



Cardiff v. Swansea

AND SO WE say farewell — at least on this part of Taff's Acre, otherwise known as the Arms Park — to yet another season.

There is, of course, the little matter of winning the Swalec Cup on the neighbouring turf next Saturday to keep us occupied for another few days and, indeed, supporters might well be interested in the Cardiff appearance in the Worthington National Tens tournament at Kingsholm, Gloucester, on Monday (further details in the Miscellany column starting on page 12), which sounds like good Bank Holiday entertainment.

But in terms of the nitty-gritty, not to mention hurly-burly, week-by-week round of Heineken League games, the curtain comes down on another fascinating season with a visit by the champions, Swansea.

We congratulate them on their worthy success — only two league defeats before today is surely statistical testimony to their strength and flair, particularly when you consider that injuries have on occasion hit hard in vital positions — and welcome warmly as always their officials, players and followers.

It is Swansea's second league title in three years and, by the manner of their success, few will begrudge them their triumph, based on a hard core of experience and yet with a fair blossoming of younger players — a combination which others are striving to achieve.

Here at Cardiff we have been creating such a blend — even a cursory glance through the statistics pages at the back will illustrate just how many of the Under 21s have had first team opportunities as well as having a successful season themselves — and to be in the top four of the league as well as in the Cup Final is scarcely an unsuccessful season.

"Winning the Swalec Cup would turn it into a memorable season," says skipper Mike Hall, "and I have a lot to be thankful for in the way things have gone."

"I would like to thank the supporters for their following and hope that they will give us that extra help next Saturday. I want to thank Alex Evans and the coaches for what they have helped us to achieve and I would like to thank the

players — and all connected with the playing side — for what has already been a relatively successful season and what can still be a memorable one.”

It is perhaps a marginal pity that the ultimate outcome of the league title does not depend on today's match but a slightly more relaxed atmosphere may help to produce a feast of rugby to remember with the best of the series between the two clubs which dates back to December 1876 when Cardiff won the inaugural game 8-0, largely through a disputed try.

In all, the clubs have met 267 times with Cardiff winning 138, Swansea 100, and 29 matches drawn. Cardiff have scored 2,339 points against 2,015.

Of seven league matches, however, Swansea have won four and Cardiff three.

For the future, Cardiff look to have what may be called a highly competitive start on next season's fixture list. The league kicks off with a home match against Bridgend on August 27, followed by Pontypridd (away) on September 3 and a visit by Neath on September 7. We travel to Swansea on September 24, receive Llanelli at the Arms Park the following Saturday and go to the newly-promoted Treorchy on October 15.

The visit of the South Africans on October 22 is then a mouth-watering highlight of the 1994-95 season.



TRADITIONAL MAGIC

FRESH BACK from North America and the atrocities of gridiron football, I met an old mate in, where else, one of those taverns in the town known as 'rugby pubs'. You know 'em. A faded photograph of Percy Bush on the wall, surrounded by the original paintwork. Or, almost inevitably, the 1905 Welsh side that beat the All Blacks, still gazing serenely out at us, the faces of young men long gone, framed forever in their pomp.

For me it is impossible to look now at a picture of the present Cardiff squad without reflecting that one day, maybe a hundred years hence, Mike Hall and Buddy will also be gazing out from a pub wall at our great grandsons if, hopefully, our rugby pubs survive.

No, I'm not trying to be morbid. What I am trying to say is that no matter who plays on it, this park stays the park. Or should that be *Park* — even though the REAL park to us ancients will always be the one next door. This park, I always remind myself, is the park where Wilf Wooller (who didn't do too badly next door at that) led Glamorgan to their first County Championship in 1948. And yes, I Was There, as well.

But where were we? Ah yes, in a rugby pub, talking to an old mate.

And how, I asked him (sounding like George V on his death bed asking "How stands the Empire", though everyone knows he really said "Bugger Bognor") and how, I asked him stands the club?

