Cardiff v. Pontypool

WEDNESDAY, 30th APRIL, 1986

KICK OFF 7.15 p.m.

Well here we are, unbelievably, at the end of the season. And what a way to end it. Last Saturday's euphoria of the Cup win still permeates the place and tonight we are hosting the mighty Pontypool. Gone is the gloom created by those five out of six pre-cup defeats to be replaced by the satisfaction of having that very coveted trophy back in the club house. It proved to be a real cracker of a game too and far more open than many of the pundits had forecast. The 49 points was a record score in the 15 seasons the Cup has been going and the seven try figure was also a record number for a final. Furthermore, Adrian Hadley's hat-trick was the first ever in the competition. Newport also figure in the records too inasmuch as their 21 points was the highest ever by a losing finalist. So the haunting reflection of that drop goal by Gary Pearce last year can be well and truly erased from the mind. What future is in store for the Cup however. It will be a tragedy if it becomes the bone of contention that unfortunately exists at present, let's hope some mutually agreed solution can be found by both the parties involved.

Although the season is ending on a high note it is also tinged with sadness by the probable retirement of our Gareth Davies. Since his debut on 13th November, 1974 against Penarth, Gareth has been a magnificent ambassador of the Cardiff Club and a great credit himself. His career has been prodigious in terms of points scoring, skill, consistency and record breaking. He has been a veritable point scoring machine since his first season with the club. Apart from season 1977-78, when he played in only fourteen games due to his stint at Oxford University, he has been top scorer in all his twelve seasons. He holds the record score for a season which he set in 1983-84 with 383 points. His career aggregate is approaching 3000 points which is many a mile ahead of the second best. His kicking has always been of the highest order in accuracy. In fact it was said that Adrian Hadley's second try last Saturday was a planned move for Gareth to hit the post and Adrian to take the rebound for the try. Gareth's association with Terry Holmes also became something of a legend in their lifetime too. Their half back partnership became as famous as any of the illustrious names of the past in Welsh Rugby. There weren't many honours that eluded him during his long career and the fact he played eleven games for Cardiff against the Barbarians speaks volumes for his consistency of form. Our visitors tonight have also been on the receiving end of some of his magic too. He has played nineteen games against them and scored 150 points with probably last year's cup semi-final when he scored 20 of our 24 points uppermost in their mind. Now it looks as if it's coming to an end. The place certainly won't be the same without Gareth around and I'm sure you would all agree that we will miss his skilful presence on the field. Hopefully he will be playing tonight so we can pay due tribute to a marvellous career which has given very much pleasure to very many people.

But it's on with the show tonight in welcoming Pontypool to The Park for the game which was originally scheduled for March 8th. Due to the bad weather in February our Cup game against Glamorgan Wanderers had to be played on that day. The Pooler, as is usual have had another highly successful season carrying practically everything in front of them. I'm sure they will come this evening with the firm intention of chalking up a double as they won this season's previous encounter 13-12. They had an unexpected set back last Saturday however when they went down by 19 points to 18 at Waterloo, so a victory over the Cup holders would be as good a way as any to get back to winning form. In all we have played 146 games of which we have won 93 to their 37 with 16 games drawn. We have scored a total of 1697 points to their 1071. It's thanks to Pooler then for coming this evening and we extend to them a very warm welcome.

Matthew Hadley's 'Rags' have had a highly successful couple of months also. Since the beginning of March they have won all their thirteen games and scored 417 points. Their overall record is played 42, won 34, lost 7, drawn 1, with 1061 points for to 494 against. They are also involved in a cup final on May 6th when they play either St. Peters or Rumney in The Presidents Cup in The Silver Ball Competition at a venue to be decided. The Youth were not going to be left out of the cup scene either as they played Llanelli last night in the final of the WYRU Cup.

Finally, we would like to thank Allied Dunbar for their generous sponsorship of this evenings game. We hope they and their guests have an enjoyable time.

