SO MUCH seems to have happened on the Welsh rugby scene in the past few weeks that it is hard to believe that two months have gone by since our last home Heineken League match — against Newbridge way back last December 5.

Since then, the Welsh national side has confounded many of its critics by beating both Scotland and Ireland — there is of course the arguably much more difficult task of overcoming France next door on Saturday — and, at local level, Cardiff have moved on to the Sixth round of the Swalec Cup and gained a league point with an outstandingly courageous performance at Stradey Park when all had seemed lost.

Local pride, too, has also been sustained at international level with the performances of Mike Hall and "supersub" Mike Rayer in their Welsh jerseys. Let us hope that Nigel Walker will reclaim his place with style after the injury against Scotland and that Simon Hill, replacement in Dublin, will continue to be in the selectors' minds, along with Hemi Taylor, Derwyn Jones and others who are impressing at higher reaches.

Well into February as we are, therefore, the season is still filled with hope and promise and a win this evening would see Cardiff confirming their place on the heels of the pace-setters.

Our visitors, Cross Keys — and we warmly welcome their officials, players and supporters for the first time in a League match at the Arms Park — have statistically found it difficult in the First Division following their promotion last season.

Yet a closer look at their results show clearly how near they have been to elusive victories: home defeats have included 12-15 to Aberavon, 16-17 to Bridgend and 7-13 to Newport while they were beaten only by 23-20 at Newport. So close and yet so far...

There is, then, plenty of spirit in the team from Pandy Park — as Neath could have told you last season when they beat Cross Keys by only 24-15 in the quarter-finals of the Swalec Cup.

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LEADERS OF THE PACK!

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And, indeed, history provides a fascinating reminder of how fortunes can change, have changed, when Cardiff and Cross Keys meet. Although the Gwent club had been founded in 1885, we did not meet at senior level until season 1920-21 when Cross Keys won both matches played without conceding a point.

Cross Keys, indeed, won the unofficial Welsh Championship the following season but Cardiff did not play them again until 1928-29 at a time when Cardiff were fielding two 1st XVs.

One of the curious results of this experiment was that, of the first 10 matches played between the clubs, Cross Keys won eight with Cardiff managing only a single victory and one draw.

When Danny Davies wrote the centenary history of Cardiff, covering the club's statistics from 1876-1975, Cross Keys in fact had the remarkable record of having beaten Cardiff more times than vice versa. Of the 18 matches, Cross Keys had won nine, Cardiff eight.

True, the balance has shifted since then although the clubs have rarely met. With Cardiff's win at Pandy Park earlier this season in the League, the record shows now that Cardiff have won 12 of the 22 meetings.

International calls and injuries could mean that Cardiff have a somewhat ring-rusty, even experimental, look on paper. That in turn means there is everything to play for and, given the vocal support that the players seek so much and which was especially evident at Llanelli, there is the real chance of a highly entertaining evening ahead from this fixture which was re-arranged from January 3 after postponement through ground conditions.

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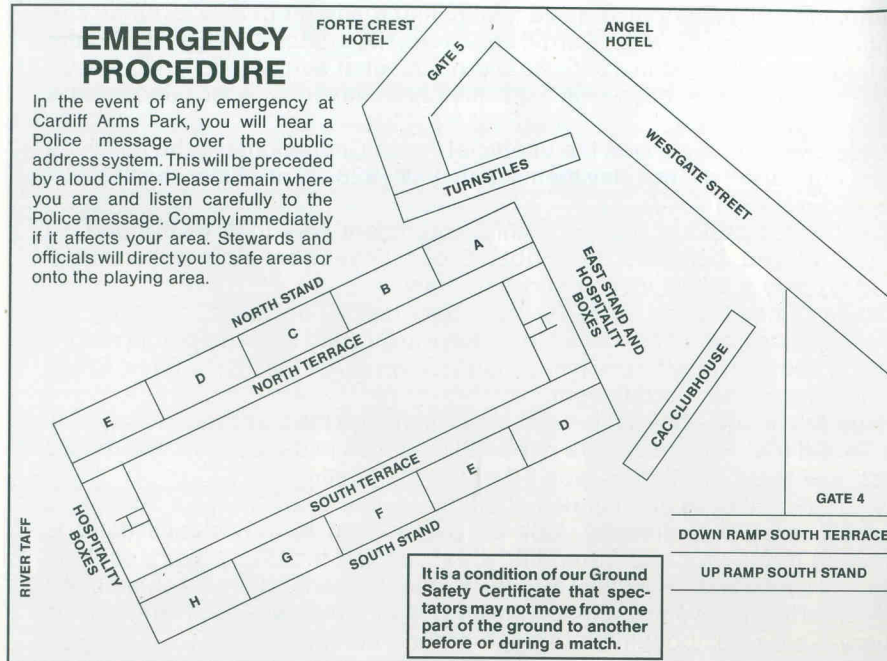
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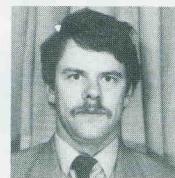

