FIREWORKS DAY... and, at the risk of being absolutely corny, it is to be hoped that Cardiff did not use up all the crackers and whizzbangs during last Saturday's often coruscating performance over Pontypool.

How good to see and hear the crowd reaction — and has it made you wonder what might have been had we met the South Africans in front of a full and fervid house on our own ground.

Be that as it may, the colourful victory put Cardiff back on top of the Heineken League Division One on try-scoring difference (we have scored 26 against Swansea's 21), with a game in hand.

October, South Africans notwithstanding, was a satisfactory month with the three League matches bringing wins over Llanelli, Treorchy and Pontypool and only the Mike Rayer injury blotting really the scene.

Today's visitors — and how good it is to see Abertillery at the Arms Park again — sit uneasily at the bottom of the table but that in no way means that they can be taken easily. Their sole victory to date in the League this season was at Pontypool but they have been on the losing end by only two points (against Bridgend), four points (at Newbridge) and six points (to Llanelli) on other occasions.

In addition, they have scored 14 tries in their seven league games, more than Newport (five), Neath (eight), Newbridge (nine), Dunvant (11) and Pontypridd (12) and Treorchy (13) whose positions appear less precarious.

No wonder, then, that Abertillery spokesman Martyn Edwards, says, "We know Cardiff are formidable at home but we'll be going with a positive attitude as we know we are playing well and scoring tries every week." And, as you can read elsewhere in the programme, Abertillery have caused past problems.

There may, then, be a few sparklers and bangers then before the evening's celebrations really get under way.

Today, there's a joint welcome really to Abertillery, their players, officials and supporters, insofar as the match sponsors, whom we thank most sincerely, are Heath Wales, the huge insurance broking company whose managing director, Mr Ian Brice, is both Abertillery President and former Cardiff player, and whose Development Director Brynmor Williams is likewise known as former Cardiff, Wales and British Lions scrum-half.

We welcome them most warmly and hope that they and their guests — and all at the Park this afternoon — have an afternoon to remember with not a damp squib in sight.

