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


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Captain's Comment: P. J. Crowe

It was just over 100 years ago that the first Varsity match was played in the Parks at Oxford. From that time Oxford University has been one of the cradles of British Rugby, and indeed it was not so long ago that the Varsity match was considered equivalent to an English trial. From Oxford came internationals of legendary fame: R. W. Poulton, V. G. J. Jenkins, Prince Obolensky, H. G. C. Owen-Smith and latterly R. A. W. Sharp, T. P. Bedford and C. R. Laidlaw. Innovations which were to change the very nature of the game itself were born and nurtured in the dressing room and pavilion of Iffley Road. The crowds thronged to see the mighty clubs of today vainly do battle with Oxford University teams, whose reserves were internationals. Golden years indeed, when sponsorship, leagues and the 'professional approach' might have been Russian words for all the meaning they held for the Oxbridge players of yesteryear. Unfortunately, those grand years have passed, but the spirit and vitality of a great Rugby tradition still thrives.

But Varsity rugby will suffer irreparable damage if spirit alone is asked to carry the standard through the years ahead. Physically things must change and indeed they have. Thanks to the generosity of Bowrings in particular, and most importantly the sale of O.U.R.F.C. land, Iffley Road has been extensively redeveloped to provide a superb venue for playing and training. To avoid the threat of leagues on our fixtures the administration and organisation of Oxford University Rugby, not just O.U.R.F.C., must be updated so that teams and players can perform maximally. This, of course, includes the appointment of team coaches, assisted by experts in various aspects of the game. Here the club owes a tremendous debt to Lynn Evans, the Blues coach, whose infectious enthusiasm and love of the game has attracted others to the cause. John Gunter, ex Oxford RFC coach, will be coach for the Greyhounds and Paul Absolom, RFU coach, will be looking after the Whippets. The 'experts' include Roger Arneil, Peter Johnson and Barry Corless. To all these gentlemen, thank you for all the time and effort you have already put into Oxford University Rugby. I hope we can thank you properly with the success on the field during and at the end of term.

Other less obvious change are taking place. Increasing sponsorship, planning major tours and improving the depth of players in the club are all items which are being addressed by the committee and its assistants. As regards sponsorship John Markland has given phenomenal service to the club and we thank him most sincerely for his efforts.

Much of this (work) both mundane and innovative, is done by the supremely efficient Dr Alan Tayler. This year he is being ably assisted by Dr Duncan Macleod and Derek Wyatt who will both assist the club to meet its changing needs. We are indebted to them all.

To all our visitors and supporters I hope you will continue to come to Iffley Road and support O.U.R.F.C. especially through the coming season as I am sure you will enjoy the open fluid Rugby that we intend to play.

Finally, to all those who don the dark blue jersey this year, remember you are playing for one of the most famous Rugby clubs in the world. Cherish and enjoy the experience. You will never forget it.

O.U.R.F.C. NOTES

Cardiff

We extend a warm welcome to the Cardiff committee, players and supporters. We are especially pleased that they have agreed to officially open our floodlights. We hope the game is one to remember. The blues have a habit of rising to the occasion. Perhaps, tonight we will see a surprise result.

Cardiff have not made their customary good start to the season. They have lost eight out of fourteen games. It is their worst opening record since 1957-58. Coincidentally, the joint English Cup Winners — Gloucester and Mosely — have also had undistinguished beginnings.

Last Saturday Cardiff lost 10-17 to The Maoris. It is customary for visiting sides to be given a 'soft' opening game: not so for The Maoris. Their win, however, should give them the confidence so vital in the early part of any tourists itinerary.

After the Barbarians, Cardiff is probably the most famous club side in the world. They have had some outstanding players over the years. Onllwyn Brace thought by many to be the greatest scrum half ever to grace the Blues in the 1950s: Gareth Edwards, Barry John and Gerald Davies.

Included in their side this evening is another former Blue, Gareth Davies (1977). He is joined by fellow internationals Terry Holmes, Alan Phillips, Robert Norster and John Scott (Captain).

COLLEGE RUGBY ROUND UP

It is a bleak and dreary afternoon in Oxford. Approximately sixteen forlorn figures agglomerate into a scrum. It collapses and all look reproachfully at the tighthead. 'Don't blame me he whimpers, I've never played prop before . . '.

After an extensive series of probing interviews, your correspondent is in a position to reveal, exclusively, that this is inter-college rugby. It would be good to hail college rugby as a nursery of champions. But that would be to exceed the usual bounds of journalistic hyperbole. It is however, much enjoyed by its participants and played — with a few exceptions — in the old spirit of rugby, jovial, easy-going, bibulous, with an appealing disregard for fitness, training, and advanced skills.

Nearly All Oxford colleges field one or more rugby sides though some add new meaning to the expression 'ten man rugby'; the former womens' colleges are surprisingly powerful. OURFC 1982-83

Last Season finished on a high note with victories over strong touring sides from Sydney University, Waseda University, and Trinity College, Dublin, which augur well for 1982-3. After the disappointments of the 100th Varsity Match, played in intolerable conditions, it is reassuring that Oxford can beat the best student sides and reinforces the Club's policy of resisting the blandishments of the English Students Rugby Football Union. With Cambridge, we have agreed that no Oxford student will play for the English Students XV, at least while in residence, and that we shall continue to press for representative matches with touring sides. Rugby is a team game and we have unrivalled opportunities to play fifteen man rugby and rise to the big occasion, as against Australia last year. This season the highlights will be a visit by Cardiff to play under the new floodlights, Stanley's Match, and a visit by Queensland University. There are many attractive home games and we hope to attract more spectators to Iffley Road than in previous years.

Improvements to the ground continue and it is hoped to complete work on the West Stand before Stanley's Match. This will, when finished, provide spectator toilet facilities on a scale suitable for a first class ground, a training or club room, and improved storage space, in addition to general renovation. Work will shortly commence on a groundsman's house to be located in the south-east corner, with road access from the new road off Jackdaw Lane on which twenty one town houses are nearing completion.

With the increased responsibilities of the Club both the playing and senior membership of the Committee has been extended. There is now an official post of Vice-Captain, the Greyhounds captain will also join the Committee, and Dr. Duncan Macleod of St. Catherine's College has agreed to be the Club's Officer responsible for the Ground. The pitch itself looks to be in excellent condition and the groundsman Mr. Terry Jones is to be congratulated on his efforts to make Iffley Road both attractive and efficient. There are several changes in the support staff. Dr. Ian Neill has retired after nearly 40 years association with the Club and is replaced by Dr. Stewart Herbertson. John Markland, the Pavilion Manager, has retired but continues to take a very active interest and is irreplaceable. Tom Webb, the Pavilion Steward, has retired and is replaced by Mrs. Dalloway from the Parks Pavilion. To all these we offer our best wishes and thanks.



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
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
