Cardiff v. London Welsh

WHILE THE first course cannot be expected to satisfy to the extent of a main dish, there is good cause this evening to believe that London Welsh and Cardiff will provide an aperitif that whets the taste for a weekend of filling and memorable rugby.

The main course tomorrow promises to be heavy, fit for those with appetites of substance; this evening the fare may be more delicate, experimental, the taster for the undoubtedly red-blooded meat to follow.

Not that Cardiff-London Welsh matches are non-competitive. While the Exiles have been going through some sad and lean years which have seen them vanish from the major divisions of the Courage Clubs Championship, there are clear signs of a revival and, indeed, the possibility still of promotion back from the National 5 South league into the "nationwide" Fourth Division.

We wish them well: history shows that Wales nationally benefits from a strong London Welsh—though the advent of strong League Rugby in Wales and, for one reason or another, the greater willingness of players to travel back from London and the Home Counties to train regularly with their clubs has made a clear impact on the playing strength at Old Deer Park.

It will not then only be Cardiff club physiotherapist Jane Parker who welcomes back her old patients — Jane came back to Cardiff after a spell with the Exiles — to the Arms Park.

The club's officials and players will be very warmly received on this 110th meeting between the clubs, representing an almost unbroken annual fixture since the first meeting in December 1885. (see Miscellany).

As we have said, there is now a curious lack of first team matches at the Arms Park until April, with only the friendly with Bath on St Patrick's Day, the eve of the Irish international, breaking up the away match pattern until the visit of Dunvant in the Heineken League on April 1.

Before then, of course, vastly important league games will have been played at Pontypool next Saturday and at Abertillery (March 11): two teams struggling to retain first division status and therefore potentially dangerous opposition indeed.

Then, on March 25, a sixth round SWALEC Cup-tie takes us on the short journey to meet the Old Penarthians whose tentative thoughts on "transferring" the match to Cardiff quickly and understandably disappeared. Naturally enough, they would prefer the atmosphere which will undoubtedly be generated at their own home. It's a long, long season...

CARDIFF v LONDON WELSH - the facts

SINCE THE first meeting on December 30, 1885, Cardiff and London Welsh have met at least once in nearly every season. Overall, Cardiff have won 92 of the 109 matches played with the Welsh winning on 14 occasions and with two drawn games (the other was abandoned after 15 minutes or so with the result not counting in Cardiff records). Cardiff have scored 2124 points and London Welsh

Of the 14 London Welsh successes, six have been in Cardiff but the most recent at the Arms Park was the 14-9 win in March 1977.

MIKE'S ALIVE - AND VERY MUCH KICKING

REFERENCE IN the programme notes for the Treorchy match to Mike Rayer's 'tragic' accident brought a joking protest from the 'victim' himself.

"Tragic," he felt, "suggests that I'm dead at least whereas, believe me, I'm very much alive and kicking.

"In fact, and if anything, I am slightly ahead of schedule in terms of recovery and I have been able to take some light exercise."

This next week will be testing for Mike when the pin, helping to heal the third of the breaks in the leg suffered at Treorchy last October, will be removed. have done! I'll be back..."

"That is, if the X-rays show it has come together as well as the other two. When the pin is removed, it will of course weaken the leg to a degree and I will have to take it very lightly again but, if all goes well. I would then hope to be back in full training by July".

Tomorrow you may see Mike with Steve Rider on BBC's Grandstand programme from the Arms Park - but the novelty of commentating and commenting is wearing thin.

"Watching is very frustrating and much more nerve-wracking than playing," he says. "When Cardiff were at Llanelli the other day, I couldn't even bear to listen to the radio in the last 15 minutes - but didn't they do well..."

The injury has meant that Mike has at least been able to spend plenty of time learning his job as a garage manager. "That's going well though I did not expect at first that I would settle in so well."

And so it's fingers crossed for these next X-rays. "I really do have to thank the surgeons, consultants, physios and all the medical people for what they
