### Cardiff v. Barbarians

SATURDAY, APRIL 2nd, 1994 KICK-OFF 2.30 p.m.

EASTER IN CARDIFF would not be Easter without a visit by the famous Barbarians, which is just one of the reasons why they are welcomed most warmly once more to the Arms Park for the 110th meeting between the clubs.

Times are changing, however, as can be seen from a quick glance at today's other fixtures around Britain. Here in Wales the SWALEC Cup quarter-final ties are being played — or at least three of them are with our own home tie with the South Wales Police being rearranged for Tuesday evening. In England, Bath visit the Harlequins and Orrell entertain Leicester in the semi-finals of the Pilkington Cup while Bristol meet London Irish in the Courage League.

So much for a festival weekend of rugby. But so much, too, for so many potential Barbarians as the demands of major competitions with the fame and finance attached take priority position.

All these problems notwithstanding, one thing is certain: that we will see this afternoon some superb rugby played in the true tradition of the Barbarian motto, "Rugby is a game for gentlemen in all classes but for no bad sportsman in any class."

And this is also, of course, an afternoon in which Welsh rugby can actually benefit if the opposition score a number of tries. Or, indeed, just one try.

Scottish Amicable, the huge pensions, endowments and investments company which have sponsored the Baa-Baas since their centenary year of 1990-91, actually hand out £300 for youth rugby to the country in which every try is scored.

Since their sponsorship, the Cardiff game alone has produced some £5,400 while Barbarians appearances in Wales have totalled £21,000 in 'try' money.

The money goes to the WRU who have so far spent £14,000 of it on the Centres of Excellence while the Welsh Junior Union mini rugby festival—to be held this year at the National Stadium next door on April 24— has also been underwritten by the Scottish Amicable money.

That's not to say that we want the Barbarians to win necessarily but a high-scoring match is beneficial to just about everyone. And there have been some high-scoring games in the past, as can be judged by the fact that 2,900 points have been scored in the 109 meetings to date.

Cardiff, incidentally, have won 68 of these and the Barbarians 36 with five drawn games. The Barbarians have been successful on their last three visits but, before that, Cardiff had won four on the trot. For the even more statistically minded, Cardiff have scored a total of 1736 points in the series which dates back to 1890 (and Wilf Wooller recalls some of the immediate pre-war games later in the programme) with the Barbarians on 1167.

Not unnaturally, however, some minds — or part of them — will be on other matches being played in Wales as Cardiff still have the chance, if we beat the

Police on Tuesday, of a semi-final Swalec Cup appearance.

The bookmakers may argue that the Gnoll, where Neath meet Llanelli, will probably produce the cup-winners but our good friends up the A470 in Pontypridd would debate the point with some heat and some justification. They still, however, have to overcome Newbridge.

And could there be a first-ever Second Division finalist? Maesteg play hosts to

Tenby United in the other quarter-final.

Swansea, of course, are no longer in the cup but last Saturday's league results leave the All Whites as favourites while Cardiff, in fourth place with the most tries scored and the least points conceded, may still have a say in the championship's final destination. We conclude a hard week's work with a visit to Bridgend on Saturday but Swansea still have to come to the Arms Park on the final day of the season.



### **GUEST APPEARANCE**

NEARLY 60 YEARS AGO, WILF WOOLLER played his first-ever club rugby match in South Wales when he was chosen for the Barbarians against Cardiff. Here, as one of the club's most famous former players he recalls some of the pleasures and personalities of those prewar days.

### **EASTER EPICS**

THE BARBARIANS first played Cardiff on 31 March 1891 and won by 7-3, but were defeated the following March by 10-0 — and so the long unbroken (except for Wars) list of annual Easter matches among the leading Welsh clubs was established.

By the turn of the century Newport and Swansea had been added to the Easter tour which became the highlight of the Barbarians' fixtures and remained so until recent times when the league system intervened.

Since then it has not been easy for the clubs involved in league fixtures to release their players, and certainly not for a full Easter to include matches at Penarth on Friday, Cardiff on Saturday, Swansea on Monday and Newport on Tuesday.

This fixture was also the highlight of the Cardiff football season. So many of the greatest players in the rugby world have performed in so many epic games at Cardiff Arms Park.

My first Barbarians Easter tour took place in 1935. I was playing for Sale and it was the custom in those days for the Barbarians to take over the medium-sized Esplanade Hotel, run by Mr and Mrs King, right opposite the Penarth Pier.

