Cardiff v. Bridgend

CONVERSATION, even among individuals not exactly rugby-oriented, has this week tended to be dominated by the splendid achievements of the Welsh national side last Saturday — and our special congratulations here to the four Cardiff backs who contributed so much: Mike Hall, Mike Rayer, Simon Hill and Nigel Walker whose last minute try (or the way to it) is photographed on page 8.

The result is that possibly not so much attention has been paid to the importance at domestic level of today's SWALEC Cup matches for the places in the quarter-finals.

By this morning, however, all that will have changed as, here in Cardiff, we welcome to the Arms Park those doughty cup fighters, Bridgend.

Over the years, we have met on five occasions in the Cup: Cardiff have won four times, dating back to 1973-74 with the only defeat being the following year by 6–4 in the third round.

But those bald statistics in no way tell the history of a series of matches which began in November 1881. Indeed, Bridgend, who for so long appeared to have put the evil eye on Cardiff, are, among the long-standing opponents, closest to parity.

We have met, in all, on 134 occasions with Cardiff having the very narrow advantage of 63 wins against 57 and fourteen of the games drawn. Cardiff have totted up 1387 points during this time and Bridgend 1210.

Cup day, though, is different and history is less likely to play a part today than is the special atmosphere which electrifies a knock-out match in which both sides may feel that their only realistic chance of glory this season is in the SWALEC Cup.

On paper at least, the draw was not particularly kind to the First Division at Dunvant, where Newbridge are the visitors, clubs with three matches at the Arms Park, and at Sardis Road, where Pontypridd meet Swansea in what some may feel will provide the ultimate winners, being all top-league affairs.

But that means, in turn, that glory may yet come from where it is least

expected. Can Ystradgynlais, for example, repeat their success against Newport when they entertain Neath? Could Llandovery conceivably catch the Scarlet holders suffering from post-international exhaustion at Stradey?

Even further west, Tenby United meet Narberth in what must be a rumbustious local derby but, somewhat closer to home and in what is currently by no means the epitome of current rugby success stories, there is an intriguing possibility.

Could Maesteg have two teams in the quarter-finals? The "senior" Old Parish side are host to Bonymaen while, closer in to town, South Wales Police make the short journey from Waterton Cross to Maesteg Celtic. The

bookmakers' prices are on page 7.

Coming back to the Arms Park, so many of the players from both sides know each other's game well as the result of cross-fertilisation that the brains of Alex Evans and his coaching staff on the one side and Steve Fenwick and Clive Norling and their henchmen will have been severely taxed.

Bridgend may have reached their cup heights when they appeared in four successive finals from 1979-1982 (they won the first two, lost the third and fourth to Cardiff, with the 1982 final decided on try count) but, more recently, they have been there and thereabouts. They were beaten in the 1990 final by Neath, who also beat them 28-10 in last year's semi-final after Robert Howley's two tries had given them an early lead.

All of which is history. Today will rapidly also become the past and we hope that, whatever the result, the quality of the play will enhance the traditions of both sides.



THE MAGIC OF THE CUP...

DURING THE 21 years of its existence, only seven clubs have won the WRU Cup, now sponsored of course by SWALEC. Only nine different teams, in fact, have appeared in the finals since the first competition in 1972, when Neath beat Llanelli 15-9

Llanelli lead the list of winners comfortably enough with eight successes, followed by Cardiff with five, Neath with three and Bridgend two. Newport, Pontypool and Swansea have each won it once.

The clubs unfortunate to have reached the National Stadium only to lose are Aberavon on two occasions and Pontypridd.

Swansea have been beaten finalists on five occasions while both Cardiff and Bridgend have fallen three times at the last fence. Neath, Newport and Llanelli join Aberavon in twice reaching but losing in the final.

The early days of the trophy were treated with suspicion by both the clubs and the followers: certainly, there was initial hostility against a knock-out tournament and the Arms Park was only a third full for the inaugural final: a far cry from today

when close to a sell-out can be expected if the big clubs win through.

