

Cardiff v. Newport

KICK-OFF 2.30 p.m.

YES, IT was a bit of a downer, that semi-final defeat by Swansea at Stradey Park. Everybody admits it and, of course, no one has felt it more than the players themselves who genuinely believed that they could manage the coveted double.

But just think for a moment. If someone had told the average Cardiff supporter way back last September that his club was going to win the Heineken League championship and also reach the semi-final of the SWALEC Cup, then he would surely have settled for that.

And, further, if that someone had said, "Which is more, 11 of your favourites will be in the Welsh World Cup squad for South Africa," then it would surely have been regarded as an exaggeration.

As it is, for both team and individuals, season 1994-95 must go down as one of the more successful in Cardiff's history. "We can still improve next season," says coach Alec Evans later in the programme — and the players are right behind him.

In the meantime, it should be an afternoon of celebration, of fun and enjoyment. On the field both Cardiff and Newport for different reasons can relax; Cardiff because only a mathematical miracle can prevent the Heineken Trophy coming to the Arms Park (can Pontypridd really score 20-plus tries at triumphant Treorchy who this morning sit proudly in fourth place) and Newport because they have deservedly saved themselves from the trauma of relegation.

The entertainment should, weather permitting, continue even after the final whistle with the celebratory arrival from the skies of the Red Devils free-fall team (once more, further information later in this programme) while all of us should raise a glass or two to the Cardiff team who have provided much colourful and spectacular rugby during the season.

Also in the programme the club expresses its thanks to a vast variety of different kinds of people who have helped in a multitude of ways. We apologise if anyone has been missed; so many have contributed.

Today, for example, the match is sponsored by Wyndham's who have supported the club so well in recent seasons. We hope that Mr Stuart Stephenson, his colleagues and guests have a thoroughly enjoyable afternoon — as, we hope also, do the players, officials and supporters of Newport who are warmly welcomed to the Arms Park for this final match of the season. 

QUIDNUNC turns serious to discuss the season with Cardiff coach ALEC EVANS

End-of-term report:

SATISFACTORY, TRYING VERY HARD BUT CAN STILL DO BETTER

Q *Are you satisfied?*

AE I believe we have progressed. We have come first in the league but it is disappointing to have let the Cup slip. We set high standards and we have largely maintained them through a long season. In racing terms, we reached the straight but did not get to the finishing line the way we wanted.

Q *Were there any specific reasons for this?*

AE The higher the standards you set the greater expectation is placed on the players. These expectations are from the team itself, from within the club and externally from supporters, members and the general public. Consistently reaching those standards on the field requires tremendous amounts of energy and perhaps having 11 players chosen in the Welsh squad for South Africa absorbed more of those energies we required to finish off the season the way we wanted to. Putting 25-30 hours a week of training and playing into rugby on top of a professional career is a demanding lifestyle but, under Mike Hall's leadership, the players have shown the necessary dedication.

Q *Have you achieved the level of excellence you demand?*

AE Achieving excellence is about reaching certain stages in a programme, advancing and then learning from the mistakes you make to move on further. It is disappointing, especially for the supporters — but the players and coaches feel it too, you know — not to be going for the double and we have not perhaps adapted fully to champion status. It means that we have to move further along the learning curve. We are gaining in experience and we are learning.

Q *You are coming back for another term as coach. What other plans do you have for Cardiff?*

AE We have to address ourselves earlier next season to the problems. It is going to be difficult to kick off where we left off and the provisional fixture list shows we have a very demanding start to the season after a heavy World Cup for many of the players. If there is also a form of European competition, then we will have a completely new emotion to

face and energy-sapping competition which we must absorb.

Q *The future is Europe and beyond?*

AE I think it is and we have to place ourselves in the firing line if we are to progress as a club. Cardiff has somehow put a tag on itself as the greatest which puts tremendous pressure on yourself but means that we must be seen to be setting elite standards. You will find that next season there is a greater importance to the Rags fixtures — there may be about 40 of them — and we have outstanding players coming through who will in these matches be genuinely playing for places in the senior side. They are first division candidates. They are our first team of the future.

Q *Will there be any overt recruitment?*


AE There will be no direct recruitment. However, we have already had inquiries from players of other clubs as to whether it would be worth their while to apply to join the club. Considering the depth we have already, they will have to be good and dedicated men.

