Cardiff v. Llanelli

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 2nd, 1993 KICK-OFF 2.30 p.m.

IT IS PROBABLY superfluous to say that any visit from Llanelli causes the blood to race that little bit more quickly; you only have to feel the enthusiasm of the crowd around you to realise that the Scarlets are indeed special.

Heineken League champions, Swalec Cup holders and with a daunting and romantic history, Llanelli have seen it all, done it all, whether it be those memorable victories over tourists or whether it be at domestic level. And they have always done it attractively, with panache.

Today, there is a little extra piquancy. Cardiff sit proudly atop the league with a 100 per cent record. Llanelli are a determined part of the chasing pack, having had an arguably more demanding start to their season.

Certainly, they have looked slightly out of sorts on occasions. Defeat at Swansea a fortnight ago dented both pride and playing record but they have also had anxious moments more surprisingly in home matches: against Pontypool and Aberavon, for example. Certainly, they have not yet been scoring with the same fluency that brought them 136 tries in last season's 22 Heineken League matches, during which of course they defeated Cardiff twice.

It would nevertheless be a foolhardy person who would suggest someone, somewhere will not shortly feel the full power of Llanelli. Certainly, under the burgeoning captaincy of the charismatic Rupert Moon and the influential coaching of Allan Lewis and Jeremy Cooper, it will be astonishing if Llanelli do not once more find themselves in title-chasing positions.

Both managements and teams will have looked anxiously at the Wales A match at Stradey against the Japanese on Wednesday evening: injuries and illnesses have upset preparations already, without further mishaps being added. These problems notwithstanding, there is the mouth-watering prospect of, as they say, a real cracker this afternoon.

Internally, there has been during and since the annual general meeting of the Cardiff Athletic Club a week ago a lively debate on future plans. Rugby Club chairman Mervyn John admits to being a "little blinkered" in seeking rugby success. "But suggestions that the rugby club is bent on running the whole Athletic Club are simply not true," he says.

"We wish to see every section progress but in the modern rugby game there are serious requirements on both the financial and playing sides to ensure that our future is not only safe but dynamic. This may mean that in some respects the rugby section will have to make unilateral decisions but members can be assured that nothing will be done without the opportunity of full debate."

The need for realistic finance has also led to the raising of charges for

today's match. "People have been given several weeks' opportunity to renew their membership or to take out season tickets but now we have to be realistic in our pricing and we still compare favourably with the marketplace."

At today's prices of £8 for a stand ticket and £5 for the terrace, Cardiff RFC compare well with Cardiff City and with the Cardiff Devils — and Swansea charged £10 for stand tickets for their recent home match with Llanelli.

"Today's prices will apply only to the major Heineken League matches," says Mr John, "with the charges reduced for less successful opposition and for friendly matches."

Back on the Park itself, Cardiff will be very aware that one victory over Llanelli in the two narrow defeats last season would have given them the Heineken League title: a win this afternoon would boost the confidence enormously for what looks to be a difficult away trip to the blossoming Neath a fortnight today. Today's other league matches, incidentally, see Neath visiting Aberavon, Newbridge at home to Cross Keys as both teams seek their first points, Bridgend travel to Newport and Swansea have ground advantage over Pontypool.



GARETH DAVIES, as Head of Sport, BBC Wales, must maintain at least outward neutrality. But how does he feel when his two beloved former clubs meet...

...and which is the greatest?

"T'was on a dark and dismal day In a week that had seen rain And all roads led to Stradey Park With the All Blacks here again."

THE WORDS of Max Boyce immortalised the Llanelli team of 1972. For a young 16 year-old from neighbouring Tumble, however, Phil Bennett, Derek Quinnell, Roy Thomas and Gareth Jenkins were already etched in an impressionable mind that had conceived and developed the principles of the game, but due to the eccentricity and the pure entertainment value of my scarlet heroes, had also determined an ambition — to don the scarlet jersev.

My first visit to Stradey was six years earlier when a chance invite from my uncle, Einar Morgan, to watch a midweek floodlit alliance match against Cross Keys kicked off my eventual insatiable appetite for rugby and especially Stradey Park.

All roads led to Stradey for me, every home match and, yes, I went through the order of ballboy, oranges-provider and autograph hunter.

In the process, I witnessed Barry John mesmerising the Australian "class of '66", the Springboks of '68 dispatched to warmer climes, and, of course, Stradey's greatest hour — 1972 and the All Blacks. I was most certainly there.

The inevitable lecture the following morning from my Headmaster, aimed also at another 300 pupils who missed school that Tuesday afternoon, had no real effect on my adulation of the scarlet jersey and, within two years, I played for the Scarlets in the Aberavon Sevens and enjoyed their post-tournament celebrations — looked after by Selwyn Williams. What a baptism for a teenager!

