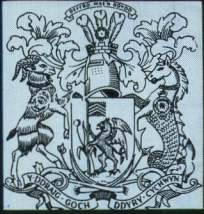

Cardiff v. Bath

WHILE THERE HAS in some respects been a diminution in the importance of Anglo-Welsh matches, a visit by Bath is always a mouth-watering prospect, even if it has arisen from a set of extremely unlikely circumstances.

Not to put too fine a point on it, you could have sought and received considerable odds against the respective clubs being removed from the Pilkington and SWALEC Cups at such a relatively early stage — to Waterloo and St. Peter's.

The teams announced for this afternoon's match, which is sponsored by British Gas Wales, however, illustrate fully just how seriously the two clubs are taking the match. Bath have named 11 internationals in their side, Cardiff six with a host also of Welsh squad members.

Like Alex Evans here at Cardiff, the senior Bath coach, Jack Rowell, and his players believe that regular top-class rugby is essential if a realistic championship attempt is to be made. In the four years of the Courage League, Bath have won the championship on two occasions and are the current English champions. The surprise of their Cup defeat at Waterloo is possibly most graphically shown by their past record: they won the John Player Special Cup in 1984, 1985, 1986 and 1987 before it became the Pilkington Cup, after which they proceeded to win it in 1989, 1990 and again last year.

A formidable record indeed — and one which should ensure a fine game in Cardiff against a club that has led the way in England with its recipe for success in motivation, fitness, footballing tactics and strength in depth.

There are other good reasons for Bath wishing to do well this afternoon. Only once have they won at the Arms Park — on September 9, 1991 when a scoreline of 10-9 very nearly echoed the previous year when a 10-10 draw on January 6 was the only other occasion on which they have avoided defeat in Cardiff.

In the entire series, since the first match on Christmas Eve 1924 when Cardiff won 22-6, there have been 42 matches between the clubs, with Cardiff winning 28, Bath 12 and the two remaining draws. Cardiff have scored 624 points in those 42 games and Bath 440. Earlier this season, of course, Bath won 31-22 at the Recreation ground.

It is, then, with genuine warmth that we welcome Andy Robinson and his



team, the Bath officials and supporters, along with the sponsors and their guests from British Gas Wales.

British Gas, in fact, have close links with both clubs, quite apart from having sponsored this match on previous occasions. The South-Western Region is associated with Bath – and not only through Jeremy Guscott, the English international centre who works for them as a commercial marketing officer – while, at international level, the Wales-England match was the final one of an eight year period in which British Gas sponsored the international at both the Arms Park and at Twickenham. At Cardiff, too, they have worked closely with Albert Francis – and send a fond farewell on his retirement.

Bective Rangers are our visitors on the eve of the Irish international next Friday evening before we come to the vital league games again with the visit to Neath. The next home Heineken match is on March 27, a month today, when Pontypool come to the Arms Park.

It seems like a three-horse race which, said Llanelli skipper Ieuan Evans after winning here, “looks like going all the way to the end”. There is, in short, much rugby to be played yet this season with this afternoon’s match as interesting as any there could be away from league points and sudden-death cup ties.

MISCELLANY... reporting on news

THE DEVELOPMENT of the Under 21 squad continues apace. Congratulations, then, to Paul Armstrong, Huw Harries and Adam Palfrey who were in the winning Welsh Under 21 side against the Scottish Under 21s on the eve of the Five Nations Edinburgh international — a victory which did not alas inspire the seniors.

On the domestic front, Meredydd Price and Rhuddian Phillips made their first team debuts against London Welsh.

Before Wednesday evening's match with Hindu of Argentine, there have been three Under 21 matches since our last report, consisting of a 19-19 draw with Bridgend Sports, a 27-15 win over Natal and a 40-0 drubbing at Llanelli.

Against Bridgend we fought back from a 19-0 deficit at half-time but the Natal performance was magnificent with the South African officials acknowledging readily that Cardiff had produced the best rugby they encountered during their UK tour.

