



Cardiff v. South Wales Police

SATURDAY 26th JANUARY, 1991 KICK-OFF 2.30 p.m.

We have certainly been through some traumatic times in Welsh Rugby over the last few years but the goings on of the last seven days have been rather mind boggling. First came the very predictable defeat on the National Stadium at the hands of the old enemy, England, as if this was bad news enough in itself it was quickly followed by the very unsavoury drugs affair.

The game last Saturday was one of great disappointment in terms of quality performance. There is no doubt that England came to do a job and wind their way back over the bridge with a victory tucked under their belt. This they duly did but the manner in which they won was more unlike their fantastic performance at Twickenham last season as it possibly could have been. Gone was the flair their backs certainly possess and it was back to the blackboard basics of domination up front and penalties will ensue in kickable positions. Perhaps it was the fact that the old Arms Park bogey affected them more than they anticipated. It was reasonably typical of the present day international scene however and highlights why we were so euphoric over the style of the Welsh victories of the late 1970's.

Then came their after the game strategy which was manna indeed for the press and generated more publicity than the game itself. It certainly ruffled the wings of some of their staid establishment who were highly agitated with the whole affair. It certainly detracted from their victory. But then again when you think of some of the great English players who have never tasted victory in Cardiff, perhaps some of the present squad are lucky to be playing when our national side is at such a low ebb.

Perhaps their muted after game action was a good thing. At least we could cry into our beer in silence without the saga of comment upon comment of the English players and management for that matter. It all serves to show what happens when success is expected to be financially rewarded. Many of the former international players that I have spoken to of late are glad, in terms of enjoying the game, that they played their rugby when they did and not at present when enjoyment seems to have gone out of the game at the top level.

Luckily following on the match and its aftermath came the very saddening drugs affair. This really rocked us to the foundation and there is some innuendo afloat to suggest that the individual caught is by no means one isolated case within the family of Welsh Clubs. Let's hope that if there are such players in our game, the positive and prompt action taken by the W.R.U. will be a very salutory lesson to them in the folly of continuance.

Its very unfair to their parent club too who probably have no idea of a miscreant's actions. I'm sure South Wales Police were more astonounded than most when the affair landed smack on their doorstep. It is of great credit to them that they have unequivocably accepted W.R.U. action in an uncomplaining and dignified manner.

Right having said all that let's get on with today's proceedings by firstly extending a very warm welcome to South Wales Police. We also offer them our commiserations on the adverse publicity the drugs affair has caused them although completely blameless in the whole episode.

Outside the cup the Police are in a favourable position in Division I of the Heineken League. At present they are lying joint second with Aberavon with 12

points a piece after 9 games played. This could have been even better had they not lost at Tredegar on their last league outing on January 12th. The Boys in Blue were in fine form going to Tredegar because they had been nominated the Division I team of the month for December. Tredegar had won only 1 of their previous 7 games in the League so the Police were probably justified in thinking another win was a reasonable outcome. This didn't prove to be the case however as a 16-14 defeat ensued. On the day to rub salt into injury Aberavon lost at Maesteg so had the Police managed a win at Tredegar they would have jumped ahead of Aberavon by 2 clear points. Such is the way of rugby.

On their day with a full squad to select from the Police can field a very formidable pack indeed. Experience abounds with internationals Messrs Williams, Jones, Sutton and Wakefield to the fore they have caused many an upset to most of their opponents. Injury and illness have taken a heavy toll on their performance and was very instrumental in their defeat at Tredegar. It was so bad last weekend that they had no option but to postpone their scheduled home game against

Pontypool.

Their top priority for the rest of this season is to consolidate their position in their division and gain promotion to the Premier Division. Hopefully by the time their next league game comes along on February 9th the sick and walking wounded will be at a far more reasonable level. In saying that we would like to wish them every success in their remaining league games which could result in promotion.

Although promotion is their ultimate goal I'm sure they will put those thoughts behind them just for today and they will be firing on all cylinders this afternoon. Thankfully we have home advantage because a visit to Waterton Cross would have proved all that harder. It won't be our first meeting in the cup either as we have met on one previous occasion. This came about in season 1972-73 when we met in a first round tie. It was played on the Arms Park and we won by 18 points to 10. That proved to be a very good Police performance because those were the days of Barry John and Gareth Edwards etc and we went on to beat Mountain Ash, Ebbw Vale, Blaina and Swansea before falling in the final to Llanelli.

In all we have played South Wales Police on 7 occasions. We first played at Waterton Cross in October 1969 and lost by 21 points to 12. All other 6 games have been played on the Arms Park, including the above cup encounter, and we have won all 6. Last season however we were glad to hear the final whistle in a close

fought game which resulted in a 21-17 victory for us.

To South Wales Police then we say welcome to the Arms Park once again, we

hope you enjoy your visit.



KNOW THE LAWS

QUESTION 1:

The ball is kicked ahead by the attacking team and an opponent with one foot in the field of play and the other in In-Goal catches the ball and minors it. What is the correct decision?

If the ball had not crossed the line before being caught, a scrummage 5 metres out, attacking side ball. If it had, a drop out 22.

QUESTION 2:

At a static scrummage the ball is at the flanker's feet. He is in front of the No. 8 and the scrummage has not wheeled. He unbinds from the scrummage and picks up the ball, is this


ANSWER:

No. "He may not play the ball as it emerges . . . If he is in front of the offside line". He may unbind but must retire to the offside line. The ball may then be out of the scrummage and he may play it. This season the offside provisions for a player leaving a scrummage have been made similar to those for a ruck or maul. This is that a player may leave a scrummage provided he retires immediately behind the offside line.

QUESTION 3:

What amendment is there, this season, to the Law governing the wheeling of the scrummage?

When the scrum is re-formed it is to be at the site of the stoppage, with the ball to be put in by the side that has gained possession. This law will be reviewed again next year.

QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

AS I WRITE, no player has sought from Quidnunc a cheque for £5,000 in order to grant an interview of any kind. The usual pint or two, yes, but that is a normal courtesy I extend to regular finks. 