Carwyn James talked long and hard with me about settling with Llanelli, standing in for "Benny" as often as possible and interestingly wanting me to play at full-back, centre or on the wing to fully understand the options open to a flyhalf — an interesting thought which, in theory, "stacked up", but perhaps also ruined a few promising careers at Stradev, with this

obsession for versatility.

My naivity shone through at the end of my first home match — as substitute against the touring Tongans. I was handed the proverbial brown envelope—"expenses" said the treasurer. "No, there's no need" I said — "my uncle Einar brought me down, and I only came five miles."

If nothing else, I was a quick learner, and off to University in Cardiff, claiming expenses left, right and centre as any quick-witted student would do.


Stradey Park, I had left I thought, for only a short spell, but Cardiff Rugby Club soon compensated for my "hiraeth". To be on the team sheet with Gareth Edwards and Gerald Davies was some compensation.

Within a few months, after Llanelli officials had churlishly prevented me playing on permit in Cardiff, I returned to Stradey on a Wednesday night in February, full of expectancy and confident of my adopted Cardiff trouncing the Turks.

Gerald scored in the corner in the first minute and I converted — what a false dawn. Seventy-nine minutes later and 30-odd points from a rampant Scarlet team, made me want to seek a safe hiding place. No chance — my uncles and cousins and school friends all found me just to reinforce the great misdemeanour of my deserting the Scarlets.

Two of the foremost club sides in the world — to choose either as the Greatest would be treading egg-shells. To have played for both is memorable — as memorable as that dark and dismal day, in a week that had seen rain...

Derwyn Jones is indeed big. Nineteen stone, and fit with it, apart from that height, which worries me. As someone had said earlier in the day,



"Derwyn could be good enough to play for Wales so long as he avoids low bridges." Max Headroom lives.

Born in Pontardulais on November 14, 1970, Derwyn Jones was always a big lad. "It took a long time to deliver me," he says laconically — and size runs in the family. Father Elvan, who played a few seasons for Swansea, London Welsh and Maesteg, also sired 6ft 4in Rhodri, who won a Welsh Under 21 cap and plays for Tenby United, and Aled, a mere 17-stone, 6ft 2 ("I don't know where he came from") prop.

He went to Ystalyfera Comprehensive and went on to Loughborough College where he gained earlier this year a BSc (Hons) degree in Sports Sciences. He has played much of his rugby at Loughborough though there were also spells at Neath ("it was during their championship year and places were hard to come by for anyone who wasn't there every week") and at Llanelli (he looks forward to renewing some old acquaintances today).

Known to his team mates as "The Legend" or simply "Ledge" — coined, it is said, because of a legendary performance against the Barbarians — and by Charlie Faulkner as Dylan (because he cannot pronounce Derwyn, he says), the big fellow is surprisingly gentle off the field while learning now the street-wise necessities of second row work.

He watches soaps on TV and takes delight in being able to tell his family what will happen in a year's time because, during his summer playing with Alec Evans' Souths team in Brisbane he saw the up-to-date versions.

He plays a mean guitar — much more of this and Cardiff will have a guitar orchestra: Shimmy Hill, Junior Humphreys, Hemi (renamed Emyr since his Wales A appearance on Wednesday) Taylor all strum — and howls out Elvis Presley numbers like "Wise men say" when called upon.

He also has a remarkable collection of other people's rugby gear. "I swop everything," he says and, indeed, he was wearing a South African jersey as we talked. "My favourite is a Wallaby test jersey but I have swapped everything but my jockstrap in the past." Quidnunc doubts, nevertheless, whether he would swop a Welsh jersey if he won one. Not the first, anyhow...

Embarrassing moments because of his height? He won't thank me for saying so but an abiding memory is of an occasion when he overrelaxed while with Neath and appearing before a touring "court". He fell absolutely straight from his huge height to the accompanying shouts of "T-i-m-b-e-r..."

Like most rugby players, he does a large amount of weight training, drinks little, eats huge steaks and chicken, regards his father and Alec Evans as his major influences and is genuinely a nice guy.

Yet Quidnunc is worried. Very shortly, he and Jonathan Humphreys are to move into Cardiff to share a flat. Ladies, beware...

UNBEATEN YOUTH TO NAME SEASON'S SQUAD SHORTLY

THERE MAY be some anxious thoughts among those who have so far represented the Cardiff Youth XV because in the next few days a squad of about 25 names will be announced for the rest of the season. Whether in the squad or not, the lads have done both themselves and the club proud so far: the youth team is the only unbeaten side within the club. There are those, indeed, who believe that the team has the potential to become as good as the Mark Ring era when they carried all before them.

