

Cardiff v. Northampton

SATURDAY, 11th OCTOBER, 1986 KICK-OFF 3.00 p.m.

Well another weekend of the season gone and yet more strange results ensued from last Saturday's encounters. Gone is Swansea's unbeaten record – Pontypool beaten for the third time on the trot – high flying Glamorgan Wanderers only just making it at Clifton and Ebbw Vale topping a Bridgend side who really appeared to be going places. Our own result against Newport also brought out similarities of the past. Did you realise the final score of 28-21 was only two points adrift of our memorable cup final against them last April. Furthermore our 28 points were made up of four tries, three conversions and two penalty goals which was an exact replica of the compilation of our 28 points in the cup final. Also Geraint John's three conversions and two penalties exactly match the twelve points scored by Gareth Davies last April. Adrian Hadley, who scored a hat-trick in the cup final, failed to get on last Saturday's score sheet.

Another unusual feature of last Saturday's game was Paul Ring's two tries on his debut. Since joining from local club St. Peter's he has taken his chances splendidly and has put in some good performances for The Rags and his first senior outing last Saturday was well deserved and he certainly celebrated it in no uncertain manner. With big brother Mark to keep a beady eye on him, Paul seems to have a promising future in front of him. Mark himself of course, is now thoroughly enjoying his return to full fitness. His insatiable appetite for the game coupled with his confidence to try anything, invariably sets the place humming as soon as he gets

A further oddity about that Newport game was the fact that Newport weren't going to be left out for the brothers act and in fact had their own set out in the shape of Nigel and Jonathan Collard. Now here's the question; when was the last time brothers played in a Cardiff First XV against a team that also included a set of brothers. Now don't ask me to provide the answer to that question will you? In regard to the first part of the question however, I would imagine that Roger and Stuart Lane were the last and prior to that it would have been either Tony and Elwyn Williams or Gareth and Gethin Edwards. Looking into family connections in the club in Danny Davies' book reveals some fascinating information which I'll tell you of in the Pontypool programme.

Another debutant (I'm glad I remembered not to put an 'e' on the end) who caught the lime-light and even upstaged Paul Ring's two tries last Saturday was ex-English International Richard Cardus who has joined us from The Wasps. Richard, who won his two caps from The Roundhay club in 1979, is a big, fast man and marked his first game in Cardiff colours for the Rags with three tries against Newport United last Saturday. He made a big contribution to a very good game that ebbed and flowed until the Rags ran out a remarkable 43 points to 30 winners. Still this is par for the course with the Rags who have scored 279 points in their ten games of which they have won eight, Matthew Hadley's side is a fairly young one this year but are playing very entertaining rugby and are always worth watching on The Park when the First XV are away. Although they lost to a very lively Bridgend Sports side on Wednesday by 29 points to 28 it was another highly entertaining game.

On to today now however, and it is our great pleasure to extend to Northampton a most warm welcome. This afternoon sees the 58th game in the series which began in February 1926. Of the previous 57, we have won 34, lost 18 and 5 games have

been drawn. It is interesting to note that of those five draws, three of them came on the trot in seasons 1960-61 at Northampton 6-6; 1961-62 at Cardiff 9-9; and finally 0-0 at Northampton in 1962-63. The latter of those was the only game in the series which produced no points at all. The 'Saints' with 18 wins in the series have a reasonable success rate in Cardiff with 6 of the 18 on our ground, Indeed, we used to have some rare old battles with them in the late 1940s and early 1950s. During that period, which was probably their best, they had such magnificent players as Dickie Jeeps, Jeff Butterfield, Frank Sykes, Don White, Phil Taylor and a host more. Their best run came during this period when they won at Northampton in November 1952. drew at Cardiff in 1953 and then won again at Northampton in 1954. They used to visit us every Easter Tuesday in times past, but it was the fourth game of a rather masochistic tour embracing three other Welsh clubs on Good Friday, Easter Saturday and Monday. Mind you, there was many a Cardiff player rather pleased to see the scrapping of that Easter Tuesday game. At this point in time we have rattled up a string of 10 consecutive victories which again is a record for the series. The Saints last win came at Northampton in 1974-75 by 9 points to 6.

