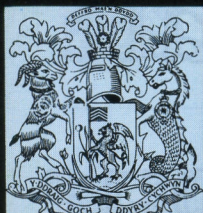

Cardiff v. Bristol

BLACK FRIDAY, unlucky thirteen . . . it is very tempting to produce the cliches for Cardiff Rugby Football Club after what was indeed a sad day and a half this weekend.

The season, however, is by no means finished, notwithstanding the announcement on Friday of the choice by the Welsh selectors for the match with France at the Parc des Princes later this week nor, more vitally for the club, the defeat at the Gnoll on Saturday the thirteenth by Neath in those closing minutes.

"We'll be back," said coaching organiser Alex Evans shortly after Cardiff had slipped to their second consecutive Heineken League defeat. "We were hard hit by injury and illness, we did not win sufficient ball on the ground, we lost too much possession and yet we were on several occasions very close to scoring ourselves." We were, indeed, very close: it could have gone either way until the very end.

But thus are titles won and lost, an injury here, a missed chance there and, when you consider that Cardiff were without Mike Hall, Mike Budd and Howard Stone, quite apart from losing the unfortunate Mike Rayer and Steve Ford in the first half, it was a fine performance to run so close to a Neath side that is starting ominously to recapture its verve.

For Mike Hall the injury, which has its roots back in the Welsh warm weather winter training days in Lanzarote and which has resulted in injections to keep him playing, the departure from the Welsh side may ironically be a blessing: he can now rest a while, with the chance of complete recovery.

For Mike Rayer, we would like to think the decision has not kept him from final consideration by the Lions selectors. And for Nigel Walker, we can hope only that the re-turfed Paris stadium gives him the springboard for his first international points.

On the League front, Cardiff are still only two points behind the leaders, neither of whom can afford to lose – and way back last September most of us would have been happy to have been assured that we would be in third place at this stage, even if we would have raised eyebrows to be told that the sole Cardiff representative in the Welsh side for Paris would be someone who had never played senior rugby.

This evening our old friends from Bristol are the visitors and we offer them as always a very warm welcome. Bristol have not had the happiest season or two, living somewhat under the shadow of their fellow Westcountrymen, Bath. The two clubs, it is jestingly said, live together through a question of trust and understanding. "We don't trust them and they don't understand us." Rather like



Cardiff and Newport, in fact.

Their victory over highly-placed Leicester in the Courage League on Saturday has virtually ensured the retention of First Division status – remember, four are relegated this year – and, with a young side, they may look forward with optimism.

While we welcome Bristol tonight, we bade on Saturday evening a farewell to someone who will, even so, be undoubtedly seen around the Arms Park frequently.

More than 300 people attended a dinner at the Angel Hotel to mark the retirement of Albert Francis, commercial manager, former ground manager and “Mr. Fixit”. Albert was first connected with the club way back in 1971 and has made worldwide friends in both rugby and cricket.

Guest speakers at Saturday’s dinner included our chairman, Mervyn John, skipper Mike Hall, former players Gareth Davies and Bob Norster as well as BBC’s Alan Wilkins and Bryn Phillips. But more of Albert in a future programme.

Cardiff, talking of the future, have also now completed many details for a tour of Australia, leaving late in July. Many more facts about this exciting trip-in-a-lifetime for players and followers are printed in the Miscellany column: and more information will follow.

For the moment though, it’s Bristol – and our grateful thanks to the sponsors of the match, Reliance Security, whose officials and guests we also welcome to the Arms Park. May they and everyone have an enjoyable evening.

YOUR CHANCE TO JOIN CARDIFF IN AUSTRALIA

IT COULD BE the trip of a lifetime: certainly, the provisional itinerary for followers of Cardiff interested in accompanying the team on their tour to Australia at the beginning of August is mouth-watering indeed.

Quite apart from the four Cardiff matches – in Sydney, Canberra, Brisbane and Cairns – the visit offers such tourist attractions as a day on the Great Barrier Reef, exploration of the famous Opera House and the Taronga Park Zoo in Sydney, and meeting with giant crocodiles and cuddly koala bears as well as the friendly natives in their rugby clubs. On top of this, there's further rugby on offer, too, with tickets for the first test between Australia and South Africa in Sydney.

All this for a basic £1,630.

Intrigued? That figure includes economy class airfares (BA London-Sydney) and internal flights from Sydney to Brisbane, Brisbane to Cairns, back to Brisbane and thence to London, all accommodation, continental breakfasts, coach transfers, including sightseeing tours on request and reserved grandstand seats for the Australian test.

What it does not include are all meals apart from breakfasts, departure taxes, travel insurance, passport/visa fees, phone calls and optional tours.

Departure date from Heathrow, by the way, is Thursday, July 29 with the return flight arriving back at Heathrow in the early hours of Tuesday, August 16.

