From Albert's Bottom to the top Echelons of Welsh Rugby

THE ROMANTIC story of the rise to prominence of today's most welcome visitors, Dunvant Rugby Football Club, is a plot which fiction and comic book writers would have rejected as being too removed from the truth.

Certainly, on a September afternoon in 1978 when the club played its first match in the West Wales Rugby Union Section E—they beat Resolven 13-9 incidentally—neither a player, nor an official or a supporter would have predicted that 25 years later they would be visiting on a regular basis clubs of the prominence of Llanelli, their giant neighbours Swansea, Neath or, indeed, travelling to the Arms Park.

Dunvant won promotion to Section D after a couple of years but were immediately relegated. Since then, howver, their steps have taken them ever upwards.

They won Section A in their third season in that division and were one of five teams promoted to the Second Division (now the Third Division) when the Heineken Leagues came into existence four seasons ago. A season in the new Second Division for entrenchment and then, last season, the Division Two title. There had never been headlines like it for the Broadacre club deep in the Swansea suburbs, not even when they beat Pontypridd 4-0 in the Welsh Cup in season 1984-85.

Dunvant had been founded in 1887 as a village team and played on various grounds before buying in 1966 Albert's Bottom—agricultural land named after the farmer who owned it and the low-lying nature of the ground—at what is now known as Broadacre. The clubhouse was opened on Christmas Eve 1972 and a new stand was built for this season.

But there's more to the club than that. In rugby terms Dunvant has one of the most sophisticated structures in Wales, with teams ranging from under-eight to youth and under-21 levels: as many as ten junior sides and four senior teams have been involved.

Coach Brian Thomas is under no illusions: "It's going to be awfully hard; we'd be foolish to think anything else," he said on gaining promotion, "but then when the league was introduced that was hard too."

And so, dramatically, they beat Newport in their first senior league match to a further welter of headlines. Things have been tougher since with defeats at Swansea and at home to Aberavon but Cardiff will be wise enough not to take them lightly this afternoon.

It is the club's first official appearance at the Arms Park: we say "official" because, as Dai Vaughan, Dunvant's president whose company Vaughan Sound also sponsors today's match, reveals on page 7, there was one previous occasion when his team took the Arms Park by

We congratulate them - and wish them well.

Back to the business of the day, however, and a further welcome to the officials, players and followers of Dunvant and to everyone at the Arms Park this afternoon, including the Coventry visitors whose youth team play Cardiff youth in an attractive curtain-raiser.

DAI VAUGHAN, President of Dunvant RFC, a roguish wit in great demand as an after-dinner speaker whose company VAUGHAN SOUND is today's match sponsor, recalls a liquid occasion on which his club invaded Cardiff Arms Park.

THE RETURN OF HMS DUNVANT

I don't suppose many people know that today is the second time Cardiff Rugby Football Club have entertained members of Dunvant Rugby Football Club. Way back in the mid 60's one of our club stalwarts, namely Chief Petty Officer Hubert Jones RN was serving on Her




Majesty's Submarine HMS Porpoise that was scheduled to make a visit to Cardiff. He duly invited all his brothers, a few friends and myself to visit the boat at Cardiff Docks.

Games were cancelled for the Saturday and the Dunvant party set off for Cardiff arriving on the submarine at about 9.30 a.m. Unknown to us the crew had been invited by Cardiff Rugby Football club to be their guests for the afternoon's game against Swansea at the old Cardiff Arms Park. Only one or two of the crew wanted to go so Hubert Jones invited his old Dunvant shipmates to boost the numbers for the game.

I must point out that this was after a guided tour of the submarine which took all of three minutes and a long session in the Chief Petty Officers Mess (a shelf behind a curtain), this taking up most of the morning, during which time vast quantities of beer were consumed. As a finale to the drinking session two old Corona bottles appeared containing, what looked to us to be old sump oil, but which later would be identified as navy rum at least 150% proof.

We arrived at the old North Stand duly fortified by the excesses of the morning, yours truly dressed in my navy officer's duffel coat (as worn by Jack Hawkins in the Cruel Sea) to be welcomed by the committee of Cardiff Rugby Football Club and to be shown into our executive seats in the old North Stand. After the game, which I think Swansea won, we were shown into the committee room for yet more hospitality. By this time I had now assumed the role of Commander Vaughan of HMS Porpoise with the Dunvant boys grading themselves accordingly from Lieutenant Commander, Lieutenant and Ordinary Seaman. After about one and a half hours of telling the biggest porkie's to the unsuspecting Cardiff Committee, Hubert Jones went pale and was obviously suffering from deep shock. When I looked around the reason was quite apparent, the real Captain of HMS Porpoise had arrived, whereupon we drank up quickly and made a hasty exit back to Dunvant.

I know that the welcome to Dunvant will be just as good today on our first real visit to Cardiff Rugby Football Club as the one extended to the motley crew in the mid '60s. Dunvant has come a long way since those early days and we feel most honoured to be amongst the great Rugby Clubs who have played Cardiff at Cardiff Arms Park.