Q *Have injuries, particularly I think of Mike Rayer, affected the season?*

AE Any team would miss Mike Rayer, who is incidentally determined to come back — and although you have to expect injuries, yes, we were hit at crucial times. Colin Laity's cartilage, Nigel Walker's shoulder, Chris John's hamstring, Emyr Lewis's ankle, Mike Hall, Mike Budd, Vince Davies, Kevin Matthews, Phil Sedgemore, Hemi Taylor, Derwyn Jones, they all missed important matches through injury. And then you've courageous people like Jonathan Humphreys who has played much of the season with a broken bone in his hand. And Simon Davies, injured when he was just coming through. Fortunately we've had adequate cover and we've had people like Steve Ford with his try-scoring to make up for it all.

Q *It's easy to be critical but there have been times when Cardiff have not always seemed adventurous*

AE Many sides have played very negative rugby against Cardiff. So negative that they have quite deliberately played referees to the limit in off-side and by conceding penalties rather than

tries.

We are fortunate also in that the senior coaches in Wales have met referees and you may well find that after the World Cup there will be a different attitude.

Internationally, referees will have the responsibility to the game of rugby at the World Cup to help make it a spectacle and players who consistently spoil the game by being offside or collapsing scrums will be punished.

The referees in South Africa will be united in their role to follow strict guidelines handed down by their corporate body, and I doubt if there will be much variance in interpretation. These improvements will then naturally affect and improve next season.

Q *Will there be long enough after the World Cup for the leading players to recover?*

AE There will be long enough for the players away from rugby. But there might not be long enough to do the pre-season strengthening and maintenance of the bodies. The modern rugby athlete is continually following strict fitness and strength programmes, and, for most of them, weight-training will resume on June 1 and the squad season will start on August 1.

Q *What about your summer?*

AE I hope to have a fortnight in Australia to see my family after the World Cup and then we can think

seriously about next season.

Q *Will there be any changes in coaching personnel?*

AE I think our coaching staff has been magnificent this season. Charlie Faulkner, Alun Donovan and Terry Holmes with the first team, Ian Bremner and Peter Manning and Bobby Newman have had a difficult time with the Rags and Under 21s with no great fixture list and with team members being scattered round the UK at further education.

You could count on one hand the number of occasions when they have missed a coaching session. We are fortunate indeed to have such a knowledgeable staff, so loyal to the club and so energetic.

Q *And any newcomers?*

AE There are some exciting coaching prospects in the players ranks and there will be help from Hemi Taylor, Mark Ring and Geraint John, who both on and off the pitch has given us so much in experience gained from his years as a WRU coach.

Q *So you are optimistic?*

AE They will help take the club through a very ambitious season 1995-96 and, hopefully, land the double...

EIGHT BRILLIANT TOUCH-DOWNS

BRITAIN'S CRACK Red Devils freefall team — the official parachute display unit of the Parachute Regiment and British army — will make a spectacular jump into Cardiff Arms Park this afternoon.

True to their Regimental motto "Utrique Paratus" — Ready for Anything — the Team jumped to it when Cardiff Rugby Football Club phoned their Aldershot headquarters earlier this week.

"Despite having half their 24-man team on a Britain-boosting schedule of displays in America and others on a tight programme of events this weekend, the Paras Regimental Colonel gave our event an immediate green light," said Cardiff chief executive Gareth Davies, "The response was fabulous".

The Red Devils' aircraft will climb 9,000 feet above Central Cardiff and the referee's final whistle will be radio-signalled to their jump-master as they circuit the stadium. The eight-man team will hurtle over Cardiff at speeds up to 120 mph before opening their canopies above the Park unfurling Cardiff RFC's flag and the Red Dragon as they descend.

"We had wanted to hand-carry the Heineken Trophy into the stadium," said Red Devils spokesman, ex Bangor, North Wales, RFC player Mark Aelwyn Roberts, "but no one would insure us!" Instead, the team will present an engraved baton to the club to mark its Welsh League Championship win.

Then they'll stay on to sign autographs and meet Junior members and CRFC sponsors before re-packing their 'chutes for another display in their hectic season later in the



evening.

As a PR boost for Cardiff, the Red Devils will be filming their descent for BBC TV Wales, running a live BBC Radio commentary from the air, and photographing their sky-high formation display for Wales on Sunday newspaper.

Gareth Davies said: "This has been my first dealing with the Parachute Regiment and I have been tremendously impressed. They have a reputation for being as hard as any scrum lock but they're real professionals. Nothing has been too much for them.

"Let's hope Cardiff and Newport spectators give them a massive 'croeso' when they land."

