

PYLE RFC AND DUNRAVEN WINDOWS "A QUALITY PARTNERSHIP"

CUP FEVER

Is there such a thing now in Welsh rugby as Cup fever or has the Heineken League superseded it, like many other things? When the Cup was introduced in 1971/72 it was the only way for David to slay Goliath. Usually, it would be blood and thunder from David for an hour then sense would prevail and Goliath would churn out a comfortable victory. But since leagues were introduced in 1990 the smaller fish in Welsh rugby don't wish to get too involved, especially if promotion is in the offering. And for Goliath, it can also get in the way. I notice now that Swansea are out of the running for the league, they are concentrating on second best - the Cup. That's the negative side but in an upbeat mood the Cup Final in recent times has been a sell out, come the first Saturday in May. Long may it continue. The Cup of course was the forerunner of leagues and some of those attitudes - usually reserved for semi-finals - having spilled over, and can be seen in the "kick the ball into the opponents 22 syndrome and let them make the mistakes." One of the few points I did agree with Cardiff chief executive Gareth Davies, in his recent State of the Union interview with Hamish Stuart in the "Western Mail" was value for money. Far too many clubs are quick enough to grab cash off fans but give little back in the way of value. Supporters have been taken for granted for far too long. There are a host of other leisure pursuits on Saturdays and some of the rugby we've seen this season will make supermarket shopping or visiting the mother-in-law a more attractive prospect! Spaces on terraces appear to be the norm this season when watching big games such as Neath v Llanelli and Cardiff v Swansea - to name but two. I must admit if I wasn't being paid, I doubt if I would watch such lack lustre fare each week. Earlier, I made the point regarding clubs not wishing to get too involved if titles were involved. Well both Pyle and Cardiff are certainly involved with championships and it will be interesting to see today how both camps approach the game. I will not dwell on it long (for fear of offending Mike Rees, the only Cardiff supporter in Bridgend) but I'm sure Cardiff will not underestimate Pyle after events two years ago when St Peter's beat the Greatest Club Side in the World, 16-14. Of course coach Alex Evans would not remember but in 1986/87 Llanharan went mighty close at the Arms Park. The Dairymen lost 18-14 and I recall a decision by a touch judge proving crucial. Llanharan of course made a name for themselves in the Cup, reaching the quarter-finals in successive years. Llanharan, in fact, are a classic case of Cup attitudes, or is it a coincidence? Since leagues started in 1990 they have won only one tie. They bowed out in the first round for three consecutive years commencing 1990/91. Last season they managed a 22-0 home win over Chepstow before losing 32-3 at Newbridge. This year LLanharan, who are attempting to stave off relegation from Division Two, are already out. They lost by a respectable 22-12 against Swansea at St Helen's. While Llanelli are generally regarded as Cup kings, Cardiff's record is next best. Strangely, it took them 10 years to lift the Cup for the first time - beating Bridgend 14-6 - but since then they have lifted the cup a further five times. Being a Bridgend supporter as a kid, (I have since seen sense and grown out of it!) I always felt that Cardiff had a distinct advantage in playing the finals at the National Stadium. That to my mind accounted for the two successive Cup finals defeats against Cardiff in the early 80's. But in those days we needed to encourage Cardiff as it was getting boring winning in the capital city all the time! Will Cardiff be able to emulate Llanelli, two seasons ago, and secure a Cup and League double? On paper their league run in appears easier than either Pontypridd or Neath and they have made a positive start in defence of the Cup. In the last round they beat Merthyr 63-8. I'll be 70 miles away today, at Builth Wells, to see if my adopted club - Bonymaen - can make progress in the Cup. Let's hope I shall have something to shout about coming home over the Brecon Beacons a Pyle win!