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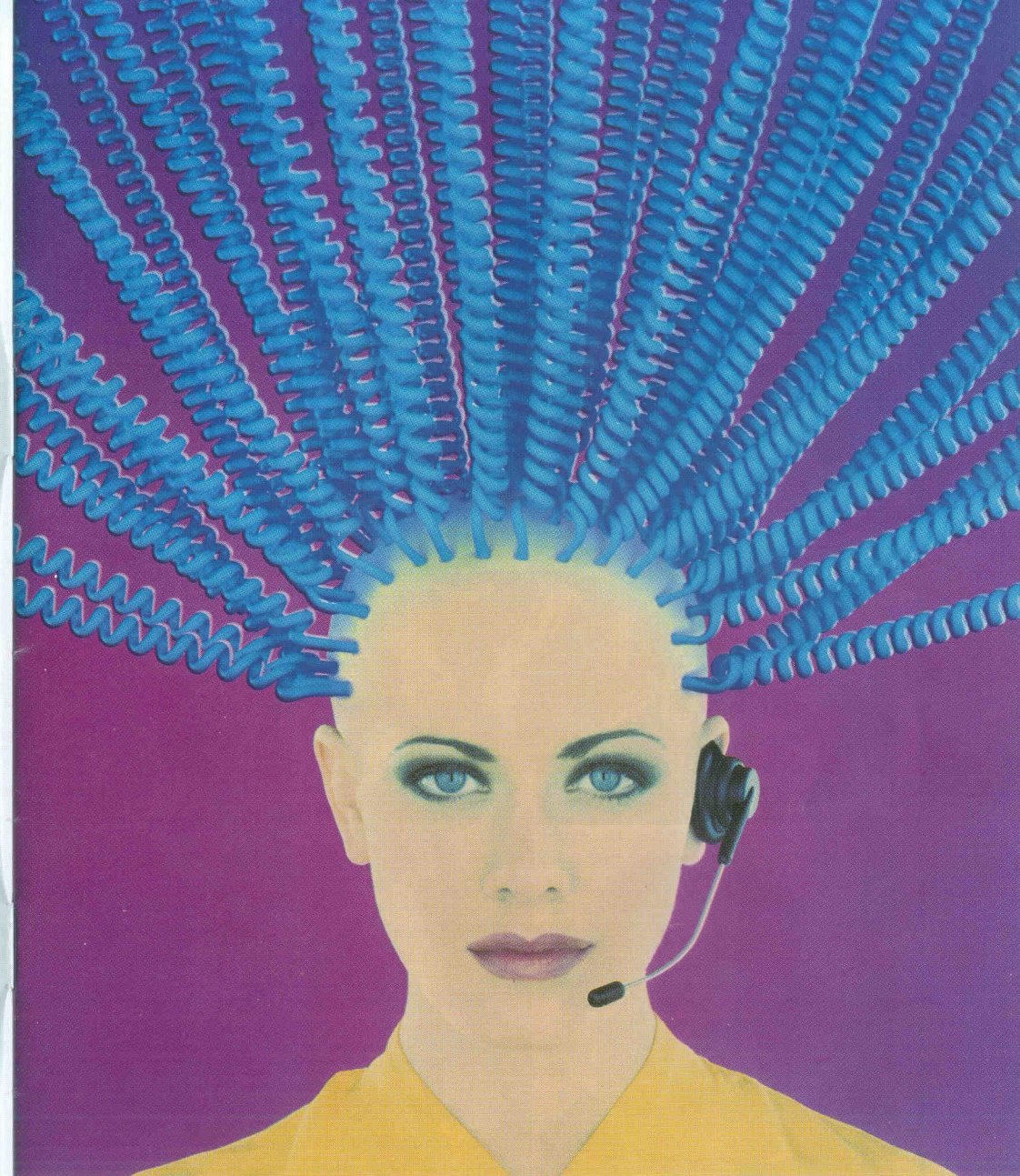


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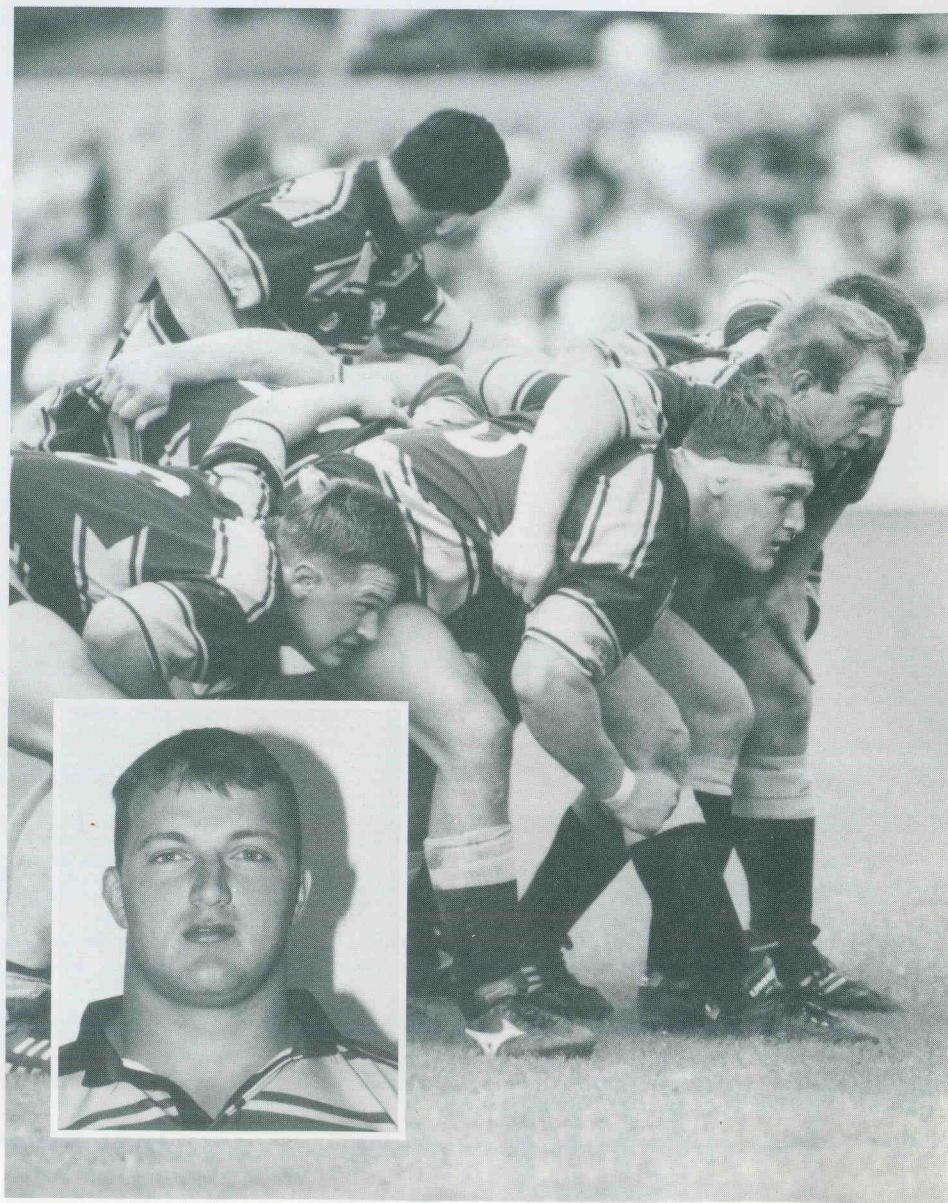

