#### Cardiff v. Neath

SATURDAY, MARCH 5th, 1994 KICK-OFF 2.30 p.m.

NOT ONLY the followers of Cardiff and Neath will be watching anxiously the proceedings at the Arms Park this afternoon. With the Heineken League championship so delicately poised, the players and supporters of Swansea, the current table-toppers who are at home to Bridgend today, and Pontypridd, who visit Newport, will view the result here with great interest.

On paper at least, Neath might appear to have the best chance but, quite apart from today, they also have difficult away matches at Swansea and Llanelli to come. Pontypridd, the dark horses and the in-form team of the moment, still have to travel to Swansea.

The season could, indeed, go to that last Saturday, April 30, before this year's champions are known. On that day, Swansea come to the Arms Park, Pontypridd go to Aberavon and Llanelli entertain Neath, whose players, officials and followers we welcome most warmly this afternoon.

That last game will be an all-action replay for the two teams because they have this week been drawn together in the quarter-finals of the SWALEC Cup: someone, in short, will have a score to settle and Llanelli, while arguably out of the championship race and concentrating on the cup, will still have a major say in the league also.

With the quarter-finals in mind, spare a thought for Cardiff fixtures secretary John Evans. Last Saturday's defeat of Bridgend, whilst very welcome, presented considerable problems for Easter Saturday, April 2, the date designated by the WRU for the quarter-final matches.

Easter Saturday, of course, is traditionally the day on which Cardiff play the Barbarians and Cardiff had already sought permission, if needed, to play a quarter-final match on another day. Nor were the South Wales Police unhappy to change dates. And if Cardiff were not in the quarter-finals but the Barbarians were unable to tour — the Pilkington Cup semi-finals are being played on the same day — then the Wasps would be happy to come to the Arms Park.

The Police fear that all time-off will have to be cancelled because of the Swansea City-Cardiff City soccer match that day also — an event which would

brewers of fine ales

not only have stripped them of a potential team but also affected possibly Pontypridd (with Richie Collins and Greg Prosser), Llanelli (Emyr Lewis) and others. But they would have preferred Easter Monday.

This would have meant Cardiff fielding perhaps a moderate side against the Barbarians to avoid injury. No final decision has yet been made; watch this

space, as they say.

Nor are these busy times merely for administrators. Many players, too, have other major considerations. Those involved in the possibility of a Grand Slam — and this includes supporters also — will be itching for news from Paris where France are playing England this afternoon. Twickenham, here we come...

Still, it's the nitty-gritty of the League which is concerning us for the moment. In the seven meetings between Cardiff and Neath in the League to date, Neath hold the upper hand with four victories. Cardiff have won twice with one draw.

In the complete series between the clubs since we first met way back in January 1879, Cardiff have won 113 of the 197 played, Neath 66 and there have been 18 draws. Cardiff have scored 2117 points in that time and Neath 1550.

There have been during that time some memorable matches and, in welcoming once more everyone from the Gnoll with their familiar chant, although we might seek a reverse of result from our October visit to the west, we hope above all for an enjoyable afternoon.



#### CHANCE OF THE 'SLAM'

I HAVE ALWAYS urged my colleague, Paul Rees of the South Wales Echo, to maintain professional standards and the ethos of journalism by keeping out of his reporting any indication that he is a supporter of Cardiff RFC — just as I have always managed to hide the fact in my writing that I am an equally fervent supporter of Newport.

While Rees always struggles in this respect, I have no problem whatsoever in seeing rugby history in a balanced light — especially in discussing the outrageously fortuitous Cardiff victories over touring teams; their achievements, totally undeserved, in beating Newport four times in a season on several occasions (what can you do with refs like that); their lack of contribution to Wales teams; also the glorious Newport Cup win of 1977, all the similar achievements in the proud history of the greatest club in Wales. And they did it without a secret underground tunnel leading to other clubs.

Balance, Reesy. That is what you must have.

Indeed, there is absolutely nothing wrong with Cardiff that a sudden flash flood and tidal wave from the Taff would not put right.