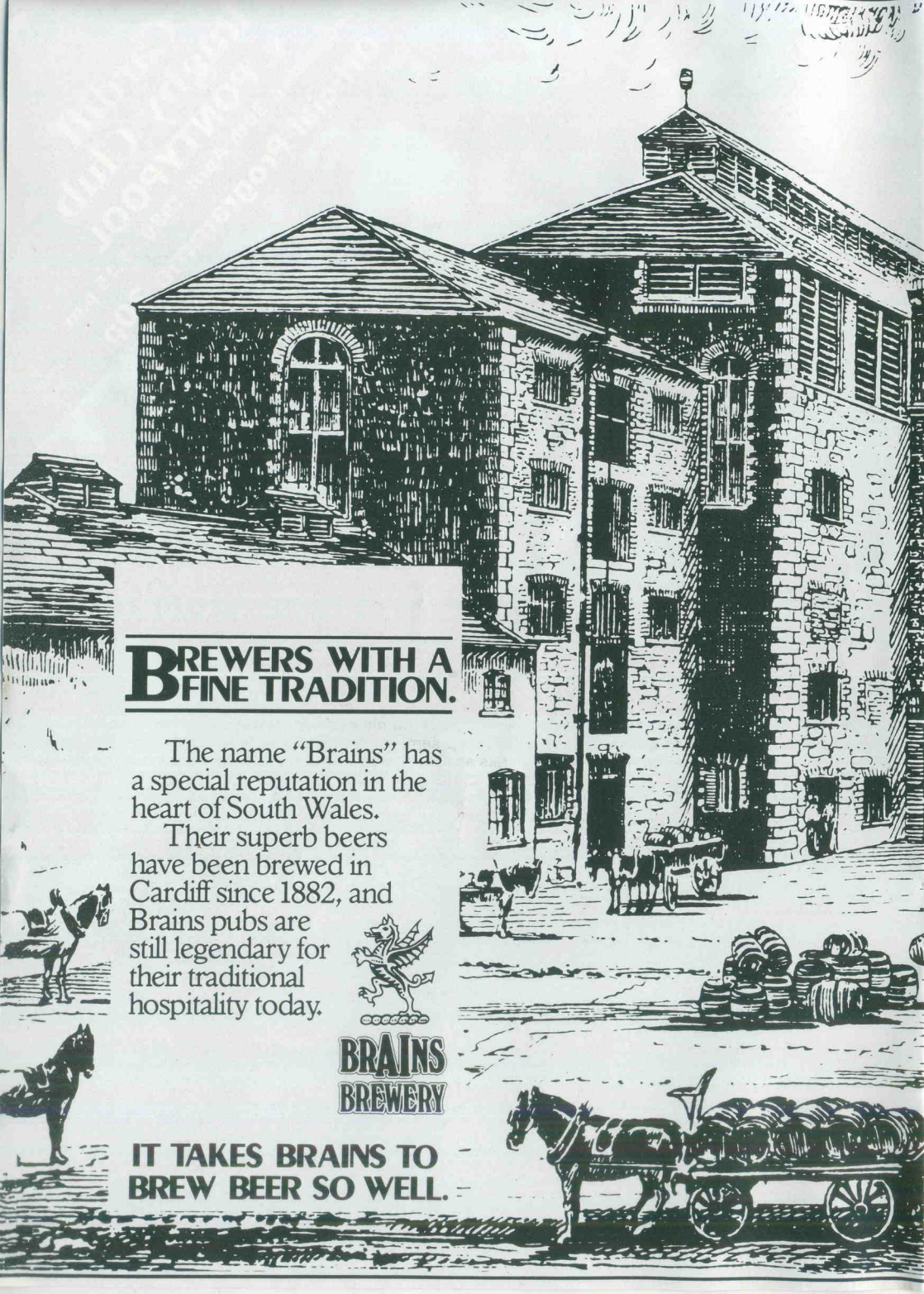

KNOW THE LAWS

DUTIES OF THE TOUCH JUDGE

On several occasions recently I have heard criticism of touch judges with regard to when he should keep the flag raised! Law 6B(5) specifies the three occasions when he should do so:—

5. The touch judge shall lower his flag when the ball has been thrown in except on the following occasions when he must keep it raised:
 - (a) when the player throwing in the ball puts any part of either foot in the field of play.
 - (b) when the ball has not been thrown in by the team entitled to do so.
 - (c) when at a quick throw-in, the ball that went into touch is replaced by another or is handled by anyone other than the players.

It is for the referee to decide whether or not the ball has been thrown in from the correct place.

From some of the remarks I have heard shouted at touch judges that last statement will come as a bit of a surprise to some spectators.

PAST PLAYERS CORNER

HARRY BOWCOTT

Harry Bowcott's career in rugby both on and off the field was as distinguished as the lineage of The Royal Family. Born in Cardiff he learned his rugby at Cardiff High School and was capped by the Welsh Secondary Schools in April 1926. He went up to Cambridge and won two Blues in 1927-28 and 1928-29 winning both games. He was first capped by Wales whilst at Cambridge against Scotland in 1929 and went on to win seven more. He was also on The Lions Tour to The Antipodes in 1930 and played in all four tests against New Zealand and one against Australia.

Harry's career with Cardiff started in 1926 but it really took off when he came down from Cambridge. He won his first team cap in his first full season 1929-30. His immaculate play, slide rule kicking and astute positioning made him a centre of the classic mould. He was vice captain to Howard Poole in 1931-32 and because of the poor form of his captain he led the Cardiff side against the touring South Africans of that season. At this stage he was joined at Cardiff by his younger brother Jackie who also had a secondary school cap and won his Cambridge Blue. They played together against the 1935 All Blacks. Harry was nominated captain of Cardiff for season 1932-33 but an appointment in the hotel business in London prevented him from taking up the honour. Cardiff's loss was a London Welsh gain though and Harry enjoyed his rugby with the exiles until his retirement.

