

Cardiff v. Pontypridd

FRIDAY, 26th DECEMBER, 1986 KICK-OFF 3.00 p.m.

Well here it is Boxing Day yet again. It's time for a lot of people to emerge from the cloistered surroundings of over indulgence and get their first whiff of fresh air since Christmas Eve. It's also time to show off all those Christmas goodies we've been presented with. Gloves and woolly socks to keep our extremities warm, the contents of hip flasks to do the same job internally and the dubious aroma (to call it by a better word) produced when the odour of after-shave hits the wafting cigar smoke. And long may it be.

In this festive season of good will and bonhomie however, perhaps it's the players to whom our thoughts should turn. Whilst us lesser mortals can enjoy the traditional festivities of the occasion we still expect the players to be at a peak at a time they may well have felt like a bit of overindulgence themselves. Also today starts a pretty tough run of games for us right up until the end of January. Bridgend tomorrow, then Bath on New Year's Day are as tough as you could ask for in a period of six days. Fortunately all these games are at home and our victory over Cross Keys in the second round of the Cup means another home game against Llanharan.

Still more of that in the Bath programme. Let's go back a little today to our last home game — Bangor. They had stated that they wanted to enjoy their weekend in every sense of the word, and nobody can accuse them of not giving full life to that sentiment. The Ulstermen gave a very creditable performance on the field and indeed we nearly saw the eclipse of our ground record. There were more than the odd few around the ground that day who thought our visitors were a little unlucky not to win and I'm sure it would have really put the icing on their cake had they done so. That's rugby though and they took it in excellent part and really got down to the business of enjoying the rest of the weekend. This they did in excellent style and during the aftermatch activities they really had the rafters ringing in the Club. This leads us to hope that our association in the future will not be as sparse as in the past. Well done Bangor we hope your weekend in Cardiff reciprocated for the marvellous weekend we had on your patch.

Back to today now though, and it's time to extend to our close neighbours, Pontypridd, a warm and festive welcome. Their visit on this day is now becoming something of a tradition and this afternoon heralds the fourteenth of such visits. They will soon be overtaking the Barbarians who made eighteen Boxing Day visits between 1892 and 1920 (did you know that then) and more recently The Wasps who made sixteen post World War II visits. On looking through the records to obtain these facts an interesting point emerges too. Although many Christmas cards depict snowy and frosty scenes, those particular elements have left us well alone in reality. In the 41 years since the second war only on one occasion has a Boxing Day game been cancelled. That was against The Wasps in 1961 so what's the odds on a white Christmas this year, very long I hope. I don't know about the rain however — that's another story.

What's happening at Sardis Road these days though. Well, the main prerogative puts definite emphasis on team building. Billy Griffiths returned as coach from Bridgend last season as you may well know, and his main priority was to settle things down after a rather disastrous start when only two of fourteen games were won. Although the season ended with twice as many defeats as wins Billy was shrewd enough to realize that there was plenty of raw talent available to keep the ball moving in good old Ponty fashion and things would improve with the passage of time and

accompanying experience. Despite losing such good forwards as Mark Rowley to us and Gary Jones to Llanelli, Ponty stuck to their guns and analysis of their results showed cause for optimism. Twelve of the 23 games lost were by less than a six point margin against the likes of Llanelli, Ebbw Vale, Moseley, Pontypool, Swansea and ourselves. They have carried their 'keep it open policy' into this season and at this point in time they have achieved more victories than defeats and, more importantly, their young squad is rapidly gaining in experience. Billy Griffiths must have been highly delighted to see them come back against Maesteg on the Old Parish ground a fortnight ago to earn a sixteen all draw. That was a great tonic for them prior to their cup game against Whitland which must have sent a bit of a shudder through the West Walian camp. They came through the cup ordeal satisfactorily which helped considerably to erase the sad memory of last season's defeat by Dunvant in the first round. This victory has earned them a home tie against South Wales Police.

