

Cardiff v. Merthyr Tydfil

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 17th, 1994 KICK-OFF 2.30 p.m.

ONE THING is certain this afternoon: there could be no greater giant for Merthyr to slay. Cardiff are not only the holders of the SWALEC Cup but also stand with some pride at the head of the Heineken League first division.

What a Goliath, then, for a potential David to fell! Yet Merthyr will be taken seriously, Division Five side as they may be, Cardiff will remember too well the humiliation of two years ago when St Peter's, then in Division Three, travelled along Newport Road to create arguably the Cup's greatest ever surprise. The romance of the Cup, indeed.

Merthyr currently nestle in third place behind the divisional leaders who include Rumney, winners of all eleven league matches and yet whom Merthyr dealt with in the last round of the cup. The rugby revival in the town is discussed at greater length and with rich humour by Dai Hayward in the Guest Appearance column on page 13 but, in the meantime, we welcome back warmly to the Arms Park for the first senior match between the clubs since 1908 their players, officials and followers.

Heineken League rugby then returns to the Arms Park next Thursday evening with the rearranged fixture with Pontypridd which will surely have a crucial bearing on the final destination of the championship.

Last Saturday's splendid win at Bridgend — at a cost insofar as the injuries to Emyr Lewis, in particular, and Derwyn Jones come at a worrying time for club and country — took us into the second half of the league season with a few points, and tries, in hand.

But there are difficult matches ahead; Neath away on New Year's Eve, a visit from Swansea on January 7 and a trip to Stradey on February 4 show fully that there is still a long way to go. Mike Hall, Alex Evans and the squad are well aware that the current points cushion is not enough on which to relax.

All this and talk of a super-competition, too. Cardiff chief executive Gareth Davies explains the current state of play on page 6.

For the moment, though, it's the Cup that counts as Cardiff aim to defend the hard-earned trophy.



EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS, even World Championships, are under discussion at club level as Rugby Football moves towards the 21st Century. What is the current state of play? GARETH DAVIES, Cardiff Rugby Club Chief Executive, brings us up-to-date following the recent International Board talks in Dublin.

CLUB RUGBY — AT WORLD LEVEL?

YOU HAVE probably read a great deal recently about a proposed European League for the leading clubs from Wales, England and France, together with the Provinces and Districts of Ireland and Scotland.

Cardiff Rugby Club, along with the other First Division clubs of the Heineken League, are supporters of the original concept, although accepting that there are certain difficulties to overcome.

A European Championship would involve 20 teams and would be of a quality just below international standard.

Eligibility would be from the identified European nations above, with the possibility of additional countries in due course and the qualification would be decided within each country based on merit.

And where does this fit in to a world situation? In the Southern Hemisphere, the Carnegie Sports International organisation has organised for two years the Supertens Cup, consisting of teams from the leading provinces in New Zealand, Australia, South Africa, Western Samoa, Fiji and Tonga on a similar basis.

They are interested in expanding this to a world stage by having the Superten winners — and this title does *not* imply 10-a-side rugby as some believe — meet the winners of a European competition for the World final.

For most European clubs involved,



it would involve no more than six extra matches — in midweek over a season, remember — on the fixture list.

And what attractive matches they would be for the followers.

This concept would remain under the control of the game itself. If it is not strongly pursued, I stress urgently that the Unions beware as, post-World Cup, the commercial piranhas and pariahs will look to exploit the game to the full — with or without the backing of the authorities.



GUEST APPEARANCE



DAI HAYWARD, seven times capped by Wales while playing for Cardiff, now writes with impish humour for a variety of newspapers and magazines. Here, he looks back to the days when there were several rugby clubs in Merthyr, including...

THE TROEDYRHIW SEARCHLIGHTS

THE RIVER TAFF, that normally flows with deceptive serenity past the West boundary of the Arms Park, starts its journey in the hills behind Merthyr. On its route to the sea it threads its way through the beads of villages that link Merthyr to Cardiff and creates a sparkling necklace that reflects the triumphs, tribulations and tragedies of the turbulent history of Industrial South Wales.

The great iron towns of Dowlais and Merthyr, that manufactured the cannons for Wellington's artillery at Waterloo, and the sleepy fishing village that became the world's greatest coal port are both adapting, in their respective ways, to the challenge created by the demise of coal and iron, and, I suppose, to the radical changes in Rugby Football.

It might seem a long way from the top of Division Five to the top of Division One, but not only are there names in Division One in 1994 that would have seemed highly improbable five years ago, but this is the Cup, and who knows better than Cardiff that strange things can happen in the Cup.

