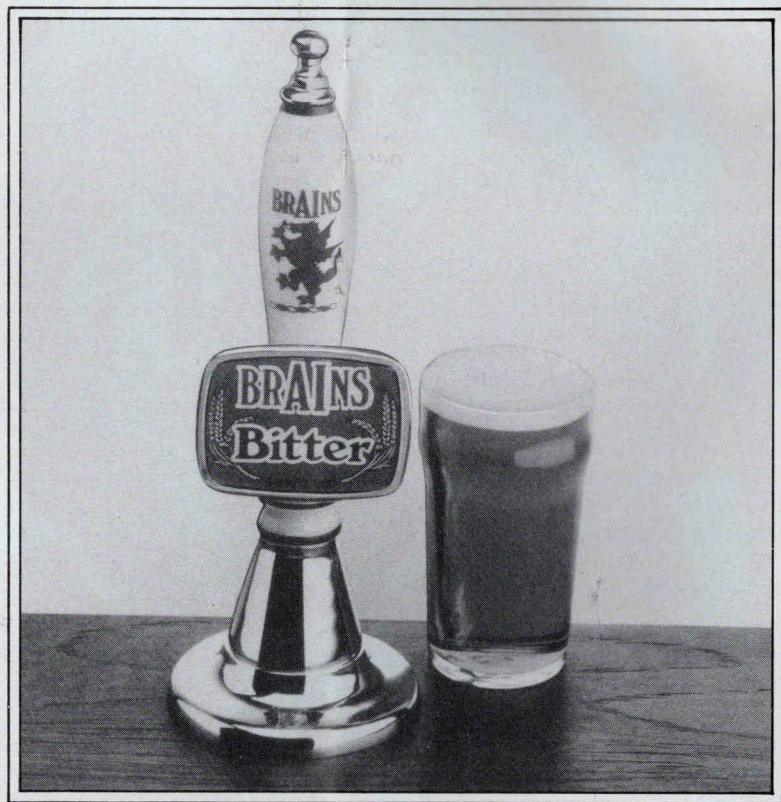

## Cardiff v. Llanelli

WEDNESDAY, 28th NOVEMBER, 1984

KICK OFF 7.15 p.m.

Well, well, well! After last Saturday's happenings, Matilda must certainly have done her fair share of Waltzing. With the sort of pre-match atmosphere that permeated, it indicated a rather close game with only the brave predicting the eventual winner. Who would have put a bent penny on the Wallabies chalking up the highest score of any major touring team that has ever graced The Arms Park. Certainly not me. And give them their due, on the day they would have been a match for any side that could have been turned out by any International Board country. The real heroes of the piece must be the whole Australia pack who's ability to win enough ball for their potentially lethal backs was very much in question. What a complete reversal of that situation it turned out to be though and great credit must go to that Wallaby pack and the positive manner in which their talented backs used it.

Perhaps we should be a little grateful that the ground was a bit on the heavy side but full marks to groundsman Bill Hardiman for having the pitch in a far better condition than we would have expected given the monsoon like rains we've had all through the month. What could have happened had the weather conditions been more suitable to their all out attacking style leaves you frightened to contemplate. Those first two tries were absolute gems and well worthy of comparison with some of the great scores by Wales in the spectacular 1970's. Oh that we could see the men in Welsh jerseys scoring such well created and clinically executed tries. The only plus element that we can take from last Saturday was the fact that Jeff Whitefoot finally gained that coveted cap after being so long on the replacement bench. Well done Jeff on becoming Cardiff's 165th Welsh international.

Credit must also be given to Wallaby coach Alan Jones in his unshakeable confidence in the ability of his best side to be good enough to achieve their first ever grand slam of the four home countries. With Welsh hopes of squashing this well and truly buried it only remains for Scotland to thwart their attempt. To Australia, then, we wish you good luck in your quest for what would be a very well deserved honour. And looking slightly more ahead to December 15th when they return to Cardiff for the Baabaa's game, it would be a real corker provided we get reasonable conditions. As you may well remember it was Bill McClean's 1947-48 Australian touring side that played the first game between the Baabaa's and a major touring team so a repeat of that match of January 1948 would come as an early, but very welcome Christmas present. Incidentally, speaking of the Baabaa's, the next new selection for the famous nomads will be the 100th Cardiff player to receive the honour. Any bets on who that would be?

On to this evening's game now however and I suppose both our visitors and ourselves are indulging in a little bit of preening and basking in the glory of doing what neither of England, Ireland nor Wales could do, and that's beat Australia. The Scarlets must be given great credit for their second half performance when it looked as if they were dead and buried at the interval. But they generated the 'Old Scarlet Fever' in that second half and ran out with another touring team scalp under their belts. Well done Sospan.