At present Northampton are trying to get over the disappointment of last season's poor record. Their win to loss ratio was less than 50% for the first time in several season's and they have failed to qualify for this season's John Player Cup for the first time ever. This year they have lost to Bristol, Harlequins, Nottingham and Moseley. They have registered good wins over Richmond and last Saturday beat London Scottish by a healthy 30 points to nil. Today they will be without their only current international, Gary Pearce, who plays for England against Japan. Their team does contain a familiar rugby name however, Guy Steele-Bodger son of the famous

Once again then, to Northampton welcome to the Arms Park on this your 27th visit to Cardiff. P.N.

MATCHES RECALLED

Continuing his season-long series of articles on a match from the past between Cardiff and the day's visitors. J.B.G. THOMAS recalls

A Second Half Recovery

October 9, 1971: CARDIFF 24pts NORTHAMPTON 20pts

THE NORTHAMPTON Club is a few years older than Cardiff but the two did not meet until 1926. Apart from a few small gaps, they have met regularly since then, providing plenty of entertainment for their followers. In recent years Cardiff have enjoyed runs of success whereas it used to be a case of give and take

One match I remember is that of 1971 at the Arms Park when the lead changed hands regularly, with bursts of scoring by both sides. Cardiff followers appear to enjoy such happenings; for them it adds to the excitement and encourages the players.

Cardiff were ten points down at the interval and not looking too happy but staged a fine second-half recovery to surprise Northampton and gain a handsome lead, only for the Englishmen to fight back bravely. They were pipped at the post and Cardiff won the match at 24-20.

There were names that some may have forgotten but who did their job nobly, as did the halves Gwilym Treharne and lan Lewis. There were experienced men at threequarter in Alex Finlayson and Tony Williams. The latter gave long and valuable service as a player, particularly in Sevens, and is now an able committee man. As they say in Taffs Well, there will always be a member of the famous Williams family helping Cardiff.

At forward there was Lyn Baxter, Carl Smith and Phil Kallonas, and all eight men in front produced a special effort in the second half. One real character was P. L. Jones, who as usual scored a try. He was a deceptive wing and opponents often underestimated his pace and strength. Finlayson was acting captain in the absence of John James.

Northampton had an outstanding player in full-back lan Moffatt, who collected 12 points in the match. In the first half, indeed, he was the only scorer, with a try through good support work before he dropped a goal and kicked a penalty, just to show he was an all-round player. Northampton were playing well even if it was a case of Moffatt 10, Cardiff 0 at half-time.

Chat at the interval indicated that some special effort was called for, and the Cardiff pack responded with enthusiasm while the halves got their act together. The outcome was 24 points without reply!


Phil Kallonas, Alex Finlayson, Lyn Jones, Tony Williams and John Harding scored tries, and lan Lewis landed two conversions. Cardiff were coasting home – or at least that is how it appeared to watchers.

Whether Cardiff relaxed or Northampton made further efforts but the men from the Midlands fought back and had the Cardiff players and followers more than a little concerned before the final whistle which ended a splendid match.

In Northampton's late rally, Cooley and Oldham scored tries and Moffatt converted one of them. The players left the field to the warm applause of an appreciative crowd, and so was maintained the long record of happy Anglo-Welsh matches at the Arms Park.

After this match, Northampton gained their revenge by winning at home in 1972 and 1974 but have not won since, although the two clubs did not meet last season and this makes today's match all the more interesting.

Another close affair with the two sides racing neck and neck to the end would be appreciated.



KNOW THE LAWS

By J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS A SPECIAL SITUATION

If a player is tackled short of the goal line and attempts to place the ball over the goal line for a try, may a defending player attempt to prevent a try by taking the ball from the attacking players hands?

The question arises from Law 18(3), which states that it is illegal for any player to prevent a tackled player from playing the ball or to pull the ball from a tackled player's possession.

Law 18(1) supplemented by Note (1) indicates what a tackled player is required to do and to do it **immediately!** Provided these requirements are met, the tackled player may place the ball over the goal line for a try and, accordingly, **in such circumstances**, a defending player may attempt to prevent such a try being scored by taking the ball from the attacking player's hands.

However this should be regarded as a ruling for a unique, specific and special situation.