The party of some 30 players, half a dozen committee and a number of former players of renown occupied the entire hotel. This was the perfect location.

Mrs King was delightful host and she never worried about what her precious Barbarians did.

The bar never shut when required to remain open — that is, except for the players who had to perform the following day. The touring rule was that they would be in bed by 11.

The Barbarians, of course, had existed, it can be said, many years before 1890, the year in which W P Carpmael of Blackheath made a successful invasion with a team to the powerful rugby lands of Yorkshire and the Midlands.

Immediately following the success of this tour, it was decided to form a representative touring team, players from all walks of life, and give the club the dignified name of the famous victors at Armanius over Varus and his legions somewhere in Germany 2,000 years ago.

A classical education was as essential in the 19th century, and Carpmael, a man of vision and exceptional organisation, conceived the idea of a team of players drawn from everywhere in the British Isles capable of playing rugby as it was meant to be played on the grounds of the great clubs.

The motto of the Barbarians was given by one of the earliest of their players, the Rev W J Carey. "Rugby is a game for gentlemen in all classes but for no bad sportsman in any class."

Over 100 years of Barbarian rugby we have underlined our faith and loyalty to the motto. It is a fitting tribute to the original conception that the pattern has been carried out by most of the rugby playing countries of the world.

On my first tour, which was the first time I had played club rugby in South Wales, the Barbarians defeated all four sides, Penarth, Cardiff, Swansea and Newport.

We were severely depleted by injury in the last game, in which we had to carry off

### Q: What happens now that the application date has passed?

A: All the applications — and they have come from Holland as well as Wales and England — have been studied carefully and a short list will be drawn up with a view to holding interviews in Mid-April and, hopefully, an appointment made by June 1 in order that the person is thoroughly installed by the start of the new season.

Q: Because the advertisement stresses that the new Chief Executive has specific responsibilities to the Rugby Club, do you in effect visualise a tracksuit managing director?

A: Not at all. His main role will be the drawing up and implementation of a strategic plan. He will be assisted in that role by the strategic committee — a five person group of which he will be a part, together with the Chairman of the Rugby

Section, Mr Peter Thomas (who is donating up to £450,000). He will be accountable ultimately to the Management Committee of the Athletic Club.

### Q: What are the main targets for the new Chief Executive?

The main target will be to ensure Cardiff Rugby Club remain as one of the world's premier clubs both on and off the field. These days on-the-field success is greatly affected by off-the-field business and an important task for the Chief Executive will be to generate new income, primarily for the Rugby Section but also to benefit all sections of Cardiff Athletic Club.

- A: No, the post is in no way filled.
- Q: What happens to the people currently responsible for the day-to-day running of both CAC and the Commercial Department?
- A: Mr Alf Heffell will be retained within a new structure and will be of tremendous value to the incoming person. In the Commercial Department, Tina Nash will continue to have a high profile and work with the Chief Executive.
- Q: The £50,000 salary package to the Chief Executive will come from money being donated to the Club by Mr Peter Thomas for the Rugby Section which will also benefit the players through a Trust Fund. Is a part of this offer also the return of Alex Evans as coach for a third season? And for how long will Mr Thomas' offer continue?
- A: At present, Mr Thomas has agreed to inject £150,000 a year for at least two years. This offer is not dependent upon the return of Alex Evans next season, but both the club and Mr Thomas hope that he will do so.

The money also helps to pay for Hemi Taylor and Jonathan Humphreys in their roles as Development Officers for the club whereby they promote rugby football within the junior schools of Cardiff.

- Q: By the time these salaries are paid, what is left for the Trust Fund? And what happens after two years?
  - Mr Thomas has initially said his donations/gifts would continue for two or possibly three years but it could be more. Up to half of the money will go directly to the Trust fund together with one half of the net profits of the CAC.
- Q: Will the Chief Executive administer the Trust Fund?
- A: No
- Who will appoint the Chief Executive and to whom will he be accountable?
- A Selection Committee, including Mr Thomas, his advisors and members of the CAC Management Committee, to whom the Chief Executive will be accountable. Other sections will not be forgotten. The committee who will choose him will be seeking to enhance the style, performance, profile and results of the complete club.

Peter Cranmer, who had been an opponent for Oxford against Cambridge and for England against Wales. We always enjoyed our rugby together both on and off the field.

The Barbarians that year selected Wilson Shaw, a Scotsman who had played for Scotland on the wing but the Barbarians chose him at out-half and led to a change of heart with the Scottish selectors who chose him in that position against England. It was a great success.