And that was his choice. "Dream, dream, dream, all I want to do is dream." There, and we all wondered what went on in the front-row, didn't we?

Recent competitions for naming a song for a Cardiff player had suggested "You must-oe been a beautiful baby" but I am not entirely sure that either of these would suit our hero.

Let's stay with the dreaming. Naturally enough, Lyndon wants to win a Welsh Cap — an ambition which was in no way harmed at Rodney Parade the other evening before he had to leave the pitch with an injury when playing for Wales A against the South Africans. The tourists both at Newport and the previous Saturday against Cardiff had duly noted the scrummaging prowess and technique of the 6ft 1", 16½ stone bricklaying prop who was born in Chepstow on January 30, 1969.

Like all props, Lyndon tends to have the mickey taken out of him by teammates who consider them to be a lower version of the rugby race — that is, the backs.

It was, then, somewhat unjust for them to haul him before the team court on the Australian tour for an intelligence test, to compete with Chris Mills as the thickest man on the trip.

In the test, the pair had to complete a jigsaw puzzle made for under 7s. Unknown, one key piece had been

lifted from the Mills' puzzle. "But," protests Lyndon, "I had finished mine long before he even realised he was a piece short."

In reality, after leaving Chepstow Comprehensive, he passed the City and Guilds exam in general building, which includes painting and decorating and woodwork as well as bricklaying.

But then you hear another story. He was sharing room 210 with Andy Booth in a Brisbane hotel when he discovered he had lost his key. He nevertheless gained entry and was puzzled on waking next day to complete silence. No Mr Booth, who is not the quietest member of the Cardiff squad.

On further checking, Lyndon discovered he was in Room 310, on the wrong storey. Dream, dream... and roommates have to double check because yer man will certainly leave something behind otherwise. Dream...

Off the pitch, Lyndon eats tuna, pasta, steaks, tuna, Indian, tuna, tuna, likes to watch videos (but he actually goes also to the cinema to watch films), drinks lager on Saturday nights only, doesn't gamble, watches the omnibus edition of Eastenders and particularly enjoys Soldier, Soldier — and, indeed, actually considered a career in the Army at one stage but turned it down on the basis that it would do nothing for his rugby career but, primarily, because "they do not pay overtime."

