



# **Cardiff v. South Wales Police**

SATURDAY, 30th NOVEMBER, 1985 KICK OFF 3 p.m.

There are enough subjects both on and off the field being debated about Welsh Rugby these days to go on *ad infinitum*. Violence, of course, is well up the list but thankfully we are not directly involved at the moment with that aspect of the game. It goes without saying, however, that we never have or ever will condone this malaise of the game in the Cardiff style of play.

Fixtures and the number of games played however are very relative and obviously have given rise to a lot of discussion in our club. As Alun Priday pointed out in a press statement, the committee has decided that fixtures must be pruned to a more realistic pattern with particular emphasis being placed on Wednesday evening games. This has been welcomed by many members and supporters although it means a little less rugby.

Having made and publicised the decision, however, is the easy part of the job, but the actual machanics of the operation are going to be extremely difficult indeed. There is certainly no instant elixir which could be poured over the complicated fixture set up to smooth it into balance for all concerned. Our own particular case further complicates matters because we are not really masters of our own destiny. All fixture secretaries have to set Cup Saturdays aside but in addition we are precluded from using our ground on international occasions as well which obviously makes the effort of achieving a balanced home one week and away the next a very difficult if not impossible task. Then again, certain sides are going to be disappointed at being dropped or played on a less frequent basis. Fixture secretary, Brian Mark, is well aware of all these problems, however, and is very dedicated to producing a list as balanced as it can be within the constraints which apply. As it is an impossible task, Brian will obviously need a little more time than normal to resolve it.

Back to today now however, and let's hope it's a nice a rugby day as it was last Saturday. And it's the long arm of the law that we welcome today in the shape of the South Wales Police. They have now become a force (pardon the pun) to be reckoned with, and last year maintained their fifth position in the Club Championship which they also had achieved in season 1983-84. In doing so they won 31 of their 44 games, lost 9 and drew 3. They just topped the 1,000 points mark of which Neale Harris scored 328 and Mark Brinkworth 116 with 29 tries to his credit. They also achieved their best ever cup run but lost to Llanelli in the quarter final, after disposing of Newport in the previous round. They also saw off such sides as Bridgend and Swansea so they were

perfectly justified in thinking they had really arrived.

This current season, however, they are struggling a little to maintain previous success. They have had the hammer blow of losing all three of their highly talented back row; Martyn Morris, Phil Davies and Mark Perego, but nevertheless have high hopes for the present incumbents Darrel Price, Greg Prosser and Jeff Roach. Steve Sutton is still beavering away in the lines-out, ensuring adequate ball while at the helm is new captain and Wales B cap, hooker Steve Davies. They have achieved some good wins over top opposition including Pontypridd, Abertillery, Plymouth Albion, Ebbw Vale (whom they hammered by 33-4 at Ebbw Vale) South Glam. Institute and Richmond. They had a good game at Bath but lost by 29-18 and another near thing came at Gloucester where they finally went down by the narrowest of margins 15-14. Last Saturday away to Bristol they more or less held their own with two tries apiece, but went down by 25 points to 15. This was mainly attributed to Bristol's place kicking of five penalty goals to S.W.P.'s two, and as quoted in the press - "a depressing reminder of how accurate kicking continues to win rugby matches." Clive Barber, Steve Davies and Mark Brinkworth (again top try scorer in Wales with 16 to his credit), all missed that Bristol game and Bleddyn Bowen had hamstring trouble but they hope all will be fit for consideration today. No doubt they will also be looking for another good run in the cup. They got over the first hurdle away to Gilfach Goch and now have to travel to Cardigan for the second round to be played on 21st December.

For the record we have played S.W.P. on four previous occasions, winning 3 and losing the other. We have scored 66 points to their 41. It only remains then to extend a warm welcome to their players and entourage, we hope they enjoy their day.

# **KNOW THE LAWS**

### **SOME OBSERVATIONS**

How often do you see scrum halves who receive the ball from a line-out often back into their own forwards for protection?

Should this be allowed?

The answer is: NO. Why?

LAW 26 (1) (c) on Obstruction states that it is illegal for any player who is carrying the ball after it has come out of a line-out to attempt to force his way through the players of his team in front of him.

But even if the referee did not apply this Law on obstruction, he would however, be justified in awarding a penalty because according to LAW 24 A (2) (a), the forwards in this particular situation are offside.

Play should not be allowed to continue even by lenient refereeing since an advantage would have been gained by the infringing team.



# **PAST PLAYERS CORNER GWYN EVANS**

It's very appropriate that today's subject concerns policemen. Gwyn was born in Treherbert but his father's work took him to the Swansea Valley at an early age. He played his first senior rugby with Vardre but his talent was such that Swansea soon recognised him and he had worn the All White strip before he was eighteen.

In 1938, he came to Cardiff and joined the then City Police Force. The chief of that particular time wouldn't allow his staff to play rugby so Gwyn spent his leisure time kicking the round ball. In 1942 he went into the army and saw action in North Africa and Italy. After the war he came back to the City Force where a new wind of change had blown and rugby was not only permissable but encouraged. Gwyn soon became so much of a star in the side that like Swansea before us, we soon had him in our first team. He joined us in season 1946-47 and such was his impact on the game that he won the first of his twelve international caps in January 1947 against England within a couple of months of joining Cardiff. He also won his Cardiff first team cap in season 1946-47. In harness with Les Manfield, what they lacked in tonsorial adornment they certainly made up for in strength, aggression, speed and sheer excellence of play.

Gwyn played until season 1949-50 and played in 101 first team games and scored 16 tries. He was the only Cardiff City Policeman ever to get a Welsh cap because by the time Alex Finlayson was capped The City Force had been swallowed up by the present South Wales Force. His police career was as meteoric and successful as his rugby career and by the time he retired Gwyn had gone right up through the ranks to Chief Superintendent.

He now lives in happy but active retirement in Cyncoed and can often be seen walking round Roath Park at a very fair lick of knots. Hopefully, he will be here today and looking as fit as in his tremendous playing days.






