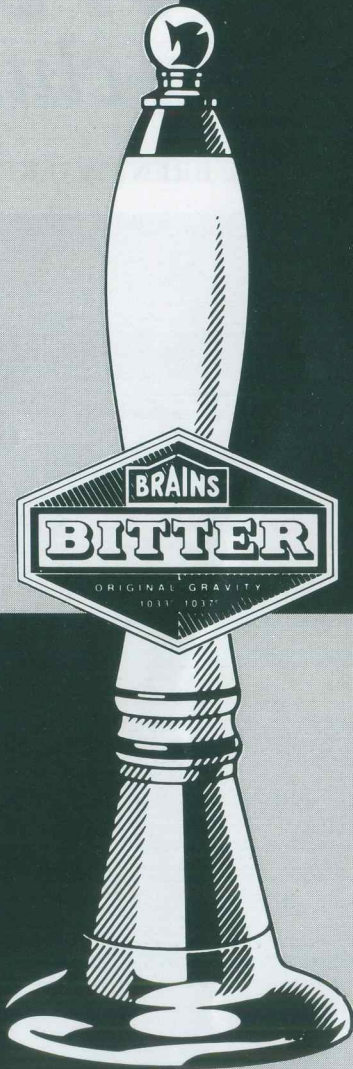

Christmas is but a whisker away yet again (where oh where has 1990 gone), so we should be really getting up a full head of steam in the "goodwill to all men" department. No matter how benevolent we may feel on all other fronts however the goodwill sentiment will not be very prevalent on the Arms Park between half past two and quarter to four this afternoon when we lock horns with Newbridge in a league encounter.

Needless to say however we extend a most hospitable welcome to the Welfare Ground brigade and we hope they enjoy their Christmas visit to the big city.

Before our last home appearance against Neath a quiet confidence in a win was very much in evidence. A great crowd and full hospitality suites engendered a marvellous pre-match atmosphere. Sad to say however we just couldn't put things together on the field and the day proved to be a non event from our point of view. Mind, Neath made sure of that and regardless of what people say about individual Neath players, as a team they have swept aside all else in Wales.

That Arms Park victory now puts them in a 9 out of 9 situation and it rapidly looks like becoming a one horse race for the inaugural Premier Division Championship. It will come as a great surprise if anything other was to transpire.

There was certainly an element of bad luck in our defeat at Swansea last Saturday and the score certainly didn't actually reflect the game situation. The loss of Jonathan Humphreys was a disaster and a clear case of mis-identification. It most definitely had its effect on the result of the game. Swansea were in buoyant mood after their overwhelming victory against Pontypool and were far more expectant of a much better result. It was good to see our players competing to the very last but with only 14 men the task was just that little bit too much. St. Helens is becoming a bit of a bogey ground to us these days. In the 12 games played there since 1980, we have won only 3 of them.

Last Saturday's weather turned out to be a bit of a villain in several places and caused the postponement of 3 premier division games. This will prove to be somewhat of a nuisance as far as rearrangements are concerned because they will probably have to be played in mid week under lights. It also gives the league table a bit of an unbalanced look where each team hasn't played the same number of games.

Our visitors today were affected by the bad weather last week and missed out on their home game against Pontypool. At present they stand in 8th place in the table but of course have that one game in hand. Of their 9 games played they have won 3 and lost 6. Their first league encounter saw them go under at Pontypool by the narrow margin of 17-14. Their second game saw ourselves visiting the Welfare Ground and we were duly sent packing with a 11-0 defeat. Four defeats followed on the trot then, though going under away to Swansea 22-3, away to Neath 19-7 and then disappointingly at home to Bridgend. Their visit to Pontypridd resulted in a win for the home side by 23-10. Since then however things have become somewhat brighter. A thumping 55-6 home win over Abertillery was followed by healthy non league victories over Aberavon and Tredegar. In their next league encounter they put Glamorgan Wanderers to the sword to the tune of 40pts to 6. They were looking forward with relish to last Saturday's home game against Pontypool but were as equally disappointed when the weather prevented play. They fancied their chances at home to "Pooler" who are going through rather traumatic times at present but now they have the tricky business of rearrangement of that game.