He doesn't gamble, preferring to put his money into property as a house owner, is a hard and enthusiastic trainer either with Cardiff or on the weights at Chepstow Rugby Club with whom he maintains a close relationship.

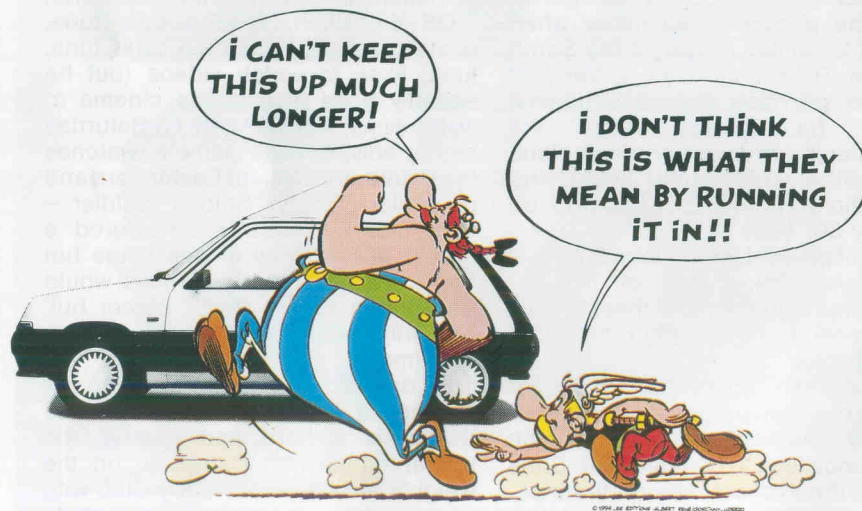

After starting rugby at 11 as a No 8, flanking for Newport Districts at 13 and 14 and moving up to prop with Gwent Schools at 15, he joined Chepstow Youth where "only three or four of us trained hard but we won matches. It was only when the others started to take it seriously that we began to lose..."

Thus the call came from Pontypool where Graham Price was coming to the end of his career and where John Perkins and Staff Jones were also to be of tremendous help, along with a training regime which was, to put it mildly, horrific but to which Lyndon took with no problem.

Under 21 caps followed the Under 19 and Under 20s, and they in turn were followed by Wales A last season where he played in four of their five victories.

In between came a really memorable

moment in his life. He went to Eastern Province in South Africa to help develop the game especially in the townships. Here he came across the last vestiges of apartheid. On one occasion, white parents would not let black boys wear team jerseys.

"Some of those townships were horrible," he says, "but the welcome I had from the blacks near Port Elizabeth was remarkable. The youngsters could not believe I was there really to try to help them. the whole trip broadened my horizons." Lyndon Mustoe is not just a pretty prop; he thinks deeply and seriously about many issues.

He came to Cardiff to "further my horizons, to try to win a Welsh cap and to try to win the League and Cup double..."

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GERAINT JOHN... back in action last week.

GERAINT MOVES UP A LEAGUE — OR THREE

WHEN, in March 1991, Geraint John had a bad knee injury playing for Cardiff against Pontypool, he thought his playing career might have come to a premature end.

Certainly when, not long afterwards, a bad car crash saw him thrown through the windscreen, the former Wales "B" cap must have wondered whether he would ever kick a ball again.

Things got better with the result that he was able to have a couple of seasons with the Cardiff Quins — playing 15 matches last season.

"Yes, I'm afraid I helped them towards relegation," he admitted this week, "and clearly did not think that, this season, I would be playing for the top of the First Division side."

Last Saturday, of course, the 32-year-old was called up by Cardiff to play in the centre — against Pontypool ironically — and thoroughly enjoyed his return to the big time. "Mind you, I felt it in the last 10 minutes," he admitted after a match in which the ball was thrown about with some panache.

"And I'd be delighted to play again, wherever and whenever." Indeed he turned out at fly-half at Penarth on Wednesday and scored a try.

The likeable Geraint has since June 1990 been a development officer for the Welsh Rugby Union, seeking to promote the game throughout the East District — and not only to youngsters.