Hopefully, then, for tonight's game there will be no hang-ups in the shape of injuries and both sides will be able to field their best teams. That win over the Wallabies did The Scarlets the world of good as the season has not been all peaches and cream for them so far. Their old warhorse, Ray Gravell has only made spasmodic appearances due to his new found career on the 'telly', while skipper Phil May was first side-lined by injury and then along came his unfortunate sending-off which keeps him out until next



month. The cumulative effect of this situation robs Llanelli of a tremendous amount of experience at a time when they are rebuilding their side in an attempt to recapture the heyday period of the early and mid 1970's. Some of their younger players are certainly fulfilling these aspirations and one of their newest caps, Phil Lewis, looks very much a player in the J.J. Williams mould. His speed along the wing and his style is very reminiscent of his famous predecessor so is his kick over the top and chase technique.

At this point in time, however, consistency seems to be the name of the game that The Scarlets are looking for. They have been very much up and down again this year. After finishing last season by winning only one of their last seven games, in which they scored only 19 points and conceded 114, they appear to be on the same track again this year particularly away from home. In the whole of 1984, that's the back end of last season and up to the present of this, they have managed to win only two games against first class opposition away from home. Things are slowly coming into line however, and no doubt nothing would give them more encouragement than to register a win on The Arms Park this evening. This is more than they have achieved for some time now though as they last ran out winners in Cardiff in November, 1978 and by also winning on their own patch that season, 1978-79, it was also the last time they doubled up. Of the 13 games played since that defeat in Cardiff, including two cup matches, we have won 8 to The Scarlets 5. All their five wins have been on Stradey but of our 8 wins, we have managed to come home with the bacon from 'Sospanland' twice. Our overall record of fixtures which began in 1881 reads played 205, won 114, lost 74, drawn 16, points for 1943, against 1415. So, to Llanelli then, welcome again to the Arms Park, congratulations on your victory over Australia and, long may we remain in partnership as the scourge of major touring teams when they visit Wales.

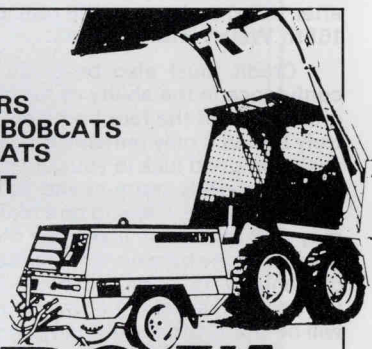
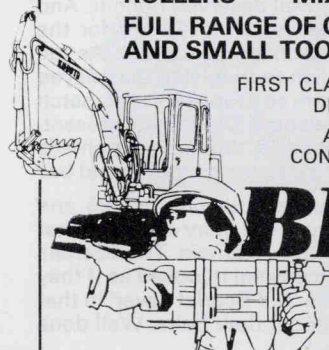

# KNOW THE LAWS

## Should it have been a penalty try?

Warm congratulations to Llanelli on their fine victory over the Australians. For 21 years I lived in Penygroes, near Llanelli, and spent a great deal of my time supporting the Scarlets, and last Tuesday was one of very many fine achievements in the history of this great club.

But the game could have ended in real controversy. Llanelli's left wing, Edward Ellis was tackled without the ball as he seemed certain to outspurt the defence and drive on his fly kick for a thrilling try.

In the end it did not matter as outside-half, Gary Pearce made the touchdown anyway, and converted his try with a fine kick from near the touchline.

However, very many spectators and television on-lookers were uncertain on the incident — should it have been a penalty try? Indeed did the referee, who was chasing from behind, actually see the obstruction on Ellis?

One thing is certain, however, **in law**, that **the English referee, Mr. Fred Howard, was perfectly correct** in letting Pearce's score stand and not awarding a penalty try under the posts.

He had no option under the laws as **a penalty try can only be given if a try would probably have been scored**. If the Wallabies cover defence had beaten Pearce to the touch down, a penalty try was, I am sure, inevitable.

But a try **was** scored from the move, thus cancelling the requirements for a penalty try.

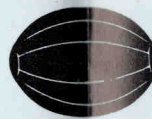

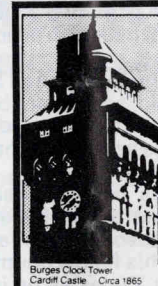

# QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

Well, I never . . . never expected, that is, to hear Alan John Phillips described as a 'sensitive soul'. Yet that is how one of his close acquaintances referred to him. The colleague continued: "He is possibly one of the most misunderstood players in the team. He builds up this tough facade — and plays to it — but deep down below that dourness, he is very sensitive and caring — particularly about the younger players."