The tour is being organised by Complete Corporate Travel Ltd of Brisbane – Alec

Evans country of course – and, for those interested, John Leslie, a representative of the company, will be in Cardiff at the end of this month to tell more and answer questions.

A definite date has not yet been fixed for such a meeting but it will be sometime around the weekend of March 27.

Keep an eye open in the press and on the clubhouse notice board for details.

ALEC EVANS himself, as Cardiff's Australian coach, is naturally excited by the plans. "People might query the sanity of playing four very difficult matches but it is the only way we will learn and improve our toughness and hardness as well as skills," he says.

But he believes that for players as well as followers it will be a rewarding trip in many ways.

"I am all for education through touring and that involves learning off the pitch, too. I don't want the players to sit around hotels when there is so much to see and do."

While he warns that August is the coldest month in Australia and that, in Canberra in particular, it could be really chilly, there'll be plenty of opportunity also for some sunshine.

"Brisbane and then Cairns are more than 2,500 kilometres north and the temperatures should be a beautiful 25 or 30 degrees," he says. That's roughly between 75 and 85 for those of us who still think in those terms.

"Up in Queensland, the followers will have

the chance to see the Gold Coast and the magnificent Barrier Reef, superb bird life and a marineland which matches anything in America," says Alec, "with marvellous scenery inland and the tropical forests.

"Then there's the chance to play excellent golf courses and you will find the local rugby people very friendly.

"The South Africans are in Australia at the same time and theirs will be the buzz tour but our games will be hard, very hard – and the whole visit a lot of fun."

AS WE have said before, some rugby followers find statistics a constant source of interest.

This evening's visit by Bristol, then, is the 171st meeting between the two clubs. Cardiff have so far won 128 and Bristol 34, with eight matches being drawn (Bristol have won only six times in Cardiff), while we have scored a cumulative 2443 points against 1175.

Although the first match between the clubs was in October 1888 – when Cardiff won 52-0 and went on to win a further 18 games before, in 1901, Bristol had their first triumph – perhaps the most notable was in September 1921 when Cardiff were the visitors in Bristol for the opening of the new Memorial Ground at Horfield. Bristol, incidentally, won that one 9-3.

NEXT SUNDAY evening, for those of you who have made it back from Paris in one piece, it is the Cardiff club lottery draw when Dave Bassett, the Singing Farmer of broadcasting fame, will provide post-draw entertainment.

For the sixth-birthday draw in April, the

cabaret singer and entertainer Bernie Perkins will be the attraction.

There are still tickets available for you to win a car each month – they cost £6 a month – and special incentives are available for organisations selling tickets. Contact Tina Nash in the Commercial Department (on Cardiff 382006) for details.

PONTYPOOL are the attractive visitors to the Arms Park on March 27 and it will be another special day for the Junior Blue and Black club.

For £6 an adult can bring into the ground – through Gate 4 at Quay Street – two under 15-year-olds.

After the match, the young supporters will be joined by players and committee men of the club: "Bar" facilities are available in the special section at the Westgate Street end of the ground behind the goal.

THINKING for a moment still of younger supporters, a fairly expensive kid's jacket was left at the Arms Park during a very recent home match.

The coat is colourfully marked and includes the name of the shop where it was purchased. If your child has lost such a coat and if you can describe it, you can claim it back through the ladies in the club offices.

FINALLY, anyone planning to follow Cardiff to Nottingham on Saturday, April 24, should heed a simple piece of advice.

Don't.

The match has been cancelled.

