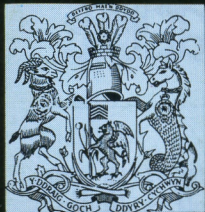

Cardiff v. Llanelli

CURIOUS THINGS have happened since last we met, both disaster and triumph coming to Taff's Acre, otherwise Cardiff Arms Park. Our last home match, of course, was the ill-fated Swalec Cup-tie with St Peter's – sincere congratulations once more to them – and, just a few yards away last Saturday, there was the quite splendid victory for Wales over England. Congratulations here to Mike Hall and Mike Rayer – and all the rear of the Welsh team, including Ieuan Evans and the other Scarlet Runners here this afternoon – on a performance which has set the Five Nations championship truly alight.

Cardiff's cup defeat did not, of course, mean the end of the season, any more than the end of the world, and two away victories at Pontypridd and at South Wales Police have kept the club well in the chase for Heineken League honours.

This afternoon's match is, as we are all aware, a vital piece in the title jigsaw. Although Llanelli are five points behind Cardiff as they take the field, they have not only a game in hand and a superior try-scoring record but also, arguably, a slightly easier run into the end of the season. After today, the West Walians have to visit only Maesteg and Neath with home matches at Stradey against Newbridge, Newport, Pontypridd and the Police. Cardiff have yet to visit Neath, Bridgend and Swansea, with visits from Newport and Pontypool.

Swansea, who today entertain Pontypool for whom Mark Ring is expected to make his first re-appearance, have yet to travel to Aberavon, Bridgend and Pontypridd with Cardiff and Pontypridd yet to go to St Helen's. The permutations are enormous.

Today's other First Division matches, incidentally, are Maesteg v Pontypridd, Aberavon v Neath, Newbridge v South Wales Police and Newport v Bridgend.

After this afternoon, there is a break in league rugby. Next Friday, we play at Ayr as a curtain-raiser for the Murrayfield weekend. On February 27 Bath will come to the Arms Park in what promises to be a fine game. Bective Rangers are then due in Cardiff on the eve of the Irish international before Heineken activities renew with a trip to Neath on March 13.

Now, however, it's eyes down for yet another big one and we welcome most warmly all connected with the famous Llanelli club. In the five Heineken League matches between the clubs so far, Cardiff have won only one, by 43-0



at Stradey against a weakened side in the first season. Otherwise we have lost by 22-16, 28-22, 22-16 and 20-16 (earlier this season). The overall record, however, shows that of the 220 matches played between the clubs, Cardiff have won 118 and Llanelli 83 with 19 drawn.

Statistics, however prove nothing whatsoever as we discovered in the St. Peter's cup game and in last Saturday's international. All we can hope is that two of the most exciting club sides in British rugby are able to put on a show worthy of what will certainly be an atmospheric afternoon.

Going back to last Saturday for a moment, it was quite rightly the senior Welsh side that stole the headlines. But there was also the little matter over in Holland of the "B" international where the Cardiff contingent acquitted themselves with distinction. Nigel Walker ran in a hat-trick of tries and Steve Ford a couple while Howard Stone and Stuart Roy had, from all accounts, excellent games. Their match having an evening kick-off, the boys were able to watch the main international on Dutch TV. "Curiously," said Howard Stone, "and although we were naturally delighted with the result, it put rather more pressure on us in the B international to do well. It was not all that easy."

Finally, we welcome also the partners and guests of today's match sponsors, Touche Ross, the leading firm of chartered accountants and management consultants in South Wales. We hope that they, and indeed everyone at the Arms Park, have a thoroughly entertaining afternoon.

GROWING THROUGHOUT WALES

MISCELLANY... reporting on news and views from CARDIFF ARMS PARK

STATISTICS are a constant source of fascination for many sports lovers who may, therefore, be interested in the odd fact or two concerning today's match and the Heineken League in general.

Cardiff's Adrian Davies tops the point-scoring charts for the Heineken season to date with 203 points — the first player to top the 200 in any season. Llanharan's Jimmy Morris is currently second with 164 with Aled Williams of Swansea next on 155. Paul Parry of Builth Wells is the only other player to have reached 150 but only one short of that figure is Crispin Cormack, the tall out-half and kicker for Cardiff Harlequins.

Curiously, perhaps the bulk of the tries are being scored in the First Division.

Llanelli lead the way with 77, Cardiff have 65 and Swansea 52. Tondy, from the Fourth Division, are next on 48 with Cardiff Quins chasing with 45.

