





Cardiff v. Bristol

SATURDAY 1st SEPTEMBER, 1990 KICK-OFF 2.30 p.m.

Welcome to season 1990/91 which most conveniently begins on the very first day of September. Goodness knows where the summer has gone, it seems but only a few short weeks since we played our final game of last season. Gone it has though and it was quite an eventful four months as far as we were concerned.

Our tour to America proved to be very successful although we were nowhere near full strength. This gave rise to the situation whereby quite a few of our younger players plugged the gaps left by the senior players who were either on tour with Wales our suffering from injury. They certainly showed their undoubted talents however and we came back with a played five, won five record. Tour Manager Gary Davies was delighted with the dedication and determination shown by the players who had to overcome some big fast American sides. Skill and better know-how came to the fore however and in our five wins, we scored 145 points to 49 against. Those victories saw us win the Boston Tournament during which we were voted as the best partaking team.

Holland was our next port of call for a festival in Amsterdam. Again we won over both games with a fair complement of younger players. We overwhelmed the host team by 73 points to 3 but the other game proved to be a very tough encounter against Steau Bucharest. Manager Brian Mark reported on the impressive organisation and size of the Romanians but we still got the better of them by 17 points to 14, a very good victory indeed.

More success came our way at Cardiff H.S.O.B. Sevens Tournament. After winning our pool we had a very close encounter with a Cambridge University VII. Having seen the Light Blues off however we met our old rivals, Newport, in the Final of the competition. We won the game comfortably to collect the trophy and Mike Rayer scooped the Man of the Tournament award to close a very successful afternoon.

Our summer of success was halted when we lost out to Bridgend in the semi final of the Snelling Sevens last Saturday. Once again we had a fair crop of our younger players on show and they did well to register a first round win over Llanelli.

With the game in its dying second the Scarlets scored a try under the posts to bring the score to 18-16 in our favour. A successful conversion would have levelled the scored and led to extra time. Ritchie Collins didn't seem to relish that prospect however and he coolly thwarted Llanelli's efforts by charging the conversion down to leave us 18-16 winners. A second round win over Pontypool by 18-8 saw us into the semi against Bridgend. An all action end to end game indeed. With each side having scored the points. So it was sudden death in extra time and after a bit of a cat and mouse situation for a few minutes the Brewery Field boys got the vital score which ensured their passage to the final. It was a very good effort by our lads however.

All in all then, the on field summer activities have been quite a success and this is in no small measure due to the undoubted talents of the younger members of our squad. This can only augur well for the future.

In speaking of younger players, how about the magnificent effort of the Wales under 19 schoolboys in New Zealand. It was a performance which brought great pride to Welsh Rugby and is worthy of the highest praise. Well done lads. Let's hope you can project the same success into the highest level of the game.

What's gone on off the field then? Well first and foremost of course is the fact that David Evans has taken over the captaincy of the club from Tim Crothers. David is looking forward to the season with great relish and enthusiasm. His pedigree is outstanding so let's hope he stays injury free for the campaign and he thoroughly enjoys his term of office. Good luck to you David.

Another very familiar face is also back on the scene in the form of John Scott. John has always held the club dear to his heart and it's great to have him back in harness again. He breaks new ground inasmuch as he has taken up the post of Team Manager, a position created to take us into the 1990s. It's a tough job to take on and John, amongst very many important activities, will also be called on to become anything from nursemaid to father confessor to the players. We wish him well too.

Further administrative changes see Alun Priday relinquish the Hon. Secretary's position to take the Chair. Alun has served the club as a player and administrator in the most commendable manner for nearly 40 years. He has held the post of secretary for the past 17 seasons during which time he has carried out his duties in a highly expert dignified and diplomatic manner. His forthcoming season in the Chair is an honour which is well overdue for him. We sincerely hope he enjoys his stint and it is one covered with success. John Nelson takes on the secretary's job vacated by Alun.