DOUBLE CROSS TO BEAR

I HAD a double sporting handicap as a boy: I followed Cardiff in rugby and Arsenal in soccer, two clubs everybody seemed to be willing to lose. When Swindon Town defeated Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup final, I took stick for weeks – and I have an awful feeling of déjà vu after Bolton's FA Cup triumph at Highbury seven days ago with another 3-1 scoreline the wrong way.

Arsenal have their marble halls, Cardiff have the reputation of being the greatest rugby club in the world; a self-appellation but they are renowned the world over. As a pupil at Llandovery College, I was surrounded by Llanelli followers. It was a Golden Era not just for Wales but for the Scarlets and there was no place to hide when Llanelli thrashed Cardiff in the 1973 Welsh Cup final.

There were consolations: Barry John dropping four goals to defeat the Turks in 1969, a 15-9 victory at the Arms Park in 1974 against a very strong Llanelli team and that unforgettable 25-15 Cup victory in 1977, but it was usually the Scarlets who took the spoils leaving me to face the music.

How I would have liked to be at Llandovery in the early 1980s when Cardiff inherited a streak of mean and the sun set on Stradey. Instead I found myself sharing a flat with a poor soul from Bridgend who just loved it when the time to play Cardiff came round. He is still in shock after the 1981 and 1982 Cup finals.

Watching Cardiff for the first time in 1967 was self-indulgence with players like Barry John, Gareth Edwards, Gerald Davies, Ken Jones, Frank Wilson, Keri Jones and Maurice Richards on parade. My father was from Neath and his father

was not impressed by Cardiff's flash, even if he secretly admired John Hickey. We were there at that September 1967 match between Cardiff and Neath which saw fixtures between the clubs called off for three years.

To my grandfather, it was proof that Cardiff did not have what it took. He was a big pal of Stan Bowes and Hubert Johnson, but stick him near the Arms Park and on would go his black tie with Maltese Crosses all over it. There was nothing he loved better than for Neath to defeat Cardiff and he never let anyone forget the 1972 Cup semi-final.

Despite the introduction of leagues, a game against Cardiff still provides an extra edge, but Arsenal could have told them it would have been like that. Watching Bridgend play Fleur-de-Lys in the Cup last year was instructive: the crowd sitting on the temporary stand were far more concerned with listening to a crackling radio describing St. Peters's efforts at the Arms Park than what was happening on the field of play. And when Cardiff lost, did it taste of victory.

Cardiff have not done too badly out of all the attention, even if some players have found it difficult to settle at the Arms Park. Far better to be loathed than ignored, but there is widespread admiration for Cardiff at, perhaps surprisingly, Pontypool where Ray Prosser eulogises about a "proper club".

Arsenal use their unpopularity as a source of strength, as a shield to protect their shortcomings. It has not quite worked that way with Cardiff who have always tried to live up to an ideal, but both clubs can be judged on what they have achieved.

