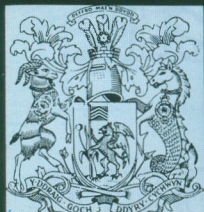

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## Cardiff v. Pontypridd

AND SO, at Cardiff Arms Park at least, we say goodbye to 1992, a year which on the rugby field has improved immensely. To all supporters, and to visitors also, the officials and players of the club wish a happy and prosperous New Year, with a specially warm welcome for the traditional guests and players from Pontypridd this afternoon.

For 20 years now, Ponty have been most welcome visitors to Cardiff on Boxing day – as they were curiously, way back in 1882 in only the sixth fixture between the clubs; travelling down from the gateway to the Rhondda must have been somewhat different in those days.

Cardiff, of course, enter the new year on top of Division One of the Heineken League and in the last 32 of the Swalec Cup after last Saturday's victory over Maesteg.

We now meet St. Peters in the fifth round and, for at least one family and friends, there will be divided loyalties. Mark Ring's brother – who many will remember playing with Cardiff – figures at No. 8 for the Third Division side. "We have played together on the same side but never against each other," comments Mark who also says that, "if selected, I am really looking forward to it". St. Peters, you will know, caused one of the upsets in last Saturday's cup matches by winning 22-8 at Narberth.

All of which goes to prove that you cannot be complacent about sudden-death, knock-out matches: just ask Aberavon, or Glamorgan Wanderers, or Abertillery or Llanharan, all of whom have caused their own upsets in their time.

Other things can be upsetting in cup ties as well, as Pontypridd discovered last Saturday when they were beating Pontarddulais. Ceri Jones, who has spent time at the Arms Park here in the centre, had to leave the field midway through the second half when a public announcement asked him to take an urgent telephone call; his wife Tanya wanted him immediately to contact her at their home in Ynysybywl.

After troubled phone calls, it was discovered that Tanya, who has recently had their second baby, was locked out of the house. - Technically, Ceri had broken the laws as substitutes are permitted only for injured players, but Pontarddulais made no objection.

Back at Narberth, there were some familiar names among the St. Peters scorers. Brendan Walsh and John Dunleavy had run in tries – with a penalty and conversion from out-half Andrew Edwards – before the exciting Gareth Snook made the match safe for the Rocks by sprinting some 50 yards to score.

More than one Cardiff player has enjoyed the company of Gareth on tour, particularly in Sevens tournaments: he will clearly take some watching.

The curiosities of the Heineken League fixture list means that we now play



Pontypridd twice on the trot: today's "friendly" and then, on January 2, as an opener to the New Year, at Sardis Road in the League; by chance, too, last Saturday's visitors Maesteg, are the next to appear at the Arms Park on January 16, also in the League.

For the record, Cardiff and Pontypridd have over the years met 71 times since the initial fixture in November 1878. Cardiff have won 49 of the matches and Pontypridd 18 with four draws. History lessons, however, can be turned upside down: certainly, many of the young players on display today will have forgotten Christmas Day in the effort to show their values.

I hesitate to state that the fairy at the top of the tree is Alec Evans, but he and Mike Hall have certainly given us a Christmas present we could not have imagined this time last year.

All the best to everyone who reads these notes, and a brighter happier and more prosperous 1993.