Individually, the First Division sees the top five try scorers. Today's match provides, then, another source of statistical interest as Ieuan Evans and Nigel Walker are the leaders with 14 apiece, followed hot foot by Wayne Proctor and Newport's Andrew Lewis on 11. Simon Davies, of Swansea, on 10, is the only other in double figures with Andrew Royall of Blackwood and Richard James (Kenfig Hill) on nine.

Gary Snook, who scored the St. Peter's try at the Arms Park three weeks ago, is one of eight players with eight League tries, including our own Adrian Davies.

Year has just been capped with the award of the Heineken League Division Three team-of-the-month award. Their three wins in four league matches included the 15-13 victory over Treorchy which robbed the Rhondda side of their unbeaten record.

Abd of course, if we were to be beaten by any "minnow", it was better that we should have kept it within the city limits. Just supposing it had been a small Swansea club...

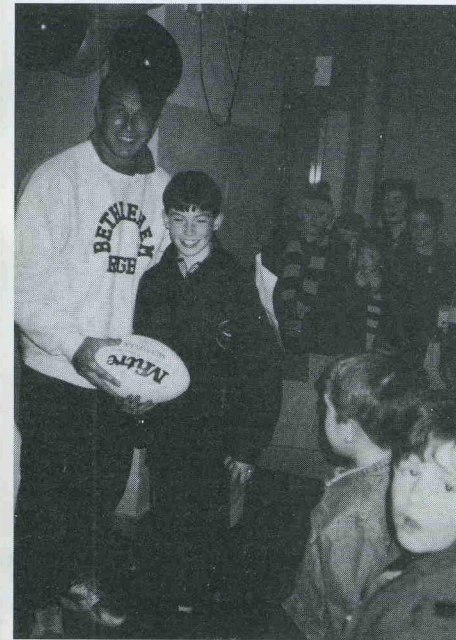

A NUMBER of Cardiff followers who went to Sardis Road for the Pontypridd match the other evening remarked how refreshing it was to 'hear' the silence during the taking of penalty kicks. Long may it stay that way — and this afternoon, too.

SUPPORTERS CLUB members — and their spouses/friends/fiances/companions — will be interested to note that tickets are soon to be available for the annual dinner dance in the Clubhouse on Friday, April 30. At a cost of £13.50 each, that is.

MORE ITEMS are now to be found in the club shop, including World Cup Sevens ties, Welsh ties and shirts and other goodies. The shop is open before and after matches on Saturdays and staff are available, via the Commercial Department, between 11.30 and 2 p.m. on weekdays.

FINALLY, and back to statistics, Cardiff have passed the 1,000 point mark in all official First XV matches this season — 1024, in fact, in 26 matches. Most even was in 1983-84, when we scored 1,214, with the 194 tries scored and Gareth Davies's 383 points also being club 'bests'.

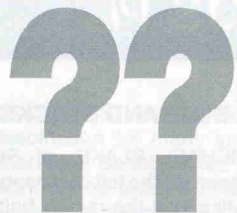

HEMI TAYLOR

QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

EXCLUSIVE – Read all about it! Never one to hide his light under any particular bushel, always seeking to inform the great Arms Park public about the inner secrets of our heroes – without recourse to electronic bugging and other sophisticated methods employed by professional royal-watchers – Quidnunc today comes up with some remarkable revelations.

But fear ye not, Stuart Roy. I am not to tell all about what you brought back from the Wales B trip to Holland last weekend. And fear ye not, Howard Stone. I refuse to say how much you took from Steve Ford in a card game on the same outing. (If Fordy will go on betting with a prial of sevens when Howard has a mere three aces, then he possibly deserves it).

No, none of these things. More astonishingly, Quidnunc can unveil some truths about the real Hemi Taylor, the team's quiet man, the Kiwi Kid, the silent one.

I'll bet you did not know, for example, that he was born Hemi Takatou Taylor. Only with reluctance will Hemi admit to his second name. Which is not surprising, really, because, when translated from the Maori, it means "The Great One," a mythological figure and name which clearly takes some living up to.

Nor, I'll bet, did you know that he once had the ambition to become a chef in the New Zealand Navy. Had he not learned that he would have first to do six months' basic training as a rookie before entering the galley, he might well have been lost to New Zealand rugby as well as Welsh.

And nor, I'll bet, did you know that had it not been for a sympathetic Gwent-born passport man at Heathrow immigration, Hemi Taylor would never have become vice-captain of Cardiff.