However, even I am coming round. For a start, with the news of tidy trust funds being set up for the Cardiff players, I am now in full training for a dramatic comeback. Second, in certain circumstances, I am prepared to unite with Cardiff supporters in the common cause against the old enemy — no, Reesy, not Newport; England! I am quite prepared for the winning try to be scored by Nigel Walker or any other Cardiff player.

And when the dust had settled on last week's internationals at Cardiff and Twickenham, the whole shape of the season had changed. To be frank, until those matches I had never been able to see Wales winning at Twickenham. Never mind how big their revival, it seemed that they would travel only on a damage limitation exercise.

underestimated the excellence of Messrs. Davies, Norster, Jenkins and their colleagues.

And I diminished the profitability of Mr. Rupert Murdoch's newspapers, if only by a tiny margin. I had an open line from the Twickenham press box to Cardiff. It is exceedingly difficult covering an international rugby match as it is. When you are covering it while punching the air at random moments, it becomes almost impossible.


Before we get too excited, we should remember that England have the basis of a good team and that they played the Irish without their best player — Ben Clarke. Bath's back row man is so influential that his club are eight points worse off without him, and his country about the same. They still have great strength in depth.

But Twickenham is winnable. If England continue to play into the hands of the opposition and play the solid, but slow-off-the-mark Rob Andrew, if their backs continue to play as if treading in treacle, and if the likes of Martin Bayfield fail to resume their progress, then Twickenham is winnable. And from no-where, Wales have the Grand Slam. Nice thought, but not to be harboured too strongly until the final whistle.

But win or lose, things are moving, at last, in the right direction. The evidence was there for every English follower to see last Sunday. Rugby Special's English version showed the four Pilkington Cup matches. Apart from a few typical thrusts from Bath, the play was turgid, slow, dreadful. Suddenly, they switched to Wales for the highlights of Pontypridd-Swansea. It was as if someone had thrown the fast forward button. Here was action. It was fast, hard, aggressive, entertaining. It was a class above and for Welsh eyes, it was compelling and encouraging.

So perhaps we have turned the corner. Perhaps Paul Rees and myself will find more on which to agree.



out of the game for a year.

This in no way dampened his ambition to add to the two caps he had won earlier. "I was," he will explain tongue in cheek, "in the last Welsh side to beat Western Samoa but then, alas, in my second international we were beaten by Roumania."

The end result of this ambition was his decision to move to Cardiff in December as fitness returned and, he says, he is learning with each training session under Alec Evans and Charlie Faulkner. 

#### **KNOW THE LAWS**

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS looks at an area of the game which can puzzle spectators, players — and referees



#### THE STATIONARY RUCK

The stationary ruck is usually formed from the tackle situation, whereby players from both sides come into contact, as in a maul situation which then collapses.

The stationary ruck can cause serious problems, unless it is refereed firmly and accurately. What should the referee look for?

- As with most phases of the game referees must arrive quickly to the ruck situation. The
  referee should establish quickly the position of the ball. He should penalise opposition
  players who are prepared to kill or obstruct the ball.
  - I have frequently noticed that players involved in a tackle often move quickly from the ball or place it quickly when support from their team arrives immediately and a dynamic ruck passes over them. However, the same players are often reluctant to comply when they are defending tacklers, unlikely to win ball, often lying on the opponents' side of the tackle in order to prevent rucking. Referees should note this and penalise accordingly.
- 2. The intention must be to work "the ball" out not an opponent. Actions of players' feet who go in and down in a vertical direction, should register immediately with the referee. They are not necessarily going for the ball and this can result in foul play. The stationary vertical foot movement must be penalised and recognised to be different from the action of rucking i.e., with the toe of the boot, studs facing own goal and a backward action of the foot. Indeed the law prevents striking, hacking, kicking, tripping and trampling.
- When the ball is unsighted by the referee, the referee should blow quickly to prevent serious or dangerous foul play.
- 4. Referees should position themselves carefully. They are advised to face the ball and the non-ball winning players at all times.
- 5. But they should also remember that the same law should apply to both sides defending as well as attacking. Some referee on the assumption that the team going forward can do no wrong and the defending team can do no right


