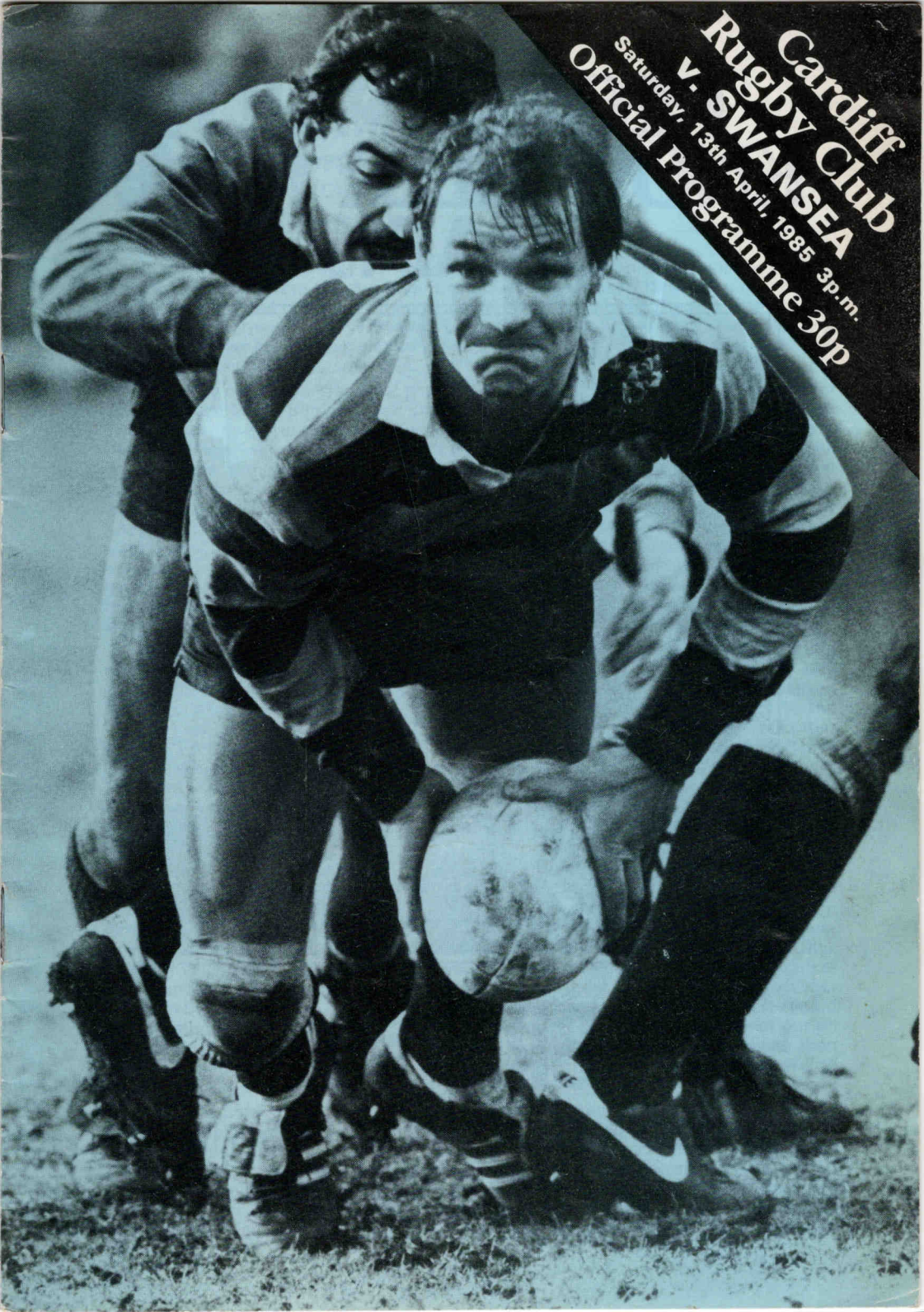

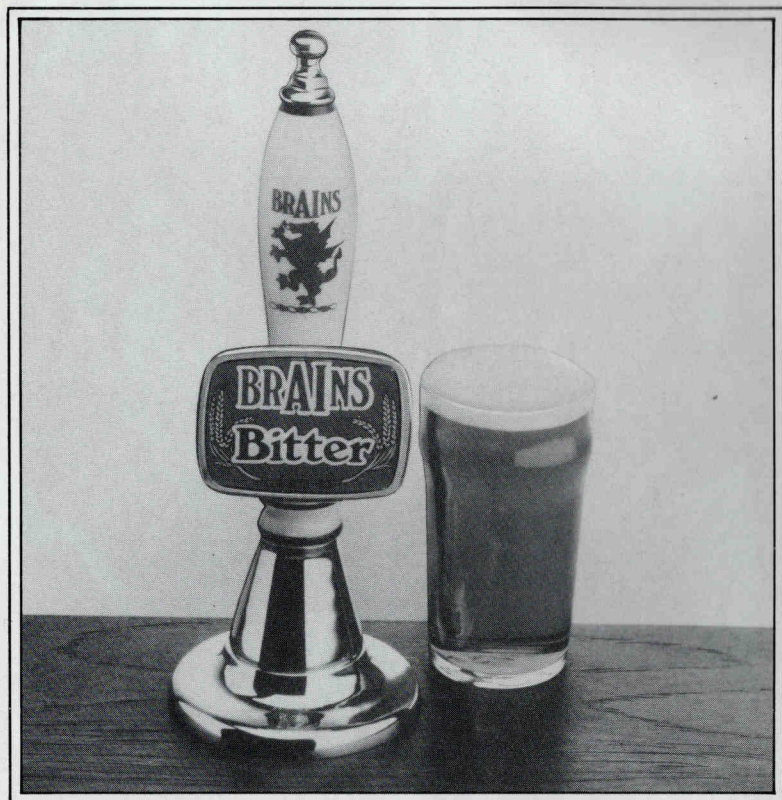

## Cardiff v. Swansea

SATURDAY, 13th APRIL, 1985

KICK OFF 3 p.m.

It seems quite incredible but here we are at our last home game of the season. Furthermore apart from the cup final it could also see season 1984-85 pass into the history books. What better way than to say farewell to rugby at The Arms Park than a visit by our old friends from West Wales, The All Whites of Swansea. They are one of the few teams we have played on a very regular basis for over a hundred years and today the series becomes 250 games old.

Presently our record stands at played 249, won 129, lost 91, drawn 29, points for 2032, against 1708. Behind those stark figures however lies many an epic struggle. Even as recently as our last game it was excitement from start to finish at St. Helens in December. We were in front by 13-9 in the last few minutes of the game but The All Whites came home very strongly to get a well deserved try to draw the match. That game included some really marvellous rugby and one try by Adrian Hadley was as exciting as any seen this season. Gareth Davies had opened out deep in our own 22 (metres of course) and the ball quickly got across to Adrian who beautifully rounded his wing, kicked over the full backs head and won a thrilling chase to score. (If you can remember he nearly scored against the Baa Baa's in practically the same fashion). That game in Swansea was certainly a corker but what is quite remarkable about it was the fact that it had rained all morning prior to the game, and it kept on unabated during the afternoon but we were still treated to a rare spectacle of classic rugby.

This has been the order of the day throughout the series however. Since the last war though, as far as results are concerned, a win in Cardiff has become a very rare commodity indeed. Their win in April 1981 was the first they had recorded since season 1965-66. Also, having won away in season 1980-81 they have to go back to the 1965-66 season in order to claim the last time they managed to double us. Their other wins in Cardiff since the war were in 1949-50 and 1960-61. The 1980-81 win didn't give them that much satisfaction either because it was squeezed in between our first ever Schweppes Cup Final win against Bridgend on one Saturday and The Baa Baa's the following Saturday. We had nothing like our strongest team out and lost by 20 points to 11. Two weeks previously however, we had beaten them in the Semi Final of the Cup by 18 points to 7.