"Whereas, because Wales is not necessarily going to be able to produce players of the physical size of some other countries, we try to develop the creative skills where kicking and scrummaging is limited.

"Yes, there are some tremendous youngsters around at Under 15 up to Under 18 levels but our job is also to create a coaching education structure whereby the parents, those who help clubs run teams on a Sunday morning, perhaps, also have the basics to pass on, even if they have hardly played the game in their lives.

"This goes for women, too, because many of them run junior sides. In fact, from a course of 44 we had last week, ten of them were women. So, from the Under 8s upwards, we are building creative, running skills."

Geraint did have one game for Cardiff last season — at Maesteg on permit — but we'll bet there'll be more to come this time.

CARDIFF v. ABERTILLERY

SURPRISINGLY perhaps, Cardiff and Abertillery have met only 18 times over the years.

And it may surprise younger followers in particular to learn that Abertillery won six of the first seven matches played between the clubs.

Cardiff can, perhaps, claim that there is a major reason behind these statistics. When the first meeting took place in season 1926-27, the Cardiff committee had decided to run two First Fifteens and to dispense with the second team known as Cardiff Reserves.

The experiment failed after five seasons as opposing clubs became apprehensive as to which fifteen would appear with treasurers and supporters alike sceptical.

On December 11, 1926, for example, on that first meeting, Cardiff were losing 8-6 at home to Abertillery as Cardiff were also losing 6-3 at Llanelli.

IN TOUCH WITH GROUND CONTROL

IF YOU admire the state of the Arms Park — or if you have ever contemplated the condition of Sophia Gardens or the bowling greens, then you must have considered the work of the ground staff.

Bryan Walker, ground manager, and his five-man team, are responsible not only for the trim condition of the turf but for everything that goes on within the 13-plus acres that comprise the Arms Park, Sophia Gardens and so on... maintenance, upkeep, painting, even ensuring that the team kit is prepared and, for away matches, is actually on board the coach (not all that many years ago, the Rags did leave without their gear but it caught up with them.).

The 44-year-old pipe-smoking Bryan served his groundsman's apprenticeship in the traditional schools of the golf course (at Dinas Powys), and at Ninian Park (under Bill Hardiman) before coming to the Arms Park eight years ago.

He finds rugby pitches relatively simple in comparison with some.

For example, while he was groundsman at Ninian Park, he had to mark the pitch out for American Football games. Such is the complicated gridiron system that students at the Cardiff College of

Higher Education calculated that there were five miles of lines to be marked. (A Rugby Union pitch, he believes, is somewhere between a mile and two miles).

And worse. Cardiff City shared Ninian Park with a rugby league side which meant altering all the markings at least twice and sometimes three times a week for matches and training.

Only one major brick does he recall dropping with horror and that was in his early days.

Cardiff City trained on nearby Coronation Park and Bryan had to mark out the pitch. He was virtually ignorant of soccer at the time and marked the semi-circle which should appear on the edge of the 18 yard box on the edge of the goal area instead.

Those who remember City manager Jimmy Scouler can guess at least a part of the language.

"Here at the Arms Park," says Bryan, "it's marvellous to be involved in the team. Bill Hardiman and Albert Francis are hard acts to follow but I try to help in whatever way I can — quite apart from looking after the grounds."

His most exciting moment? Curiously, "the visit of the Pope to Ninian Park. Even though I am not a

CARDIFF v. ABERTILLERY...

In season 1930-31, on the days when Cardiff were beaten 11-3 and 14-0 by Abertillery, they were simultaneously being beaten 17-10 and 6-4 by Gloucester.

The books have become rather more balanced since then with the result that, of the overall 18 matches, Cardiff have won nine, Abertillery eight with the sole drawn game being played in April 1961.

Cardiff have scored 258 points against Abertillery's 146.

In the Heineken League games, during the first season of the leagues, Cardiff won the two matches 55-12 and 34-6.

...and GLOUCESTER

RATHER older opposition will be at the Arms Park on Tuesday evening when Gloucester are the visitors.