Shimmy's a mean cook of pork chops and pasta, he trains hard. likes the occasional Guinness or bitter after a game, growls over Madonna, salutes magpies and insists on a bowl of cornflakes and two slices of toast before a match.

But he also goes gambling with Jonathan Humphreys and Hemi Taylor, a fatal error, and watches, would you believe, Home and Away. But then, like women drivers, not one of us is perfect. Even so, how did he manage to attend the wrong wedding reception last weekend?

CUP OF GOOD HOPE

On that day, they played for Radyr Cricket Club's first XI against Pontypridd in the Days Medical Alliance First Division.

Radyr secretary Chris Hitchings reports diplomatically that "only Howard really troubled the scorers with 41" while Andy Moore is reluctant to discuss his two-ball stay at the wicket.

"Howard has been a splendid bat over the years," says Mr Hitchings, "while Chris Mills, a local product who had just left Radyr School, is very promising though he did not play much this summer because of exams and the Cardiff tour to Australia.

COINCIDENCES OVER 100 YEARS...

Cardiff Supporters Club member Richard Hudson, has been delving into some historical details and uncovering very curious coincidences:

"I had been re-reading the rugby club chairman's report of last season and it crossed my mind to look back a hundred years to C. S. Arthur's History and Statistics 1876-1906.

I was amazed.

The entry for 1892-93 opened with the words "In consequence of the disastrous season of 1891-92, the members, in Annual Meeting assembled, decided on making a great change in the constitution of the committee..."

My curiosity deepened and I turned back to the season in question.

1891-92... "This was by a long way the worst season the Club has ever passed through, the losses exceeding the wins, being 14 to 13 out of the 31 matches played." "... Cardiff were never able to place the same XV in the field for two consecutive matches, injuries and the caprice of the committee partly accounting for this".

Injuries were to beset the club a hundred years on and again no settled team played from one week to the next. The chairmans report for 1991–92 opened — "What is there to say about a Season that has seen the Club return one of it's worst playing records in its history."

The playing records were - 1891-1892: Matches

played 31; Won 13; Drawn 4; Lost 14. 1991-92: Matches played 39; Won 16; Drawn 2;

Lost 21.

Because of the poor record of 1891-92 changes were made and the general committee was split into two—a Match and a Ground Committee. It was also decided to have a paid secretary at a salary of £50 per annum.

As a result of 1991-1992 changes were also made to the committee and a (paid) coaching organiser was appointed.

I am glad to say the playing records were much improved.

1892-1893: Matches played 33; Won 28, Drawn 0; Lost 5.

1992-1993: Matches played 37; Won 29, Drawn 0, Lost 8.

And 1893-1894? Well that's another story."

Intrigued by Mr Hudson's statistics, we looked up the record books. In fact, Cardiff won 28 of the 36 matches played that season, losing six and drawing one.

None of which of course proves anything. What Cardiff did provide in season 1893-94, in fact, was the complete Welsh three-quarter line — Biggs, Fitzgerald, Elliott and Sweet-Escott—against Ireland at Belfast on March 10, 1884.

Wales lost by a penalty goal to nil and Ireland won the Triple Crown.

safety reasons to transfer from one side of the ground to the other while matches are in progress.



KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS
Our resident expert looks
more closely at the reality of
some of the law changes.



SOME LAW CHANGES CLARIFIED

A: QUICK THROW-IN

Quick throw-ins cannot be taken unless the same ball is used. If it is touched by anyone other than the players or replaced by another ball then a quick throw-in cannot be taken.

If the quick throw-in goes wrong **for any reason** the opponents have an option of a scrum or line-out opposite the place where the quick throw-in was taken.

It is for the referee to decide whether or not the ball has been thrown in from the correct place. The touch judge should bow to the referee's judgement.

B: THE KICK OFF

If the ball crosses the opposing team's goal-line from a kick-off without touching or being touched by a player, the opposing team has the option of grounding the ball, making it dead, or playing on.

If the opposing team does not play on then they will have the option of **either** having a scrummage formed at the centre of the half way line, with the put-in **or** having the other team kick off again.

Players, coaches, spectators — and referees — are reminded that the option of having the other team kick off again is new for this season.

C: DROP GOAL

If a team takes a scrum in lieu of a free kick — they **cannot** take a drop goal until it has been first touched by the opposition. There is no doubt that referees are suffering under so many amendments. Gareth Simmonds was criticised after last May's Cup Final when a drop goal was awarded after a free kick.

The opposition may have touched the ball but Gareth was man enough to admit that he had forgotten the law — hardly surprising in the middle of a fast, exciting game.

But, once again, the law has been amended. It is an unnatural law change because, in theory, play can go through several phases from a free kick without the opposition touching the ball. Until they do, a drop goal is not permitted.

The aim is to open play up but not enough thought was given to the ramifications of the change.