Three days after this, however, there was the heavy defeat at Stradey Park with Llanelli gaining revenge for their earlier 72-5 defeat at the Arms Park.

A powerful Scarlets pack, with new recruits and including also the highly promising Scott Quinnell, were just too strong for us although we did create possible chances in the second half.

For those interested in the Cardiff future, there are good games ahead, with Newport and Swansea as the likely highlights.

AT THE OTHER end of the scale, the Cardiff Veterans have also been deeply committed — to the extent that a match at Aberdare against a team raised by the Aberdare president, raised more than £1,000 for muscular dystrophy.

We won 34-27, with the likes of Neil Hutchings (currently also chairman of promotion-seeking Treorchy), Rees Williams, Wayne Lewis, Mike Marshall (remember him? He went north and played for York), Lawrence

O'Brien (currently training St. Peter's to cup greatness as you may recall), Roger Layne, Steve Cannon and Bobby Lakin (still playing superb rugby) striving manfully in a game which became so serious that, in the words of Bobby Newman, "we actually had to resort to kicking the ball".

Before the England international, a somewhat more relaxing encounter saw us beat St. Just of Cornwall by 35-15 (approximately was the word used).

Our ageing worthies make the return trip to Cornwall at the beginning of April when rugby will be a minor part of a weekend which includes cider-tasting, golf and a dip for some members in Sennen Cove as a tribute to the late Stan Bowes.

AS IF to show that there is a lot of life left in some of the old dogs, Bob Newman also managed recently to earn himself a place on the 1st XV appearance chart when he came on as a very late replacement for Jonathan Humphreys at Ayr.

"I did make two tackles in the last 10 seconds," he claims. "A bit late, both of them and gave away a penalty under the posts."

AYR, as usual, provided first-class hospitality and a genuine welcome — and it also provided, much to the delight of the Cardiff squad and officials, a come-uppance for Mr. Adrian Davies.

Now Adrain, as you will know, is an immensely talented man who seems to be able to turn his hand to anything. "On top of which, and worst of all," says a team-mate, "he's a nice guy."

After the match, and after the haggis (which is considered now to be an aquatic animal insofar as it was swimming in whisky), Adrian Davies played piano much of the night without repeating a tune. He was, however, confronted with a bagpipe expert.

Mr. Davies did recover his self-respect and reputation on the famous Troon golf course. "He can play both left and right handed," said a partner ruefully after seeing him hack from one particularly tough lie.

LLANELLI attracted very nearly a full house to the Arms Park and, as the result of experience gained during this match and during the Swansea game earlier, further safety barriers have to be erected in order that no part of the ground should become overcrowded.

Club officials ask therefore that spectators who have entered the terraces at one particular point should remain there and not move from that area in order that control can be maintained.

The monitoring of crowd admission is an integral part of the Safety in Sports Grounds Act and permanent gates may have to be introduced to ensure that there is no movement between areas.

It is likely too that for major Cardiff home matches in future, the police will close Westgate Street to traffic at 1 p.m. Members, along with hospitality suite owners and their guests, are recommended to arrive well before 1 p.m. if they wish to take their vehicles into the ground.