"We've got a young centre playing here," he said, "who'll make you forget Bleddyn. Name of Gerald Davies."

How that rugby pub still stands I do not know. The roof should have instantly collapsed at such sacrilege. I saw Bleddyn. I saw him score his record breaking 41st try in 1948 — mind you, the rest of the team had to

hang around waiting for him to arrive before giving him the ball bringing Blue-and-Black immortality — and as far as I am concerned no one, but no one, could be a better centre threequarter than Bleddyn Williams. And no centre pairing could come close to Bleddyn and Dr. Jack, who produced patterns on the park that Torvill and Dean couldn't emulate on ice.

But I suppose, as I watched him touch down for that memorable try in 1948, there were old stagers telling each other that Bleddyn wasn't a patch on Gwyn Nicholls. And when they watched Gwyn other old stagers were talking about Frank Hancock. (Let's not mention Monkey Gould or Albert Jenkins in this programme!)

In years to come the latest half-back geniuses will be compared unfavourably with Gareth and Barry as Barry was compared to Cliffs Morgan and Jones and so it goes. This is what we call tradition, and no club in the world has more of it.

Some of that tradition has been nibbled away by modern market forces. No one in a hospitality suite will ever FEEL the game as I felt it as a kid. And I don't suppose many kids nowadays nick into the ground as we used to do. It was easy then: climb up at the river end, the ruins of the old North Stand making it easy, and over into the ground, hang on if you could for the Dogs, pooled pocket money on trap six. But in later years my delight was to stand at the club end, behind the rails with men like Slogger Templeman — his old Uncle John nearby — and simply listen.

You'd come away wondering why Buller Sullivan ever went North while the Tanner-Billy Dach argument raged as though it had happened only yesterday. Tradition.

The magic was even more potent, of

THESE LAST few days of the season are exciting times for Colin Laity. The scorer of a crucial try in the quarter-final of the Swalec Cup against South Wales Police, he then both initiated and finished the move that beat Pontypridd in the semi-final at Rodney Parade a fortnight ago.

"We are certainly expecting twins," he says, "and the original date was June 10 but the medical people say that they are so large that they could be few weeks early."


Now, Colin is suggesting that Cardiff should be sponsored by Mothercare — or at least they should sponsor a special creche at the Arms Park.

Andy and Alex Moore, Owain and Angie Williams and Tony and Lyn Rees are all expecting. It is not all that long since Nigel Walker and Howard Stone became dads. Vince and Gaynor Davies, too, with their new baby Callum — and there's Mark and Yvette Bennett with daughter Loren.

Watch out as well for the engagement of another well-known Cardiff man.

There, isn't that nice? Team spirit lives on both on and off the field — a spirit which is particularly noticeable at Cardiff these days.

Colin Laity again: "I had thought that those successful years at Neath produced an unbeatable team spirit with everyone playing for each other — but here it's even better.

"I certainly do not regret the move (Colin lives in Thornhill and teaches at Penarth) and, after finding it difficult at first to break into the first team regularly, I am hungrier for the game than for a long time."

He attributes much of this to the coach, Alex Evans. "He has given us what I call a library or progression, providing the ammunition, but the players still need the attitude. If they didn't, they wouldn't do it. At Cardiff now, we have both the ammunition and the attitude."

Colin, known somewhat rudely by Steve Ford as "Five *rs*s because of a certain broadness in his beam width — breaks off at this stage in our conversation to ask a quiz question which might stretch the pundits.

What do his previous three regular partners in the centre have in common? Think, first, of Neath.

Answer: Bateman, Devereux and, most recently, Scott Gibbs all went North.

Going back to the irreverent Steve Ford's nickname, Colin takes some exception. "They get at both me and Mike Rayer but why not ask Mike Hall about it? My body fat is only about nine per cent where Mike Hall's is 15 or 16 per cent. I train hard and enjoy it."