The history of these two clubs goes back 163 games to October 1882 when Cardiff were

hammered 26-0 and after which the local newspaper wrote that "Gloucester played together as one man and gave the visitors a lesson which doubtless will be valuable to them in the future."

Perhaps it did indeed. To date, Cardiff have won 107 times, Gloucester 38 with 18 draws.

GROUND CONTROL...

STEVE BALE, Rugby Correspondent of The Independent and Man of Gwent (or is it Gwentish Man? He prefers Monmouthshire anyhow), with some nostalgic names and recollections...

HOW GREEN (and white) IS MY WESTERN VALLEY?

IT IS one of those givens of Welsh Rugby that there are too many clubs in Monmouthshire for their own good, or at least too many clubs that used to call themselves "first class" or "senior". Or at least too many to sustain a successful club capable of best riding the First Division of the Heineken League like a colossus such as — who shall we say? — Cardiff.

Well, it wasn't always like this, as this correspondent's fading memory of Gwent (I think I prefer Monmouthshire in this context) rugby still tells him. Look at Abertillery, look at Wales when they were winning the Five Nations' Championship in 1966. Alun Pask, Haydn Morgan, Allan Lewis — the names still trip off the tongue, don't they?

By now the good green-and-white folk are perhaps a little fed up with being reminded of their illustrious names from the past. So let's get more up to date and revive some more personal memories of a fine and friendly club. The season was 1983-84, Abertillery's centenary, and there I was as the Western Mail's resident man in Gwent assigned to the great event.

There was a match against Japan, but perversely I was not called on to cover it. If memory serves, I was over the mountain in Pontypool that day but they still invited me to the dinner which I think took place in the Ambulance Hall. Anyway, these are incidentals; for me the main point was all the lesser games that marked that centenary, the Tuesday-night arrivals of the Westons and Walsalls.

Believe it or not, they made that season special. For one thing, it was my first on the Western Mail and my naked ambition was such that I would cover any game, anywhere

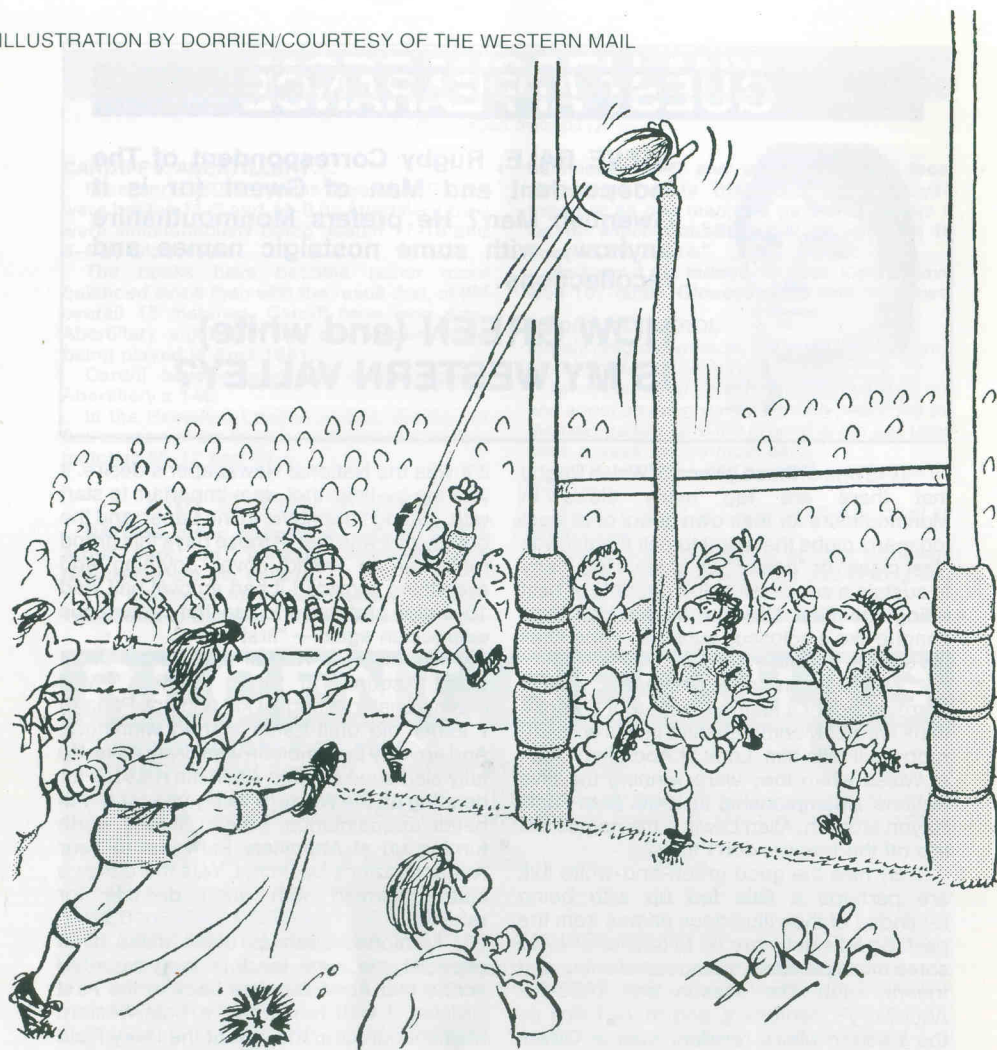
if it was the National Newspaper's desire. It was the by-lines that were important to start with, getting your name in the paper, and the beauty of it was that in those days this grand rugby organ would cover anything and everything provided it had an oval ball, had 15-a-side and was — to use that contentious expression again — "first class".

