

Newport Rugby Club are proud to host one of this season's SWALEC Cup semi-finals, and we extend a very warm welcome to our old friends, Cardiff and Pontypridd, who will be striving their utmost to reach the final of this glamorous competition.

Both teams are doughty cup-fighters, and it will not be a new experience for either of them to figure in a final. Cardiff, in fact, have reached this stage of the competition eight times, and on five occasions they have succeeded in carrying off the trophy. Incidentally, two of their final appearances were made against my club. They lost to Newport on the first occasion, but defeated Newport the second time.

Pontypridd have yet to win the cup, but in 1979 they appeared in the final where they lost 18-12 to Bridgend. This season both Cardiff and Pontypridd have established themselves as two of the outstanding teams in Welsh rugby, and they go into today's cuptie with similar records in the first division of the Heineken League.

They have each registered 15 victories and one draw, and at the moment they occupy third and fourth places in the league table. Either could very well move into the runners-up spot before the season is over.

Between them Cardiff and Pontypridd have supplied Wales with some brilliant players for this season's five-nations championship, and this afternoon spectators will be hoping that these players, as well as their colleagues, will make the match worthy of its great traditions. We, at Newport, wish both clubs good fortune!

CARDIFF'S CUP JOYS — AND HEARTBREAKS

ON JANUARY 23 last year, I was scheduled to cover a cup-tie at Tenby who were hosting Swansea. Cutting short a longish story and journey, my car broke down somewhere approaching Bridgend and I was able only to limp back to Cardiff where I duly phoned the office to report the problem.

"Where can you get to?" they inquired solicitously.

"Cardiff Arms Park," I said.

"Who are they playing?"

"St. Peter's."

"Who are they?"

I attempted to "sell" the match on the basis that St. Peter's were a romantic side, named after a church and a feeder club to the big boys a mile or two across the city centre.

Reluctantly, the Observer sports editor accepted my excuses.

The rest is history. I sat virtually alone in the Cardiff press box and watched the biggest surprise in Welsh Cup history as the Division Three team toppled the First Division leaders 16–14.

Later, much later, that evening, my phone rang. It was the Observer sports desk to congratulate my car on its perspicacity.

On the equivalent Saturday this year, they came to me as if I were the font of all cup shock knowledge. Bet you can't find another one, they challenged.

Now, I'm reluctant to mention it and offend the hospitality of my Newport friends, but I said confidently that Ystradgynlais was the place to be.

The conversation was not dissimilar to the previous year.

"Who?"

"Ystradgynlais."

"Repeat that."

"Ystradgynlais."

"Oh, go on, give us a clue."

"Try Who strangled Alice."

And it came to pass that Who strangled Alice beat Newport and my name became synonymous at the Observer with being at the right place for the story.

In the year of the underdogs, perhaps I should be at Neath this afternoon to see whether I — or the car — can work some magic for Maesteg.

But seriously, as they say, Cardiff — and Newport despite a similar trauma on one occasion at Penclawdd — have not always been cup pushovers.

While Llanelli inevitably lead the way insofar as they have won the WRU Cup nine times — including the last three — and have appeared in 15 semi-finals in the 22 years in which the cup has been played, Cardiff have made 12 semi-finals, winning on eight of these occasions.

The club's most memorable cup years were during the Eighties, during which they won the cup on five occasions and were beaten finalists on another.

Their first final appearance was against Llanelli in 1973, the second year of the competition, when the Scarlets won by a comfortable 30–7 watched by 32,000 people. Alex Finlayson scored the Cardiff try, with Gareth Edwards dropping a goal but it was nothing like enough to counter tries from Ray Gravell, J.J. Williams and Hefin Jenkins, who were assisted by a conversion and four penalties by Phil Bennett.

Four years later Cardiff were back again, this time to be beaten 16–15 by Newport. Paul Evans and Bob Dudley–Jones scored tries for Cardiff, Ken Davies and Jeff Cranton for Newport. John Davies converted both and kicked a penalty for Cardiff but Chris Webber, now a Cardiff committee man, kicked both a conversion and a penalty which, along with a Leighton Davies penalty, tipped the balance Newport's way.

In 1981, Cardiff won the cup for the first time. Tries from another current committee man, Bob Lakin, and the triumphant Treorchy chairman Neil Hutchings, with two Gareth Davies penalties, were too much for Steve Fenwick's two penalties.

Next year Cardiff beat Bridgend again though the match ended all square at 12 apiece. Yet another present-day committee man, Ian Eidman, scored the only try of the match to decide it. David Barry kicked two penalties and a conversion while Gary Pearce kicked the Bridgend penalties and a drop goal.

1984 saw Cardiff back again, beating Neath 24-19 with tries from Owen Golding and Gerry Cordle, plus four penalties and two conversions from Gareth Davies.

There was a hiccough a year later when Gary Pearce gained his revenge. Now with Llanelli, he dropped a late second goal to edge his team in front 15–14 after tries from Alan Phillips and Gerry Cordle had put Cardiff ahead.