Cardiff's early forays in the competition were not especially inspiring. Cardiff Training College were beaten only 7-6 in the first quarter-final before the club were beaten by Neath in the semi. Llanelli, with Phil Bennett's seven successful kicks at goal, beat Cardiff in the final the following year and we lost to Aberavon in the semi-final in that third season.

It was in this season (1973-74) that Cardiff met Bridgend for the first time in the cup, a magnificent match finishing with Keith James dropping a last-minute goal to win the game 21-18 for Cardiff, who had trailed by 18-8.

QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

AT THE MOMENT the Western Mail photographer took the picture (left) of Nigel Walker leaving for dead the French flanker, Quidnunc was on his feet cheering and waving his Welsh scarf in anticipation.

Well, you might ask, what is odd about that? Surely, there were tens of

thousands of Welshmen and women similarly placed?

Maybe there were. But, in the first place, Quidnunc is a phlegmatic

person, not usually given to displays of such basic emotion.

And, in the second place, he was a lone figure in a restaurant in Beziers, a rugby-crazed town in the South-West of France, surrounded by a horde of six-foot-eight former players of that club.

At least I saw the try. Nigel's poor wife Rachel, in her seat in the stand with baby Rebecca, is not a tall lady. Now, as the crowd rose to blow Nigel if necessary through those last yards, she could not see above the waving arms.

"I guessed he had probably scored when everyone started dancing around," she said, "and I have now had the chance to see it on television. But there's no doubt that Princess Diana had a better view of it than I did."

Speaking personally, I had a marvellous view from all those miles away and the French gentlemen, volatile Latins as they may be, were magnanimous in defeat. They were highly impressed that I had actually met Monsieur Walker.






Quidnunc was wearing also a Cardiff rugby top at the time and, as the club's totally unofficial representative at a gathering of former players into which I had fallen purely by chance, I felt I had to accept the drink on behalf of Messieurs Walker etc, etc, etc.

By the time I had claimed knowledge also of Messieurs Clement, Llewellyn, Moon, Jenkins, Davies et al, the evening was as out of control as it

was by then in the City Arms, no doubt, or, indeed, in Kiwis,

Kiwis? Well, trying to discover what life was like back in Cardiff, I understand that our heroes at some stage joined their fellow clubmates such as Hemi Taylor, Jonathan Humphreys, the Legend and another regular denizens of the joint, to listen to champagne corks popping in that New Zealand bar.

On recovery, around Wednesday, I spoke with Mike Rayer who was the one person who took a dim view of Nigel Walker's try. "That's my corner," protested the two-try hero of the Scottish match. "If Nigel wants to score tries, he should get them on someone else's patch..."

Seriously, though, and understandably, Mike was elated with the total performance. What is it really like under a high ball when a few tons of angry Frenchmen are bearing on you with no gentle intent? "You don't think about it, honestly. You have to say that's my ball and don't look at anyone else.

It was marvellous to beat England last year, it was brilliant to score two tries against Scotland but this French match topped the lot. We played sensible rugby and went 17-3 ahead with the result that there was no need to do anything flamboyant. Then, when the French came back at us, the crowd were marvellous just at the time when we needed it."

Mike Hall feels that he personally had a better match in Dublin. "This was a marvellous team effort but I think we have been threatening for some time to

deliver.

Nigel's try? I asked the referee how long there was to go and he said three minutes. They won a line-out, I think, and I was trying to get across to cover when I suddenly saw Nigel's little black head with the ball. Nobody could have stopped him then but I was still worried because the French still had time to come back.

But Quidnunc, as always, will let you into a little secret. When Scott Quinnell burst and passed inside for Walker to take the awkward ball and score, Nigel does not think that he was even meant to receive it. "Scott was," he believes, "trying to pass to Mark Perego."





MICHAEL BOON, Sports Columnist of the influential WESTERN MAIL, debates the ethics of amateurism within rugby Union's leading performers. Should they be allowed to earn money or are they...

JUST PLAYERS?

THESE ARE uncertain days for rugby football.

Is it still an amateur game? You can hear the sardonic laughter almost before the question is finished.

Is it, then — as England hooker Brian Moore says bluntly — a semiprofessional sport?

Or, bearing in mind the recently reported earnings of Will Carling (£100,000 a year that stems totally from his value as a rugby personality), a fully professional code?

The answer, in practical terms, is some of each. To begin, let's look at the first and third options. It is patently absurd to imagine that substantial money for rugby exists, or could ever exist, among those hundreds of clubs beyond the Heineken League's first and second divisions.

By this, I mean money in the widest sense... sponsorships and the like.

And there is only one Will Carling.
I am not saying that he is the greatest player to have ever picked up a rugby ball (not by a million miles am I saying that, believe me!): but he has everything going for him.

He is captain of England; he is London-based; he is highly articulate; he is extremely personable. In short, an ad man's dream.

The captains of Wales and Scotland are equally articulate, equally personable and, in my view, better players. But leuan Evans and

Gavin Hastings do not possess the royal flush of market place trump cards by (a) leading England and (b) doing so from a fashionable London club.

This is not a whinge. It is the way of the world and good luck to Carling for making the most of his opportunities.

Which, in a roundabout way, brings me to my friends, your friend, and everybody's friend Albert Francis.

He twinkles his way through life, spilling out intuitive commercial awareness as if sales and marketing had been his entire career.

They haven't, of course. He was originally a ground manager of Cardiff RFC's headquarters at the Arms Park and of the cricket centre at Sophia Gardens. What he had going for him—and you cannot quantify this priceless asset—was an ability to gain the complete trust of players.

After retiring as the commercial manager who brought this club's outstanding hospitality suites into being, he joined forces with Brian Williams, a tax expert, to launch Just Players.

In other words, to exploit *legally* the market value possessed by the Wales and British Lions quintet of Scott Gibbs, Robert Jones, Mike Hall, leuan Evans and Tony Clement. There are times when we all despair of Rugby Union administration ever arriving in the modern world. But Just Players is the way through this



KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS looks today at the refereeing inconsistencies connected with the maul and the need for communication



We continue to see mauls develop, players go to ground by whatever method and referees, at all levels, allow the mauls to continue for ten, twenty or even more seconds — waiting for the ball to become playable "in the interests of continuity of play."

LAW 22 is quite clear as to the requirements once players have gone down on one knee, or more, in a maul. "If a player in a maul goes to ground a scrummage is to be ordered unless the ball is IMMEDIATELY available for the continuation of play."

However, even our top referees still allow play to continue far too long once players go to ground in the maul. This can only stagnate play and eventually causing "penalty" infringements to develop.

In fact **sides are being penalised incorrectly** for such infringements such as "going over the top," or "playing the ball on the ground" or "over vigorous rucking." This happens because the law is not applied correctly.

Referees, therefore, must **not** allow "collapsed mauls to drag on. Setting a scrum would improve continuity. All referees need to act consistently on this. Referees should **COMMUNICATE** their intentions clearly.

When a maul collapses, the referee should immediately call — "taken in by — ——, ball not coming out!" This will alert the players that the referee is about to call for a scrummage. The referee should allow no more than five seconds for the ball to become available. If it does not emerge then the referee should whistle for a scrummage.

All referees should coerce and encourage the players to make the ball available at all times, and at all levels. Referees should rule according to the law on collapsed mauls. Players will then change their attitude, there will be more continuity and the game will be a far better spectacle.



strange mix of the professional, the semi-professional and the amateur who cohabit within the game.

Those, I admit, are not the International Board's definitions. But they are mine and, dare I suggest it, those of most other people as well. These are the prima facie practicalities rather than dancing around a form of words that protect the tradition of amateurism.

So, are Just Players and similar agencies an escape hatch through the miasma of rules more honoured in the breach than the observance? Some may say so. If they do, they cannot live in 1994.

They might, however, be dwelling in the 1950s and 1960s. For those not around at the time, tennis and athletics of that era gave birth to a cynical word... 'shamateurism'.

In my attic, I have a relic of those

days. It is a picnic hamper set awarded to a former mile world record holder for winning a race at London's White City. He sold it to me for, as I recall, £5.

He and his fellow international athletes traded all their prizes in such a manner to provide a modest income to cover training and travel costs.

They and tennis players also accepted under-the-counter appearance money from meeting and tournament promoters around the world. It was outright hypocrisy.






