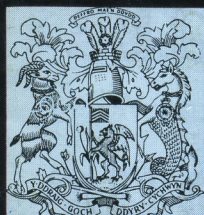

## Cardiff v. Newport

TIME, as they say, waits for no man and, suddenly, here we are with the last home game of yet another season. It scarcely seems like yesterday that we were preparing with some little apprehension for the match at Aberavon which effectively kicked off the new campaign.

Since then, we have met both triumph and disaster and hopefully, in the words of Kipling, treated those two impostors just the same. There have been highs and lows, yes, but no matter what happens against Newport this afternoon or at St. Helens, Swansea, a fortnight today, the balance has to be favourable, the overall assessment "satisfactory."

Cardiff Rugby Club chairman Mervyn John admits to being pleased with the way the season has gone. "I would have been happy at the start with fourth or fifth position in the league. We have come such a long way since last year but the losses since Christmas have made us aware of our weaknesses and these have to be strengthened.

"Although we have been in the leagues for three years now, it took the club a time to realise how much we had to change attitudes and for the players to appreciate the need for commitment.

And not only the players. The committee has also to be adaptable, to be more aware of what is going on in the rugby world whereas we have perhaps in the past been over-concerned with being a historic and traditional club."

The club is looking closely to the structure for next season of the Rags and the Under 21 teams. "We must apologise for the changes made in the fixture lists this year for these teams. Some of the Rags matches became meaningless and some of the traditions have disappeared but we have not forgotten them, nor the many followers who watch the second team matches.

We will make sure that the fixtures next season are more meaningful, possibly 50 per cent Rags matches and 50 per cent Under 21s".

The Cardiff club is aware that an Anglo-Welsh league is a real probability at some stage in the future. "We must be ready for such an eventuality," says Mr. John, "to accommodate a fixture list which could include league matches against all the leading Welsh and English clubs but also maintaining the traditional opponents."

Coaching organiser Alex Evans, whose comments on his first year with Cardiff are reported further in the Miscellany column, is also aware that there are weaknesses. "While the season has been successful in terms of



points and tries scored, there is no prize really for second and third place and we will have to go up a gear next season," he says, "to achieve the success we all want whilst still enjoying the flair and style of rugby that Cardiff wish to play and the supporters want to see."

Meanwhile, this afternoon, we welcome our oldest rivals, Newport, and, as always, give the warmest of welcomes to their players, officials and supporters.

Newport sit in mid-table with a split record: ten matches won, ten lost but, despite our 39-3 win at Rodney Parade earlier in the season, they will come to the Arms Park as they always do with an eye to victory. The championship, however, may be no closer to final resolution this evening as Llanelli, the leaders, have no match, their fixture with Pontypridd being postponed until April 28 as they have several players involved in the World Cup Sevens tournament at Murrayfield. Swansea are at Aberavon.

Many Cardiff players will clearly be keeping fully fit during the summer. Not only does the club tour Australia in August but several are involved in the Welsh tour to Namibia next month. Congratulations to them.

And finally a welcome this afternoon and say a big thank you to Baytrack Limited for their sponsorship today.

We thank them for their support – as, indeed, we thank again all those who have assisted us during the season – and trust that they and everyone present will enjoy an exciting and enjoyable match.

### THANKS, I'LL BE BACK

ALEX EVANS, the Cardiff coaching organiser from sunny Queensland, looked out over the Arms Park earlier this week and watched what are euphemistically called April showers falling.

"It seems only like yesterday since I arrived," he said, "but I have certainly not changed my mind about the weather."

"The friendships I have made, however, have made up for that — friendships on the field with the playing and coaching staffs, friendships off the field with committee, members, supporters and the general public.

It has made my decision for my wife Kay and I to come back next season an easier one even though it means leaving the family and friends in Australia for another 12 months.

It has been fantastic for Kay and myself to live in your country and we hope that the Cardiff tour of Australia can perhaps be a regular thing for future generations of Cardiff and Queensland players to reciprocate so that both can enjoy the welcome and warmth of their countries."

The Cardiff club and its supporters, says Alex, believe in the ideal ethics of what the rugby code should be in every country.