Takatou Taylor was born in Morrinsville, a small farming town in New Zealand's North Island on December 17, 1964. His mother and father were both farmers which explains his love to this day of the open air – though in no way explains the fact that he is a steel fabricator at Llanwern and lives at Risca. He played rugby league, as a centre, until he was 16, was then moved to the back row and, on playing union, was established as a flanker with Waikatu, well enough to have a trial with the New Zealand colts. But Hemi also had a wanderlust, the travel bug maturing when a leading New Zealand referee, returning from officiating in Britain, effected an introduction with Newbridge where he duly played from 1986 and established himself firmly on the Welsh scene. He also had a season with East Brisbane in Alex Evans' home city although they did not meet at that time.

"I enjoyed my rugby in Wales so much," he explains now, "and particularly the social side, that I came back year after year – though that was nearly stopped. Three years ago – I have residency now – I was asked to leave the country because of visa difficulties, work permits and so on and was turned away at Heathrow. I was sent back to Brussels, where the plane

had come through, to get a visa. The British Embassy said it could take six months.

I had to decide whether to fly home or try again at Heathrow. This time the guy at the desk was from Gwent and recognised me and my passport was stamped."

Hemi Taylor is indeed a quiet man, softly spoken, the sort of guy who sits quietly in a dressing-room, drily and wryly commenting pithily, generally looking totally innocent when all mayhem may be surrounding him on the pitch.

Few things seems to rile his phlegmatic personality although Jonathan Humphries came close to incurring his wrath recently in the clubhouse — and no wonder. Mr Taylor has been known to have the occasional gamble and was quietly playing the fruit machine when he won £25. Mr Humphreys, misreading the machine, thought it said £2.50, leaped forward and pressed the "gamble" button. And lost.

Hemi has also been known, however, to pour cold water on other people. Literally. During the pre-season training and coaching visit to deepest Devon, after one particularly drenching session, Hemi decided that, in pursuit of building team spirit, he would get to know Mike Hall rather better. His method was to pour a bucket of ice-cold water over his new captain. "I did not really know him before that," he says with a little smile, "but we got on fine after that. I don't know if it helped at all but I was made to feel very welcome at Cardiff. I found it a friendly club and I'm very happy to be playing here."

Hemi Taylor has other hidden talents which he is trying to nurture. Close colleagues in the team report that he has been seen carrying a mouth organ — though not playing it. Well, fellows, he does play it — and is now learning to play guitar. "I enjoy 'blues' but at the moment I'm just jamming around, learning chords from a mate. If I ever get unemployed again, I will become a busker: if you see me, a couple of pounds would be welcome." He can also be persuaded occasionally to do the haka.

What about that bit about becoming a chef in the New Zealand Navy? "One of my ambitions is to coach when I retire from the game — Alex Evans is helping me here and passing on some knowledge and suggesting courses — but I am thinking also one day about possibly running a bar and restaurant. The two things could go together and I still do a bit of cooking at home," he says.

Unlike many sportsmen, he cannot get on with pasta, preferring fish and chips. At home, too, he also — wait for it — is one of the few people to admit to watching El Dorado and he's a qualified scuba diver, loves volley ball and basketball.

Cardiff may tour Australia later this year, in which case Hemi will take the opportunity to go to his home country — and visit a piece of beach-side property he owns. Who knows perhaps he may have the restaurant there one day?

"I am," he says, "more a listener than a conversationalist." Quite so, but when he does talk, Takatou — The Great One — is well worth listening to.



KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS

In general Welsh rugby has reacted positively to the new laws. There is no doubt that the speed of the game requires a high standard of fitness and a greater alertness.

However, one area that is still causing great concern is the line out. Last season the line out was a shambles and this season it is still a shambles because it is not being refereed. The new laws regarding the line out are being ignored with too much attention being paid to whether a side is lifting or not. Referees should remember that **lifting is a free kick offence.**

A. THE SUPPORTING PLAYERS IN THE LINE OUT

The law allows lifting and supporting **after** the ball has been touched. How should referees view "support" before the ball has been touched?

Lifting is a free kick offence as is using other players of your own team as a support by climbing on them. **Referees should remember that an infringement between members of their own team concedes a free kick whilst infringements against the opposition (i.e. offside, pushing, barging, early binding etc.) are penalty offences.**

Merely stepping into the gap without jumping for the ball concedes a free kick; doing something to an opponent when there gives a penalty.

Therefore, referees must be more concerned with the action of players towards the opposition than to their action to their own players.