For the record, today the 58th game in the series between us which began in 1878, including two games in the Schweppes Cup. The overall results stand at 42 wins to us. 13 to Pontypridd and 2 drawn. Those two cup matches tell their own story too. because Ponty won both of them. The second of them must have been their best ever result as we had beaten them fairly comprehensively 19-3 on Boxing Day 1979 but come 12th January 1980 on The Arms Park bingo - Cardiff 6 Pontypridd 13, a real shaker to say the least. It also puts them as the only club with a 100% record against us in that competition. No doubt they would be delighted today to relieve us of our ground record which would take them into 1987 on a real high note. To Ponty then welcome again, we hope you enjoy your day.

Don't forget the epic coming-up New Year's Day Cardiff v Bath. I hope you will not object to a 50p charge for the programme, but it's extremely good value for money when you think of the raffle involved and also the fact that Help The Aged is a very good cause.

The Record Breakers

December 26, 1977: CARDIFF 9pts PONTYPRIDD 13pts

YOU MAY WELL ask today, when did Pontypridd first win at the Arms Park? It was a long time ago on Boxing Day 1883; their next win was in March 1930 but there was another long wait before they were victors again. It was on Boxing Day 1977 and it gave the men from the Taff Valley special pleasure.

They captured Cardiff's ground record before a large crowd that included thousands from my birthplace of Pontypridd. It was a rather unspectacular match but, of course, it was the result that mattered. Cardiff had held their ground record against Glamorgan Wanderers, Neath, Bristol, Aberavon, Northampton, Penarth, Ebbw Vale, Swansea, Pontypool and London Welsh, and were heading the Western Mail Table.

Pontypridd were also doing well and arrived at the Park determined to capture the record.

Yet the match was full of errors on both sides and at one stage I am sure both teams would have settled for a draw. It was hard and unrelenting, far from the normal holiday rugby, yet in many ways it was absorbing. Cardiff took the field without their captain Gerald Davies but still had a good side on duty.

Pontypridd's objective was to maraud through their back row, inspired by Tom David, and make life as difficult as possible for Gareth Edwards who, judging by his own high standards, did not have a happy match; neither did Pat Daniels in the centre as Pontypridd harrassed any Cardiff player in possession. In the end it was Cardiff's defence that let them down when the winning try was conceded, although

both sides allowed several chances to go begging.

Cardiff took the lead before a 10,000+ crowd, when David Barry landed a 28-yard penalty goal. After 18 minutes Ponty were level when Jeff Hazzard, a most useful player, landed a 30-yard penalty only to fail with two more attempts.

Then Ponty took the lead. They moved left from a maul and Alun Thomas burst through the centre to

race diagonally for the line and score a try that Hazzard converted.


Cardiff hit back before the interval to level the scores once again. Gareth Edwards dashed away from a maul and kicked deftly to the corner for wing David Thomas to race up and get the try. David Barry kicked a good conversion.

The second half was a stalemate until ten minutes from time after both sides had missed chances to take the lead. Edwards dropped for goal and it sailed over the bar to cheers from Cardiff supporters. Unfortunately for them the referee. Alan Richards, ruled that the ball had not been put in straight at the scrum and disallowed the goal. Groans from Cardiff supporters and cheers from those of Pontypridd!

Yet one felt that someone had to score before the end and win the match. A high punt took play down to the Cardiff goal line. Pontypridd won a ruck after the line-out and busy scrum-half Robin Morgan sent wing Brian Juliff galloping over on the blind side for the winning try.

Cardiff had only themselves to blame, but the men from Ponty returned up the valley delighted with the triumph. Pontypridd went on to win the Western Mail Club championship and prove themselves the best in Wales. Veteran Bob Pemberthey, as in this match, was the hero of the season. Tommy David was the captain and Jeff Hazzard scored 213 points.

They still say in Ponty that it was the win at the Arms Park thet set them fair for the title. Cardiff remained as runners-up.



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
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QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN



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
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CARDIFF v BATH 1st January, 1987

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

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KNOW THE LAWS

TOUCH

There is an interesting change in law this season with regard to the ball going into touch. Touch judges, players and spectators should be aware of the situation where the player is in touch but the ball has not crossed the touch line.

The law now states that: "if the ball is not in touch and has not crossed the plane of the touch-line, a player who is in touch may kick or propel the ball with his hand but NOT hold it."

A further reminder — the ball is **in touch** if it lands on or touches a touch line. Let's hope that all club touch judges know and apply these laws correctly.

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