Under skipper Simeon Brunker, who made his comeback against Bedwas after a cartilege operation, they have proved a talented side — though Simeon himself is again injured, this time the other knee though not so seriously.

In the earliest stages of the season, neither Pembroke nor Dunvant provided serious problems. Dunvant, incidentally, have in Alan Bevan a 6ft 10 ½ in forward who had such difficulty in finding boots to fit that he gratefully accepted a pair from our own 6ft 10 in, size 13 Derwyn Jones.

A young Cardiff side then beat Bedwas. "We played typical schoolboy rugby," said one of the coaches, "and tried to run at every opportunity which led to an exciting game even if it was not part of the plan. We must remember when simply to get shot of the ball! Not a bad fault, nevertheless. And many "senior" followers were hugely entertained before the home Heineken League match with Dunvant a fortnight ago when we beat Coventry.

The visitors, with a typically large pack, were ultimately beaten through fitness on a warm afternoon. More typical of the way the side has been playing, perhaps, was the substantial victory over Glamorgan Wanderers when we ran in 10 tries, nine of them converted. We did not attempt penalties that day.

Thinking of Glamorgan Wanderers, incidentally, an enthusiastic rugby follower and a member of the Athletic Club choir, North Walian Tom Jones, has put up a cup to be played for annually between the

youth teams of the two clubs.

Last Saturday, the Youth team went to Leicester and played, to their excitement, on the famous Wellfield Road ground. Once more, the "English" pack was somewhat larger but we came away with a victory — though Leicester could just have won the game right at the end with a penalty from half way.

Not unnaturally, then, the team is abuzz with enthusiasm and, when they look at those past youth team players who have played for our 1st XV this season, they can see that ambitions can be realised. Howard Stone, Jason Hewlett, Chris John, Chris Mills, Andrew Lewis, Brent Wakefield and Paul Armstrong are just a few who have already worn the senior jersey after coming up through the ranks.

None of this, of course, would be possible without the interest of such people as committee man and youth team manager Jim O'Donnell who is quietly optimistic about this year's crop.

"We will not only be able to call on the squad who have to be registered," he explains, "but also there are many schoolboys, who can't be registered unless they are in the Upper 6th and aged 18 or over, who will be a part of the set-up. There are some players of real potential and they are well worth watching".

Plans are afoot for a showpiece match against a French side at the Arms Park on the eve of the France-Wales international. But more of that nearer the time.

In the background, cajoling, coaching, creating, are the dedicated staff such as Gareth Jones, Mickey Mawn and Hughie Smith, brother of former Cardiff star Carl, along with the rub-a-dub man Billy Woods, the everpresent trainer who, even after surgery on his Achilles tendons and unable to leap on the pitch, still travelled to Leicester last Saturday.

The Youth team, then, is in good heart and hands. We'll take a look at the Under 21s in the programme for the next home match with Pontypool.





KNOW THE LAWS

by J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS
Our resident expert clarifies
some of the points raised by
the amendments to the laws.



SOME LAW CHANGES CLARIFIED

A: TOUCH

 The ball is deemed to have been kicked directly into touch or touch in goal, if, from a kick it is in touch without having pitched on the playing area or without having touched or been touched in flight by a player or the referee.

This is **not** a change in Law, only of the definition of the word, **DIRECTLY**. Therefore, a penalty kick which bounces into touch **or** goes in on the full — will result in the kicker's team having the throw in.

Therefore, please remember that directly into touch now means on the FULL OR WITHOUT HAVING TOUCHED ANOTHER PLAYER.

Also, this season, a FREE KICK may now be kicked on the full from a kick within the kicker's 22-metre area.

B: LINE-OUT

- Players should remember that, during this season, anything illegal they commit to their own side
 e.g. lifting, support, peeling off, spacing will result in a FREE KICK.

 However anything illegal they do to the expections of hold much change chetruct will result in
 - However anything illegal they do to the **opposition** e.g. hold, push, change, obstruct will result in a **PENALTY KICK.**
- 2. It is also important for the scrum half or acting scrum half to remember that, as a "player participating in the line-out," he may run into a gap in the line out to take the ball providing he does not charge or obstruct any player in the line-out. Therefore, he can now jump fairly for the ball with the opposition.

There must be a clear gap in the line-out. If the opposition moves into that gap he is allowed to jump fairly and contest the ball. But he cannot run into the line-out and contest the ball from the opposition if there is no gap available to start with.


C: THE RUCK






