Cardiff v. Nice

With the risk of sounding 'corny' can I say that it's "Nice" to have a bit of French flavour injected into our fixture list and early enough in the season for us, hopefully, to expect the sun to be shining and the ground firm underfoot. These conditions would certainly suit our visitors today who hail from the South East coast of France, bang on the shores of the Mediterranean Sea. This is rather an exotic area with the close proximity of such places as St. Tropez—famous for you know what—and Cannes where the outlandish usually becomes the norm during their internationally acclaimed Film Festival. This is all poles apart from my very early boyhood impressions of the French. To me, at the time, they were all Johnnie Onions — very sunburnt men in black berets who had a phenomenal capacity for packing more onions on the handle-bars of a bike than appeared on all the stalls on the Hayes.

Small wonder then that the men of such an area find time to play rugby. Play they do however and Nice participate in the Frst Division of their national League. They have never managed to win the championship which has been dominated since World War II by such clubs as Narbonne, Beziers, Agen and Lourdes. French rugby is such that we in Wales who know little of their set up recognised such clubs as the big guns. It also shows that the strength of their national rugby lies in the south of the country as in Wales. Mind you France is a big place and I was amazed when, on research, I found that it is about 30 times bigger than Wales and possesses about 17 times the population. A known characteristic of their rugby however is their inability to display the sheer magic of the form they more than often show at home when playing on foreign soil.

But back to today's game it gives the Cardiff Rugby Club the greatest of pleasure to welcome Nice to the Arms Park on this their inaugural visit. The French Connection of the Cardiff Club however is a very long one which has led to honours being bestowed on two of the club's past players. This French Connection started in the year 1905 when we played Stade Francaise in Cardiff and won by 44pts to 8. This was reciprocated in 1906 when we played a Combined XV in Paris and won 27-5 in what was the club's first ever trip to France. Then in 1910 one of the greats of our club, Percy Bush, went to live in France at Nantes where he took up the position of Vice-Consul. On his arrival he was asked, and accepted, to captain the town club. He did much to raise the standard of the club and became a bit of a legend in the area. Indeed in one game against Le Havre he scored 54 points by amassing 10 tries 8 conversions and 2 drop goals. After his return to Wales the French Government awarded him a silver medal (Medaille d'Argent de Gratitude) in recognition of his services as Vice-Consul.

The affiliation set up by Percy Bush between Cardiff and Nantes finally came to fruition when in 1945 Cardiff undertook a tour to that town and also Cognac. It was during this tour that a life lasting friendship was established between our own Danny Davies and Henri Picherit. Many very pleasant tours have taken place since and there are many Cardiff players who have pleasant memories of the lavish hospitality received from the Hennessey and Martel distilleries. During the following season the French Connection was also instrumental in providing the Cardiff Club with another first. As a result of the tour of the 1945-46 season we agreed to fly to France for a match against Nantes on Monday, 11th November, 1946, Armistice Day. The game was ultimately played but only after much delay caused by the weather conditions and the reliability of the plane, a former German bomber Junkers 52, the Cardiff Club had finally taken to the air. The Danny Davies—Henri Pricherit association ultimately led to Danny also being awarded a gold medal (Medaille Education

Physique et Sport), the first occasion for it to be presented to a foriegn national. Danny had worked extremely hard to encourage an "entente cordiale" between Welsh and French rugby and well deserved his honour.

So to the Nice Club today we again extend a most hospitable welcome. We hope you enjoy your stay and today will be the start of another long association for our respective clubs. I'm sure if we arrange a tour based on the Nice area, there would be no shortage of players anxious to be included in such a party.

Then states explicitly, "The opposing team must be behind the goal line until the kicker begins his run etc., etc."