"While the season has been successful from the point of view of tries and points scored, there is no prize for second or third places and we will have to go up a gear for next year to achieve the success we all want whilst still enjoying the flair and style of rugby that Cardiff want to play and their supporters wish to see.

Thank you, everyone, for a very enjoyable season's association with your magnificent club. I look forward very much to next season."

### EARLY DAYS

*NEWPORT, today's visitors, were in fact Cardiff's first official opponents when, on Newport Marshes on Saturday, December 2, 1876, and amid a downpour of rain, about 200 spectators paid 6d each and saw Cardiff beaten.*

*Indeed, Newport were unbeaten in the first*

*four years of their history and Cardiff's first success did not come until December 18, 1880 — the eighth meeting between the clubs.*

*Those not steeped in rugby history and folklore may be surprised to learn that in those early days there was a knock-out competition for the South Wales Football Challenge Cup. Newport had beaten Swansea in the first final in 1875-76 and met Cardiff in the final the following year.*

*The match, at Sophia Gardens, aroused much public interest and "thousands of spectators, including at least a thousand from Newport," saw Newport win yet again.*

*This was the first time that Cardiff had charged for admission to a game — thus causing some resentment with letters of protest being written to the Press — and a grand total of £72 was realised.*

### CURRENT STATISTICS

**INCLUDING THOSE early matches, Cardiff and Newport had before today met 366 times, with Cardiff winning 176 of them against Newport's 133. Fifty-seven have been drawn.**

**The for and against tally for these 366 matches — which, incidentally have been split equally, 183 both at home and away — shows that Cardiff have scored 3165 points against Newport's 2391.**

**The clubs have met three times in the Heineken League, with Newport winning the first by 12-6 and Cardiff the most recent two, 18-3 and 39-3. During these past two seasons, Newport have also knocked Cardiff out of the cup, 12-4 at the Arms Park last season.**

# QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

A DIMINUTIVE Cardiff judge wrote to The Times recently to complain about what he described as "heightist remarks" proliferating in that erudite newspaper's obituary column: "a small man with a large circle of friends" and "a little man with a big heart" were the type of comments about which he jocularly protested.

In response, a further reader suggested that, as a 5ft 5in judge he must be "one of those little things sent to try us."

Today's end-of-home-season subject for discussion comes into the former categories. Albert Francis is diminutive, he is a small person with a big heart, he is a little man with a huge circle of friends.

And he'll be the first to laugh at jokes at his expense like his future plans to become a guard on a Hornby train, or a bouncer at Mothercare.

The ubiquitous Mr. Fixit of Cardiff Athletic Club is today's victim because, hard as it is to believe, we will no longer be seeing him officially; Al has retired, no longer to be the organiser, manipulator, negotiator, entrepreneur and "Agony Aunt" to two or three decades of players. Head groundsman, commercial manager... very little has happened to Cardiff RFC in the past 30 years, albeit with a break while he sought pastures new, without Albert knowing.

It all seems a far cry from March 2, 1928 when he was born, the youngest of 10, in Llanelli, where he attended Dafen and Stradey Secondary Schools. Here, his first love was soccer (no, not for Subbuteo) where he played centre forward in Dafen's Carmarthenshire League side.

Rugby, indeed, was not to figure in Albert's life for many years because, after starting work as a painter at the age of 14 and moving a year later towards a horticultural career, he joined the RAF at the age of 17. As a medical orderly, he saw sickening as well as spectacular sights in such exotic places as India, Hiroshima (shortly after the bomb), Singapore, Hong Kong, the West Indies, America and so on.

But then it was back to the outdoor life, gaining his RHS certificate at Carmarthenshire Horticultural College, spending 12 years with the old Steel Company of Wales where he not only encouraged gardens and flowers to grow but also tended their cricket, rugby, bowls and tennis areas.

It was a logical step with that background to join next the Cardiff Athletic Club — although his timing to become head groundsman of the Athletic Club complexes was not auspicious.

He arrived in March, just a short three months after the River Taff had burst its banks the day after South Africa had beaten Cardiff. The whole area was covered by four feet of water. A few years later — in 1965-66 — talks began to move the club and county cricket to Sophia Gardens where an open field beckoned.