But it was Cardiff yet again the following year when Newport were beaten 28–21. Adrian Hadley, who, like Cordle, eventually went north, scored the first-ever hat-trick of Cup-final tries. Neil O'Brien had another while Gareth Davies contributed 12 points with his boot. Richie Collins, now with Pontypridd and formerly with Cardiff, scored a Newport try that day.

In 1987, it was Cardiff again — and for the last time to date — when they beat Swansea 16–15. Gerry Cordle again scored the try, Geraint John kicked three penalties and Mike Rayer dropped a crucial goal.

Those seeking pointers — and certainly those from Pontypridd — may show that Ponty have beaten Cardiff on the two occasions they have met in the Cup — by 9–7 in 1979 and by 13–6 the following year.

Cardiff, on the other hand, can point to two winning semi-finals at Rodney Parade — beating Newbridge 21-11 in 1982 and Pontypool by 24-3 in 1985.

Statistics and history, however, prove little in rugby football. Ponty will be determined to make what would be only their second final appearance while Cardiff, as we have seen, have been without a trophy for a few years now.

WHEN BACK-BENCHERS REVOLTED **OVER CARDIFF RFC...**

ON APRIL 17, 1946, the House of Commons was debating the entertainments tax and was wrestling from the Government relief from the duty imposed.

Some help was indeed given and the then M.P. for Cardiff South, Mr. James Callaghan, later of course to become the Prime Minister, rose to address the assembled Members.

"I join the congratulations which have been offered to the Chancellor of the Exchequer on this concession. In South Wales, particularly among the struggling rugby clubs, it is welcome as a valuable help.

"Speaking as one who has the honour to represent the City which has the finest rugby club in the four countries . . ."

At this point, for some reason, Mr. Callaghan was interrupted with calls of "No . . . no". Apparently the protests were coming largely from one of his own party, Mr. James Griffiths, who represented Llanelly (as it was then spelt).

Mr. Callaghan was undeterred by this protest from the West.

"I must appeal for your protection," he pleaded with the Deputy Speaker. "I repeat, and doubtless I shall be contradicted in later speeches if Hon Members do not agree with me . . . that Cardiff Rugby Football Club is undoubtedly the finest rugby football club."

Doubtless he was indeed further interrupted and contradicted. And perhaps the words were just a shade emotive, even for a politician. But whereas Cardiff may not — quite — be the "finest" club in rugby, it is quite certainly one of the best known worldwide, with its history dating proudly back to 1876 and its blue and black shirts having been worn with distinction by so many great players.

Certainly it would be pointless to attempt to list the international caps, for example, which have been won by players representing the Arms Park team: they would need far more space than could be allotted in a match programme.

Ask Cardiff fans of different ages for their favourites and they will all come up with different answers depending on their own generation for, even in the lean years, there have been heroes.

And nor, of course, has it merely been players of individual skill, even genius, that were produced.

Cardiff were also, for example the originators of the four threequarter system. Way back in season 1883-84 Cardiff were short of a threequarter for a visit to Cheltenham College, one of the stronger teams of the time.

They brought in a young man from Somerset — F.E. Hancock — who had moved to Cardiff and he scored the only two tries of the match.

When the team was selected for the next match, away at Gloucester on February 23, 1884, the committee were in a quandary. They did not wish to leave out any of the regular "three" quarters, nor did they want to lose the blossoming Hancock. They chose all four, the combination being so successful that the four three-quarters were retained for the remainder of the season, thus revolutionising the game which, till then, had been viewed as chiefly for the forwards.

Some may consider the game to be still like that but the Welsh Rugby Union adopted the system in 1888–89 with the other Home Unions following in 1893–94.

Cardiff, in fact, have over the years always attempted to play open and therefore attractive rugby. It is still the case. A glance at the Heineken League first division table today will show Cardiff in only third place, but with 81 tries scored — not only the most in Wales but 15 ahead of their closest competitors, Abercynon.

Last year, incidentally, and with 79 tries, Cardiff were 57 behind Llanelli's almost incredible 136 from their 22 league matches but still the second highest try scorers in the four divisions.

In recent years, the famous club has not, however, been as successful perhaps as in many previous decades. Two seasons ago, indeed, had it not been for the re-structuring of the Heineken Leagues with no-one dropping from the top division, Cardiff would have been relegated.

A change of personnel, a change of spirit and a change of attitude altered things to the point that Cardiff last season finished runners-up under their new coach, Alex Evans, an Australian bubbling with enthusiasm and ideas, and new captain Mike Hall.

Certainly, thrre is much talent in the first team squad. Mike Hall, Mike Rayer, Nigel Walker, Simon Hill, Mike Griffiths, Adrian Davies, Steve Ford, Stuart Roy, Owain Williams and John Wakeford have all represented Wales.

Derwyn Jones — at 6ft 11ins one of the larger players in the rugby world — Hemi Taylor, the naturalised New Zealander, Howard Stone, Mike Budd, Lyndon Mustoe have "A" caps and there are a group of under 21 and Youth caps thrusting through. The Cardiff Under 21 side, indeed, is having a fine season.