Merthyr RFC have spent many years languishing in the backwaters of Welsh Rugby since their heydays in the 1870s when they regularly played Cardiff. Indeed, they together with Swansea and Newport were Cardiff's only opponents in their inaugural season in 1877. However there is a new spirit abroad in the Club, and fed-up with being called a Soccer Town, they are intent on filling a Rugby vacuum that Welsh Rugby can't afford, with a team worthy of a town of Merthyr's significance.

They beat Rumney (Cardiff, and no aitches) in the last round of the Cup to arrive at the Arms Park today, but they lost to them in their vital league game, and one detects a strong feeling that they wish it had been the

other way around. They know they have to make progress through the leagues, however glamorous a run in the SWALEC Cup may be.


Several of the Merthyr team will be familiar to Cardiff supporters. Steve Sutton. Wales and Pontypool, Mark Titley formerly a clever wing with Swansea and Wales, now an even more accomplished outside-half for Merthyr, Ritchie Donovan in the centre, Colin Hillman at Hooker, Mark Pugh, prop, Martin Burridge at scrum half, top try scorer and a former Cardiff Youth player, should all be known to the Cardiff faithful. Around this core Merthyr have built a solid layer of home-grown talent and look good prospects for promotion from the 5th and even the 4th Division. They have the facilities at Ynysfach Park, and an excellent Clubhouse with a superb carpet in the Concert Room.

As one would expect from a Club with a half a dozen P.C.s in the team, and Alwyn Jenkins P.C., as Coach, they have a great respect for law and order. This has been recognised by the fact that their main sponsors are H.J.J., the largest firm of solicitors in Wales.

Not that Merthyr has always been so tranquil, and neither has its Rugby Club. In their annual Boxing Day match with Dowlais in 1892 a player was sent off for accusing the referee of being bought off by the opposition and, to quote the official records, "The nearness of Dowlais to Merthyr, was it seems no guarantee of fraternity between players, and the proximity of many fast flowing streams gave many officials an early bath."

It isn't generally known that on Christmas Eve 1908, Merthyr and North Glam played the Wallabies at Penydarren

BILLY SPILLER... played for the Wallabies against Merthyr, for Cardiff against the Wallabies two days later... and also cricket for Glamorgan.


Park, losing the game 13 points to 5 points. An even lesser known fact is that the Wallabies borrowed the Cardiff outside half, Billy Spiller, and two Merthyr players E. Lewis and R. H. Gunn. It is not surprising that they were short of players, because two days later they played Cardiff on Boxing Day losing 24 points to 8 points, with Billy Spiller in the centre for Cardiff, and then Swansea on December the 28th. Modern players would blanch at the thought.

Whatever the outcome of today's match, we wish Merthyr all the best of luck in re-establishing Rugby Football as the major game in the town, and we are delighted to know that they have built up a large and loyal band of supporters. They still have some way to go to match the Merthyr of the 1890s, which listed the following teams as playing

regularly.

Merthyr Thursdays, Merthyr Excelsiors, Cyfarthfa Juniors, Georgetown Juniors, Dowlais Quins, Dowlais Hibs, and Dowlais. Gellifaelog, Penderyn Rifles, Penderyn Excelsiors, Troedyrhiw Searchlights, Merthyr Police and Merthyr White Stars.



KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS looks at an aspect of the lineout which has led to allegations of 'formation dancing'.



'STEPPING OUT'

QUESTION 1

At a formed lineout are all players of either team allowed to "STEP" away from the line of touch prior to the ball being thrown in?

Answer

YES, a recent International Board directive allows this. Individual players may not do so however, as they would be considered to have left the lineout and were therefore subject to penalty, i.e. a free kick.

QUESTION 2

If a team, (or teams) "STEPS OUT" at a line out where must the hooker of the throwing in side stand and where must the ball be thrown?

Answer

The hooker must remain on the line of touch and throw the ball so that it is first touched by a player at least five metres from the touch line along the line of touch.

This will mean that if the throwing-in side "step out" the ball must land nearer the line of opponents (unless they have also "stepped") or, unless they all step back in to compete for the ball.

Note should be made of the fact that some hookers are throwing the ball at an angle across the widened gap towards their own team. Referees should be aware of this and apply the law accordingly, i.e., "if a player wilfully or repeatedly throws the ball in not straight a penalty kick should be awarded."


In the first game of the Season against Bridgend, John Reason maintained that Cardiff were winning prizes in "formation dancing" with the way they stepped into and out of the line outs, and criticised Welsh referees in particular for allowing them to do so, and for having their own laws.

Well, Mr. Reason, it is permissible in law.