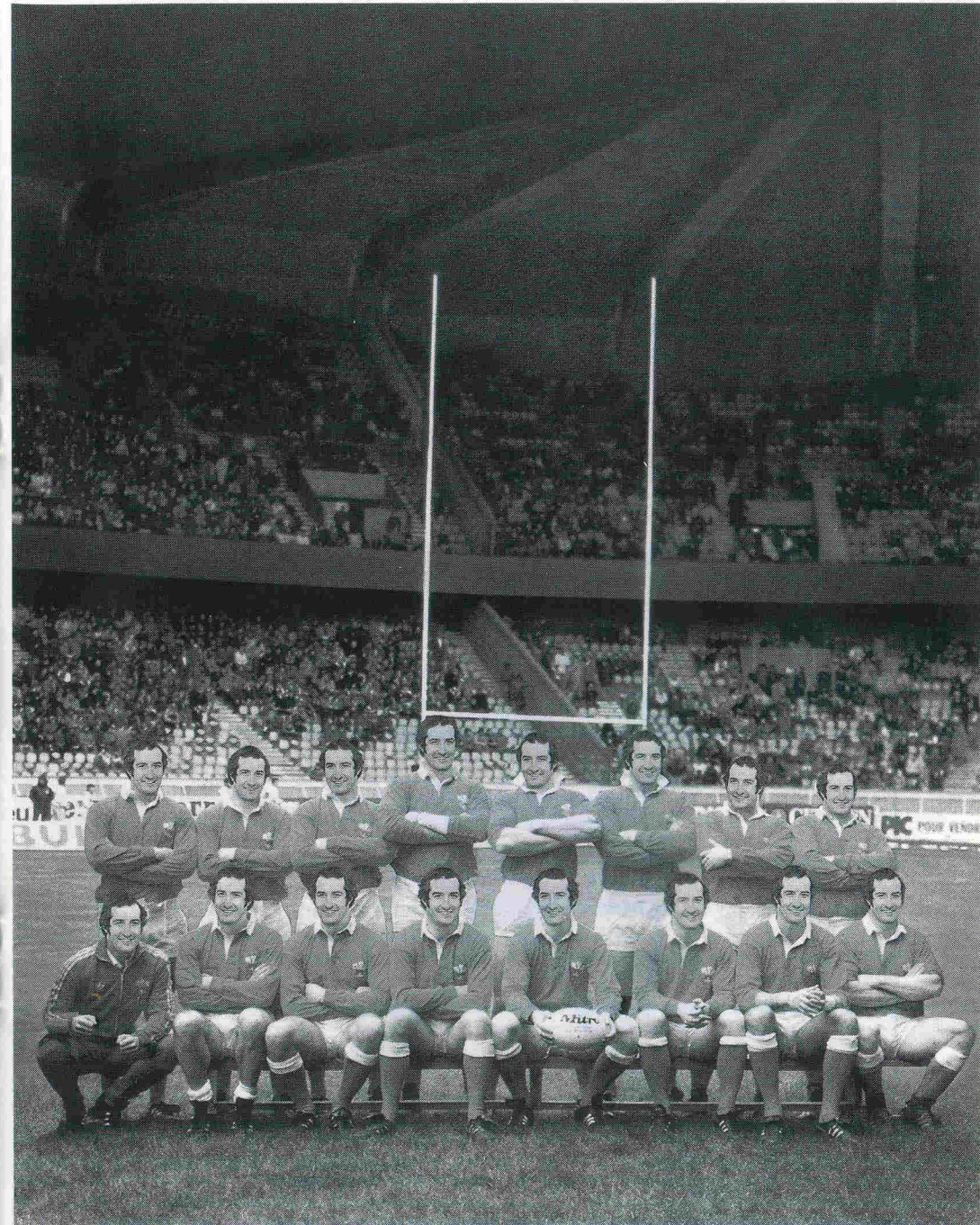

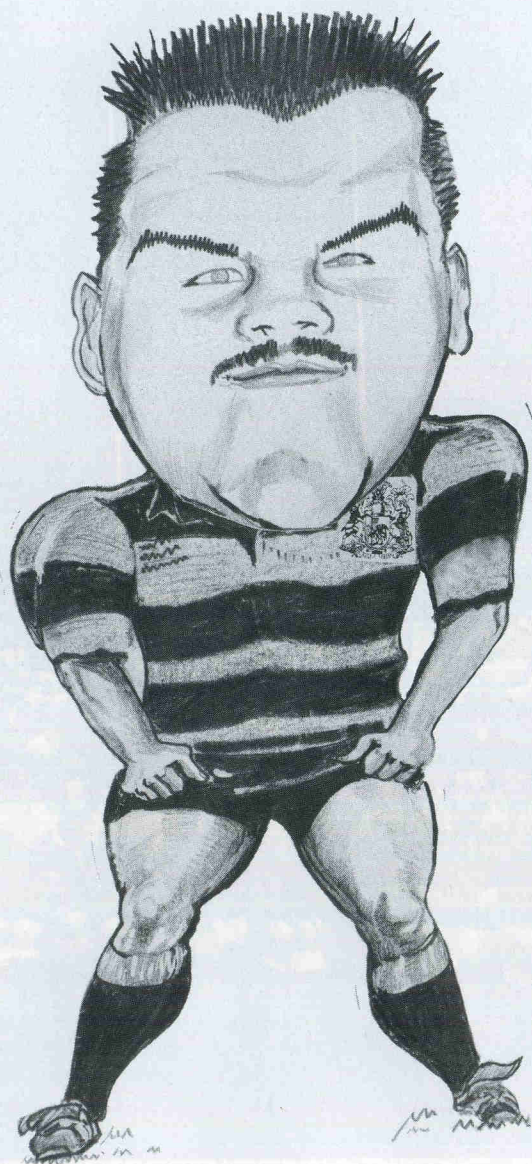

FUNNY PEOPLE, front-row forwards. They not only apparently think alike, behave alike and, in general, keep company with each other. They also, according to Quidnunc's observations, are beginning to look alike.

