touch

Judges.

Incidentally, Cardiff and District Society of Referees appreciate the co-operation and kindness of Cardiff R.F.C. in allowing local referees to act as touch judges in Cardiff's home matches. Thank you.

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
