Cardiff v. Pontypridd

MONDAY, DECEMBER 27th, 1993 KICK-OFF 2.30 p.m.

AND SO ANOTHER year of rugby at the Arms Park comes to a close with the traditional visit of Pontypridd for the Boxing Day fixture, even if it is in fact December 27.

It is a day to which a large number of followers look forward, an afternoon away from the turkey, the television and the trappings; an afternoon to take in some much needed fresh air, to gossip and, no matter the result, to enjoy.

Some will argue that the fixture has lost a part of its poignancy, its vitality even, since the advent of the Heineken Leagues but we can be certain that both sides will be seeking a victory, with, hopefully, rather more flair than the sterile match won here by Pontypridd on the first day of December.

Ponty are, in the eyes of some knowledgeable pundits, arguably playing the best rugby in Wales at the moment. A look at the league table shows them to be in fifth place but they have lost only three matches, one fewer than Cardiff and Llanelli — to ourselves early in the season and then, in November, to Swansea and Llanelli on successive Saturdays.

Nor is it merely the Neil Jenkins boot that is doing it. Certainly his contribution of 219 of their 361 points has been crucial but David Manley's 13 tries have clearly made him a vital man to stop.

Their emphatic Swalec Cup victory over Treorchy, high-flying and unbeaten Second Division leaders a week last Saturday, was also a performance of efficiency and, under the weather conditions, of flair.

Pontypridd's players, their officials and their vociferous but cheerful supporters who have made the short journey down the A470 are, as always, particularly welcome; the compliments of the season to them. And, to everyone, the chairman, committee and players of Cardiff wish a



TALKING TURKEY



COMPLIMENTS of the season to all my fat and bloated friends; nothing personal Sam, Colin and Duncan, it applies to us all at this time of the year. Anyway, the only amusement that we disciplined, thin, and miserable people have is to poke envious fun at our cushioned and contented acquaintances.

As we sit in the stand today, with the smell of expensive after shave we wouldn't normally buy, mingling with the aroma of cigars we can't afford to buy, wearing a ghastly tie from sister Sue, and even more horrendous socks from Aunty Kate that we suspect she bought in 1946 for her now deceased husband, we all should be full of pudding, booze, bonhomie and expectancy.

The expectancy comes from the anticipation of a cracking game, free from the restrictions imposed by playing no-risk and often tedious Rugby Football, created by the needs of the 'Heineken League Monster' that gobbles up those who dare and lose.

It is all very well for the SAS to quote "Who dares wins" — they don't have referees, and if they lose, they are not around to take the recriminations.

We need games like today's to remind us what a beautiful and simple game Rugby Football can be. That is always assuming that the players haven't forgotten their skills and sense of adventure.

There was very little of either the last time Pontypridd met Cardiff, a mere 26 days ago. Certainly not enough time has elapsed to erase the memories, possibly the scars, of one of the least entertaining games ever to be endured by those whose role it is merely to sit and watch. But then, I suppose the players think we are a pretty dreary lot from where they stand as well.

In the spirit of Christmas, let us give them the present of generous and impartial

support and in return they can give us a stocking full of tries, created by exciting and daring, running rugby. We wouldn't expect, and certainly wouldn't get, from two such committed adversaries a 'Kiss under the mistletoe' approach to today's game. There will still be the odd act of friendly villainy or upright retribution in the murkier depths of the scrum and maul.

"Boys wil be boys" and what they do in the privacy of a straining scrum, may not be romantic, but it is their own business. Just don't tell the referee, or the Editor of the Daily Mirror. Paul Sedgemore may not be Princess Diane, but don't expect the tabloid press to know the difference. The last thing we want are secret cameras in the scrum, or bugged Jock-Straps. No more at least than the bugs that naturally occur.

The Vice-Chairman of Cardiff RFC, John Evans, is an official of the National Sports Centre, where our boys do their weight training. He would be most upset if outsiders placed prying cameras in the rafters of his weight training room. 





WHAT IS THE CORRECT DECISION FOR **EACH OF THE FOLLOWING TEN OFFENCES?**



This is the time of the year to wish all connected with our beloved game, a happy. and more pertinently, a prosperous New year. To all the players and all the officials in all the clubs. To all those Welshmen who play over the border, and for England. To the referees and touch judges, who receive more abuse than bouquets. To those funny little men - and women - in track suits who run onto the field with bottles at every stoppage, to feed players with all the zeal of a mother with her first baby. To all the coaches, the good ones, and all the rest. To the teachers who teach the game in the schools, particularly those who actually teach them how to pass as well.

To the brave new Welsh Rugby Union and their dear departed. To the marvellous All Blacks, but not to those who did stamp, nor to those who didn't stamp — their authority. To the magnificent Press, who teach us all how to play the game, especially those who can actually think for themselves