Today's game then becomes very important to both of us. After our successive defeats against Neath and Swansea we are on a bit of a slippery slope but home advantage will be a bonus. Losing games at home is a commodity which sides want to

keep to the very minimum these days. David Evans will be very keen to get his side back on a winning trail. Newbridge however will be equally as anxious to keep their bandwagon rolling and climb up the table. It will be our last league match of 1990 so lets hope, like the first one of this now fading year we can celebrate with a win.

Although Newbridge was founded in 1890 they are relatively infants on our fixture because we first met in season 1964 when a 3-all draw resulted on the Arms Park. Since then a further 22 games have taken place and the up-to-date record reads played 23 with 16 wins to Cardiff, 5 to Newbridge and 2 drawn. Points wise we have scored 393 to their 239.

Newbridge is a club that certainly travels well. During the early days of formation they changed their ground as often as Elizabeth Taylor changed husbands. They played on exotic sounding grounds as The Drill Hall Field, Ty Hir Farm, Top Hill Flats (now the site of Treowen Housing Estate), Show Field and Waen Bedr. The latter field of that list was reputed to have a one-in-four slope but Newbridge played there for some 25 years before they acquired their present ground in 1921. At the time it was no more than a morass and tons of waste from local tips was used to drain what has now become their present day field. They first played on it in 1926 and this was mainly due to the great efforts of striking miners of the time who were rewarded with a bowl of soup and a Woodbine for their daily stint.

From such adverse beginnings Newbridge clawed their way along to the halcyon days of season 1964-65 when they won their first ever and only Welsh Club Championship. Since those heady days things haven't been all roses either. They have suffered such disasters as the clubhouse being blown up and then burnt down on separate occasions. They have come through such catastrophes in remarkable fashion however and are now experts on coping with adversity and the unexpected.

On their day with their best side on the field selected from their large squad they can shake the best of sides. Coach Paul Evans is convinced he has the makings of a more than good side. He has a good blend of experience and youth at his disposal and no doubt he is hoping that they put their act together today.

To Newbridge then we again say welcome to The Arms Park, we hope you enjoy your day.

Talking of goodwill wasn't it a nice gesture to see our two Andrews Booth and Moore shaking hands at the first scrum of the recent Varsity Match. They both put in a cracking performance in great spirit and at the end of the game Andrew Booth was in possession of the ball which he very sportingly handed over to Andy Moore in recognition of Oxford's rather unexpected victory. Well done lads, your performance and attitude on the day did you both proud and you proved very worthy ambassadors of the Cardiff Club.

On the home front it is sad news that Ian Watkins has lost his fitness battle for consideration for the forthcoming English game. His injured knee has failed to recover in time. It's good news however for Newbridge hooker Ken Waters who has been called up to the squad to replace Ian.

The Rags winning sequence continues with Garndiffaith as their latest victims. They have now won all their Silver Ball games and are now top the table. They will be well tested today away to Neath Athletic so I'll let you know more of that in a later programme.

Don't forget you still have a few days to get your Christmas presents from the club shop.

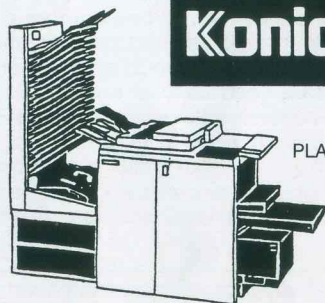
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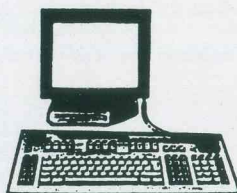
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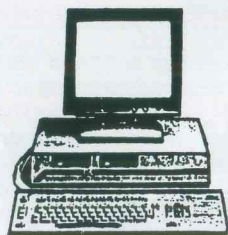

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KNOW THE LAWS

Question A:

At a lineout the throwing in side line up two men, one 8 metres and the other 15 metres in from the touch line. The scrum half runs up to the thrower in, confers and immediately joins the lineout 6 metres in. The ball is thrown into the lineout and he gathers it and runs upfield. Is this allowed?

Answer: YES, Play on.

Question B:

Under Law 6(B)(6), a touch judge may signal for offences under Law 26(3) (i.e. for misconduct and dangerous play). Is barging in the lineout included in Law 26(3)(e) "to hold, push, charge, obstruct or grasp an opponent," i.e. **may a touch judge signal for barging?**

Answer: YES. The law is specific and the referee and touch judges should work as a team.