Tuesday and signed immediately." Nor does he regret it: "It was the best move I ever made. Just as Mike learned a lot at Bridgend from Ike Stephens, I have learned a great deal here from Mike Griffiths and from Alec and Charlie who are second to none. KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS

This evening, Malcolm raises and answers pertinent questions that have arisen recently.



Question 1: May a player who is brought to ground but was never held, crawl any distance to score a try?

Answer: NO. He may get to his feet, i.e. both knees clear of the ground and his weight on his feet, and then dive in for the try.

Question 2: Is it possible for a player to be offside alongside a maul In Goal?

Answer: NO. The maul is over, but the player may well have been standing in an offside position in front of the hindmost foot before the maul moved into In Goal. The penalty then would be in the field of play.

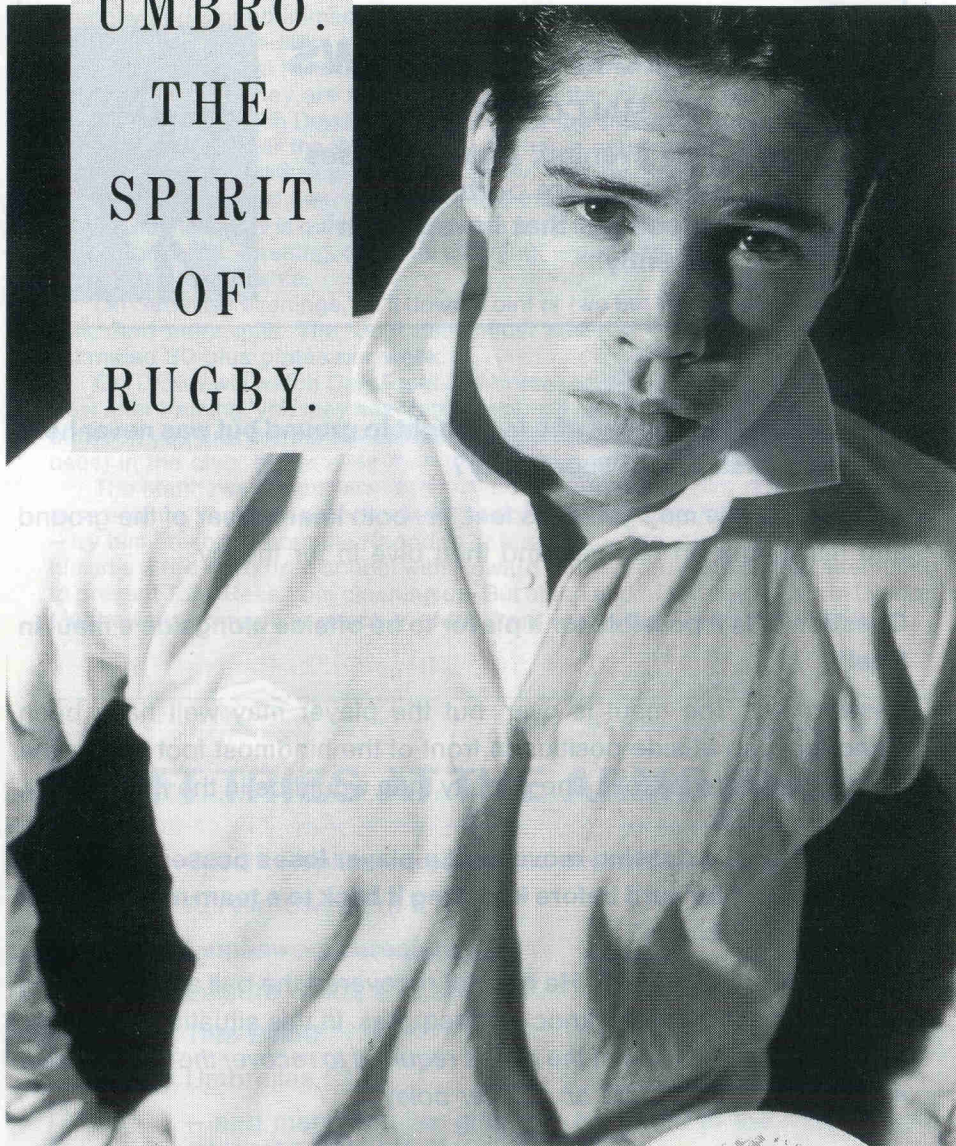
Question 3: In a passing movement a player loses possession of the ball, juggles it forward before knocking it back to a team mate. What is the correct decision?

Answer: A SCRUMMAGE. He has not recovered the ball after knocking it forward as the Law on knock-on requires. In this situation *the player, after losing possession of the ball, is required to recover the ball before it has touched the ground or another player.*

Question 4: A player about to take a free kick is prevented legally from kicking the ball. What is the correct decision?

Answer: THE KICK IS VOID. No advantage can be applied. The referee should award a scrummage and give the put-in to the opponents.
