And a Blwyddyn Newydd dda to you all. The fact that I am writing these notes with some three matches to go before you read them has nothing to do with the N.G.A. and flying pickets, and everything to do with a congestion of fixtures, Bank Holidays and the exigencies of the printing trade.

Nevertheless, despite the fact that we are still bruised and somewhat bemused by the decidely unseasonal Cup match at Treorchy, and we have yet to learn whether Bridgend, Pontypridd and Coventry are going to enter into the spirit of the season of goodwill and make us a present of a couple of tries or so, I can assure you that we are starting the New Year in the very best of ways by hosting Bath R.F.C.

It matters not that over Christmas you were comatized, analysed, baptised or breathalysed, nor that you are probably now over-sized and under-capitalised, you are going to eulogise over what I consider to be the best all-round team in England when they are at full strength. I saw them beat Newbridge on their own ground with the gutsiest performance I've ever seen from an English club pack and with some splendid running from their three-quarters.

The week before Newbridge had beaten, easily, the South Western Counties selection that ran the All Blacks close enough. However, the Bath team had already beaten Neath 67-0 at Bath — a result that caused gasps of incredulity amongst Welsh fans. However, when you realise that Bath can call upon the services of players of the calibre of John Horton at fly-half, who has won eleven caps for England, and is partnered by Richard Hill, formerly of Exeter University and currently under surveillance by the English selectors, and three-quarters like David Trick (one cap against Ireland) who has now happily returned to the fold after doing walk-abouts in America, together with John Palmer at centre (a hot favourite for a centre spot in the English team) and Simon Halliday, who has played for England against Canada, but with bad luck and even worse timing broke his ankle recently, it is perhaps not so surprising.

Particularly when served by a Bath pack that fears no-one, and contains Ronnie Hakin (Ireland) at No. 8, and Paul Simpson (England) who is an unusual and very effective player. When he isn't tackling All Blacks and lying concussed, he is flashing smiles at the crowd and leaping at advertising boards. I realise it must be galling to some players to know that they have missed out on the goodies since the R.U. edict on amateurism, but really Paul it isn't the advertiser's fault — and it was the wrong advert anyway.

Paul Simpson with Roger Spurell (captain) and John Hall form a powerful back row that, allied to their potential thrust behind the scrum, must lead Bath to believe they are well set to gain their first ever win at Cardiff Arms Park.

We have played Bath on 32 occasions, winning 25 games and losing six, scoring 468 points to their 223. Our biggest win in the series was at Cardiff in 1982 when we beat them 32-3. They returned the compliment last year when they hammered us 28-9 at Bath.

Whatever the result, may Rugby Football win, and start off 1984 with an optimistic smile on its face.

KNOW THE LAWS

ADVANTAGE

The referee is the sole judge of whether an advantage has been gained. An advantage must either be TERRITORIAL or such possession of the ball as constitutes an obvious TACTICAL advantage. Officials who referee advantage well are those who have a real feeling for the game — its players and coaches — and spectators.

Here are some guidelines for referees, players and coaches.

- Put yourself in the non-offending team captain's position. Would he want the
 advantage or the scrummage; would he want the advantage or the penalty?

 He cannot have both. It is either advantage or the scrummage; advantage or
 the penalty.
- After a knock-on or throw forward, if the non-offending team does not get clean ball, without any pressure, then blow immediately. Similarly if the offending team regain immediate possession of the ball following the knock-on, the referee should blow up for the scrummage.
- 3). The referee should ask himself why did the number 8 keep the ball at his feet, or why did the jumper catch the ball two handed in the line-out and hold onto it? In both instances it is to catch the opposing players offside and to be awarded a penalty. The referee should give them the penalty.
- 4). For offside players the referee should ask himself, "did the offside player stop the movement of the ball?" If the answer is yes then give the penalty.
- 5). The referee should tidy the game up early so that players know exactly what the referee expects of them at rucks, mauls, tackled situations etc., so that the referee is not continually blowing for the same offence or playing advantage for the same offence by the same player e.g. the hooker who continually comes around offside at the front of the line-out, holds his arms in the air, smiles and apologises to the referee, and then returns to his side of the line-out. The referee who continually plays advantage in this situation is causing trouble for himself and the non-offending team.
- 6). A referee cannot make players play the advantage following an offence. It is up to them to play the ball, and if they don't, they are saying, in effect, "referee blow your whistle".
- 7). Advantage is a personal thing, but whatever approach a referee adopts, he must be consistent during the game for both sides.