Abertillery v Walsall first class? OK, it didn't count in the Western Mail championship though, I kid you not, Penarth v Esher did until Esher started winning it. And anyway the ambition went from naked to fully clad soon enough when the reasons for heading up the Western Valley changed with better acquaintance. I mean, it was worth turning up at Abertillery Park just to hear Arthur Crozier's backchat. Was there ever a club chairman with such distaste for referees?

Memories such as these make it an especial pleasure for this long-departed scribe that Abertillery are back in the First Division. I well remember a post-Western Mail encounter in the rain at the Dairy Field where Abertillery, by now down in the Second Division, lost to Llanharan. It was just five days before the 1991 World Cup kicked off, rugby therefore being on the point of never being the same again. In the circumstances, this was rather a good place to be.

It was the way that Abertillery stalwarts of the stamp of Adrian Rees and Gareth Collier talked about the Second Division that was so alarming. This was not a situation you could grow accustomed to, they insisted, because once you settled for the Second Division you were already on the slippery

slope to the Third, and financially that, for a club like Abertillery who had been used to mixing in Merit Table circles, would be oblivion.

Good for them that they have hoisted themselves back into the First, even if staying there, as others have found, is a good deal harder than getting there. And let us not forget that the First Division has never in its four and a bit seasons of existence had fewer than four Monmouthshire clubs in it. Not so bad after all, is it?

Although they may not get many players in the Welsh team, although there may be too many clubs for their own good, perhaps we should salute the sheer tenacity of this part of the rugby world.

If I take myself a lot further back to an earlier personal era, the not-quite-halcyon years I spent on the South Wales Argus at Newport (don't all jeer at once), I could point out that the most consistent Welsh club bar none was Pontypool. Not only that, but they set up a production line of international