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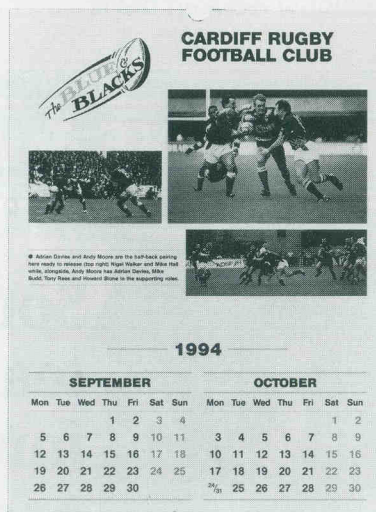
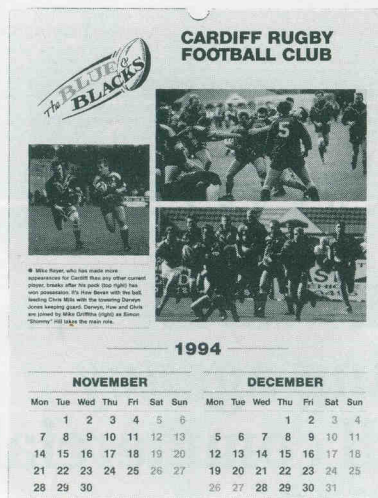
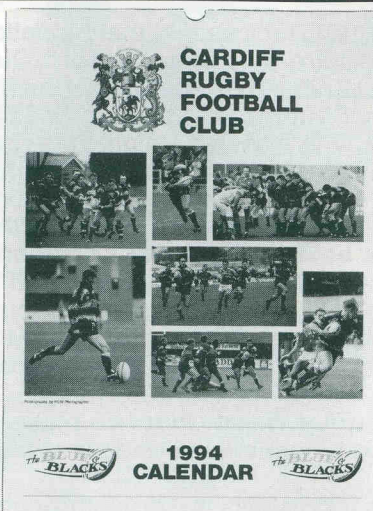
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QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN (continued)

And, coming via Radyr Comprehensive School as he does, it makes you wonder whether perhaps here we have the chance of another club-loyal man like Howard Stone, from the same North-East Cardiff suburban school and, indeed, cricket club.

Similar track record, too: school teams from 11 years old and onwards, Cardiff Under 13s and Under 15s and Youth... just the sort of (nearly) home-grown talent now being sought by such as Hemi Taylor and Jonathan Humphreys in their roles of development officers for the club.

TOP OF THE TRIES – AND TIGHT IN DEFENCE

VICTORY over Cross Keys this evening would put Cardiff, albeit temporarily, back into third place in the Heineken League first division with a superior try count over Pontypridd.

And although they are not arriving with the early season frequency – and, remember, we did run in six against Cambridge University on Saturday despite not being on top form – the number scored may yet have a value in end-of-season placing.

Cardiff have scored 63 league tries – 11 more than Neath, who have a game in hand, 13 more than Swansea, at the top, and 14 more than Llanelli. Pontypridd come next of the First Division sides with 44 while only Abercynon, with 51, from the lower leagues have scored more than 40.

Cardiff have indeed, with 502 league points, scored 61 more than their closest rivals, Pontypridd, while, to show the tightness of the defence, 144 points have been conceded. Only Builth Wells, at the top of the Fourth Division, have a better defensive record: 127 points against.

Statistics can of course be made to prove just about anything – or

nothing at all. They do, however, hold a certain fascination for many, which is why readers may be interested in just a few more from the leagues this season to date.

JINKS LEADS...

NEIL JENKINS, the Pontypridd outside-half who always used to watch Cardiff as a schoolboy and who names Gareth Davies as his childhood hero, is way ahead in the individual charts.

His 244 points place him 63 ahead of David Phillips of Caerphilly on 181, Byron Hayward from Abertillery on 179 and Cardiff's Adrian Davies, last year's top scorer, who is currently on 176.

They are followed by Paul Thorburn on 168, Aled Williams (164), Mike Lewis of Ystradgynlais (160) and Blackwood's Alun Hughes with 160. After that, only Luc Evans (Treorchy), Paul Parry (Builth Wells), Mike Barry (Kenfig Hill), Mark Watts (Maesteg), Steve Pearce (Narberth), David Rees (Newport), Phil Sutton (Tenby), Mark Thomas (Dunvant), Mark Ring (Pontypool) and Robbie Savage (Abercynon) have more than 100.