A casualty of the A.G.M. was John Davies who was not re-elected to the committee. John has also given valiant service to the club as player and administrator since 1964. His considerable experience will not go to waste however as he is now a national under 21 selector. He will also continue to look after our statistics — a job he has done since he took over from the late Danny Davies.

Right that's caught up with the out of season activities so what does this season hold for us? Firstly you have to shake off the habit of a lifetime because from today onwards Saturday kick off time has been brought forward to 2.30. This will ensure that our home games get full coverage on the BBC sports programme during the early evening which wasn't the case with 3 p.m. kick offs. Don't forget then, you have been informed.

Next we are delighted to have a contribution in today's issue from Mr. George Walker, Chairman and Chief Executive of Brent Walker who are, of course, our very generous main sponsor. This will be their first full season of sponsorship but already the relationship between our respective adminsitrations is first class. Needless to say we will always be very pleased to see Mr. Walker and his colleagues whenever they can make it to Cardiff.

At last then we come to the main business of the day, the visit of our great friends from across the bridge, Bristol. My apologies to you for such a late mention but as ever there's always a lot of information for the first home programme of the season.

One thing is for sure with their visit today, followed by Leicester home and then Bath away is quite a challenge before we go headlong into our journey into the unknown — league rugby.

Since 1888 Cardiff and Bristol have played on no fewer than 168 occasions. Of these, we have won 126, lost 34 and drawn the remaining 8. During this period a great affinity has developed between the clubs. Proof of this is the fact that Bristol is now the only English club we play home and away each season. Hopefully this situation will continue because the clashes between our clubs invariably serve up some blood tingling rugby.

Throughout the series victory for Bristol has been on a rather spasmodic basis. Prior to 1988 they had managed only 4 victories in Cardiff and had never achieved a better winning run than 2 consecutive games. 1988 heralded a purple patch for them however because they won a record 4 games on the trot which included consecutive wins on the Arms Park for the first time ever. We put a stop to that sequence last season however when we won our home game last March.

Bristol like ourselves have a very heavy Welsh commitment prior to embarking on their own league programme. They will no doubt use these tough games against the Welsh clubs to sharpen their reflexes in readiness to acquire a more favourable position than the 11th place they finished in Division I of their league set up last season. Another win at Cardiff would put them in fine fettle. We of course will also be looking forward to starting the season on the right note. In such circumstances then let's hope for another good old fashioned Cardiff-Bristol encounter which will live up to the standard of some of the truly great games of the past.

To Bristol then we say welcome yet again to the Arms Park, we trust you all enjoy your visit.





KNOW THE LAWS

By J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS

The International Board has decided that there will be no changes to the Laws of the game until after the World

However, for this coming season there are some minor amendments to Laws and Notes, resulting from previous rulings or interpretations, and these, therefore, will become effective on September 1st.

1. LAW 24B, OFF-SIDE

The off-side provisions for a player leaving a scrummage have been made similar to those for a ruck or maul. This is that "a player may leave a scrummage provided he retires immediately behind the off-side line", i.e. behind the hindmost foot of the player's team in the scrummage.

Last year's ruling on when the opposing team may charge a free kick has been incorporated into Law and has been made subject to advantage.

3. LAW 20. WHEELING OF THE SCRUMMAGE

It has been decided to retain the limitation on wheeling a scrummage but "when the scrum is reformed it is to be at the site of the stoppage with the ball to be put in by the side that has gained possession". This Law. apparently, will be reviewed again next year.


4. THE TAKING OF PLACE KICKS

"The use of sand or sawdust is permitted for placing the ball".

However, this is not new, for many clubs and international teams used sand and sawdust last season! The use of kicking tees made of sponge rubber or similar soft material has been accepted in principle and guidelines for their use will be considered at the next meeting of the International Board.

5. INJURY TO PLAYERS

"The referee may require a player to leave the field to be medically examined if necessary".