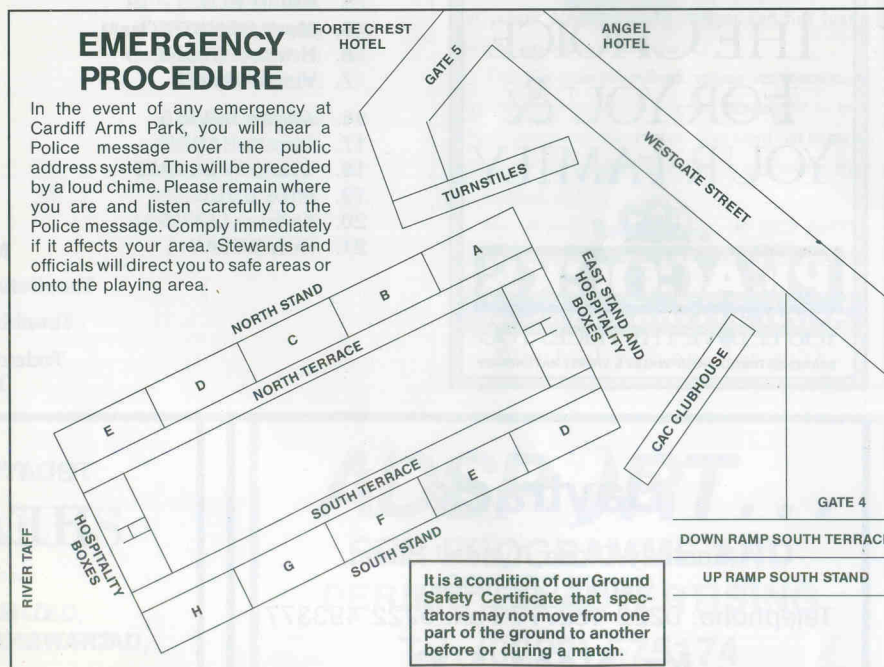
forwards and for a while so dominated Gwent rugby that none of their local rivals was able to beat them for years on end.

When the exceptions came, they were big, big news. There was, for instance, a cup tie against Newbridge when Brendan McAloon — a name to conjure with — kicked the early penalty that beat Pontypool by a glorious 3-0. The idea of Abertillery beating Pontypool, as occurred recently, would have been more or less unthinkable. And Newport seemed to have a death wish whenever they played the Pooler. Could it have been fear? Or just a form of nervousness?

Going round Gwent in those days was a fairly stifling business, with the clubs all on top of each other, and now that it has passed into the personal memory bank it can be safely put down as invaluable experience. But, now as then, you underestimate these guys at your peril. Pontypool have beaten Swansea and Llanelli, but Abertillery have beaten Pontypool. It's a basic instinct. It's called survival.

'FANNING OUT'

Increasingly the midfield is becoming more cluttered and this is having a serious effect on the game.

How often do you see a situation where a player is tackled, the ball won quickly and a maul forms? Then one side will commit four players to the maul whilst the others spread in midfield.

Does the midfield clutter also increase the amount of midfield off-side and decrease the amount of midfield space? What can be done by players, coaches and referees to improve the situation?

It is the referees' duty to ensure that the midfield defenders are on side. Attacking sides have to consider different options to beat the defence. It is also an area which the law makers will have to address sooner than later. I would like to see players get more space in midfield and, in order to do so, we should not allow players to stand off from rucks and mauls. Either, they are part of the ruck or maul or should be ten metres back. This would make a lot of difference.

In conjunction with players fanning out into midfield **we often see players who are very slow to retreat in defensive situations.**

I am convinced that the slow retreat is, and has been, coached. It is difficult to define "slow", however, if the referee considers the intent of the retreating player to be negative or destructive, then these slow retreating players should be penalised. **Referees need to be more vigilant in this area or our game will slowly stagnate.**

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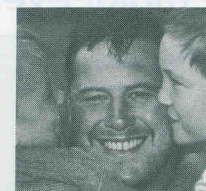
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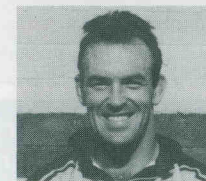
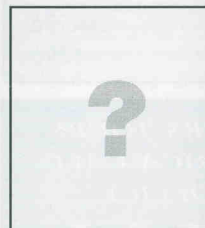
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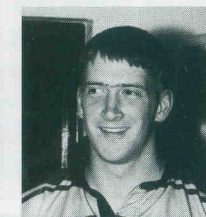
