



Cardiff v. Swansea

SATURDAY, 7th DECEMBER, 1985 KICK OFF 3 p.m.

"The try for Cardiff was scored by Terry Holmes." Regretfully we will never again hear those oh so familiar words booming over The Arms Park in particular, but also over many clubs' grounds scattered all over the country. Every one of the 123 he scored whilst adorning The Blue and Black invariably gave more than its fair share of pleasure.

Whether they were from close to the line situations where he thundered over with the awesome power of a JCB or from far out with side steps, hand offs and a final defence splitting swerve, the arc of which would have done grace to a soaring eagle they all added up to another four points for Cardiff in Terry's view. The great man has made his decision however, and who can blame him if the vast sums of money being bandied about are true. Lets not sink into the gloom of negation however, but dwell on so many positive recollections he leaves us with. Born and raised in the very heart of the city, he is as Cardiff as Roath Park. Previous generations of boys in the street in which he lived (of which I was one) played their rugby with a ball that consisted of six rolled up Wizards and five Hotspurs all secured with a fair length of old knicker elastic. Very often it was not so old much to the detriment of the respectability of the schoolgirls of the street and on reflection perhaps its why we called them 'droopy draws'.

Right since his entry into primary school rugby Terry has always been that much in advance of his contemporaries. As a schoolboy, although fairly spindly in stature, he played like a youth. As a youth he played as a man and in senior rugby he has been a giant amongst men. A remarkable feature of his play has been his commitment to every team he has played for. I'll never forget the Scottish game of 1979 at Murrayfield when Terry had hared across the field to make a crashing try saving tackle on the Scottish wing. Whilst waiting for the ensuing line out he stood, slightly bent over hands on this thighs and the hot breath from his mouth appear to me to etch a perfect set of Prince of Wales feathers on the freezing Murrayfield air.

All this is now behind us however, as he passes into the Cardiff Hall of Fame. He has achieved cult status in Cardiff and the rest of Wales showed the esteem in which they hold him by the reception he received when he left the field slightly early in the Fiji game.

To Terry then, probably one of the best ever Cardiff born players we say a million thanks for the memories of your magnificent Rugby Union career both on and off the field. If we can put up a statue in the city to commemorate the feats of a born Cardiffian rugby player, surely we should rename The City Hall, The Holmes Hall to immortalise Terry.

"The try for Bradford Northern was scored by Terry Holmes" Now I'll bet those will become very familiar words up north soon — oh, those lucky people.

Rugby Union life must go on regardless however, and what better way this afternoon than a visit from our old friends and second most played opponents Swansea. The series stands at present at 250 games played, 130 of which we have won to Swansea's 91 with the remaining 29 games drawn. We have accumulated a total of 2074 points to The All Whites 1726.

Ironically too, the happenings at The Arms Park during the past week could have a very marked influence on the international future of some Swansea players today. Firstly with the No. 9 shirt of Wales now up for grabs, Robert Jones the young All White scrum worker has already made his impression on the game in Wales and has very deservedly gained his Wales B cap. Will he eminate that other teenager All White scrum half of 50 years ago, Haydn Tanner, by getting his full cap against England next January. Then with Robert Norster out of contention will Richard Moriarty get that second new spot, a position many think is his best. A good performance today from both of them would do their cause the power of good. To Swansea then a warm welcome once again to the Cardiff Arms Park.

Now a word about last Saturday's game. Without going into the pro's and con's and blameworthiness at this stage, it was sad to hear sections of the crowd acting very unsportingly. We have always enjoyed a reputation of being very fair and appreciative. I would hope that we don't lose that reputation which has taken a long time to build up. Silence, on times is a far better form of protest than abuse.

KNOW THE LAWS

THE WELSH RUGBY UNION DIRECTIVE ON VIOLENCE IN RUGBY

The General Committee of the W.R.U. view with the greatest possible concern acts of violence perpetrated on the rugby field during recent weeks. Whilst it firmly believes that such actions are untypical of the game as a whole, behaviour of the kind which has been recently witnessed is totally unacceptable and cannot be tolerated.

Everyone involved in Rugby Football has a responsibility to the game. It is a precious heritage, one which must be protected and indeed enriched and enhanced. To abrogate this responsibility will be to betray those who have gone before and, even more important, leave a doubtful legacy for those who will follow. The W.R.U. Committee believes that the time for appeals and fine words is past. It is now time for firm and decisive action. To this end the Committee has taken the following decisions:

1. In future, no Welsh player sent off at any time in a season will be eligible for selection to EITHER the Welsh National squad OR National team during that season. Furthermore, the Committee expects all other organisations under the jurisdiction of the W.R.U. and selecting representative teams whether at National, county or district level to adopt the same policy.

2. The Committee has instructed the Disciplinary Committee to review the sanctions taken against INDIVIDUALS ordered from the field of play and to give special consideration as to sanctions to be taken against CLUBS whose players have a bad disciplinary record.

3. The Committee reiterates its unequivocal support for referees and has instructed the Referees Committee to consider whether any further support or assistance can be given in this area.

4. The Committee has instructed the Coaching Committee to give consideration, through courses for coaches and players, to the development of correct attitude and sporting behaviour.

Finally, the Committee of the W.R.U. takes the view that a stand against violence in the game must be taken now. It intends to keep the matter continually under review and it will not shirk form taking even harsher action should it think it is warranted.



PAST PLAYERS CORNER

MALDWYN JAMES, F.I.Min.E., C.Eng.

Maldwyn is another of the eleven Cardiff players who represented Wales in season 1947-48. He was born in Cilfynydd where he did his early schooling before going to Pontypridd County. He went down the mines when he left school and began his rugby career with Cilfynydd. In season 1937-38 he gained a final Welsh Trial cap which is still exhibited in the Cilfynydd Club to this day. His occupation exempted him for military service and by November 1941 he had attained a first class certificate in mining engineering from Powell Duffryn's own school.

In 1942 after playing in a charity match at Taffs Well Mal was invited to play for Cardiff. This he did and also played in all the wartime internationals for which of course no caps were awarded. On resumption of official fixtures in 1945-46 Mal was first choice hooker and earned his First XV cap. He won his first Welsh cap against Bill McClean's 1947-48 Wallabies when Wales won by 6-0, and went on to win another four caps in that season.

After playing in 85 First team games, during which he did his fair share of place kicking, he finished in season 1947-48. He came on to the committee in season 1949-50 and served in many capacities until he retired in 1959-60. He reappeared again however in 1972-73 and was

chairman in season 1975-76 before retiring, for good he says, last season.

Maldwyn had a very successful career in mining and worked his way from the coal face to the top echelon and the alphabet he can put behind his name is well and truly justified by reason of his own hard work. His first management came at Bwlfa Tylorstown then on to Maerdy where he brought up the first coal at the new pit. He returned to Cilfynydd to Albion Colliery where 14 years earlier he had started his career. He went on to group management and finally finished as East Area Manager at Ystrad Mynach from where he retired in 1973. He now lives in happy retirement with his wife Madge in Abercynon.