● IN THE INTEREST of safety — the freefallers can hit the ground at speeds of up to 30 miles per hour — spectators are asked to remain in their seats until the last man has landed and the display ends.

A DAY TO REMEMBER

WHAT WITH the Red Devils dropping in, weather permitting, the trophy presentation and various championship-winning celebrations taking place around the Arms Park during the day, it promises to be quite an afternoon.

On the pitch, too, there are still things to go for.

Steve Ford, for example is expected to be in the team and he is chasing two possible records.

He needs two tries to equal the Heineken League record of 20 in a season — Ieuan Evans being the holder — and four for the Cardiff club record held by Bleddyn Williams.

Nor, of course, is Steve alone high up the try-scoring lists.

Only 15 players have so far reached double figures before this afternoon throughout the five divisions of the Heineken League with Cardiff's Simon Hill on 11 in equal seventh place.

The six above him are Steve Ford, Mark Dicks (Merthyr with 13 tries), Keith Lee (Rumney), Wayne Proctor (Llanelli), Glenn George (Rumney) and Doug Burgess (Pyle) all on 12.

David Manley of Pontypridd is another on 11 tries with Neil Morgan (Merthyr) and Darren Starr (Caerphilly).

Rumney, in fact, head the club try-scoring with 81 — they meet Felinfoel today — with Cardiff close behind on 79 and Merthyr third on 65. Rumney confirmed their Fifth Division championship by winning at Seven Sisters and they will be joined next season in the Fourth Division by Merthyr.

Adrian Davies maintained his second position in the individual points scoring with 207 for the season, 42 fewer than the phenomenal Neil Jenkins.

Aled Williams of Swansea is third with 189.

For the not-so-successful, this afternoon is also a fraught one. The relegation battle reaches its climax as Abertillery travel to

GORDON WELLS REMEMBERED

THE FUNERAL took place in London this week of Gordon Wells, a former Cardiff captain who made 254 appearances for the club between 1952-53 and 1961-62 and who was capped seven times by Wales.

During his career with Cardiff he scored 119 tries, including a famous "double" as Cardiff beat the Australians 14-11 at the Arms Park in 1957.

A contemporary player writes:

Gordon was born and bred in Ynysir, Cwm Rhondda, two stones throw away from Cliff Morgan in Trebanog and Gareth Griffiths in Penygraig, Gordon formed with them the club's midfield in the Fifties following the retirement of Dr Jack Matthews and Bleddyn Williams.


They were also the Barbarians midfield first choice on the first-ever overseas tour to Canada in 1957.

Gordon went to Porth Secondary School Grammar School and was the school's outstanding athlete and rugby player. It was as an athlete, indeed, that he first came to prominence, as a sprinter, long jumper and the Great Britain triple jump record holder in the early Fifties.

We were all surprised that he didn't make the Great Britain side to the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki.

An honours chemistry graduate from Cardiff University, he did his post-graduate teaching diploma at St Luke's College, Exeter, and was part of the 1953-54 unbeaten St Luke's side that was the first to score 1,000 points (old scoring) in one season.

His first teaching appointment was to teach chemistry at Cheltenham College, where he always maintained he completed his public school education!

He then joined Shell Chemicals as a technical representative and for what was to be a long and successful business career as a senior marketing executive.

He worked in the Caribbean and in Scandinavia as well as having product marketing responsibility for Western Europe.

Gordon was essentially a shy, quiet individual who disliked ostentation but loved argument and debate. He had the driest sense of humour and together with his great friend John Evans (JD) kept the club side of the late Fifties always on their toes.

We shall miss his warm, cheerful presence, his wicked dry humour, and his companionship.

Four former captains, Dr Jack, Bleddyn, Rex Willis and C. D. Williams were among the Cardiff mourners at the funeral.


CARDIFF v. NEWPORT

THE MATCH STATISTICS

CARDIFF HAVE played Newport on more occasions – 371 – than any other opposition, partly through the fact that we used to meet on four occasions a season (see Peter Nyhan's Guest Appearance column) and partly because the history goes back to 1876-77.

Cardiff have won 179 of the meetings, Newport 134 and there have been 58 draws. Cardiff have scored 3307 points, and Newport 2462.

The Clubs have met on seven occasions in the Heineken League, Cardiff winning five times, Newport once and with one draw.



MIKE BUDD, the popular Cardiff flanker, fairly bubbled during the Cardiff victory over the last home match against the Barbarians – and was duly rewarded by being named Man of the Match by the Junior Blue and Blacks Club.

The scheme suggested is that any member/ticket holder who recruits another person to buy a season ticket will have their own at a reduced rate.