So The All Whites are still very keen to lay their Cardiff Bogey where both sides are at full strength. Today would give them a lot of satisfaction to go back home West with a win under their belt. If we survived Wednesday night's game against The South Wales Police it means they would have the pleasure of becoming the first side this year to win one The Arms Park. They obviously won't be at full strength because Dick Moriarty will be missing and if you cast your mind back to the 13-13 draw earlier on at St. Helens he was outstanding that day. A bonus for them, of course, is the fact that Malcolm Dacey is back in business and his encounter today with Gareth Davies could be very significant perhaps. Stuart Evans will also be out to impress against our all international front row so all should be set for another cracker. To Swansea then welcome again to The Arms Park and without wishing you too much success we do hope you really enjoy your visit.

At the beginning of these notes I mentioned that this and the Cup Final could be the only games left to play this season. As you know all in all with inclement weather and the subsequent postponement and rearrangements have caused a pool of eight games which needed a new date, Moseley H; Bristol H; London Welsh H; Maesteg H; Newport A; Llanelli A; Neath H; Bath A. We had arranged for Neath to play on The Arms Park on May 4th. They agreed to this but subsequently fixed up a tour to Italy and asked us to release them from the new date. This we had to do of course. Then came our



marvellous win in the Cup semi final against Pontypool and that changed the whole complex of the situation. It meant terrific pressure for the players who frankly admitted that they've had enough and hoped that the season would end on Cup final day. So it was decided to accede to the players wishes and forgo all five home games and seek the co-operation of Newport, Llanelli and Bath in the hope that they will understand the particularly awkward situation in which we find ourselves. Hence the statement that today and the Cup final would bring down the curtain on the season.

A quick look at the present record for the season reads played 38, won 31, lost 5, drawn 2, points for 1002, against 447. Gareth Davies is top scorer with 345 points and is only 39 short of his last season's record of 383. It looks as if that will still stand because 39 points in the two games left is really asking for something. Top try scorer at the moment is Adrian Hadley with 20, Terry Holmes 16, Gerald Cordle 15, Mike Carrington 15 and Mark Ring 14.

