
BILL EVERSON (Man Of The Tournament) AWARD

The Adjudicators for the above Award will comprise a panel of the following:Garvin Howells, Chairman, and four other judges, one from each of the following Clubs:ABERAVON, ABERTILLERY, BRIDGEND, CARDIFF.

Rules of the Tournament

- Each team will be represented by 10 players whose names will be given to the Organising Committee prior to the start of the tournament. From these names seven must be nominated to play throughout the tournament except for injury (see Rule 7).
- 2. A scrummage will be formed by not less than three players on each side.
- 3. The tournament will be played throughout on a "Knock-Out" basis.
- 4. The winner of any game will be the team which has scored the most points at the end of normal time. If the score is equal, play will continue until one side scores to win the game.
- Each game other than the final will be of seven minutes duration each half, with one minute interval.
- The Final will be of ten minutes duration each half at the end of which, if the scores are equal, Rule 4 will apply.
- 7. If an injured player is declared unfit by the tournament doctor, he may be replaced immediately during the game from within the 10 names submitted at the commencement of the tournament. No player who has been replaced may take any further part in the tournament.
- 8. The decision of the referee on all questions relative to play will be final
- In the event of any contingency arising which is not covered by these Rules, the decision of the Organising Committee will be final.




Welcome to Cardiff Arms Park and to the Worthington Welsh "Sevens" for the Snelling Trophy.

"FOLLOW THE BEARS"

I was never a fan of seven-a-side. To this tenderly nurtured Cardiff boy suddenly thrust at 16 into the heavy technology of Monmouthshire (not Gwent — it was that long ago) rugby, sevens seemed a frothy irrelevence, requiring only Snow White to orchestrate the dizzy, Disney-like circles round which the participants seemed to be in permanent perambulation.

I was not alone. Welshmen required their rugby to be fully manned up to 15 so that those wide open spaces were policed properly just perhaps to prevent anybody running too far, too fast. We needed those Oxo cubes of props to spend the afternoon doing a PISA job on each other and, so I was told, playing a game among themselves which has nothing to do with the final score or for that matter, the other 27 (include the ref) on the field.

We needed towering second rows who may not necessarily be able to jump but who could certainly inhibit others from getting into the bad habit. And back rows? They were so finely tuned optically that a blink of the referee's eye was enough to put them a yard ahead of the

opposing outside half and two yards up on the off-side law.

Scrum halves were heroes, but largely immobile. They died for club, country, their outside half, the corpse often found beneath a pile of players still cradling the ball like something out of Pompeii. Faithful unto the final whistle. Outside halves, always the maestro in the mind of the crowd. Always full of eastern promise, always threatening to be another Cliff Jones but almost always a Cleaver, belting that ball with the precision of Steve Davies into the corner.

Centres? Powerful, they would stop a bus but could never catch one. If the ball reached them, well, ooo, this was the chance of a life time and no chance would they share the experience. They would die with the ball and what might have been was never on the agenda.

Wings? Well, they were usually the people who couldn't play anywhere else and anyway, the ball (according to the philosophy recorded above) would never reach them or their opposite number so they were quite surplus to requirements. A living testimony to redundancy in slow motion.

But Welshmen, starved by the war years of rugby, were happy enough with the fare. They didn't need high scores. Take the dozen post war years between Wales and the old

enemy, England

Starting at 1946-47 — 9-6, 30-3, 9-3, 11-5, 23-5 (a hiccup) 8-6 (that's more like it); 8-3, 9-6, 3-0, 8-3, 3-0, 3-3. Of course the top level international rugby had its portion (but not too much) of flair, the Bleddyns, the Cliffs, the Ken Joneses, and coaching had not cauterised the capillaries enough to choke off some semblance of individualism in the likes of Lewis Jones. Nevertheless, the level of thinking, fitness and what was the right thing to do on your line or theirs managed to cancel out froth, frivolity and free range football.

So when the Snelling Sevens, named after a chairman of Wales Gas long before reprivatisation paved the streets with gold for most of our former nationalised chairmen, came along in 1954, Welshmen were not knocked out by the game which enraptured the Scots and gave Englishmen yet another excuse for champers, caviare and the odd sausage roll out of

their Rolls Royce boots (car variety).

Yet the insatiable appetite of Welsh rugby fans yielded crowds of 30,000, 25,000 and 20,000 as the Snelling Sevens, born in 1954 in that great cradle of the game Rodney Parade, moved about Cardiff, Swansea and Newport. One of the weaknesses of the project in the later years was the failure, refusal or sheer common sense (take your pick) on the part of so many top players to appear. They already had plenty on their playing plates with the fixture list.

The golden years of the seventies had London Welsh (remember them?) very much in the eye and they were playing elsewhere. Jonathan Davies, Scott Gibbs and last year Nigel Walker

were all Sevens names to conjure with but crowds slumped to 6.000.

Twenty years ago, I would not have been bothered. One man's meat is another's Seven-

But Welshmen, wallowing in the slough of defeat and defeat, have seen other nations rise out of the ashes of Welsh despondency. Western Samoa (and I never thought that joke about the other half funny!)

Fiji, Japan, Tonga and even Romania are now forces to fear.

Much of their success has been due to basic fitness but more so to their free-thinking, their refusal to play the game the old way, their refusal to move the ball, the body or the brain along established lines. And, dare I sat it as a late convert to TV Sevens at top level, isn't that what the Sevens game is all about — a game in which you are never safe — ask Swansea who were 24-0

ahead last year only to go out 28-24 to Newbridge.

Take some comfort that the Snelling Sevens, now renamed the Worthington Sevens, are sponsored by Welsh Brewers, a sympathiser with lost causes but never a sponsor of them. Welsh Brewers, with their quite incredible portfolio of sporting sponsorships tend to make the right things happen and it is time that Welshmen raised more than their elbows in support of Sevens, no longer a frothy irrelevance but rather a crucial ingredient in the ferment of world rugby. Probably the most natural Sevens thinker in the world is one David Campese who is, to my mind, not so much a rugby player as a rugby philosopher. We could do with a lot of both






