CARDIFF AND THE CUP

Today, Cardiff come to Aberavon for the Semi-Final clash with their long standing friends Swansea. The situation is not a unique one, because during season 1972 - 73, Cardiff defeated Swansea in the Semi-Final of that year, also at Aberavon, by 12 points to 8.

Cardiff's path to today's Semi-Final has been achieved by victories over Garndiffaith away, Cwmavon home, Pontypool away, and Ebbw Vale away. On analysis of these victories, I think it is reasonable to say that we had a certain amount of good fortune in overcoming Garndiffaith in the first round by 3 penalty goals to nil.

For the third round we drew Pontypool away and we were immediately written off as standing no chance against the "semi - lionised" Terry Cobner led "Pooler" pack. The result, 16 - 11 to Cardiff is now history, but what a way to write it. Gerald Davies scored four magnificent tries and we triumphed for the second year running on Pontypool territory.

Lady Luck again saw fit to give us an away draw in the fourth round, again in Gwent, to Ebbw Vale. This also proved to be a fine game of open rugby and we won 29 - 10 with a good performance from our young backs, expertly marshalled by Gareth and Gerald.

When the Semi-Final draw was made on television, I think I detected a momentary drop in the jaw of the Swansea Chairman, John Llewellyn. This was probably due to the fact that they have to go back to December, 1970 for their last victory over Cardiff.

We hope to extend this sequence today, and make us participants at the National Stadium on April 29th. I'm sure Swansea will have something to say about that. May the better team win (as long as it's us!)

SWANSEA AND THE CUP

It was down at Burry Port that Swansea had their only real fright in the Welsh Cup. The ground was so confined, the Burry Port forwards ran around like bats out of hell, the match went into extra time, and the boot of Dennis Lewis, a former Swansea full-back, put the home side ahead.

By then the wind was gusting to gale force and the fervour of the screaming crowd lining the touch - line was rapidly reaching the same peak. Suddenly, a giant-killing act was on the cards and the genuine anxiety was mirrored on the faces of Swansea officials and committeemen perched on the staging that served as a stand.

In the end, all was well . . . Swansea survived. with no heart attacks, just sighs of relief that they had managed to clamber over the first hurdle. But it was the sort of match that makes the Welsh Cup. now sponsored by Schweppes, such a fascinating competition.

Swansea's next two ties were at home, where they accounted for two Gwent clubs, Pontypool United and Newbridge.

Next it was the guarter-final at Bedwas, and Swansea produced what was easily their best performance of the season, disciplined and dedicated in the most appalling conditions. It served to raise hopes of another final appearance among the St. Helen's faithful.

But first Swansea have to dispose of the Cup favourites, Cardiff, in today's Semi-Final. Their record of achievement in the last couple of weeks must give them hope, a record highlighted by Easter Monday's magnificent performance in beating the Barbarians.

So now Swansea, after the shakiest of starts on the Cup trail, are just one match away from the Final. Can they make it? Can they end a long, depressing run of defeats at the hands of Cardiff? We shall find out this afternoon.