Not all the international stars, alas, are available today, missing through non-rugby injuries. Nigel Walker, the exciting former Olympic athlete who returned to the game after 10 years absence to score 14 first division tries in his debut year and who this season has added Welsh tries to his record book, damaged ribs in a car crash.

Hemi Taylor, the hard-working back-row man, limped off in the last round of the Cup against the South Wales Police and, within a few hours was on the operating table — for appendicitis.

Whatever Cardiff side is chosen today, they will certainly try to live up to the aims and abilities of their illustrious predecessors and to Mr. Callaghan's proud claim that he represented "the finest".

Cardiff have made little impression in the Cup during the Nineties, as can be read in another article in the programme, and the club would dearly like a meaningful addition to the splendid Trophy Room in the Arms Park clubhouse. They would also like to do it in style.

A great deal of Ponty's success this season has been due to the efforts of the pack, with captain Nigel Bezani leading the way. We have a solid and skilful front five, and an excellent back row. The set pieces, and particularly the lineout under the new laws, are key features of the game. They must be dominated if we are to get over this last barrier to the SWALEC Cup Final. Good luck to them all, backs and forwards, and may they be the best team on the day.

When the players take the field this afternoon they know that they will carry the hopes of thousands of fans with them. When the team wins they bring joy to households up and down the valleys and vales. Husbands or wives get special attention, kiddies get bought toys, the dog gets extra long walks, and the cat gets the cream. When the team loses, husbands, wives, kiddies, dogs and cats lay low for a while! Seriously though, the supporters do care very deeply about Pontypridd R.F.C., and they get a hell of a lift when it all goes well.

WATER UNDER THE BRIDGE?



SWALEC CUP CARDIFF v PONTYPRIDD

Cardiff and Pontypridd will know their final opponents even before they kick off in front of what is sure to be a packed Rodney Parade in the second of the day's semi-finals.

The clubs have met only twice before in the competition — and, strangely enough, that is twice more than Llanelli and Maesteg who have never faced each other in the Cup — and it is Pontypridd who hold the edge, winning 9–7 in a quarter-final back as far as 1979 and triumphing again, this time by a 13–6 margin, at Cardiff the following season.

Pontypridd will spend the rest of this week trying to ensure that Wales outside half Neil Jenkins, with a League record 269 points to his credit already this season, recovers from the left hamstring he tweaked at Swansea on Saturday, while Cardiff also have injury problems.

Jenkins, though, remains optimistic. "It was not too bad when I woke up on Sunday", he said. "I will have plenty of treatment over the next few days and I am reasonably confident of being fit to face Cardiff. There is no point in being negative but, on the other hand, I will only play if I know I have made a full recovery. This is a huge match for the club and potentially a great game to play in — I would hate to miss it."

Nigel Bezani, Pontypridd's influential captain and prop forward, had to admit defeat at the hands of a bout of influenza last weekend and missed the League match at Swansea. Defeat of any sort is not something Bezani enjoys and it will take a lot more than a virus to keep him out of the action on Saturday.

"I have tasted defeat in one semi-final and I would certainly like to win this one to make up for it," said Bezani. "Winning the Cup is an ambition I would love to fulfil but I have great respect for the Cardiff front row, all of whom, you could say, I know quite well.

"Mike Griffiths and I are old pals. We are both builders so we have a chat during work occasionally about various games and there must be a chance we will have another chat on Saturday at some time or another.

"Cardiff's young prop Andrew Lewis looks to be a fine prospect and has been very impressive but here at Pontypridd we are lucky to have hooker Phil John in outstanding form this season, while Andrew Metcalfe has been a revelation at prop since joining us from Swansea. It all points to a classic struggle."

Cardiff coaching director Alex Evans will wait as long as possible before naming his line-up but already knows he will be without Wales wing Nigel Walker, who cracked a rib in a road accident recently, and back row forward Hemi Taylor, who was rushed to hospital for an emergency appendix operation moments after the Blue and Blacks had booked their semi-final place with a victory over South Wales Police last Tuesday.

In addition, two more Wales internationals are doubtful. Wing Simon Hill has a strained hamstring and outside half Adrian Davies has still not fully recovered from the rib cartilage damage he suffered while playing for Wales A against Canada A last month.

"It is a bit of a problem to face a match as important as this with so many injury worries but experience has shown that our squad has plenty of strength in depth and the players who come into the side will be able to do the job required of them," said Cardiff captain Mike Hall.

Despite the selection doubts, Hall remains confident. "Pontypridd are playing very well at the moment but they haven't won anything yet, and it is our intention to keep it that way," he said. "We know we can beat them and they are certainly no Llanelli or Neath just yet. We went up to their place and won early in the season and there is no reason to believe we cannot do the same again. They won't even have home advantage this time."

All the talking stops on Saturday when it is time to turn the words into deeds. It is as simple as that, or is it? It will not be long before we know the answer.