Colin Laity, who was born in Helston, Cornwall, on June 19, 1965, has been in Wales now for 10 years, during which he had eight seasons with the South Glamorgan Institute and Neath, where he won a B cap, before coming to Cardiff last season.

Things did not look too good when Colin suffered a severe groin injury in the final match last year, and, indeed, he asks for special thanks to go to the medics who have seen him through various injuries: surgeon Brian Rees, former Cardiff and Neath — and Wales — player, Dave Shearings and Roger Evans, Keith and Ron.

Still, all is now well, touch wood, and the Laity fitness is likely to be more challenged by events this evening than by breakages, thoughts of twins or what have you.

Far from putting up his feet, Colin is due to attend two stag parties — of long time friend and drinking companion Jason Vigliotti and of a second Jason, his brother-in-law and former Neath and Swansea player Jason Ball.

Colin is married to Jason's sister and it clearly seemed a good idea to have the Cardiff-Neath-Swansea connections all together. A happy way to end a season — particularly if the Cup also runneth over.


FREE-SCORING OWAIN

course, when true Cardiffians — in later years men like Terry Holmes and Ringo and Mike Murphy — were playing. But years ago any Cardiff player, even to those of us in Grangetown who believed West Wales began in Ely, was a *Cardiffian*. Yes, even full backs with fancy handles like St. John Rees, though what we might have made of a Nigel in those days I don't know.

No man, of course, is greater than the game. Though after the semi-final I suppose Pontypridd fans might disagree, in the case of that particular game, at least. (Who knows, though. Neil might have missed those kicks as well.)

Here, though, no player past or present is greater than this park itself. The words are magic: Cardiff Arms Park. This is the one

DEATH OF MR. DUNCAN BROWN

DUNCAN BROWN, a product of St. Illtyd's College, Cardiff, who joined Cardiff Rugby Club in 1931/32 as a full-back and in that year gained his Athletic 'cap', has died in his eighties.

Duncan actually played 93 times for the 1st XV and was awarded his 1st Cap in 1934/35 but, like so many contemporaries, his career was cut short by the war.

He served many years on the Rugby Committee — becoming Chairman in 1955-56 — and later became a Vice-president of Cardiff Athletic Club.

Duncan, who was headmaster of Cwrt-yr-Ala School, Cardiff, from 1954 to 1976, was to be seen at nearly every home game with his wife Pat and they loved the atmosphere in the enclosure.

Just a year ago Duncan's sons Peter and Timothy presented a Youth Cup, in recognition of Duncan's 80th birthday, to the Cardiff Rugby Club to commemorate the fact that Duncan was the very first Secretary of the Cardiff Youth team in 1948.

KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS
queries the validity of some

rolling mauls when in fact the
ball carrier is not tied in.



WHEN IS A MAUL NOT A MAUL?

I have seen a few games this season where a pack of forwards have driven down field in what looks like a maul, but on close examination, the ball carrier is not bound in, and either has the ball in one hand or even behind his back.

I saw this happening on more than one occasion in the recent cup semi-final at Rodney Parade. Viewers and spectators may remember Pontypridd put together one 50 yard "rolling maul" which ended when Cardiff were penalised for collapsing it in their own 25. It raises an important point in Law, for it did not seem to be so much as a maul, but a shield or wedge of 4 or 5 players in front of the ball carrier. When it went to ground the ball carrier was still on his feet.

A maul is formed by "one or more players from each team on their feet and in physical contact closing round a player who is carrying the ball."

Nobody surrounded the ball carrier in this instance, yet Cardiff were penalised for something which did not exist. On the other hand, they may have been penalised for playing a man without the ball!


But a shield or wedge of players driving forward in front of a ball carrier who is not bound on his colleagues is illegal. Referees should be vigilant and deal with this obstruction quickly.

I do hope that positive steps will be taken by the W.R.U. to bring club coaches and referees together in a closer working relationship for, again, this season at all levels we have seen so much inconsistency especially in what players can and cannot do at ruck, maul and tackle.