On that tour, too, I recommended the Barbarians selectors to suggest a comparatively unknown called Harold Sever on the wing. He would be a good man to have in South Wales.

He scored two tries in a 16-3 win against Swansea and next year was picked by England against Wales. He dropped a goal and England won 4-3. I should have kept my mouth shut.

It was a pleasant experience playing the light-hearted Barbarian rugby with players bristling with experience from: Ireland, Scotland and England.

I played again in 1935-36 when we lost to Cardiff through a dropped goal scored by Arthur Jones. I was not entirely pleased with my fellow centre Peter Cranmer who dropped my scoring pass five yards from the line. However, we beat Swansea.

By September 1936, I had moved to Cardiff, and was working in the docks.

I am not entirely sure why I arrived in Cardiff but I liked what I had seen of the city and the thought of playing alongside the immortal Cliff Jones, my Wales and Cambridge friend, was a deciding part. I have never regretted the decision.

For the next Barbarians Easter tour, then, I was a member of the famous Cardiff team. My old friend Peter Cranmer was in the opposition. We had been building up a pretty useful team after three or four lean years with an excellent out-half in Lyn Williams and a classic runner in Arthur Bassett.

We won 16-3. I scored two tries and a conversion along with a penalty. That remarkable all-round Cardiff player lanto Jones a friend for many years who weighed only 10½ stone and was a labourer in the team. At some time or other he played in every position from hooker to full-back and it was in this game that he stepped in when Duncan Brown was injured.

The following year, the Barbarians brought down a Springbok centre, especially to mark me. He did it very well... we drew 8-8.

The last season before the war brought a strong Barbarian side including Obelensky, the Oxford and English Prince, and an Irishman Loot Br Mayne, who eventually went to the war and collected a handful of medals.

The war started and sport ceased up to a point. I was stationed in the Cardiff Docks in a heavy A/A battery. We got time off to play for Cardiff when I was still captain and the final victory over the Barbarians by 16-8 in 1940.

My old Welsh centre and captain Claude Davey was there for the Barbarians with Haydn Tanner at scrum-half and Vivian Jenkins at full-back for the Barbarians; Quite a Welsh get-together. It was almost fratricide.

I disappeared to the Far East as a guest of the Japanese but the Barbarians continued to play a few games here and there until 1946, keeping up the old traditions. In the first full season, they returned for the Easter tour and defeated Cardiff by a narrow 10-9, even though Cardiff had those wonderful pair of centres Jack Matthews and Bleddyn Williams and at scrum-half was Billy Cleaver.

By this time, however, I was sitting in the press box, starting a career with the News Chronicle. I was also able to spend some time at the Penarth social headquarters where the Baa-Baas were down and invariably went to the dinner on the Saturday evening of the Cardiff game.

Looking back, I am glad that the breathalyser was a couple of decades away.

There is no doubt now that the Barbarians have many problems to solve because of the league structures started by all the countries and which are demanding a different format of fixture list and a presence of all the clubs' best players in league games.

I don't personally entirely like the system. I certainly do not like the adjustment to the laws, and particularly the mauls. And I think that the game has moved more to professionalism and is at the moment an understudy of rugby league.


I think I would prefer to look back at the Barbarian style and quality of rugby as the essence and soul of the rugby union game.

### **KNOW THE LAWS**

by J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS deals with some of the queries raised during the current season



Here are the answers, to 3 questions that have been asked during this season.

### QUESTION 1

A lineout is formed with a 1 metre space between opposing forwards. Before the ball is thrown in, all the players of one side move a further distance from the line of touch, creating a space of more than one metre. The ball is then thrown in. What is the correct decision?

### Answer

**PLAY ON.** The players have **not** left the line of touch. The hooker must remain on and throw the ball along the line of touch. Each team should remain in a straight line parallel to the line of touch. If individuals move out before the line out is over then a free kick should be awarded. The referee should insist on a space to alleviate the necessity for moving out.

### **QUESTION 2**

A player near his own goal line **catches the ball from a kick by his opponents.** He is held by several attackers, but **none** of them his own team, and is driven into in goal where he grounds the ball. What is the correct decision?

### Answer

No maul has formed and the defending player has carried the ball into his own goal.

A scrummage is awarded to the attacking side, 5 metres out from where he is held.

### QUESTION 3

A player receives the ball direct from a kick by an opponent.

Players of his own team bind on him before opponents form a maul from which the ball does not emerge. What is the correct decision?

### Answer

A scrummage should be awarded to the receiver's team.