During the war he served in The Royal Artillery 40 Heavy Ack Ack Division but on cessation of hostilities he was busy again putting London Welsh well and truly on the map. He was elected to the WRU in 1960 and became a selector in 1964. He was assistant manager of the team to The Argentine in 1968 and after that his vast knowledge of the game was well used on selection to establish what was to be a golden era for Wales. In season 1974-75 he reached the pinnacle of his administrative career when he became the third Cardiffian to preside over the Welsh Rugby Union.

After a highly successful career as a Civil Servant in The Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, Harry retired back to South Wales and now lives in quiet retirement with his wife in Wenvoe.

Rugby Ground: St. Helen's, Swansea.

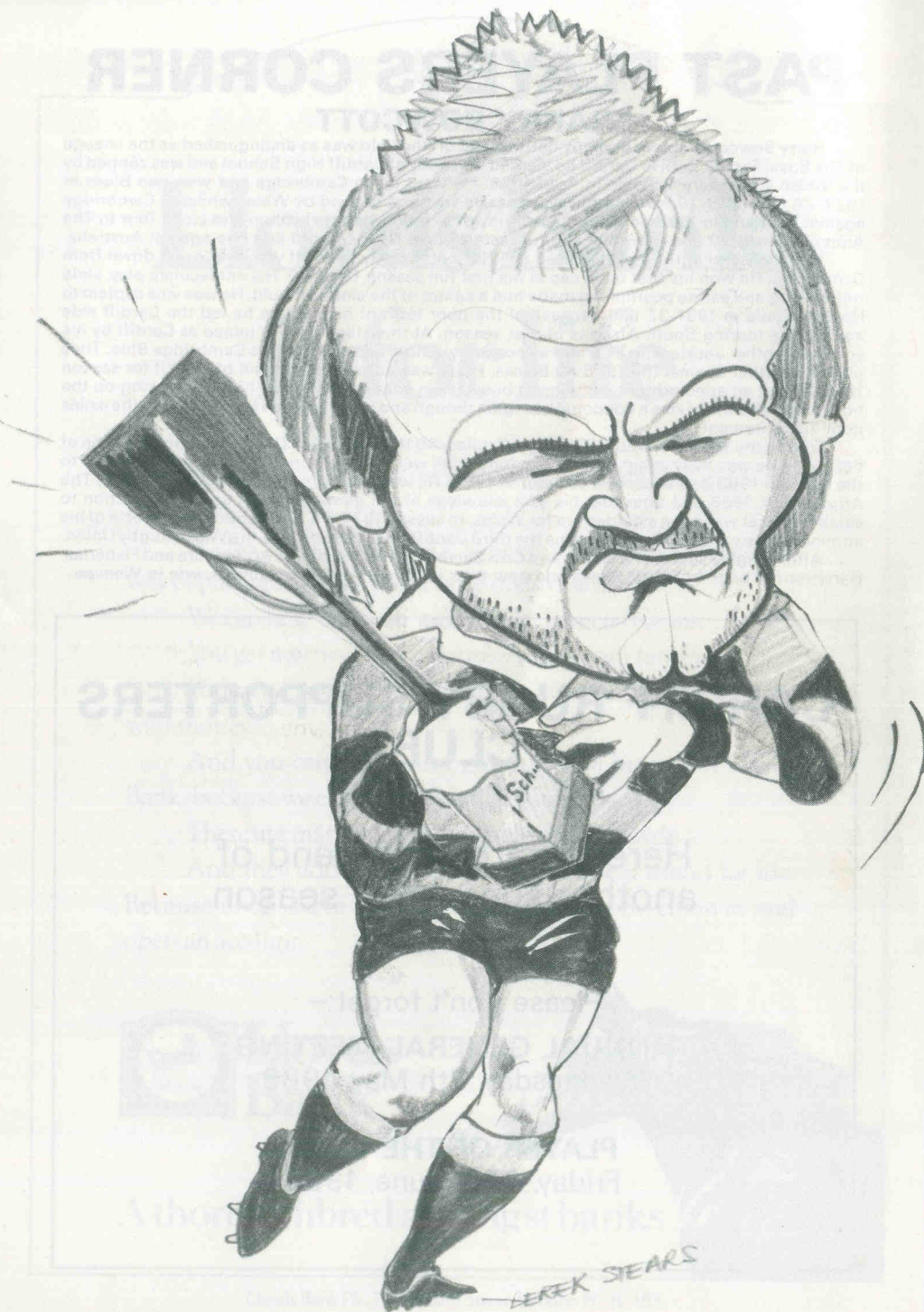