The Rags record reads played 35, won 31 and lost 4 with points for 846 and against 401. Their four defeats came at the hands of Glamorgan Wanderers II and Bath United away and Blackwood and Swansea Athletic home. This weekend they go away on a two match tour to play Lymm and Sale 2nds. Lymm are particularly strong and are due to play Sale 1sts in the Cheshire Cup Final.

Our Youth team have also reached the final of the W.R.U. Cup and now wait eagerly for the result of the other semi final which is still to be played having been postponed on several occasions already. The teams in the other semi, however, are Maesteg and Llanelli so a win for the latter could see a repeat performance of the Schweppes Cup a week later on The National Stadium. Whoever their opponents are, let's hope we can achieve the double to end what has been a great season.

## KNOW THE LAWS

By J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS

1. **Question:** In claiming a fair catch or mark, a player is injured. What is the correct action for the referee to take?

**Answer:** Summon attention to the injured player — after stopping play. **If the injured player is unable to take the kick. within one minute, a scrummage shall be formed at the mark. His team shall put in the ball.**

2. **Question:** The ball rebounds from the goal post to a defending player who calls for a 'Mark'. Should it be allowed.

**Answer: Yes,** a fair catch or mark may be obtained even though the ball on its way touches or rebounds from a goal post or crossbar and can be made in In-goal. The player should be stationary with both feet on the ground.

3. **Question:** An opponent unfairly charges the catcher in In-goal after the referee has blown his whistle for a fair catch, i.e., a mark. What is the correct decision?

**Answer: A drop out shall be allowed.** If the opponent had unfairly charged the catcher in the field of play then the referee should award a penalty kick.

4. **Question:** If having charged fairly, players of the opposing team prevent the free kick from being taken — what happens next?

**Answer: The free kick is void.** The referee should award a scrummage at the mark and the opposing team shall put in the ball.

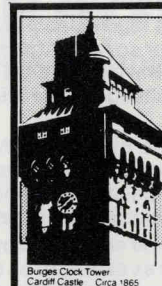

# QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

When you consider that it's only Adolf's third season in senior rugby, you have to acknowledge that a lot has happened to him — and possibly the only three things he would care to forget in that time are a missed opportunity at the Parc des Princes, his nickname and an evening on Mekong whisky, Brains Dark being somewhat difficult to acquire in Thailand.

All of which should give the Cardiff aficionados a clue that the subject of this afternoon's final seminar of the season — Swansea being the last visitors to the Arms Park — is Mr. Adrian Michael Hadley.

Of all the team with whom I have dealt in this column I give Adrian the prefix 'Mr.' on the grounds that he works, or so I am informed, in the tax office and one never knows when it may come in handy to have done a bit of crawling. "And like every tax man you ever knew," says an unkind colleague, "he tries to get away without paying anything out."

I sympathise, too, with the nickname. When all is said and done, it would not automatically cross the minds of proud parents that A.H. also stood for Adolf Hitler. Never mind, I suppose it could have been George Bernard Hadley — although there are other players around who might have been better qualified for those particular initials.

Adrian Hadley — so everyone seems to say — is a quiet man, unassuming, modest, occasionally dry but clearly not as extrovert as some of his colleagues in the backs. He is rarely to be found around singsongs and never does a solo — "which is a blessing with that voice of his," says another team mate who has actually heard it — and tends to fade into the background.

But this quietness, which can give the impression of laziness insofar as, in the words of one associate, "Adolf will do the least that's necessary to score a try for example," is deceptive. After all, just look at his track record.

Adrian Hadley played for Cardiff Schools and South Glamorgan Schools before winning three Welsh Youth caps in 1981. He joined Cardiff at the start of the 1982-83 season, won a first team place within a month or two, scored 26 tries in that first season and won a place in the Welsh team squad.

The meteoric rise continued when he was chosen to tour Spain with the Welsh party and scored seven tries — including two hat-tricks — in the three games in which he appeared. If he was disappointed at not winning a place in the side which played the Spanish national team — the two Reeses were on the wings — he did not show it, though a close friend believes it was a blow at the time.

His moment was to come shortly. Early in the '83-'84 season he was chosen against Japan, scored a try and then collected his first full cap in Bucharest against Romania in the November. Four more caps followed in the Home internationals that season which culminated in his appearance in the winning Cardiff Schweppes Cup side — though Adrian had sadly to be substituted early in the second half.

There've been more caps this season, of course, and another honour in being chosen by the Barbarians on Easter Monday.

In short, an eventful year or two — and the next two Saturdays should find more happy memories for the religious, St. Joseph's club man.

"Mind you," says a team mate, "it's just as well he plays for Cardiff. If he played for Swansea you wouldn't even see him, he's so white. He's the only member of the team who went on last summer's tour of Thailand and came back whiter than he started out. He just doesn't tan."

"And he should stick to beer, at which he can see off some of the forwards without

My thanks, then, to those within the dressing-rooms who have acted as finks, narks, squealers and informers: it's been fun listening and writing. I hope it's been fun reading.