TOPPING the try-scoring list by a long way is Pontypridd's David Manley, who has burst onto the league scene this year with 15 to

Gary Snook of St Peter's comes next with 11, David Howells of Bonymaen has 10 while Neil Edwards (Abercynon) and Alun Owen (Caerphilly) have nine apiece. Half a dozen players, including Glen Webbe from Bridgend and Simon Davies of Swansea, have seven tries and then Simon Hill and Steve Ford are among a group on six, which included also Rupert Moon and Andrew Richards from Llanelli and Steve Williams of Neath.

AND NOW FOR THE CUP

AS THE SEASON grows even more hectic, Cardiff travel to Bristol on Friday evening for a friendly – and there is, by the way, a supporters club coach making the trip (book today) – on the eve of the French international next door.

Then, the following Saturday, Bridgend come to Cardiff to seek a place in the quarter-finals of the SWALEC Cup.

Such was the draw that one or two lower division clubs will fight their way into the last eight. Maesteg is the venue for two tries with Bonymaen meeting the senior club from the Old Parish while the South Wales Police meet Maesteg Celtic.

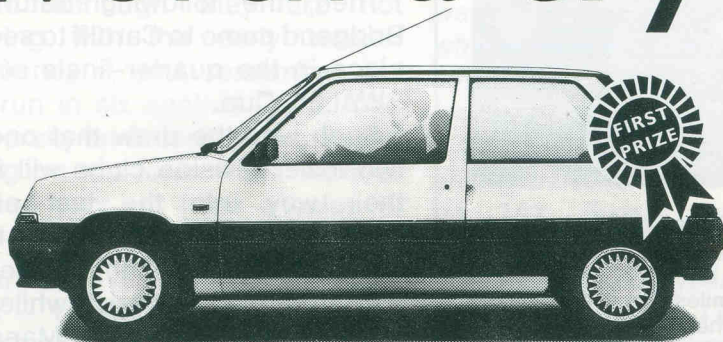
Tenby and Narberth will be fighting it out for the Pride of far West Wales, where Llandovery have to play at Llanelli and Neath face the short but difficult trip up to Ystradgynlais, who surprised Newport in the last round.

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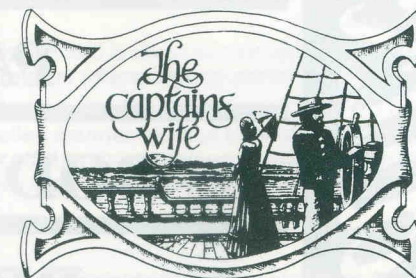
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KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS This evening, Malcolm asks some pertinent questions – and provides the right answers.



QUESTION A

A player arrives at a tackle, stays on his feet and is about to pick up the ball when he is driven off by an opponent. Should the referee intervene and penalise?

Answer:

The opponents must arrive in a controlled manner, attempt to bind on the player who is about to pick up the ball and drive him off, thereby setting up a ruck. They must arrive over the ball and not from the side and they are not allowed to hurl themselves recklessly at him.

QUESTION B

A team is awarded a free kick a few metres **outside** their 22-metre area. The kicker takes the ball straight back from the mark and kicks to touch from **inside** his 22. What is the correct decision?

Answer:

The referee should award a lineout opposite the place from which the kick was taken – for the player has received the ball **outside** his 22 and retreated behind the line before kicking.

QUESTION C

May a flank forward pack at an angle?

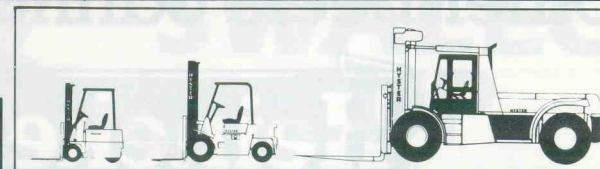
Answer:

A flank forward in the second or third row of a scrum may pack at any angle **provided he is properly bound**.