With a bit of luck, that word 'sensitive' should send Alan John Phillips into a motivated state of mind for this evening's visit of those menaces from the west.

And, of course, there is a particular irony in this evening's game following the defeat of Wales on Saturday. As the two club sides who have defeated the touring Australians, there may be special needle in proceedings. In which case Alan Phillips will certainly be well to the fore.

Alan, in fact, enthusiast as he is, watched Saturday's game from the anonymity of the West terrace. He was, I'm told, sought out by a journalist after the shattering defeat for his comments. "If you are a writer," he told the scribe, "I am making no comment. But if you've half an hour to spare as a rugby enthusiast, then listen to this." Or words to that effect.

Rivalry as there has always been between Alan and the Welsh captain Spike Watkins — when Alan and Mike were Cardiff clubmates, they were of course alternating as reserve hooker to Bobby Windsor in the Welsh national squad — it gave the Cardiff vice-captain no pleasure to see his fellow countrymen under both the hammer and the sword. He is as enthusiastic for Wales as he is for Cardiff — and that is saying really quite a lot.

"If Alan Phillips cries off from a game," says one of his team mates, "then you can guarantee something really serious has happened. He is 100 per cent for the club, very loyal."

That loyalty to his colleagues has led to occasional brushes with committee men "but it is only that he is fighting for the team, and especially for the youngsters," says the colleague.

The enthusiasm shows itself in a variety of ways. "He was responsible for bringing to the club one very good young player who was out of a job," says another person connected with Cardiff, "and made himself responsible for ensuring that the player had new boots and was thoroughly looked after. But Alan's that sort of guy."

Others will tell you of his determination to raise money for the club's tours. Before the trip to Bangkok last summer, for example, "you couldn't get on the team bus for any away match without Alan wielding a batch of raffle tickets under your nose. No one was safe from him — and Terry Holmes."

And even though he doesn't play the game himself, he would not miss the club's fund-raising golf days: he'll always be there for the laugh.

Talking about golf, and digressing for a moment, I believe that Terry Holmes was back on the course this afternoon, striving to regain fitness, when partnering Albert Francis in a friendly match between the Cardiff Committee and the Llanelli Committee.

And talking about Albert Francis, I understand that Albert could tell you the half-time score of a game even if he hadn't seen a single move. When he takes the interval oranges on to the Park, Alan Phillips will scoff the lot, given the chance and if Cardiff are winning. If things are going wrong, as happened a week or two ago when Oxford University were the visitors, he won't have a single slice.

Strange because the redoubtable and lively Phillips has a reputation among some of his mates of being a bit of a magpie where food is concerned.

A man of many parts, then. Hooker Phillips is a Cardiff record-holder — as the player who has scored the most tries wearing the No. 2 shirt. This was a number he did not always wear.

At Kenfig Comprehensive he played in the centre — which gives some clue as to his

speed and mobility around the field — and only later turned to hooking, a position from which he captained the Wales Youth team. Even so, not many people will remember that his first appearance in Cardiff's colours was on the wing — albeit as a replacement.

From then, Alan never looked back — or rarely, anyhow. The proud possessor of 15 Welsh caps (along with Terry Holmes, Gareth Davies and Scotty, he presented a Welsh jersey to the ground staff at the National Ground: it hangs proudly in Bill Hardiman's office), he will surely remember the notorious 'Ringer's' international with irony.

With only 14 men, and with time running out, Wales seemed to have plucked a famous victory out of the air when Alan made the break which sent Elgan Rees in for a try. Hare's injury-time penalty shattered the celebrations.

The window-cleaner from mid-Glamorgan — he somehow always manages to persuade the Cardiff team to stop at his local pub for a drop or two of real ale on their way back from matches down West — always plays to the very end, never gives up. And so it's a bit surprising also to hear another friend echo almost the original words of this article. "He can make some very cutting comments sometimes about his colleagues but they are always constructive. And he'll melt if you apologise for an error. . . ."

All of which again should help send A.J.P. out on to the Park tonight raring to go. I don't somehow think that Llanelli will discover how sensitive Alan really is.

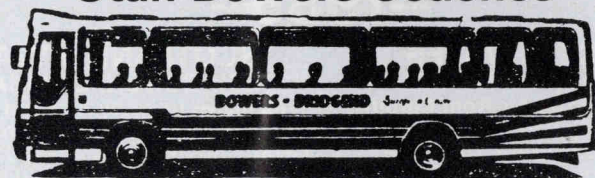
And so it promises to be yet another Wednesday evening of drama. It's strange how the fixtures have fallen to provide so many mid-week crucial matches. And there are more to come.
