



Two or three minutes from time and already 16-9 down, Cardiff conceded a penalty which Aberystwyth failed to convert.



QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

HIS FORMER Llanelli colleagues have been quick to attempt to play down some of the powerful attributes of Emyr Wyn Lewis.

Big Emyr – he's about 6ft 4 and about 17 stone – had been known from his schooldays as *Torw* – the Bull. It arose first when he decided to take on the school bullies by the simple process of putting his head down and charging them.

But now those finks down West allege the nickname is incomplete. "You should see him on tour," reports one of them. "As soon as training is over, he'll pick up his sun-tan oil and a towel and head for the highest place around — as close to the sun as possible.

"That's why we call him Sitting Bull."

And if that makes Emyr a chief among the Indians in any pack, it makes him even more formidable.

But what made the Welsh-speaking part-time policeman leave such deep roots in the West — Carmarthen Athletic and Llanelli — to play for Cardiff? Why did he quit the Scarlets?

"I didn't quit. They got rid of me," he retorts instantly.

Now, Emyr is a quiet sort of guy who treats most things good-naturedly, preferring to smile than to be belligerent, but Quidnunc's suggestion that he was being perhaps disloyal was clearly undiplomatic.

"I admit I was not particularly enjoying my rugby at the end at Llanelli," says the man who now has 36 caps, at No 8 and at blindside, "and, when I was summoned before the committee, I explained that I wanted to play the traditional type of game the Scarlets played in their hey-day. They told me I was wrong and so they said I was in effect a part of their future plans.

"It seemed that Cardiff were playing that kind of rugby and I felt that Alec Evans could develop my game. And here I am."

Born on August 29, 1966, the Bull was initially a soccer player of some promise but, between the ages of 16 and 17, sprang up in size, joined Carmarthen Athletic youth and was quickly spotted by Roy Bergiers who took him to Llanelli under Gareth Jenkins who in turn "was impressed with the way I ran with the ball but with nothing else."

Off the pitch, he likes the odd heavy duty cider, loves fishing (and helping out his father at his Lampeter fish farm), collects ladies telephone numbers (he's single, girls), but denies watching television much. "I've only watched Eastenders twice," he claims, and then admits both occasions were in the past week.

Any conversation about Emyr inevitably comes back to the nose. As we talked, Delyth Morgan, a Welsh Women's international, came to join us and she had recently broken her nose.

"First time?" asked the Bull sympathetically.

"Yes," said Delyth. "You'll get used to it," said the Bull, "I've broken mine 133 times, I think."

DANGERS WHEN PASSION BECOMES PAROCHIALISM

IN THE Thatcherite mid-80s consultancy was the business to be in. Management consultants, fashion consultants, consultant consultants... you name it.

Perhaps now, in Major's mid-90s, consultants are a little passé. But then again maybe they just might be the single facet from that notoriously greedy era that is worth giving another try.

And the Welsh Rugby Union should be at the head of the queue when the next generation of consultants come calling.

From an outsider's point of view the intensity and passion which swirls so vehemently around rugby in the Principality is one of its most captivating qualities and one no other country in the world can match.

Everyone doesn't just have an interest but a definite, abiding opinion. It is responsible for setting Welsh rugby apart from the game not just in the United Kingdom or the northern hemisphere but across the world.

But now in times of turmoil and dissatisfaction only rivalled by Ron Waldron's contentious reign, that passion is less flatteringly called pariochialism.

It is a serious charge but one which is eminently defendable.

In fact, the WRU need only look next door at Cardiff's example to glimpse the way ahead.

It is an undeniable fact that Alex Evans has turned the Blue and Blacks around. He, too, is an outsider. He offers a new and different perspective.

The most difficult thing in the world is to stand outside of something you care fervently about and consider it objectively. But this is where Mr Evans and similarly "unattached" observers can do more good than an Arms Park full of subjective Welshmen. Outsiders don't have historic hang-ups.

Although only too well aware that the words "rugby" and "league" should not be used in that order in South Wales, there is much to be learnt from that sport's example — in Australia.

A seemingly unaccountable slump in popularity during the mid-80s had nothing to do with Mrs T but rather a common complacency within the upper echelons of the Australian Rugby League.

The "Ella Effect" was still being felt and, as a direct contrast to the situation that exists in Wales, the amateur code was taking hold. What did the Australian Rugby League do?

They brought in consultants, image-makers, added razz to the matazz and worked hard at reviving their game. It was an unadulterated success.

Rugby league in Australia has now expanded to include teams from all over the wide, brown continent, including a team from Western Australia, traditionally an Aussie Rules stronghold. But more teams meant more players.

Again the situation is not dissimilar from the ones many believe the Heineken League has created here. In Australia they fought hard to ensure the sport's standards did not drop. Criteria, tough criteria, had to be met before the new clubs were accepted into the Sydney-based competition.

Players from not just acros Australasia were drawn into clubs, the leading British players "summered" in Sydney and so the dragnet continued until four more quality teams kicked into life three weeks ago when the new season started.

Far from diluting the Australian game the influx of overseas players has served to spice up the competition, helped to propogate homegrown talent and generally added another vivid dimension to a commercially-aware growth sport.


From a game that was stagnant fewer than ten years ago, rugby league has stripped itself down and rebuilt a spectator-friendly product. Whether the game appeals to you or not there can be no denying the game's ability to reinvent itself in Australia.

There is no reason — besides parochialism — that Welsh rugby could not follow that example. Obviously changes would need to be tailored to suit the game here, the people involved and the needs of the clubs — elite or otherwise.

The Test and County Cricket Board, another unfeasibly large body top-heavy with administrators, has managed to incorporate overseas players. Unfortunately the British input into the summer sport is not always of the quality necessary to succeed internationally but that is another matter.

Surely, though, a bit of networking between sports could benefit Welsh rugby. Take from each what you want, discard the dross and most importantly, learn from the mistakes they have made.

Now is the time to throw off the shackles of insularity – before it's all too late.



KNOW THE LAWS



J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS explains what happens now when a front-row forward is sent



COMMON SENSE

The moratorium on Law changes extends until after the World Cup, but at their recent meeting the International Rugby Football Board made some minor amendments, one of which was highlighted when John Davies, the Welsh prop, was sent off during the international against England.

This FRONT ROW RULING comes into immediate effect.

In the event of a front row forward being sent off, the referee, in the interests of safety, will confer with the captain of his team, to determine whether another player is suitably trained or experienced to take his position. If not, the captain shall nominate one other forward to leave the field and be replaced by a substitute front row forward.

This may be done immediately, or if the player's captain wishes, after he has tried another player in the position.

Also, where a team has used all its front row forwards, the game will continue with non-contested scrums, as per Law Variation at Under 19 Level; i.e.,

- a) there is no contest for the ball.
- b) the team putting in the ball must win it.
- c) neither team is permitted to push.


Two other important decisions were made also with immediate effect.

- **OPEN WOUNDS** Out goes the 10-minute restriction and the bleeding player may be temporarily replaced on more than one occasion.
- The decision was taken to revert to the former provision relating to SHOULDER PADDING. Padding can only be worn to protect an injury and MUST be attached to the body, i.e. (1) No harnesses; (2) No sewing padding into the jersey.