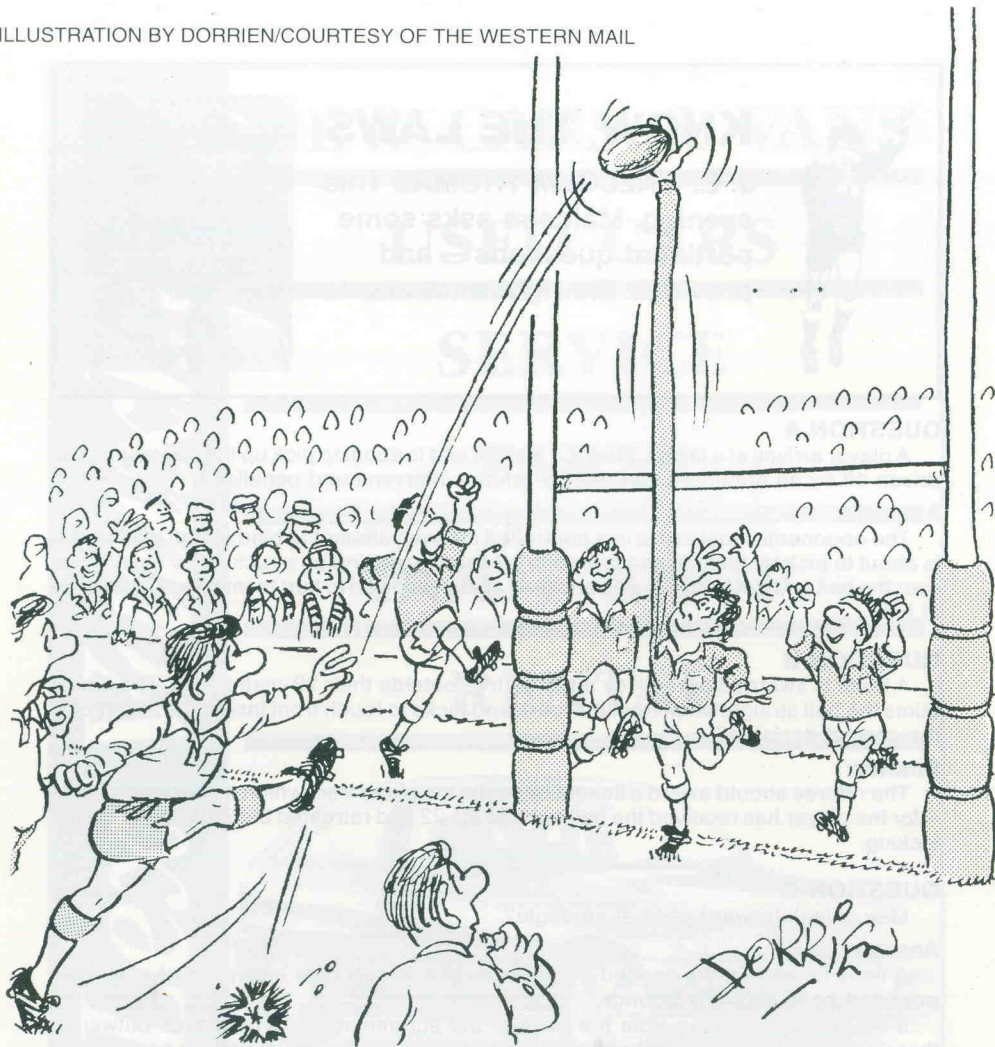
If the ball is emerging from the back of the scrum and he moves outwards, thereby preventing an opponent from advancing around the scrum, a penalty kick should be awarded.