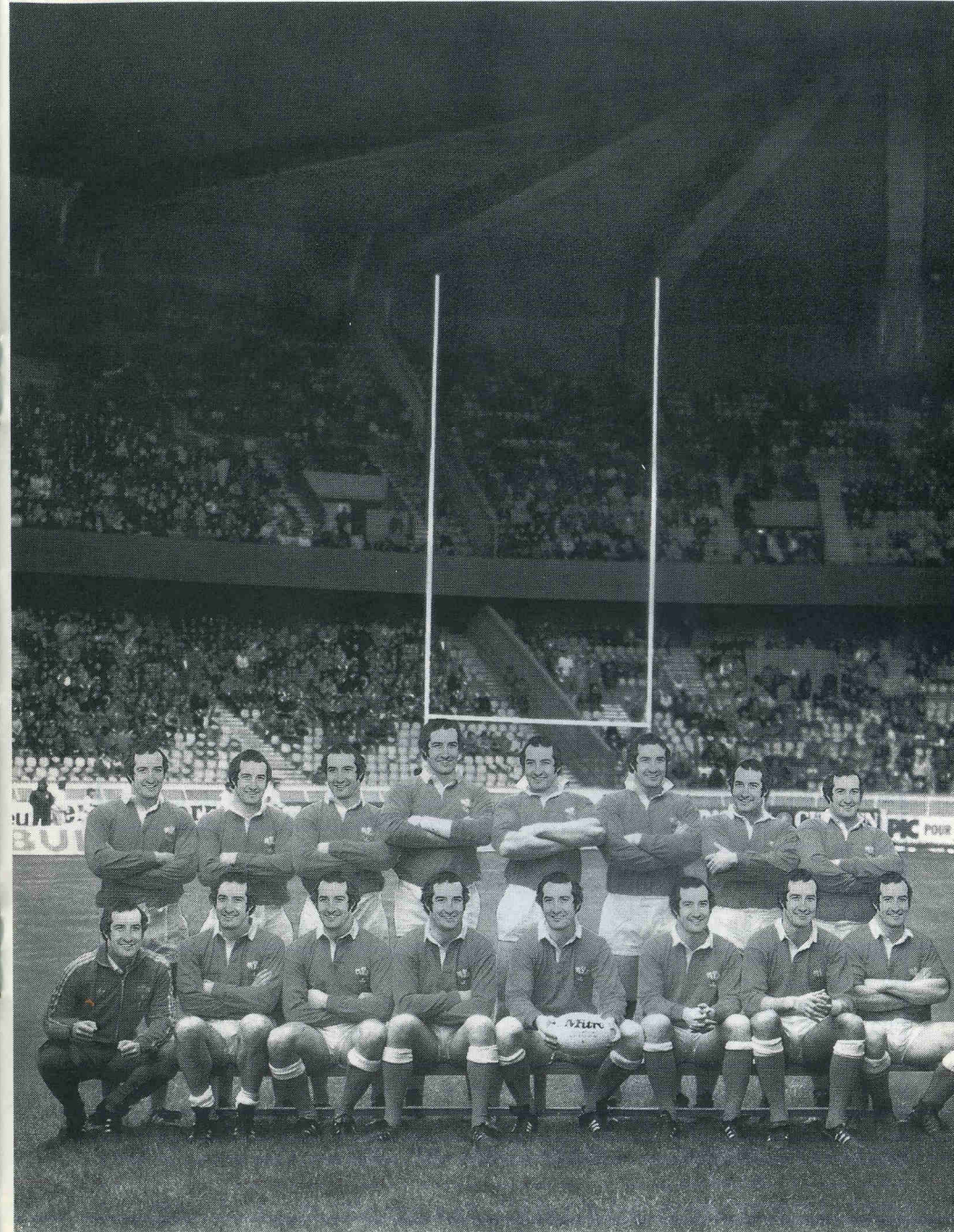

QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

WHY, you may well ask, do we choose to caricature Mr. Colin Laity wearing a kilt? No, it's nothing to do with the recent Scottish weekend – Colin was in fact playing for the losing Cornwall side in the semi-finals of the English County Championships that day – and nor is it to suggest that he is in a position to claim Scottish ancestry as well as being qualified for both Wales and England.

No, indeed. But what you possibly did not realise was that the Cornish kilt is every bit as traditional as the Scottish variety – dirks, daggers, sporrans and all in the full regalia – and that our Mr. Laity is a very proud Cornishman. Indeed, you could have found many of the Cornish side wearing them after last year's county final at Twickenham. The Celtic fringe and all that.

Not that he wears one the whole time, you understand – but the next likely occasion is to be a very important one.

It is a well known fact that ladies tend not to understand the importance of rugby football. 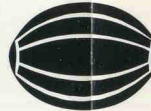

explains and interprets the laws of Rugby Football in his regular series.

This afternoon, he asks some topical questions



Question 1: Which of the following statements are correct?