B. THE QUICK THROW IN

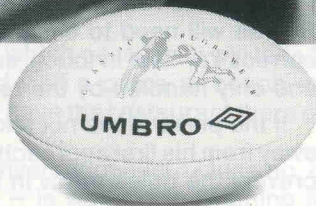
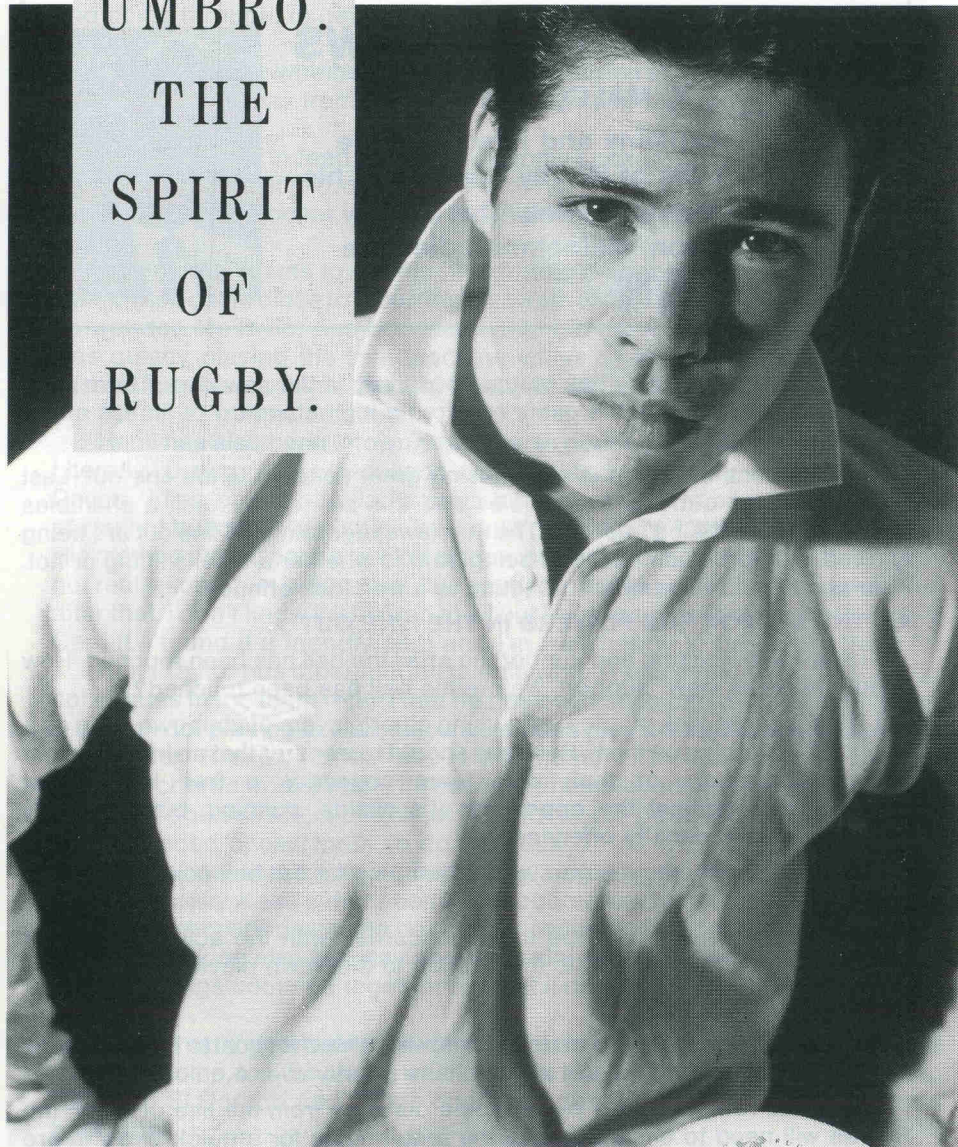
A player is allowed by law to run back towards his own goal to take the throw in. But the formed line out will **always** take priority over a quick throw in.

If a ball is retrieved by a player some distance from the line of touch the referee will need to ensure that all the requirements for a quick throw in are correct, i.e. "feet in touch, same ball thrown in straight, ball travelling 5 metres and only handled by the retriever".

If the player does not take the opportunity of the quick throw in but moves away from his first approach to the touchline, then the referee should attempt to prevent the quick throw in **if** the line out is formed.

Remember that a line out is formed if two players minimum, from each side, have approached the line of touch.