To call PETER NYHAN a "guest" is really a misnomer. For years Peter wrote the programme introduction. He is former player, committee man and chairman and now a vice-president of Cardiff R.F.C. Mention Newport and his pulse-rate quickens.



WHEN VICTORY OVER NEWPORT MEANT KIPPERS FOR DINNER

DURING A DECADE or so of writing the programme notes for our home games, I must confess that I relied heavily on two commodities in their compilation. Firstly there was my own plagiarism and secondly, other peoples' forgetfulness. On the plagiarism point I always had a cocked ear or an open eye for information whether spoken or written, all was fair game. I would then twist and turn this information and dress it up — to make it sound as original as I could.

Then I put my trust in other people's forgetfulness because we only played other sides once a season on the Arms Park so a lot of the information of one year was rejigged in another form for the following year. I didn't get many complaints over the format so it was a case of carry on writing.

The exception to the above however was the Cardiff-Newport association. The sheer history, tradition, competitiveness, emotion and comradeship of the clubs were somewhat unique and would fill volumes. The history cannot go back any further because "The Port" were the first game that Cardiff, in its present set up, ever played. That game is beautifully described in the Danny Davies History of our club. It took place on Newport Marshes on Saturday, 2nd December, 1876. Some 200 spectators who had paid the splendid sum of 6 old pence were present to see the game. Newport won on the day, but so began a legend.


Since those far off days a further 370 games have been played and that means that Newport are far and away our most played opponents with Swansea a long way behind on 271. During their history Newport have registered some marvellous

achievements. They have managed 6 invincible seasons, were unbeaten for their first 4 seasons and again in season 1891-2 and 1922-3. They come very close to adding to these qualities in season 1894-95 when they suffered only one defeat against Llanelli and more recently in 1950-1 when only 2 defeats were registered. Newport have supplied international players to the 4 Home Unions and also to South Africa. On one occasion in the past when they played a game against Bristol the whole 15 players were internationals drawn from England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales while at the same time the 3 reserves were also internationals. Now that's something that would take a bit of beating I'd say. Major touring teams also have cause to regret visits to Rodney Parade where South Africa

twice, New Zealand and Australia have all come out second best.

With all these marvellous milestones however one achievement which they would dearly have liked to chalk up was 4 wins in a season against us, their oldest enemy. The 4 fixtures a season went on for some 90 years or so between 1887-88 and 1975-76 when it was proved to be too impracticable to continue. During this time victory by either side was relished and indeed during the war years a Cardiff win over the Black and Ambers meant a supper of kippers on the following Tuesday night's training session.

The Black and Ambers recorded 3 wins and a draw on as many as 8 occasions but they just could not manage to apply the coup de grâce. Indeed the last 3 efforts of the 8 in 1950-51, 1958-59 and 1968-69 saw Newport win the first 3 fixtures each season but had their ambitions dashed by drawing the final game much to the immense disappointment. On the other hand, it was great relief to the respective Cardiff captains

namely Bill Tamplin, C. D. Williams and Howard Norris because it would have cast something of a shadow over their terms of office.

Much to Newport's chagrin however — Cardiff won the 4 games a season on 4 occasions. These came in 1897-98, 1905-06, 1947-48 and 1951-52 and the respective captains. G. A. Young, Cecil Biggs, Haydn Tanner and finally Jack Matthews were very happy men indeed.

And so on to today, when Newport come without the threat of relegation hanging over their heads. It appears that only something akin to a miracle would see us deprived of the league title but I'm sure all present at the Park this afternoon would like to see us blow out in style. 

TWO IMPORTANT POINTS OF LAW

- A.** A player, just outside his 22 metre line, attempts to gather or play the ball but fails to do so although he wilfully touches it. The ball travels into his 22 where he gathers it and kicks to touch.

What is the correct decision?

The referee should award a line out opposite the place from where he kicked the ball.

If the referee feels the player took any action to play the ball then he should not gain ground at the ensuing lineout. However, if the ball hit the player accidentally and then travelled into the 22, the lineout would be formed where the ball went into touch.

- B.** The ball carrier is held in the field of play, driven into in-goal and pulled to the ground. The ball is not grounded but the "tackler" does not release the ball carrier.

What is, or should be, the referee's decision?


No tackle is possible in In-Goal, so there is no requirement, as in Law 18, for the ball carrier to be released. **Therefore, the referee should blow his whistle and award a scrum 5 metres out opposite the place and the attacking team should have the put in.**