Question C:

The attacking side are awarded a series of penalties 5 metres from the goal line because the defending side continually charge before the tapped penalties are taken. **May a penalty try be awarded?**

Answer: YES. If the referee feels that **this repeated infringement is preventing a try being scored**, the referee may award a penalty try. The referee may feel that he wishes to inform the defenders that repeated infringements make them liable to the award of a penalty try.

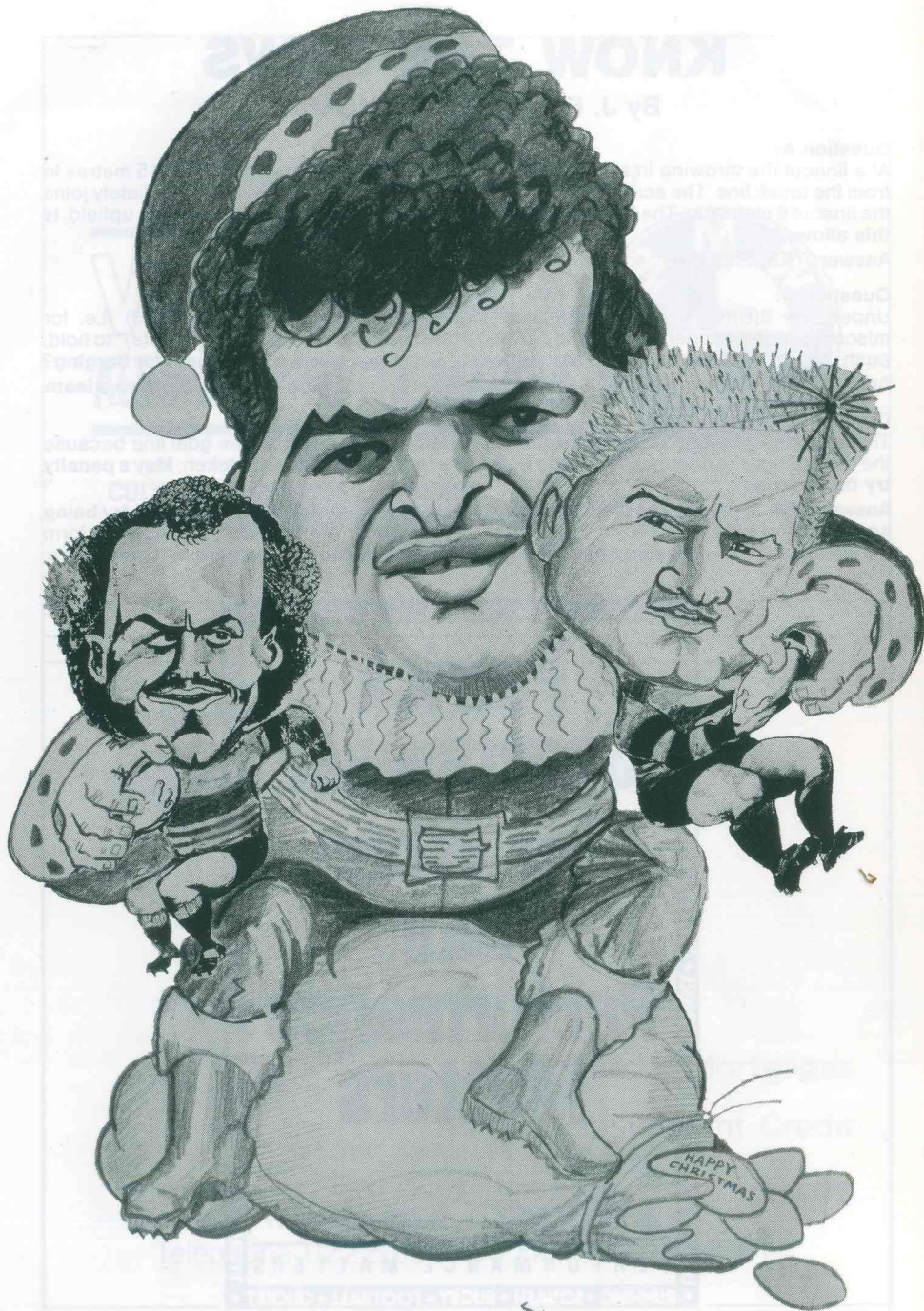
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QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN