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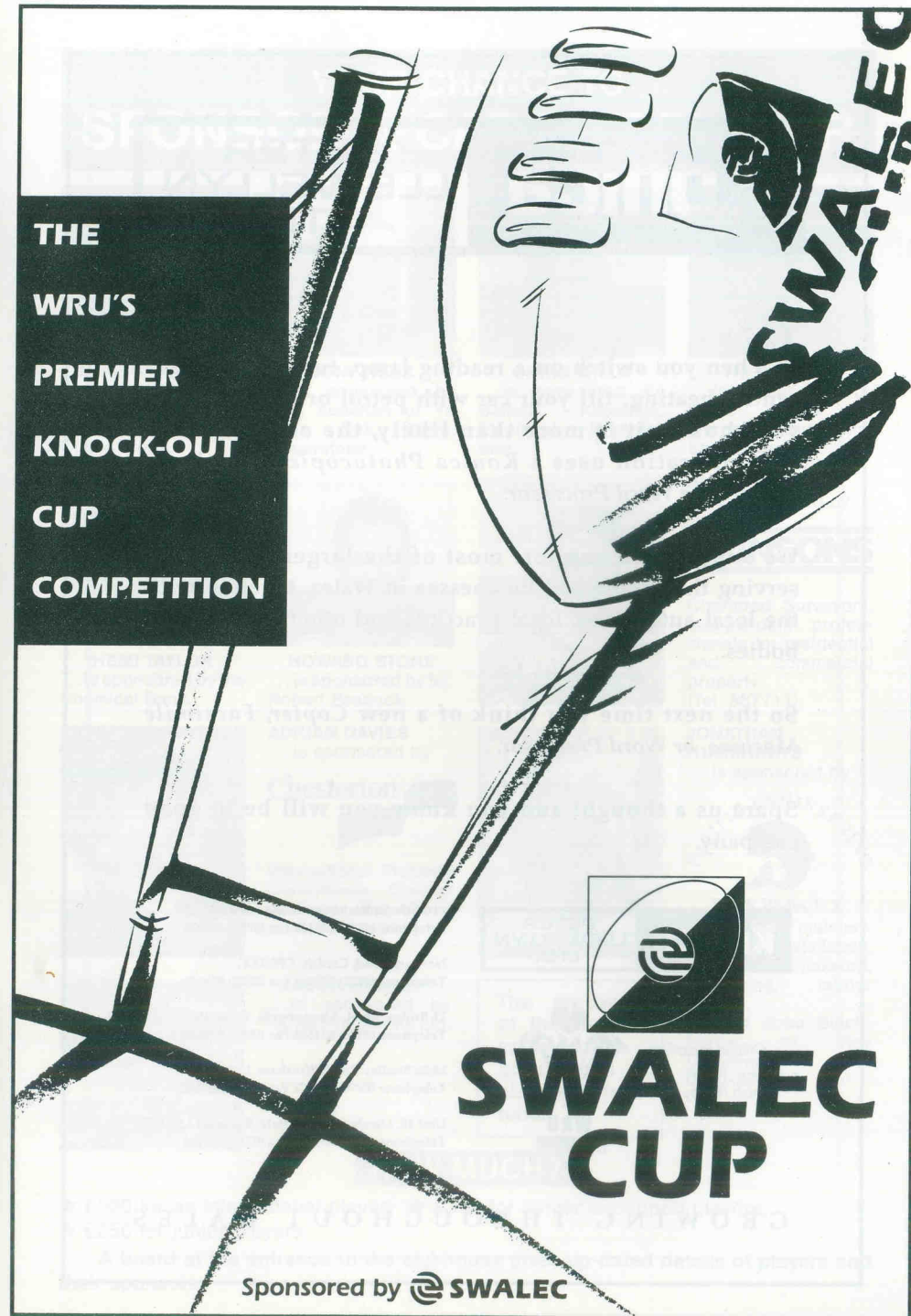



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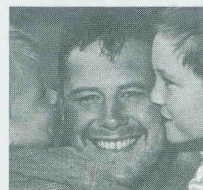
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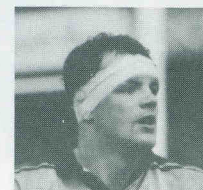
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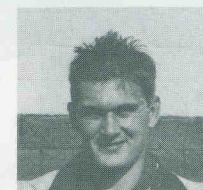
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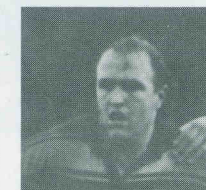
