





QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

UNDERSTANDABLY, Mr Simon David Hill is a happy man. Next Saturday, he wins his sixth cap for Wales when he turns out on the wing against South Africa not long after perhaps feeling that he was moving backwards in the minds of the selectors.

Secondly, he has completed all his written examinations on the way to becoming a qualified dentist in 18 months — "I am not a *former* dental student despite what has been written elsewhere," he says, "and I am still training at the Cardiff Dental Hospital."

This second point about exams could be crucial. Over the years, Simon has missed out on various tours, sevens tournaments and so on (including the Cardiff trip to Australia) because of examinations during May.

His emergence back into the Welsh team — he was only on the replacements bench for the Wales A international against the tourists at Newport — leaves the door still open for a World Cup squad place next Spring and Summer. And there are no exams this time.

Apparently Jonathan Humphreys is attempting to take all the credit insofar as he was captain when Simon scored a hat-trick against Abertillery the other Saturday. "My inspired leadership," claims Humph, "brought you back to the selectors' notice."

Either way, Simon, who was born in Barry (at the maternity hospital) on May 27, 1968, is playing some of the best rugby of his career despite being called "The Dopey Dentist" by coaching organiser Alex Evans.

His teammates call him Benny (after the comedian) and many supporters use the nickname "Shimmy" both because of his running and speed rather than as rhyming match for the long-chinned television soccer pundit Jimmy of the same ilk. Mr Hill is a man of no mean talents. He gained A levels in Physics, Chemistry and Biology at Llantwit Major Comprehensive, where he also played out-half after hooking at his junior school, and went on to read Microbiology at Leeds University.

Why Leeds? "It was the only place that would have me," he says modestly, "and microbiology was just a temporary thing to get a degree." Indeed, he rather fancied being a vet at that time — his uncle has a farm in the Vale and his mother breeds Borzois — but he finally came down on the side of dentistry.

This is at least some use to his colleagues insofar as they go to him for their gumshields and fittings. The mind boggles as to what they would have done had he been a vet.

Between the drillings and fillings which take up most of his pre-qualification practical work, he also manages to sail quite a bit in summer (he is currently awaiting a presentation evening when he will receive seven prizes as a member of the crew of a successful yacht in the Channel area out of Barry Yacht Club. "I'm just a general dogsbody, putting up spinnakers and that sort of thing," he explains.

He continues to go steady with Emma, a Llantwit lass who is studying European Business Admin in London, but has as yet failed to persuade big Derwyn, Humph and Hemi Taylor that their guitar trio should become a quartet. "I haven't had the time to master the instrument yet," he acknowledges, "which is a pity because they badly need a singer to put Humph out of his misery. His voice really is terrible..."

Simon also plays a bit of golf — off 21 at St Athan. It was, in fact, golf that brought him to Cardiff about five seasons



LEAGUE POSITION MAY BE FALSE

IN THIS, the season of 'mists and mellow fruitfulness' all should be bountiful and harmonious, as we store up our larders and our energy, for the season of goodwill to come.

But all is not harmonious and there is precious little goodwill to all men. The papers are full of supposed confessions of adulterous politicians, garrulous goalkeepers, vindictive Grand Prix drivers, crooked cricketers, and controversy has haunted the South African Rugby Tour.

Are we that much more evil than our forefathers, or does the press in its frantic search for circulation, concentrate and then elaborate on the seamier side of mans fallibilities?

We will have none of that in today's programme, but just before we proceed I must admit that I once threw a match. And your programme editor Duncan Gardiner is still waiting for me to throw the cigarette that should have gone with it.

Today we welcome Newbridge, with the warmth deserved by a Club with whom we have always had a close and uncontroversial relationship. That could be because they don't beat us too often at The Arms Park.

However, without being controversial, Newbridge did beat us here on 4th January, 1964. It shows as a 3-3 draw in the records, but Arthur Hughes scored a perfectly good try that day, which was disallowed by the referee.

I know because I was there, and saw it. Albeit from a worms-eye view, lying prone, after Arthur had run right through me, and trampled me into the mud.

Newbridge arrive today with a team full of confidence after beating Pontypool last Saturday. Indeed, but for two very narrow defeats against Neath and Bridgend they would be sitting pretty, well placed in the upper echelons of Division One, instead hovering with their Gwent butties at the wrong end of the table. Cardiff will not be fielding their full side for obvious reasons, and should beware of underestimating the latent talent and

spirit of this Newbridge team, that has a nice blend of youth and experience.

With ex-Cardiff players, Paul Kawulok, Peter Craven and Paul Edwards in their pack they should know a thing or two about today's opposition. Peter Crane is rated by many, including myself, as the best, pure open-side in Wales, and with Andrew Gibbs rapidly rediscovering his prodigious potential, they should field a formidable back row.

It was the pressure applied to the Pontypool scrum that finally gained Newbridge their win.

Paul Edwards, Nigel Meek and Brendan Fischer, were rock solid, and with Paul Kawulok and Chris Crane providing plenty of weight, they eventually overcame the Pontypool pack. Ray Prosser must have been apopleptic — particularly when it is realised that Chris Crane, an Oxford Blue from Pontypool, is a solicitor practising in his home town.

Perhaps the scales of justice were weighted against Pontypool on the day.



J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS asks when a boot going on to a player may not be foul play.



'RUCKING OUT'

It is now quite common to see players on their feet using their boots on opposition players on the ground.

Is there any occasion when a boot going on to a player can be considered not to be wilful hacking, kicking, stamping or trampling? How often do you hear, "he got what he deserved because he was on the wrong side"?

What is acceptable to players, coaches and referees? What is permissible; what does the law permit?

Players must never place a boot, stamp on, or kick another player's head. Players must never stamp "up and down" on players on the ground. Players must not use their boots in retribution for other offences.

Referees must blow their whistles early if players are on the ground and it is likely that boots will be used. Referees should deal quickly with players who deliberately go to ground and kill the ball.


Players should attempt to step over the man, or men, and ball to leave the ball on their side without contact with the player on the ground.

They may use their feet to move players with the ball, providing the players on their feet are, (1) moving forward, (2) their studs are facing backwards, and (3) the ball is in close proximity to the player on the ground.