Albert was also on the move — to Fisons where he spent 13 years, rising to area manager in several parts of the country and becoming an expert on golf courses, a game he loves, playing to an 11 handicap. But he grew tired of travelling 4,000 miles a month and returned as head groundsman, putting on a tie to become Commercial Manager in 1988 and a leading light first in the projection of the club lottery (which has raised some £250,000 so far) and then the ambitious hospitality suites.

In retirement, indeed, Albert has been named chairman of the Greens Committee at Cardiff Golf Club with the result that it will be no surprise to see similar suites alongside the 12th and 18th greens in the near future.

When he's not on the telephone fixing outrageous deals, tracking down international tickets and providing a shoulder for players to cry on, Albert is an avid newspaper reader, has a very occasional lager shandy, loves being with people enjoying themselves, finds television the best sleeping pill invented and is working on the new garden at his house.

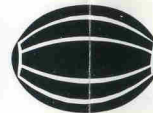

## KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS

Today, Malcolm comments on queries about some of the laws introduced this season.



### A. QUESTION

At the start of a game, the ball is kicked off from the centre by team 'A' and the ball lands over 'B's' dead-ball line. What is the correct decision?

#### Answer

The options open to team 'B' are:

- either (1) ask for the kick to be taken again.
- or (2) Scrum at the centre of the halfway line with a 'B' put in;
- or (3) accept the kick and take a drop-out.

### B. QUESTION

At the start of a game, the ball is kicked off from the centre by team 'A'. The ball lands in the field of play, goes into the in-goal area, without touching another player, and is immediately grounded by the defending player.

What is the correct decision?

#### Answer

A scrum on the halfway line with the defending team, 'B', to put in.

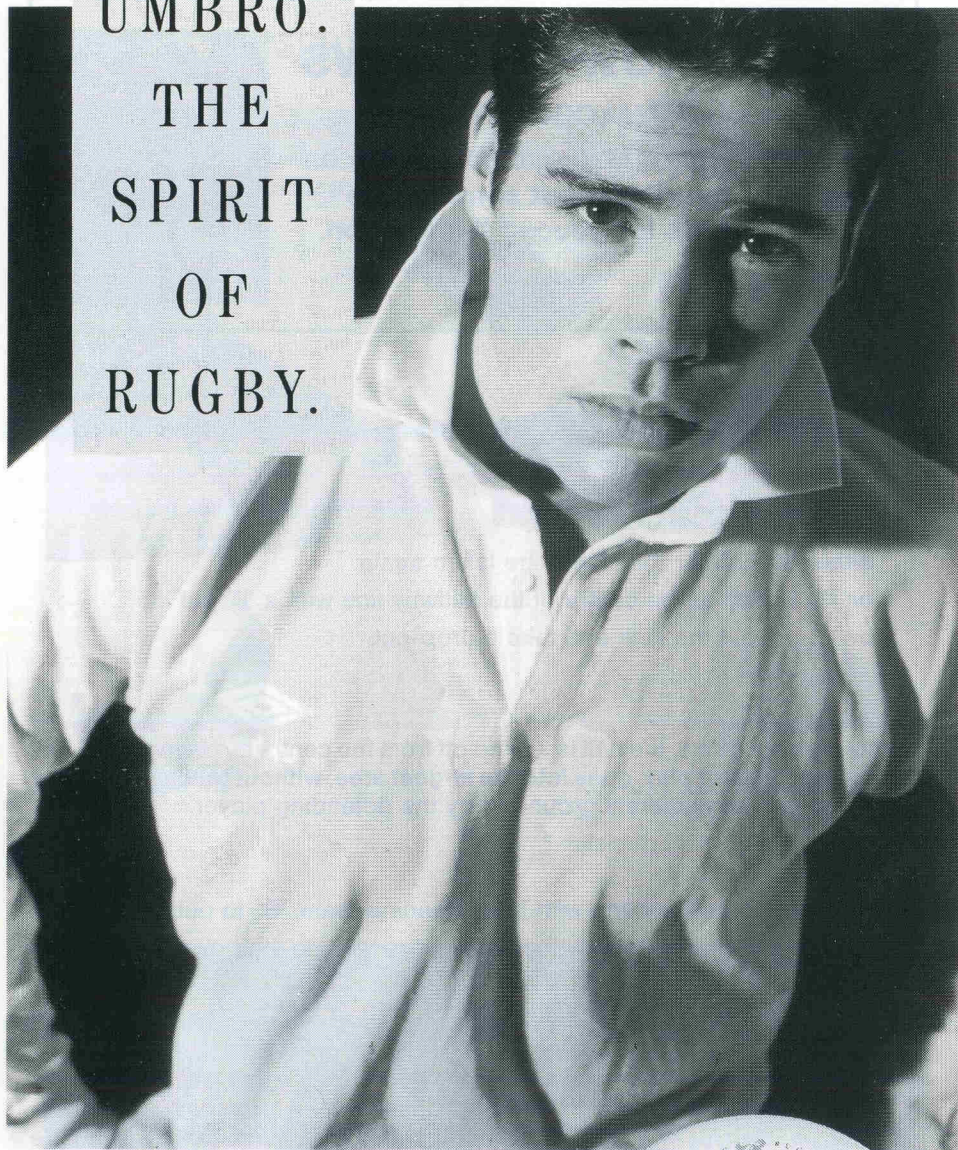
Players receiving the ball being kicked directly into their own in-goal area have the option of:

a. **Grounding the ball.** (Picking the ball up first to survey the scene is permissible), and will be awarded the put in at a scrum formed on the halfway line; or

b. **of Playing on.** Playing on is any action other than grounding the ball, i.e. running, passing, or kicking the ball. **If the ball is then made dead** a 22 metre drop out should be awarded.

This season, of course, a place kick is taken at the centre of the halfway line **only** to commence each half. A drop kick will be taken at a point on or from behind the centre of the half-way line by the defending team after the opposing side has scored. The drop-kick as a kick-off, following a score, has certainly speeded up play. It is not necessary to wait for players to reach their own 10-metre line before the kick is taken.

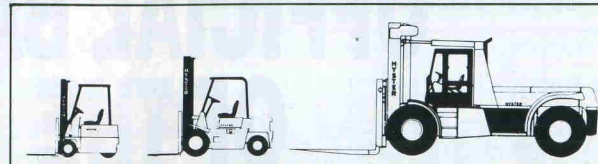

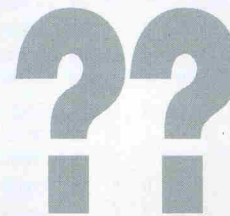

His long-standing friend Gareth Davies, the former Cardiff and Wales captain, tells a story which illustrates so many of the Francis strengths.

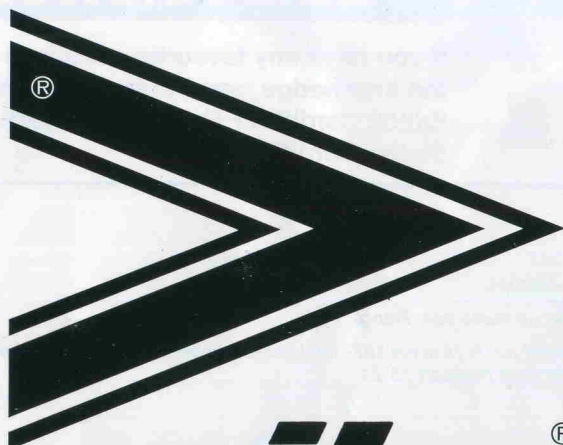

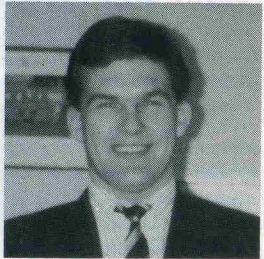

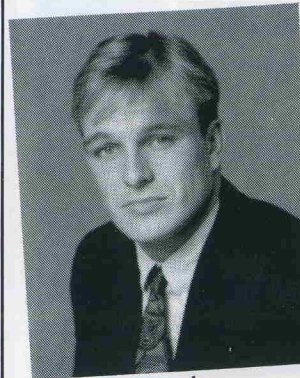
